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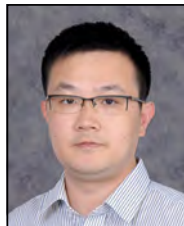
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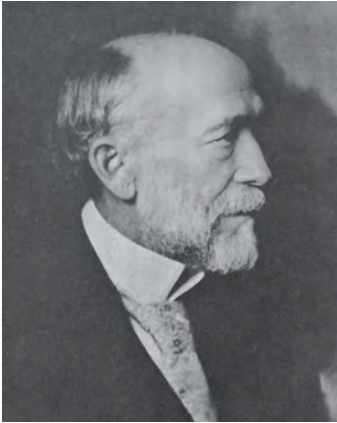
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The Senator Platt Family Collection

Started Prior to 1870



Senator Thomas Collier Platt

The Senator Platt Family Collection was started prior to 1870 by United States Senator Thomas Collier Platt (1833-1910) who represented New York in the House of Representatives and the Senate beginning in the 1870s and through the turn of the century. Senator Platt was known for his role in consolidating the five boroughs of today's City of Greater New York in 1898, and "shelving" Governor Theodore Roosevelt by putting him onto 1900 McKinley-Roosevelt Presidential election ticket. He never imagined that McKinley would be assassinated in 1901.

The Platt Family Collection reflects the numismatic bent and political influence of Senator Platt whose personal interest in this hobby was supplemented by gifts from his many friends. A large portion of the collection was assembled by Senator Platt himself beginning in the 1860s and 1870s, but more items were added by later Platt generations. Other collectors in the Platt family included his son Frank Hinchman Platt (1856-1920) whose legal career was intimately connected with the political career of his father; Livingston Platt (1885-1968),

a lawyer, leader in state politics, and former mayor of Rye, New York who assembled the world's largest combined U.S. and International collection of Christmas Seals; and Frank Hinchman Platt II (1913-1990), a lawyer and member of the 101st Airborne Division that landed in Normandy, captured Eindhoven, liberated the Kaufering IV prison camp, and engaged in the Battle of the Bulge, holding out in Bastogne.

The Platt Family Collection touches upon a wide range of numismatic categories but boasts concentrations in colonial coins, large cents and the classic commemorative series. Some of the highlights include a stunning Proof 1895 Morgan silver dollar, as well as Condition Census examples of the 1786 Maris 24-P New Jersey copper and 1797 Sheldon-135 Draped Bust cent. The fascinating selection of world and ancient coins is highlighted by a spectacular Choice Mint State Peruvian 1713 Cob 8 Escudos, a Mint State British 1820 Crown, and a Roman Republic Anonymous Aes Grave As.

In 2023 the senior members of the Platt Family concluded that their successors did not desire to continue collecting, and the holdings should be made available for others to enjoy. As such, Stack's Bowers Galleries is honored to now present the Senator Platt Family Collection to a new generation of collectors as part of their August 2024 sale. For a majority of the coins, this sale represents their first public appearance in a century or more.

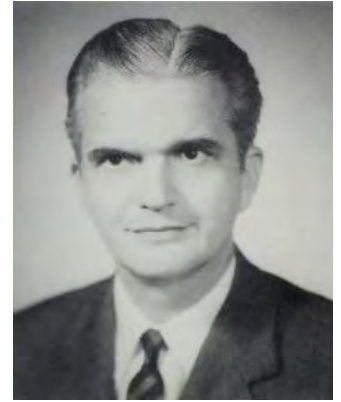
The Collection of Lucius S. Ruder, 1901-1965

Lucius S. Ruder was born in Hamilton, Ohio, on September 18, 1901. He graduated cum laude from Dartmouth in 1922. A quiet, intellectual, punctilious businessman with deep ancestral roots in Butler County, Ohio, he was a director and part owner of the Cincinnati Sheet Metal and Roofing Company. Mr. Ruder was also active in banking circles acting as a director of The First National Bank of Hamilton, Ohio, where his father before him had been a president and founder. He was also a director of the Bank of Clearwater in Clearwater, Florida, where he established a home in the years following his volunteer service as a Lieutenant Colonel in the Air Force in World War II.

A student of history, Mr. Ruder had wide interests in local historical affairs, and he had an extensive collection of early American letters and papers. He is said to have had one of the finest private collections of Civil War documents and letters known.

Paralleling his interests in history and economics, Mr. Ruder's numismatic activities began with the purchase of an extensive coin collection from the estate of Dr. Philip Holmes, a prominent Chicago surgeon and lifelong collector who had amassed the bulk of his collection in the 1920s. Mr. Ruder easily doubled the size and quality of this collection over the years unobtrusively drawing

on multiple sources and broadening his interests to include Washington medals, tokens, and foreign coins. He spent many happy hours at home with his wife, Louise, reading and studying the historical setting of each coin. Were it not for his untimely death in 1965, Mr. Ruder would have amassed a truly great work when his coins were correlated with the historical documents.



Lucius Ruder was a warm, friendly man and a dedicated collector of quality material. His enthusiasm inspired that of others and his love of history and people was always apparent. His surviving friends and family still miss him.

Stack's Bowers Galleries was privileged to offer prior portions of the Ruder Collection across a series of auctions in 1987, 1992, and 2023. The current selection is marked by a magnificent array of U.S. and British gold coins including an Irregular Stars 1907 Wire Rim Indian eagle (potentially unique in private hands) and a Mint State British 1729 EIC 5 Guineas.



