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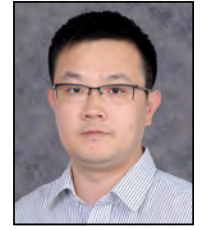

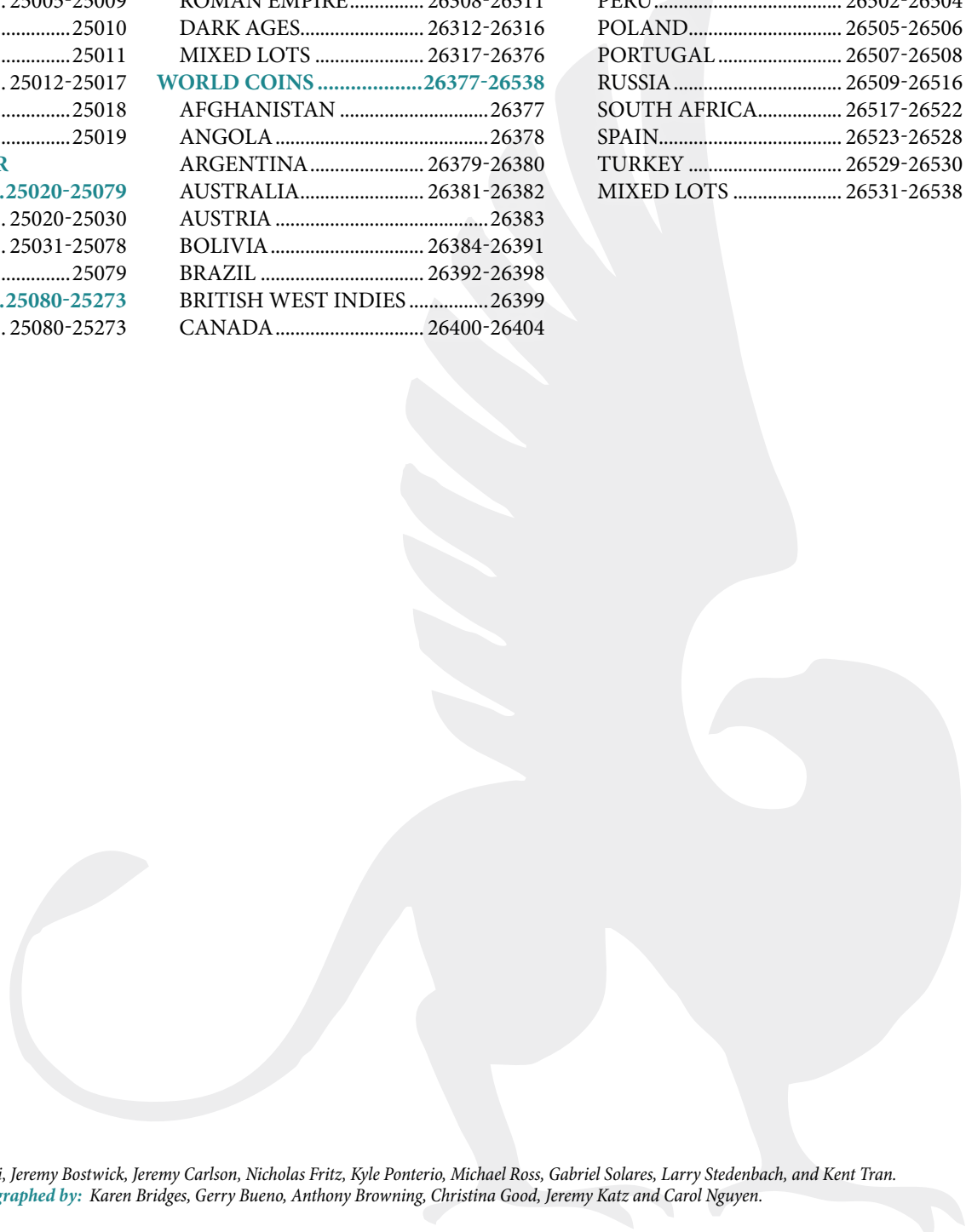

Very well centered and attractively toned, this issue imitates those of Philip II of Macedon with an enchanting, stylized flair. Wholly deserving of its star for its superior eye appeal.

Possibly Unique Suevic Gold Tremissis

Often prepared by apparently illiterate die engravers, Suevic issues typically display badly blundered legends, and this example is no exception. Nonetheless, the quality of the dies and great preservation of the surfaces allows us to read the last part of the legend as "MVNETA". The first part could be either a butchered spelling of Valentinian's name or "LATINA", a word with precedence in Suevic coinage, though its meaning is unclear. This fascinatingly mysterious coin is well-struck and wonderfully well-preserved. The flan is slightly wavy as is typical, and the surfaces are lightly toned to a burnished golden color. This singular specimen possesses charming crudeness and historical intrigue.