Stephen Phillip Rutherford

Stephen Phillip Rutherford, known mostly by his middle name “Phillip,” was born April 30, 1942 in Brawley, California. Growing up as part of a farming family in the Imperial Valley, he helped out on the family’s feed lots and in the fields, planting and harvesting alfalfa and various vegetable crops. After completing high school he attended University of California Davis and graduated with an agricultural degree. He then joined the Army for four years.

After leaving the Army Phillip created a motion picture livestock ranch in California, supplying livestock



and wagons to the motion picture industry. In the 1980s he returned to the Imperial Valley to take over the farm for his father. Phillip remained in Brawley and continued to farm up until his death in December 2023.

Phillip began collecting coins as a young boy, a pursuit he loved throughout his life. The primary focus of his impressive collection was Spanish Colonial issues of Mexico and South America. Additional areas of interest included U.S. coins, Ancient coins, Mexican gold medals among others.

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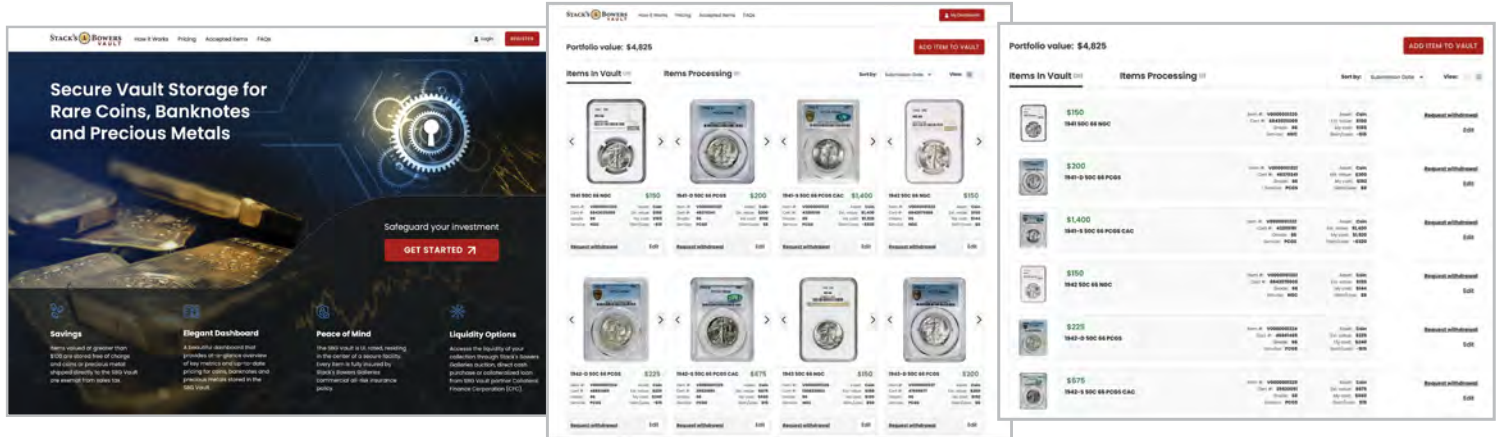

The undoubted star of this set is the tremendous Spur-Ryal of James I, graded a marvelous MS-63 by PCGS. It goes without saying that examples of the type do not often appear with this level of preservation. The strike quality is tremendously impressive, with a beautiful richness to the famous and popular design. The flan delivers a rich luster, with a shimmering appeal

and allure punctuated by supple glossiness. This enchanting piece is complimented by two 2022 commemorative issues, a 5 Ounce 500 Pounds and a 2 Ounce 200 Pounds. Each of these delivers essentially perfect surfaces, with rich cameo contrast and an old style design charmingly executed on these trial issues. A set that is the only one produced in this format, and as such, a treasure that is worthy of a premium bid.

The son of Mary Queen of Scots, who would later be executed by Elizabeth, James was a Protestant despite his mother's Catholicism. Having inherited the Scottish throne from Mary, and being the great-great grandson of Henry VII, he was a natural choice for the English throne once Elizabeth died childless. He succeeded her to the throne, uniting the monarchies of England and Scotland and he is the first Monarch to have two sets of succession numbers attached to his name, one English the other Scottish. James immediately faced challenges to his rule in England, and survived several attempts on his life, most notably the foiled Gunpowder Plot of Guy Fawkes. An increasingly obstinate Parliament limited his aims at ruling, and this would continue long after James. Of note, the King James Bible derives its name from James I for authorizing the translation of the Bible into English in 1607. Jamestown the first permanent English colony in the New World also arose from the name of James the monarch at the time.

Outside of this example, we have only been able to trace two other pieces throughout the years. One substantially inferior piece was sold in Baldwin's Auction 26 (05/2001 Lot #2024) and another example is impounded in the British Museum collection that also appears technically lesser than this one. Given the potential decade plus wait one might encounter when seeking out a plain edge Anne Proof, any collector of

Anne or British Milled Coinage should act with urgency to bid on the present lot.

Produced in 1707 in Edinburgh, this 6 Pence arises from the time of the Union of England and Scotland into the Kingdom of Great Britain. While England and Scotland had the same ruler since 1603, political union between England and Scotland was a difficult proposition during the 17th Century having failed three times during the tumultuous time for Great Britain. By the beginning of the 18th Century deeper political integration had become desirable for economic reasons, allowing the Articles of Union to pass both Parliaments. While it is unclear if the plain edge proof coinage was to celebrate the Union, it seems likely given their paucity of mintage and the symbolism inherent in the date and mint of these coins.

He gained much experience under the likes of Lieutenant-General Sir John Moore and was appointed to Aide-de-Camp to Major General Lumley, a well known hardened senior officer. On July 30, he was appointed to senior officer of his Battalion during the Battle of the Pyrenees which resulted in the decisive defeat of the French. For this victory, Lieutenant-Colonel Ward, Captain Campbell and Lieutenant-Colonel Leggatt were each presented gold medals from the Prince Regent.

The “Dump” Coinage of New South Wales

A VERY RARE type for this already elusive series, the present specimen displays broad evidence of circulation, but nevertheless retains all of its rather spartan design facets as well as an enchantingly wholesome nature. A tremendous opportunity for the advanced collector of the series.

Owing to the extreme shortage of coinage in Australia, the government in New South Wales secured some 40,000 Spanish colonial 8 Reales to repurpose. Each crown-sized coin was holed out, with the large denomination serving as a “5 Shillings” piece,

and the small denomination—the hole itself—serving as “15 Pence” piece. As the resulting denominations were both worth more within New South Wales than anywhere else (owing to their reduced silver than what would be expected elsewhere), the hope was that this necessity coinage would not leave the colony and cause another shortage. Ultimately, these pieces circulated heavily for a decade until a supply of British coinage arrived at significant enough levels to satisfy demand. At that point, the “Holey Dollar” and the “Dump” were withdrawn, leaving few survivors to satisfy collector demands today.

Indeed, a similar specimen, *also graded NGC MS-67 and hailing from the Augustana Collection*, realized a total of \$204,000 in our Summer 2022 Global Showcase Auction (Lot # 30013).

Czech Mint records suggest that between the 192 strikes, 20 were given to private individuals and 172 were preserved for the Slovakian state, an administrative subdivision of the First Republic of Czechoslovakia. How many of these pieces survived the occupation of Czechoslovakia and the subsequent Second World War, not to mention the following communist occupation, is unknown. Between PCGS and NGC, only six have been certified, with perhaps a handful more examples still extant beyond this. This miniscule figure highlights this piece's status as an ULTRA RARITY and provides some context on how elusive these pieces are. In 1938 the First Republic of Czechoslovakia stared down a crisis, trapped against the aggressive Nazi Germany, Adolf Hitler's focus shifted to the Republic after Austria had been incorporated into Germany. Claiming to be acting in the defense of ethnic Germans in Bohemia and Moravia-Silesia, Hitler demanded the Sudetenland's absorption into Germany. Britain and France, still war weary from the Great War consented to this demand, without consultation of Czechoslovakia and in violation of France's previous defense agreement with Czechoslovakia. In 1939 the remnants of the First Republic of Czechoslovakia were occupied by Germany as the Protectorate of Bohemia and Moravia. Britain and France watched the last remaining democracy in Central and Eastern Europe be absorbed under the yolk of tyranny, a tyranny that would continue until the Velvet Revolution in 1989 and the peaceful split of the Czech Republic and Slovak Republic in 1993. This 10 Ducats serves as one of the last physical reminders of the democratic and progressive Czechoslovakia and highlights the beauty and hope of all Democratic societies. A moving and powerful symbol of the triumph of the open society against the evils of both fascism and communism.