The Suevi were a Germanic people that lived for centuries north of the Rhine. Julius Caesar famously recounted his clashes with the warlike tribe in De Bello Gallico, his written account concerning his conquest of Gaul. Little else is known about the Suevi before their migration into the territories of the disintegrating Western Roman Empire in the beginning of the 5th Century A.D. Likely pushed due to pressure from the aggressive Huns, the Suevi

crossed the Rhine into Gaul and then advanced farther south into the Iberian Peninsula. Rapidly losing control over the Iberian provinces and unable to militarily challenge the Suevi, the Roman emperor Honorius accepted them as Foederati, nominal vassals who agreed to settle an autonomous kingdom in Gallaecia and not cause chaos from further incursions into Roman territory. The Suevic kings Hermeric and Rechila, who ruled in the time of Valentinian III, spent their reigns solidifying Suevic control over the region. During these years, the Suevi gradually synthesized their language and customs with the local Latinized population. This is evident in their coinage, struck in the name of the Roman emperor and bearing legends in Latin, or at least an illegible imitation of Latin.

Rechiar, who took the throne in 448, was both the first Christian king of the Suevi and the first to mint coins in his own name, disposing of the nominal fealty to the collapsing Roman authorities. The ambitious king made a series of bold raids into Roman-held lands, plundering cities and taking prisoners. Rechiar's provocations soon caught up with him, however, as Roman-backed Goths dealt the Suevi a decisive defeat and executed their king as punishment. The Suevi were overshadowed and at length absorbed by their powerful Visigothic neighbors, but their mintage of some of the first post-Roman coins of the nascent "Dark Ages" has cemented their numismatic legacy.

Distinct from the later produced pieces of a similar design that were struck at the Buenos Aires Mint, this example was produced on Tierra Del Fuego by Popper with gold discovered there. The "in the field" nature of the piece is demonstrated by the somewhat crude production, with a slightly askew and soft strike. Even still, this piece retains a tremendous eye appeal, with dazzling golden luster and essentially no evidence of handling

or marking. At the pinnacle of **RARITY** and desirability for Argentinian issues, and a piece that should garner no shortage of excited bidders seeking to add this to their collection.

The issue of Julius Popper, a powerful and controversial figure, who was granted the rights to prospect for gold on Tierra del Fuego by the Argentinian government. Popper amassed wealth and power, and these coins symbolized his near dictatorial control of the archipelago. His abuse, of and conflict with, the natives led to the reduction of the population of the Selk'nam from 4000 to 500 by the end of the 19th Century. Popper died in 1893 under mysterious circumstances that some have speculated to be poisoning by his enemies.

Likely produced in Potosi, Bolivia, this massive silver ingot preserves impressive details on its flat side. The markings on its surfaces provide clues as to its journey. The fineness in Roman numerals is clearly readable, as is the manifest number “XXVI”. Three Spanish royal stamps are visible, attesting that the ingot’s owner paid the necessary taxes. While the assayer’s name to the right of the fineness mark is unfortunately too faint to make out, the “V” initial of the silversmith Jacob de Vreder is sharply displayed. The bold “ELVR” monogram identifies the owner as Elvira Diaz. The deep diagonal cut on the left end indicates the portion of the ingot which was to be excised to pay the defense tax upon arrival in Spain. A typical cylindrical “assayer’s bite” is seen at one end, where

the assayer took a sample to test in order to confirm the stated fineness. The underside shows the recovery number A212-85, placed by Treasure Salvors after the ingot’s recovery. In addition, there are traces of yet more markings which remain unidentified.

An impressive piece from the most famous Shipwreck discovery of all. The surfaces exhibit varying degrees of porosity, which have not significantly affected the details and instead serve as proof of this ingot’s three and a half centuries spent under the sea. A historic and highly appealing piece of treasure.

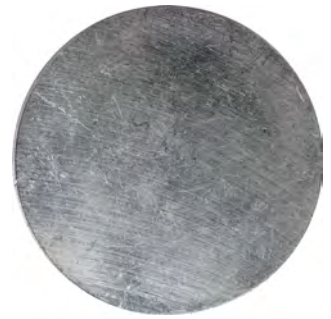

A **SCARCE** and seldom encountered issue, this specimen presents a rather well rendered countermark facing upward (with respect to the orientation of the host coin), with the host itself offering a deep gray tone and charming overall detail remaining. As such, a tremendous opportunity for the advanced collector of Portuguese colonial issues or countermarks more broadly.

Due to financial hardships and debasement of his coinage, Antonio I issued the decree of 1 April 1582, decreasing the value of copper coinage, which resulted in them being countermarked. Later, in August of the same year, another decree was issued that raised the value of all gold and silver coinage of good weight and purity then in circulation, mostly of earlier Portuguese or Spanish origins, thus doubling their value. This was the easiest way to alleviate the monetary crisis, but copper coinage remained unchanged since there was no profit to be made. When later defeated by the Spanish, all debased coinage of Antonio I was confiscated under penalty of death, explaining their rarity today. Antonio fled to France and eventually to Holland, seeking help to reestablish his throne, but failed to gain support and ended his days in France on a small pension.