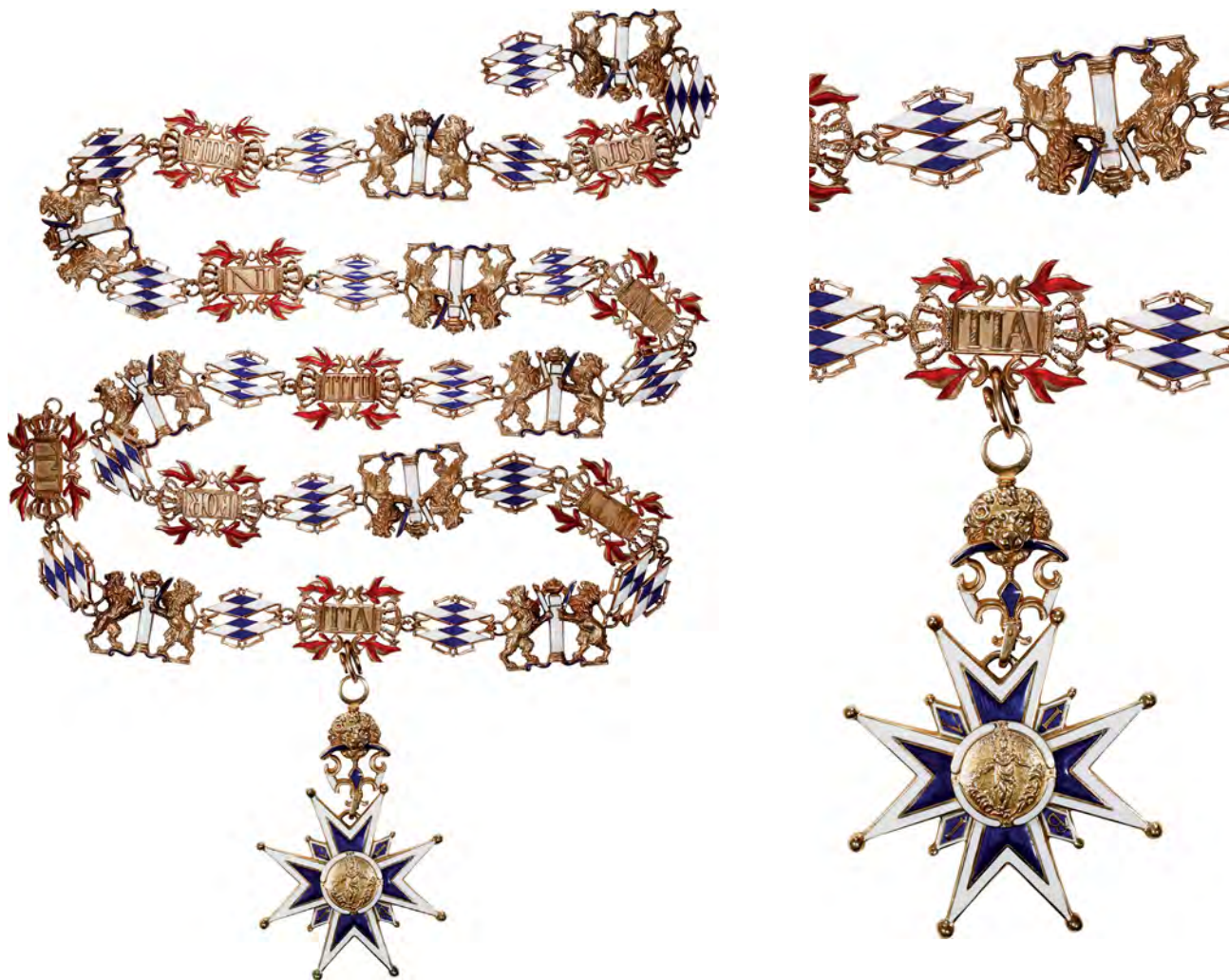

The Order was founded 24 April 1729 by Elector Charles Albert, who gave it the title of Order of the Holy Knight and Martyr Saint George and the Immaculate Conception of the Holy Virgin Mary. The statutes for the Order were established 28 March 1729 as a Military Order of Chivalry for Roman Catholic noblemen, the Grand master was always the elector, later the King of Bavaria. It was confirmed as a Catholic order papal bull nihil aeque jucundum which gave the Order the same rights a the Teutonic Order. The statutes dedicate the members to be devout Christians unparalleled amongst the institutions founded during the age of the Enlightenment.

An intriguing item that has an accompanying history that is unusual to say the least. While perhaps apocryphal, this piece was featured in a mid-20th century article in the Milwaukee Sentinel titled Numismatics? It's Pleasant Epidemic, where it details the local folklore that surrounded it. For enjoyment sake, we have transcribed the entirety of the article below:

"In 1934 only eight Milwaukeeans were suffering from numismatics. To date no more than 150 have been afflicted. It's practically an epidemic. Money has and is being solicited to alleviate suffering. But don't be alarmed. While numismatics may be regarded by some as a disease, it is merely Mr. Wester's way of defining "coin collecting."

I had only a vague understanding of this formidable word until I met Hubert L. Polzer, a Milwaukee jeweler, who makes a hobby of collecting old and interesting coins. He is nationally recognized as an author-

ity on the value of rare coins. When the Sentinel's Problem Clinic is puzzled about coins, Polzer is often quizzed. He knows the answers.

His huge collection numbers several thousand items, dating from a Roman coin, 430 B. C., to the 1950 Booker T. Washington memorial half dollar. His smallest coin is Siamese, made from lead bullets. Though only about half the size of an aspirin tablet, it bears the official seal of Siam.

His largest piece is a \$4 Swedish coin of about 1734. It is solid copper, weighs eight pounds and is 12 inches square.

Hanging on the west wall of his store in a gold frame are specimens of "fractional currency" issued by the United States government, 1863 to 1887, because of the shortage of metals. It is similar to our present paper money, but from three to 50 cents in value. It is still legal tender, but a collector will give you more money for it than a bank.

Teachers of economics in local schools and colleges frequently borrow from Polzer's collection for classroom study and instruction.

Born on Walnut St.

The Milwaukee Numismatic Society was born in the back room of Polzer's jewelry store at 1132 W. Walnut St. Polzer has been its president and librarian as well as the president of the Central States Society. He has been contributing to the Hand Book and to the Guide Book of United States coins for many years, and all for the love of the hobby.

He is properly proud of this privilege and says, "If you know your American coins, then you know most every event in American history."

Polzer was born just outside of Vienna, Austria, in 1900, and came to Milwaukee at the age of eight. He showed me his old report card. The marks were "sehr gut."

At 13, while learning his trade in a 12th St. jewelry store, he became enamored with the then new buffalo nickel. Cutting out the Indian heads was good practice on the jeweler's saw. With these cut-out heads he made cufflinks and tie pins for the kids of the neighborhood. His interest in coin collecting began.

A Cherished Treasure

We asked Polzer what his most valuable piece was.

"Let's not speak of value," he said, "but my most cherished piece in one rich in Milwaukee history."

Then he showed me three 20-mark gold pieces struck in 1888. They were hinged together with gold filagree. Each piece bore the likeness of one of the three Kaisers - Kaiser Wilhelm, his father and grandfather.

This unusual memorial had been presented by the royal family to a Milwaukeean. In 1921 it was sold at auction at the Auditorium to another Milwaukeean. The proceeds went to help Germany rebuild. Upon the death of the owner Polzer came into possession of it.

"Examine the workmanship," said Polzer, handing it to me. "Understand its historical significance. Who can place a value on such a thing?"

This collector's treasure will be shown for the first time publicly since the auction, Aug. 24 to 29 at the Schroeder Hotel when the American Numismatic Association holds its annual convention in Milwaukee for the first time. Some 450 to 500 members will be guests of the local chapter."

The convex center of the plate is entwined with oak leaves and scrolling around 7 coins. In the very center of the plates is a commemorative German Taler surrounded by three German 5 Mark coins, an Austrian 2 Florins, a British Crown and an Italian 5 Lire. The ruler on these coins represent the majority of German rulers of the 19th century. The plate was produced circa 1890 to 1903. Kerfack, a Master Goldsmith, was know for quality and made precious gold and silver items. This piece was made with the highest artistry and skilled workmanship. Each of the coins contained in this piece are securely held in place appearing to be braised in several areas. Like many vintage silver artifacts that were manufactured for use and display, the surfaces do show evidence of being cleaned numerous times over the decades with rich slate patina in the protected areas and crevasses. While each of the coins offers rich mottled patina with some displaying iridescent hues.