According to famous author and collector Major Fred Pridmore, the 1801 local act called for five silver denominations and one copper denomination. A total of 2,500 Pounds sterling was ordered to be cut and stamped and, except for cut quarters of the Pistareen, all silver denominations were to be stamped with word "Tortola," while the copper issues were simply stamped with the letter "T". Due to the lack of available money for use in commerce, these cut and countermarked coins continued to be utilized until 1889, accounting for the great deal of circulation seen by the hosts.

This seldom encountered

GALL stood for Galle, a city on the southwest coast of Ceylon. Given Portuguese activity on the island, coinage from fellow colonies were imported for use. Some issues, such as the present piece, were specifically struck for exporting to Ceylon while others made their way to the island through commerce. Following the Dutch East India's successful campaign to drive out the Portuguese from the island in the mid-17th century (Galle 1640, Colombo 1656 and Jaffna 1658), coinage was subsequently countermarked for the new authority. The prevailing rate for Indo-Portuguese coins then in circulation was 5, 6 and 10 Stivers and were to be countermarked with the cities monogram. Due to large amounts of counterfeits in circulation all coins were inspected by a competent goldsmith and if found to genuine were countermarked.

This **RARE** and short-lived issue, struck for less than four months, is seldom encountered with only about eight known examples. The countermark is bold and well-defined on a moderately worn and weakly struck host that displays an attractive pale golden coloration complemented by richer patina amongst the devices. Plenty of remaining luster pops out when rotated in the light adding to its pleasing appearance. The surfaces are relatively smooth with signs of handling consistent for the grade. A handsome survivor of the type that is sure to see spirited bidding from collectors for the opportunity acquire such a tough issue.

According to Jorge Murillo, author of “Historia de las Monedas de Costa Rica”, due to the introduction of counterfeit ounce and a half ounce gold coins (8 and 4 Escudos) by Julian Fabrega in Leon, a full investigation was launched in Nicaragua. By the decree of December 24, 1841 it was stated that all coins bearing the seal of the Central American Republic and any foreign coins, no matter what size were to be countermarked. Only the silver coinage that was countermarked has a small circular piece extracted to test the purity and to pay for the work of countermarking. The only known genuine host coins for the gold issues are the 1837-CR E 4 Escudos and 1835-CR F 2 Escudos of which we have been able to confirm eight examples of the 4 Escudos with a ninth unconfirmed. Though we have been able to confirm one 2 Escudos, it is believed that only two have survived.

The test punch and removal of the plug of silver is standard for this issue. To verify that the coins were in fact silver they tested them first with the punch mark in the legend. They then proceeded to remove the plug of silver and then apply the double six-pointed star countermark. According to sources the removal of the plug of silver was done to pay for the countermarking of these coins. While this cataloger believes this to be true, I also believe that regardless of denomination they were all mutilated in a similar fashion with the test punch, plug removal and star countermark all in the same general locations for each type of host coin.

*The Holey Dollar issues of Dominica and Tobago appear to be quite similar, but in fact are distinctly different. The most significant of which is the side each coin was pierced from; Dominica from the reverse while those of Tobago were pierced from the obverse. This can be further corroborated by several 4 Bits examples from the later Dominica 1813 series (Ponterio NYINC 1/2011 Lot # 897 & DNW COINEX 9/2015 Lot # 2156 [Ex: J.G. Murdock, Ex: Richard Peltzer, Ex: Julius Guttag]). Though most of the 4 Bits issues are significantly worn with little remaining original detail, the two cited examples clearly show design features of the Spanish colonial reverse motif. Upon further comparison and examination it becomes apparent that the central piercing was also removed from the reverse, but the application of the crowned 4 appears to have been applied at the discretion of the worker. The 1813 Act caused the earlier issues to become very scarce with limited survivors. Now with respect to the present piece, though the style of cut is identical to the Dominica issues of 1798, it is very clearly pierced from the opposite side similar to the Tobago Holey Dollars. There exists a few other pieces that share these characteristics, for example the 4 Reales from the DNW COINEX 9/2018 Lot # 5247 The Bob Lyall Collection (Ex: Edward Roehrs, Ex: Ray Byrne, Ex: H.D. Gibbs, Ex: R. Prann), that shares an identical piercing from the obverse and simply can not be ignored. Discussions with long time advanced collectors and West Indian academics tend to agree with the above assessment in how to determine the difference between the issues from Dominica and Tobago. Furthermore, it is now speculated that there are two distinct types from Tobago; Type I, crude elongated and slanted crenations and the Type II, with neat nearly vertical crenations. The present piece falls into the category of the Tobago Type II and should be considered **EXTREMELY RARE** and of great importance to the West Indies cut and countermark series.*