Paul Kerfack (1832-1903) became an apprentice goldsmith under his father, Friedrich Heinrich Kerfack (1795-1867) of Rostock, Germany. Paul completed his apprenticeship on 1 April 1851. For 7 years he traveled as a journeyman through Germany, Switzerland and Northern Italy (Piedmont) and France. In his father's workshop, he completed his master work and achieved his Master level on 17 May 1858 at age 27. Paul purchased a work studio where he constructed two separate areas: a work area and a sale room. There were now two Kerfacks working together as goldsmiths for 10 years. Their work was now recognized as quality and serious workmanship. He installed a shopping window to entice more customers. He decided to make only genuine and precious gold items. One could not purchase cheap articles nor copies in his store.

Paul died in 1903 and the business was taken over by his wife. She died in 1917. Their son Otto Kerfack (1875-1937) took over the business. The business declined due to inflation and WWI. In 1930 he declared bankruptcy. After three generations, the line of Kerfack goldsmiths came to an end. Two of Ott's employees purchased the business. On 15 July 1930 they opened the studio under name of Paul Kerfack, owners Hermann Peters and Alfred Sinner, Jewelry, Gold and Silverware. The Kerfack business survived WWII

without destruction and plundering by the Russian Army. Sinner's Son, Gerhard, became a partner. In 1958 Peters retired from the firm. Sinner retired in 1965 and died in 1967. Gerhard Sinner took over the business by himself. In 1973 he changed the name to Kerfack/Sinner. The East German government only allowed him to make repairs.

In 1979 Gerhard Sinner was imprisoned for not paying taxes and producing Jewelry without the State's approval. He was accused of espionage and enemy of the State. He received 5-1/2 years imprisonment and could no longer work as an independent goldsmith. The entire family estate was confiscated with a value of well over one million East German Marks. On 30 June 1979, after 121 years the firm of Paul Kerfack was dissolved.

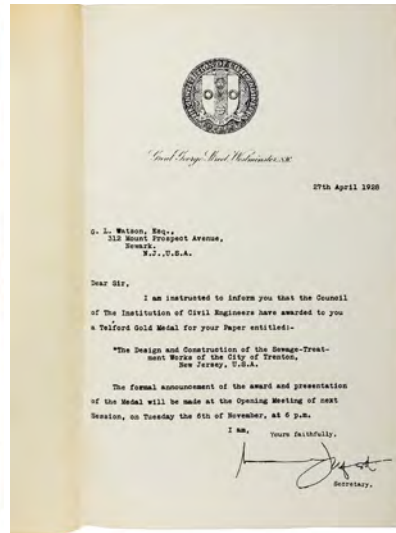
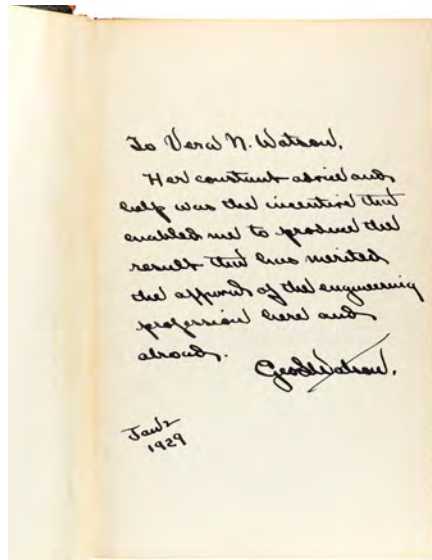

According to his 27 February 1976 obituary in *The New York Times*, Watson "...had been a consulting engineer and adviser for the United States Government, Panama, Brazil, China and Canada, and for some 55 state, county and municipal commissions, boards and legislative bodies," and had also served as a "...consultant to the old New York and New Jersey Interstate Bridge and Tunnel Commission during the construction of the Holland Tunnel."

YAP ISLAND. Stone Money “Fei”, ND (Pre-O’Keefe type, mid-late 19th Century). ESSENTIALLY AS MADE. Opitz-pg. 316/21; Quiggin-pg. 144, P1#12; Sigler-pg. 19. Weight: 54 pounds, 8 ounces; Dimensions: 16 ½” by 19” by 4”. Yap Island produced the world’s largest and heaviest coinage, most commonly referred to as “Fei” or “Rai”, considered sacred amongst the local people. The largest examples are in excess of 12 feet in diameter, weighing about 2 tons. Due to their excessive size, the larger stones often traded ownership without physically being moved and would remain in place as it became common knowledge among the inhabitants that it now belonged to a new owner. As there is no large source of stone on Yap, the stones were quarried and shaped on the island of Malakal in Palau, then shipped back to Yap on native boats. The stones are made of calcite, which is abundant on Malakal. Some of the larger stones took as long as two years to quarry and shape using axes made from giant clams. The trip from Malakal to Yap via boat was a hazardous voyage that claimed many lives. Often the value placed on a stone directly related to the amount of human lives lost in order to quarry it and deliver to Yap. Although there are many sizes and shapes of Yap stones, they can be classified into two basic types: pre and post O’Keefe. The earliest stones were produced by the locals using axe heads

made from segments of the giant clam. Later stones or “O’Keefe stones” were produced in the late 1800’s using metal tools. David O’Keefe was American of Irish heritage who came to Yap with tools and a junk boat acquired in Hong Kong, which he used to quarry and transport “Fei” from Malakal to Yap, and through this process set himself up as the King of Yap Island. The 1954 motion picture “His Majesty O’Keefe” starring Burt Lancaster, although somewhat dramatized and engrossed, fairly accurately portrays this series of events. The stone offered here is the pre O’Keefe type. Seldom are larger stones available for sale as removing them from the island was extremely hard due to their size and weight. This example is quite nice to behold and well produced considering it was hewn by hand. In color it is a lovely milky golden tan with stripes of richer coloration. Often referred to as the key or “Holy Grail” to assembling a collection of primitive money, the chance to obtain one of these pieces does not present itself often with serious consideration given by interested bidders.