An unlikely item, certainly **UNIQUE** as seen, that began its journey in 1754 where it was struck in the Peruvian capital of Lima. Circulating for what was likely many decades, the coin eventually arrived in the United States, being present in New York City in the late 1850's. It was here that this 2 Reales was stamped by the Franklin Museum "ADMIT / TO THE / MODEL ARTIST / 127 GRAND ST / NEAR B.WAY." The use of a foreign issue at this time may point to the Mint Act of 1857 in which the United States revoked the legal tender status of all circulating foreign coins. Possibly as a result of this demonetization in the U.S., it surfaced again around a decade later, this time in Central America's El Salvador. Sometime following the local decree of September 28, 1868, a circular stamp with the country's arms was applied to the Shield side of its host coin in order to certify its legitimacy to circulate there. Finally, sometime after the decree of 1873—which declared that all British coins presently circulating be stamped with a circular punch (the stamp was different than the previous type and carried no wreath below the arms)—it would appear that this piece was punched yet again, this time likely mistakenly; perhaps it was the applier's inability to read English that led him to

believe that the U.S. merchant stamp rendered the coin as being British in nature. In any event, the timing associated with the countermarks presents a very vivid chronology of this piece, as it led multiple lives in South, North, and Central America from the mid-18th century to the latter part of the 19th.

While this coin's voyage around the Americas certainly paints a fascinating picture, there's little doubt that its visit to the Franklin Museum was the most interesting. Despite the wholesome name, this operation often featured entertainment acts that can be most appropriately described as a forerunner to the burlesque show. As a guise to modesty, one of the popular acts was known as tableaux vivants, which reconstructed famous artistic scenes that contained nude or semi-nude women as the primary subject. A period advertisement read: "THE ORIGINAL AND ONLY TROUPE OF MODEL Artistes (sc.), consisting of twenty-seven young ladies, appear at the Franklin Museum, 127 Grand street, every afternoon and evening, in a selection of living pictures, with a great variety of other entertainments." If only coins could tell stories, this enigmatic and unrivaled piece would certainly have more than its fair share!

It is interesting to note that aside from the later Trade Dollars, British coins are seldom encountered with chopmarks. Occasionally coins bearing a British countermark such as the Bank of England or Merchant issues can be found coupled with other markings, usually consisting of official government issues of foreign nations. To our knowledge very few British issues appear to have circulated in the Orient, but since the Spanish 8 Reales was the preferred form of specie it makes sense that the present example was accepted and chopped while in commerce. A real treat for the specialist seeking interesting and unusual items relating to international trade.

The economic situation in Central America after gaining independence was so dire that numerous counterfeits circulated freely. In several instances they were even officially authorized by the government, such as the case with the provisional government of Honduras. When studying and comparing the countermarks of Guatemala it is noted that several official punches were employed throughout the countermarking action. It is also noted that several different counterfeit punches have been recorded, though the style is close to legitimate issues they are a bit crude and lack in the fine details found on the government issued punches.

The act called for the amount of £100,000 to be stamped, but only £12,000 were re-validated before abandoning the project in 1759. When the home authorities received copies of the act, it was immediately repealed and for exceeding his powers for the approval of the act, the Governor of Jamaica was censured.

In late 1753, countermarking of Ducats with reeded edges began re-valuing them at 6 Guilders 12 Stivers while the coins without the new "Djawa" mark were valued at only 6 Guilders. The intent of this added mark was to prevent the importation and exportation of good specie by private individuals. Later another local ordinance 8 January 1760 stated counterfeits without reeded edges bearing counterfeited "Djawa" countermarks were in circulation. By order of the home office, countermarking ceased in 1761.

It is interesting to note that the location of the star punch, like many countermarked issues, appears to be in the same general area. When comparing other host coins, again this holds true. For example, Spanish or Maria Theresa coinage appear to have the mark to the right of the portrait. That said there are a few outliers where the countermark appears in different locations, but these are the exception and not the rule.

It is interesting to note that the most prominent hosts for the 1828 overstrikes are those of the Republic of Peru from either Lima or Cuzco, though the Cuzco issues are bit scarcer and more popular. However, Mexican hosts make up less than 20% of the known recorded examples from this series.

Chopmarked Spanish coins were placed into three classes determined by the amount of defacement and loss of integrity. Those found to be mostly intact and of good weight were categorized as Class I, set aside to be countermarked later and charged a 1% surcharge. While those that saw significant circulation and damage were included into Class II or Class III, which were only able to enter the country as bullion, subject to 2% import duties. The decree of 13 September 1831 states that those of Class I admitted to the Reales Cajas were to be charged a 1% countermarking tax. While those of Class II and III were deposited into the Real Aduana being charged 2% according to the bullion regulations. The decree goes on to state that the surcharge on insurgent coinage was being lowered to 1% making it equal to those of Class I Spanish coins.