Some peripheral roughness on the reverse hints at the noted corrosion removal, the coin's only mentionable drawback. Exceedingly elegant with its understated charcoal tone, this outstanding piece will generate endless enthusiasm.

Struck during three different years (1771, 1774, and 1777) and with issues bearing the dates of just 1771 and 1777, this trade issue represented the Danish Asiatic Company’s attempt to establish a presence in the Asian sphere, all while presenting some rather familiar iconography (*the dos mundos* “pillar” style made famous by colonial Spain). The original output of 1771 is almost unobtainable, with an estimated five examples known. The subsequent issue in 1774, also dated 1771, but recognizable on account of the presence of a “D” at the end of “ISLAND,” is more plentiful—albeit with an estimate of only 20 known to survive. This **EXTREMELY RARE example emanates from the latter emission, and is assuredly an enthralling representative. Hardly any evidence of handling or circulation is noted, with a good deal of original brilliance residing among the protected areas, and with an alluring cabinet nature present throughout. A tremendous opportunity for the collectors of issues related**

to colonial Spain and the New World, trade issues related to the Far East, and even **RARITIES** within the sphere of world crowns more broadly.

KM is rather erroneous in its presentation of the two types, those dated and issued in 1771, and those issued in 1774 but still bearing the 1771 date. KM mentions that the central crowns on each side of the 1771 originals are large, while those on the 1774 issues are small. KM also erroneously links Dav-411 with the originals from 1771, and Dav-411A with those from 1774, but Davenport’s only distinction between 411 and 411A is the presence of a “D” at the end of ISLAND, or a lack thereof. Davenport makes no noted distinction between originals and restrikes, though he suggests that the answer may lie in the die pairings. In fact, it is this lack of the final letter in Iceland that determines original status, as those that lack the “D” are the original issues from 1771, leaving all other 1771-dated coinage as the actual output for 1774. Among those issued in 1774, there are noted differences in dies and die pairings, as one obverse displays a crowned coat-of-arms that features a more pronounced, plunging “V” shape that divides the two upper halves, along with a legend break centered directly above the crown. Meanwhile, a different obverse displays a much tighter “V” shape dividing the two upper halves of the shield, along with a legend break that shows the “D” in “DAN” almost touching the central cross at the top of the crown. For the reverse, differences in the size of the central crown are also noted.

Exceptionally Rare Engraver’s Mistake Recovered from the “El Cazador” Shipwreck

MEXICO. Mint Error — Inverted Date — 8 Reales, “1872”-Mo FF (1782). Mexico City Mint. Charles III. NGC VF Details—Sea Salvaged. cf. KM-106.2 (inverted date not mentioned); cf. Cal-1122 (same); Yonaka-M8-82a (plate coin). Presenting a remarkable engraver’s mistake, whereby the celator transposed the middle two digits of the date, this **EXTREMELY RARE** issue, one of only four known and all of which were recovered from the El Cazador wreck—at first seems futuristic, as it evokes a period some 90 years later during the Mexican Republic. In fact, this crown had long since been submerged, going down with the *El Cazador* ship when it sank in early 1784. Some moderate corrosion is noticed throughout the surfaces from prolonged saltwater immersion, but isn’t really a distraction, while the highly erroneous date remains clear and bold. When taking into account its status as a sea salvaged piece from a famous wreck along with its stunning error date, it becomes easy to recognize its unicorn nature in terms of unrivaled appeal and historical importance.

According to author and researcher Brad Yonaka, this error date was known at the time of manufacture. In fact, an official proclamation was issued on 11 January 1783 describing such an error, stating that, should any be encountered, they should be gathered, melted down, and restruck. If any of these defective coins were encountered, individuals were encouraged to return to the mint or any other royal administrative office to exchange for equivalent face value in non-error coinage. The proclamation was to remain in effect for more than six months until the last day of June, after which the coins would be demonitized and only worth their bullion value. Clearly not many of these error dates survived, as all known examples were recovered from the El Cazador wreck, with the current piece being one of the finest known.

The Extremely Brief Nueva Vizcaya 8 Reales

Some flatness of strike affects the central devices, but both the royal arms of Spain and the civic arms of Durango are discernable. Free of the sloppy striking or excessive adjustment marks seen on most examples, this piece stands above the rest and makes a stunning representative of this exceedingly challenging one-year issue.

Nueva Vizcaya was a large northern province of New Spain, with its capital at Durango. When the War of Independence erupted in 1810, bringing the colonial trade networks to a halt, the province found itself economically isolated from Mexico City and in dire need of coinage. A provisional mint was authorized for Durango to address the shortages. This emergency issue was struck only between February and March of 1811, just before the commencement of Durango's regular issue, bearing the bust of the king, which was in continuous production until the end of the war. As such, this crude necessity issue is among the rarest Royalist types of the War of Independence period.

The last piece to come to market, an example grading just VG-10 by NGC, though it was previously mentioned as having been "...mounted and with various test marks" when appearing at auction prior to its certification. On this elusive coin, most of the legends are completely, and rather boldly, visible, with some minor areas of weakness upon each side as is usual for the issue. Additionally, the noted repair emanates from the careful and tasteful removal of some graffiti that appeared within the central ring of the reverse. Nevertheless, the level of handling is commiserate for the grade, with some enticing deeper gray toning further accentuating the legends. Given the staggering **RARITY** of this important crown, it is quite easy to overlook its details

designation, as its overall level of preservation likely places it among the finest that one can hope to encounter.

New research conducted by Max Keech, in his yet to be published upcoming book, offers supporting evidence for the attribution change from a Royalist issue to the second Insurgent issue that is indisputable. The mines of Real de Catorce were opened to obtain silver for the provisional coinage during January and February of 1811, but by 20 February the insurgent forces under the guidance of Lt. Coronel José Mariano Jiménez fled the province. Unfortunately, on 21 March 1811 Lt. Coronel José Mariano Jiménez along with Insurgent leaders and over 900 men were captured. Later, on 22 May Jiménez gave testimony during his trial confessing to issuing coinage in the province and neighboring areas. He stated that this coinage was issued in full fineness and intrinsic value.

In response, Morelos used his monogram not only on royalist provisional types, but also to revalidate coins struck under his own authority which were found to be valid official issues. This accounts for the curious appearance of the Morelos monogram being struck over the existing Morelos monogram of the host coin, as on this example. The large majority of such coins, however, are copper. The present piece is far more scarce for having been struck in silver.

Good centering provides a mostly complete reading of the peripheral legends, including the full name and ordinal of the king. The centers display a bold mintmark "P" and denomination between the pillars along with a well-presented royal shield. Some roughness points to the coin being a sea salvage, but this adds to its rustic charm and complements the deep charcoal tones.

Colonial officials in Peru first requested permission to establish a mint in Lima in 1551, but the distant Spanish authorities waited until 1565 to grant this request and send instructions to produce only silver coinage, in denominations of 4 Reales and below, in a style based on the "Late Series" issues from Mexico. Production began in 1568 under assayer Alonso Rincon, but these early emissions were found to have deficient silver content. The Viceroy of Peru replaced Rincon as assayer with Xines Martinez (who took the mark "X") in late 1570. However, an order from King Philip II arrived in 1571 to halt all production and wait for the arrival of a new "shield and cross" design to better match the types in use back in Spain. Martinez was in turn replaced by Diego de la Torre in 1573, and today most coins from his brief tenure are of the newer "shield and cross" type. The "pillars and waves" issues bearing his mark are exceptionally rare today owing to the vanishingly narrow window of time in which they were produced.

The surfaces are quite argent but are interspersed with dark tone. This unauthorized issuance was usually melted down, so most surviving examples are sea salvaged. As such, this wholesome survivor is a **VERY RARE** find indeed.

This rare issue is a direct result of the Great Potosi Mint Fraud of 1649. Global commerce was shaken to its core after the discovery of a wide-spanning conspiracy in the Potosi mint that had been issuing countless underweight and debased silver Reales for years. With Spain's commercial reputation at stake, the Crown issued severe punishments for the guilty and began instituting reforms. The mint reforms had the unintended consequence of encouraging the public to hoard the newer, finer issues, which created widespread scarcity of good coinage in circulation. In response, Luis Enriquez de Guzman, the Viceroy of Peru, took matters into his own hands by reopening the Lima mint in 1658. A unilateral decision by Guzman without the permission of the Crown, this action ended the 66 year long hiatus of the Lima mint, which had been shuttered since 1592. Authorities put an end to this illegitimate operation just 16 months after its start. In that brief time, the mint produced a rather singular series of coinage featuring prominently the star symbol of Lima, the so-called "City of Kings".

The attribution to the British Virgin Islands stems from the culmination of several factors including known weight standards, goldsmith hallmarks, plug removals and later added countermarks. Robert Chalmers, author of "History of Currency in the British Colonies" published London 1858, states that before the close of the 18th Century the rating of the Dollar in the Leeward Islands had increased from 8 Bits originally to 10 Bits then 11 Bits of 9 Pence each (8 Shillings 3 Pence [8 s 3 d]) and then later to 12 Bits, the only exception to this was the Virgin Islands which remained at the 8 s 3 d standard (8 dwt). By 1798 the Leeward Islands, which consisted of Antigua and Barbuda, Guadeloupe, Montserrat, St. Kitts and Nevis, St. Martin, Dominica and the Virgin Islands, were plagued with light weight Joes and small quantities of worn silver. Early in 1798 Martinique, part of the Windward Islands, passed a local Act that raised the Dollar from 8 s 3 d to 9 s which was on par with Grenada and Antigua. The justification for this was due to good silver leaving the island and was done out of necessity rather than choice. Later that year Dominica followed suit. The rate of gold was also raised. Within a few months the Leeward Islands had a uniform rating of the Dollar at 9 s, with the only exception being the Virgin Islands which remained at the 8 s 3 d standard. Before the turn of the 19th Century the Leeward Islands as well as all British West Indian Islands had established a standard rate for their standard coin, the Half Joe, at 66 Shillings, its weight was fixed at 7 dwt in the four original Leeward Islands and at 8 dwt in the Virgin Islands.