Issued by decree of 20 December 1834, suppressed 31 March 1837 (By Decree of 1 February 1836). Countermark applied to the obverse of a 1829-EoMo LF Mexico Republic 8 Reales. Always a collector favorite, this short lived mint only struck coins for only three years and are heavily sought after by enthusiasts. For this mint we have only nine documented examples bearing a Philippines countermark, ten if the 8 Escudos in the Bank of the Philippines collection is included. This wholesome survivor exhibits signs of handling consistent for the grade with relatively smooth surfaces and even wear. Close inspection reveals three small thin shallow scratches on the reverse accounting for the details designation, but have long since toned over matching the rest of the coin. Despite its shortcoming a presentable example of the type that is pleasing to the eye certain to add depth to even advanced collections.

Possibly the best description of what one would call this would be an “Anvil Clash”. In the early days of the Restoration (1814-47) of the Ancient Regime (Federalism), much time was spent reversing the changes imposed by Napoleon Bonaparte. During this time specie was limited with few cantons issuing their own coinage. The Canton of Bern was in possession of approximately 660,000 French Ecu's and during the period of 1816-19 revalued them at 40 Batzen. According the Standard Catalog of World Coins about ninety percent of the countermarked pieces were withdrawn and melted by 1851 and it is believed that less than 5,000 pieces are extant today.

The countermarks, in typical fashion for this issue, are uneven on the obverse with the characteristic "melting spot" on the corresponding reverse. The surfaces are relatively smooth with only minor marks or abrasions as one would expect from the designated grade, but nothing of note. A handsome example of this popular type that is considered quite advanced by Thai collectors.

This interesting and seldom encountered issue should be considered the first Crown size coin of Thailand. Several Royal proclamations were issued specifically pertaining to the use and exchange of foreign silver "Flat coins" that were imported for trade. Initially, the exchange rate fluctuated as the supply of imported specie could not keep up with the demand of re-minting them into Pot Duang (Bullet coinage). The 7 January 1857 decree finally stipulates that a fixed rate of exchange was one Tamlung one Baht (five Baht) to three foreign silver coins and that they could be exchanged at the Royal Treasury. Since different types of foreign coins were being imported many merchants were hesitant to accept them in trade at the prescribed rate. Later several more decrees were issued to try to address the hesitation of the merchants refusing to accept them in transactions even going so far as penalizing those who declined them. Eventually, the most common coin in circulation at the time, the Mexican "Dollar", often referred to as "Bird" coins became the standard being marked on the obverse with the Chakra wheel and Mongkut emblems.

The Cross of Christ is the insignia of the Order of Our Lord Jesus Christ, founded by Dinis I of Portugal circa 1317-19 and is the symbol of all Portuguese discoveries overseas. In the closing years of the 19th Century Timor, under the authority of Macau, saw a large influx of false coins. In an attempt to mitigate this problem, the above decree was issued and all incoming coins were to be brought to the local government for inspection. If found to be correct, they were marked with the Cross of Christ and placed back into circulation.

Struck at a time shortly after Russia went onto the international gold standard, the piece is heavily influenced by foreign banking interests. Beginning in the late 18th century, and becoming more pronounced as the 19th century progressed, Russia increasingly relied upon foreign banking consortiums to float Russian bonds. At first, funds were raised primarily in Amsterdam, then in Germany, and by late in the 19th century, almost exclusively in France. The inclusion of "100 Francs" in the reverse legend—

denoting the coin's adherence to the Latin Monetary Union—also clearly demonstrated the economic ties that Russia had with lenders in France. The Rothschild banking empire based in Paris, where many Russian bonds were placed, was a major participant in underwriting the Russian bond offering floated in early 1901, and may well be the source of the gold within the coin offered here. Containing the exact same gold content of a contemporary French 100 Francs and struck in the same 0.900 fine gold alloy, this 37 Rubles and 50 Kopeks piece would have been interchangeable at par in circulation. Bitkin describes the coin as a "donative," suggesting the coins were never intended to circulate, but instead were meant as gifts to gain influence while conducting official Russian state business. S.I. The host coin is rather deeply toned, with the enameling being very vibrant and unbroken, as well as expertly rendered. Pin back attached to reverse. An **EXTREMELY RARE**, impressive, and wearable icon in miniature form.

Associated with a 15th century Byzantine icon with an alleged Marian apparition, Our Mother of Perpetual Help is believed to have originated at the Keras Kardiotissas Monastery (Μονή Κεράς Καρδιώτισσας) in Crete, and has since been in Rome from 1499. It was canonically coronated in 1866 by Pius IX, and has since become one of the most popular icons within Roman Catholicism. Here, it has been expertly rendered, likely rather contemporaneously with the icon’s coronation, on the obverse of the prior century’s “Madonna Taler” from Bayern (Bavaria), with the fields smoothed, a light engraving created, and highly colorful enameling employed in order to evoke all of the hidden meaning throughout this heavily iconographic piece.

Following the coalescing of the various Italian city states and subsequent unification under the House of Savoy, the Italian Kingdom began to eye a larger role in the Mediterranean. Ambitions in the northern African coast, as well as southward into the areas of Somalia and Ethiopia, brought about the goals of a regional empire in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. One of the early conflicts, the Battle of Adwa, actually saw the Italian forces repelled-an incredible defeat staged by the victorious Ethiopian Empire. This sovereignty for Ethiopia would continue for another four decades until the Second Italo-Ethiopian War, in which the Italian forces would subdue that of Ethiopia, driving Emperor Haile Selassie into exile. In the interim, Italian goals were not repulsed by the defeat at Adwa, as skirmishes and territorial acquisitions continued throughout the early 20th century. By the outbreak of World War II in Europe, Italy had amassed quite a sphere of influence throughout the southern Mediterranean and northeastern Africa.

This award medal was presented to members of the VIII Eritrean Battalion, which saw action in numerous campaigns in Africa between 1896 and 1916. Despite the defeat at Adwa, this medal seemingly presents a different story, even boasting about it, along with other later victories. Nevertheless, Adwa served as an abject humiliation for Italy's forces, losing to a would-be colony that had inferior resources other than sheer will. Given that gold medals are so incredibly rare among those found for the various Eritrean battalions, it is very likely that this medal would have been awarded to a higher-ranking member of the Italian military who would have participated in these conflicts over the listed 20-year span. As such, an incredibly rare and important piece.

The design of the “Three Graces” Pattern Crown was inspired by ancient Greek mythology. Zeus, the king of the Greek gods, married Hera, the queen of the gods, and together they had three daughters. Their three

daughters were Aglaia (Brightness), Euphrosyne (Joyfulness), and Thalia (Bloom). They symbolized charm, beauty, nature, creativity, and fertility and as a result, became known as the “Graces.”

Borrowing from this powerful mythology, William Wyon engraved his rendition of the “Three Graces” to symbolize the enduring relationship that England, Ireland, and Scotland shared with one another as the United Kingdom. The depiction of the “Three Graces” appears on the coin’s reverse, with each “Grace” embracing one another. At their feet, there is a harp, shield, and thistle, symbolizing the cultural symbols of each country; the harp symbolizes Ireland, the shield symbolizes England and the thistle symbolizes Scotland. Much like Aglaia, Euphrosyne and Thalia shared a close relationship, these countries also have a strong relationship with one another.

Richard John Mahony was born in 1828 at Dromore Castle, his family estate, in Kerry, County Munster—a large county in the southern and western coasts of Ireland. He served as a barrister and justice of the peace, and was also involved in the evangelical movement of the 1860s known as the Ulster Revival as well as the Brethren movement. This medal was awarded to him for the numerous dwellings which he erected over a two-year span, likely being awarded later in 1873 or 1874. He passed away in 1892 in London at the age of 64. Of further interest, he was the father of Harold Segerson Mahony, born in 1867, who would go on to win the men’s singles title at Wimbledon in 1896, coming back from two sets down to defeat Wilfred Baddeley 6-2, 6-8, 5-7, 8-6, 6-3.

The Incredibly Rare Dinar of Shajar al-Durr, “Queen of the Muslims”

Several Islamic coins are bound to capture immediate attention on account of their elusive **RARITY** that is implied by their very mention. To this number are the coins of Shajar al-Durr, “Queen of the Muslims”. Such coins are so elusive that Album’s *Checklist of Islamic Coins* relays this about her coinage: “Coins of Shajar al-Durr are exceedingly rare and should be considered uncollectible. None have appeared at auction or on fixed price lists in recent decades...none are illustrated in Zeno.” While her name is never mentioned on her coinage, the titles are given in feminine declension and this Dinar also bears the honorific title “malkat al-muslimin” (“Queen of the Muslims”). We have only been able to trace two other examples of a Shajar al-Durr Dinar, one permanently impounded in the British Museum collection and one example plated in Balog. The present example is from the same obverse dies as the Balog specimen, with differing reverse dies. This Dinar is rather nicely struck, with most of the script being on the flan, and with just a touch of the periphery cut off. Sparkling golden appeal remains, though for completeness, the edge does appear to show some traces of filing. An example of the highest importance, and an opportunity that is unlikely to present itself again in the foreseeable future.