Now turning our attention to Ralph Gordon who authored "West Indies Countermarked Gold Coins" published 1987. On page 99, he states that the Windward Islands were on 7 ½ dwt standard and that the British Leewards (Leeward Islands), except for Tortola (largest and most populated of the Virgin Islands), used the 7 dwt standard, but that Tortola and the Danish West Indies used 8 dwt as their standard. Going through the various plated and listed examples we find numerous pieces that bear the same "I.H" hallmark as seen on the second piece above, Gordon-303; ANS Collection-1927.143.1. Examples cited such as Gordon-211,

pg. 102 (7.04 dwt/10.95 gms), has a large plug with the "I.H" hallmark. The example listed as Gordon-301, pg. 107 (7.05 dwt/10.97 gms), has a small assay test plug with subsequent "I.H" hallmark and later Martinique 20 over Eagle of 1805. The weights of these two examples are just above the 7 dwt standard of the Leeward Islands.

Perhaps the most interesting example for our purposes is Gordon-302, pg. 107 (7.49 dwt/11.65 gms); ANS Collection-1915.31.4, which bears the "I.H" hallmark and appears to have had the plug removed and was later re-plugged, which distorted the "I.H" hallmark. This example is of particular interest in that it the new plug bears the script "IW" hallmark and incuse "G" stamped thrice near the edges of the obverse for Grenada by Proclamation of 31 July 1798. It is also interesting to point out that each of the "G" punches are stamped over "S" in relief within square indent for St. Vincent by local Act of 1 August 1798. The importance of this piece as well as the second example listed above, Gordon-303; ANS Collection-1927.143.1, as they relate to the present coin cannot be overstated. These two examples help give a more accurate time frame in which the West Indies Script B was applied. Given the fact that both the St. Vincent and Grenada actions had the prescribed 7 ½ dwt standard, the Grenada Proclamation also called for regulating already plugged coins to this standard. From this we can surmise that the "I.H" goldsmith was active prior to the 1798 actions of these islands.

Though Gordon either decided not to list or was unaware of the present coin with the effaced hallmark on the plug, he does state that the West Indies Script B stamp has not been recorded as a single mark coin. The fact that this piece has remained at the fixed 8 dwt standard due to the plug being soldered and not easily removed is quite remarkable. The later action of 22 April 1803 by Guadeloupe called for the removal of debased plugs, such as the case with Gordon-303; ANS Collection-1927.143.1 which contains both the "I.H" hallmark as well as the West Indies Script B. From this we can conclude that the approximate period in which the West Indies Script B was active was the 1798 to 1803 period.

For the advanced collectors of the series, or even iconic countermark issues more broadly, this example will no doubt entice and thoroughly entertain.**

It is interesting to note that though this host is of extreme rarity, it is not surprising that examples of the type circulated in Costa Rica. In conversations with advanced collectors the late Richard Stuart and late Alex Siegel, both had stated on separate occasions that there are two different weight standards for the 1831-CR, the Latin standard of 27 gms and the French standard of 25 gms. At

one point Alex stated that "to find a full weight Assayer E was a rare bird", which would indicate that Assayer E was on the lighter weight system. There is coin evidence that at least some examples of Assayer F are overstruck on Mexico War for Independence 8 Reales. While Assayer E is far rarer, there does not appear to be any evidence that supports they are over another coin. In Brian Stickneys book "A Monetary History of Central America", he states that Assayer F was active in 1831 while Assayer E was not. It appears that Assayer E began being active during the period 1837-42 and worked alongside Assayer F, at least in part. Being of a smaller diameter and lighter weight, 25 gms, any design would be thoroughly struck out. Though the mint records for the San Jose mint were compiled in the 1883 Annual Report, Secretaria de Hacienda y Comercia, it contains incomplete data. The anecdotal evidence above with the present example would indicate that there is a real possibility of two different weight standards for the 1831-CR 8 Reales.

When the colony returned to French rule in 1816, steps were taken to remove the cut monies of the previous administration. It wasn't until May of the following year that the cut segments were demonetized. However, some of the dollars continued to circulate until 1858 before they were finally withdrawn.

Boldly overstruck on the common and popular 1836-dated R.W. Robinson Hard Times token, aligned with the top of its obverse near 9 o'clock on the Haitian obverse. Abundant undertype is visible on both sides, some of which cannot seemingly be explained by either the identifiable host or overstrike. The broad diameter suggests that the token was rolled flat before it was struck with the Haitian dies. The obverse is that of a 100 centimes, the reverse that of a 50 centimes; the reverse is rotated 90 degrees clockwise from head-to-head medal turn vs. the Haitian obverse.

A related 50 centimes die trial, struck on top of a counterfeit 8 Reales, was offered as lot 751 in our (Stack's) January 13, 2004 International Numismatic Sale. That piece, while struck with obverse and reverse dies of a 50 centimes, appears to use the same reverse die seen here. This obverse die was also used on an overstrike on a large cent in the ANS Collection (1922.999.288). While the private mint at Belleville, New Jersey was known to have made Haitian coins of this type (as documented by Bill Dalzell in an upcoming paper to be published by the American Numismatic Society), assumptions that such coins were circulating counterfeits (like other Belleville products made for Brazil and elsewhere) may prove to be incorrect. This desirable and eye-catching coin is an important document in unlocking the story of this fascinating coinage.

Close inspection reveals evidence of a mount removal at 12 o'clock from long ago now toned over, but is hardly a distraction for this **VERY RARE** issue. Though several have appeared on the market in recent years, this is an anomaly, highly unusual

and should not be mistaken as readily available items. Despite its shortcomings this desirable and sought after issue, far nicer than normally encountered, is sure to catch the attention of Mexican, Guatemalan and Honduran collectors alike.

According to the famous collector and author Frank W. Grove these medals were issued under the Captaincy General of Guatemala, as part of Mexico, for the mining region of Olancho in what is now Honduras.

12. Disputes.