Little is known about the early life of Shajar al-Durr, however she was purchased as a slave by As-Salih Ayyub before his rise to power as Sultan of Egypt. After she bore him a son she wed As-Salih Ayyub who ruled Egypt from 1240-1249. After his death in November of 1249, Shajar al-Durr kept her husband’s death a secret, as Egypt was facing invasion by Louis IX of France and a Crusader Army. News of his death however reached the Crusader Army and they immediately marched on Cairo. Shajar al-Durr agreed to a defensive plan with her generals, and her army put down the Crusader threat. After the defeat of the Seventh Crusade, Shajar al-Durr and the son of the Sultan, Al-Muazzam Turanshah, grappled for power. Turanshah, having offended many in his kingdom, was murdered in 1250, and Shajar al-Durr was installed as Sultana. Despite her elevation, such a prominent position for a woman met resistance, and the Ayyubids in Syria revolted. To quell rebellion, Shajar al-Durr married Izz al-Din Aybak and abdicated the throne to him. He ruled for 7 years until Shajar al-Durr had him murdered. This murder led to Shajar al-Durr’s own death in 1257 when she was beaten to death. She was buried in a Mausoleum in Cairo that she helped design.

A massive explosion took place in the city of Leiden in January 1807 which, at the time, was a part of the Kingdom of Holland—a client state among Napoleon's exploits across Europe. Given the expectation that the kingdom would be attacked by the British, a great deal of gunpowder was ordered to be on hand, with one of the barges carrying the munitions sparking an explosion that destroyed a portion of the city and killing some 155 people. The temple of the Lodge La Vertu was located in the blast zone, hence the reference to it on this medal. Upon hearing of the destruction, the King of Holland, Louis Napoleon (Bonaparte), arrived to assist in rebuilding the city and calming the public. One such medal was made in gold for the king, while another 48 in gilt silver and 154 in silver—one less than the number of lives lost in the blast.

Samuel Marks permission to make use of the Official Mint of the Transvaal Republic for one day in recognition of service rendered. Mr. Marks accordingly instructed the officials to strike the most modest silver coin of the realm, but to strike them in gold instead of silver. On the other hand, an official record states that at the request of Mr. Samuel Marks a number of gold threepenny pieces were minted. It further states that this was verbally authorized by the State Secretary, but that such authority was withdrawn shortly after. In the meanwhile, however, the pieces had been minted. It is apparent that such a procedure was irregular, and would not be countenanced in a modern mint. Records of the late Transvaal Mint indicate that 215 of these pieces were produced—their actual weight being approximately 40.3 grs. each of standard gold, and their bullion value at the price of £3 17s. 10-1/2d. per oz. of standard gold is approximately 6s. 6d.”

Brewster was a career military officer who served in the United States Army from 1885-1925. During this forty year career, Brewster saw action firstly on the American frontier at the tail end of the Indian Wars, later fighting in the Spanish-American War, the Boxer Rebellion, and the First World War, finally serving stateside after 1921. It was during the Boxer Rebellion that Brewster received his highest decoration, the Medal of Honor, with the citation reading: "The President of the United States of America, in the name of Congress, takes pleasure in presenting the Medal of Honor to Captain (Infantry) Andre Walker Brewster, United States Army, for gallantry in action on 13 July 1900, while serving with the 9th Infantry at Tientsin, China. While under fire Captain Brewster rescued two of his men from drowning." Later during the First World War, Brewster served as Inspector General of the General Headquarters for the American Expeditionary Force. It was in this role that Brewster played a valuable service tendering advice to John J. Pershing regarding the performance and capabilities of division commanders. In the course of his service in Europe, Brewster was awarded many medals by the various allied European Nations, five of which make this lot. Included are as follows.

Siege: August 1579 - 10 March 1585, sporadically. Square uniface flan with arms of Brussels (St. Michael subduing Satan) in center flanked by date (15-80); legend: PERFER.ET.OBDVRA.BRVXELLA. This **VERY RARE** and seldom encountered necessity issue exhibits a bold central stamp on a nicely produced even flan. The surfaces display a lovely old cabinet patina with a pleasant iridescent sheen. Minor marks and abrasion are present, as one would expect from the designated grade, but aside from a few shallow scratches nothing overly distracting. Close inspection reveals an attempted piercing from long ago at 12 o'clock and initials "ES" at 6 o'clock accounts for the details designation. Despite its shortcomings a handsome example of this very elusive issue that is certain to excite obsidional collectors far and wide.

The siege of Brussels was set in motion by Philip, Count of Egmont, the son of Lamoraal, Duke of Alva. The Duke, a Dutch patriot, was murdered sometime in the early years of the Eighty Years War. At some point after

servng in the Dutch army under William of Orange, Philip defected to the Spanish for unknown reasons. In order to convince the advancing military of his intent, Philip promised them the city of Brussels, his home town. Aided by his loyal infantry and cavalry regiments, his troops were able to occupy the castle. Due to a quick response the Dutch forces were able to regain the lost position driving Philips troops back. After retreating and being under siege for two days, Philip, now being charged with treason, surrendered and was exiled never to return to the city of Brussels again. Though Philip's forces had been defeated and he was expelled from the city, the Spanish were still present in the surrounding areas. Eventually, the defending Dutch garrison demanded payment for their services of protecting the city. During this time the magistrate was forced to gather silver from the churches and several prominent citizens to strike coins.

It is interesting to note that we have only been able to locate one other example from this series, dated 1579, sold in Heritage 2004 New York Signature Auction Lot # 14234 hammering down for \$1,850- hailing from the Garrett collection.

While the French were under attack by the Grand Alliance, in what turned out to be one of the bloodiest battles of the War of the Spanish Succession. Both sides suffered significant losses, nearly sustaining 10,000 casualties. The attack commenced on the night of 27 June and after an impressive 69 days of resistance the French finally surrendered.

Usually encountered in well-worn condition with environmental damage, this piece is leagues better than what is normally observed in the market. Each punch is bold and deeply impressed, though the central stamp is slightly double-struck and rotated, on a nicely preserved planchet. Aside from a few minor abrasions the surfaces are smooth and glossy adding to its pleasing appearance and originality. Seldom encountered in the superior quality, it is sure to catch the attention of discerning collectors.

When the French occupied Cambrai in 1595, the bishop whose loyalty lay with the Spanish king deserted the city. In his departure he took money, war supplies and a small armed force. When the advancing Spanish forces discovered that the bishop had fled they surrounded the city. Preparing for the onslaught the governor of the city, Jean de Montluc, and his wife began strengthening the fortifications enabling the besieged city to repel the invading forces on several occasions. As the siege progressed tension within the city towards the French increased. The inhabitants harbored mistrust of the occupying French and were quite agitated by the debased coinage the Governor issued to pay troops; the intention being able to redeem them at full value after the siege. Eventually the inhabitants led an uprising and opened the gates to the city to welcome the Spanish ultimately resulting in French surrender on 7 October 1595.

Pleasing to the eye, this lovely siege issue is sure to be a welcome addition to the next collection it enters.

After the death of Charles II of Spain the line of succession was unclear since the monarch had no children. Struggle for control of the Spanish Empire and throne ensued between Philippe, Duke of Anjou, and Charles, Archduke of Austria. Attempts at diplomacy between France and England to resolve the issue were unsuccessful and rejected by the Spanish as well as Philippe, Charles II named heir. His proclamation as King on 16 November 1700, fifteen days after the death of Charles II, called for an undivided Spanish Empire. This ultimately led to war between France and Spain on one side and the Grand Alliance (The Holy Roman Empire, the Dutch Republic, Savoy and Great Britain) on the other. During the war the allies marched on Aire after taking control of Douay. By September the city was surrounded by the Prince of Anhalt-Dessau's forces of 40 Battalions. However, by the time the Allied forces arrived, Governor de Guebriant had gathered significant quantities of supplies preparing for a long siege. Due to a money shortage, de Guebriant utilized his own silver to make coins and pay his troops. The besieged forces managed to repel the Allies, but realized holding the city was futile. Eventually de Guebriant met with the Duke of Marlborough to discuss the terms of surrender ultimately handing over control of the city and left with his troops.

Pleasing to the eye, this small siege coin is attractive and original looking; certain to be a welcome addition to the next collection it enters.

Convinced of his right to the Electorate of Saxony, Johann Frederick II, under the false guidance of Wilhelm von Grumbach pursued his fathers claim to this title. Annoyed, the Holy Roman Emperor, Maximillian II, signed an imperial ban against Frederick II and demanded he turn Grumbach into the authorities. Forced by persistent refusal the Emperor authorized an imperial intervention and in late 1566 the city of Gotha was under siege. Eventually, Augustus, Elector of Saxony, who led the besieging forces was able to incite a mutiny ultimately claiming victory over the city and Grimmenstein castle on 13 April 1567. Later, many of the individuals involved were publicly executed by being quartered, hung or beheaded.

Seldom encountered in this elite state of preservation, this handsome survivor offers good eye appeal with much originality.

After failed attempts to gain autonomy from imperial rule, the city Bishop Christoph Bernhard von Galen attempted to gain back the good graces of the Holy Roman Empire through diplomatic channels. Though the cities elders were resistant to this and refused to grant the Bishop the ability to make such decisions. This led the Holy Roman Empire to cut off the city and isolated them from seeking support and reinforcements for their cause. The bishop saw this as an opportunity, surrounded and laid siege to the city on 22 July 1660 with nearly 15,000 soldiers. Suffering from food and money shortages, the cities elders resorted to personal loans and melting of silverware to provide coins for trade within the city. The winter was particularly rough that year compounded by diminishing supplies, negotiations for a peaceful surrender began 1 January 1661. By 26 March of the same year the city of Munster signed a declaration that forbid it from seeking contact and aid from foreign powers. The city was forced to pay a hefty sum to the Bishop who also instituted hefty taxes effectively ending the city's endeavors of becoming autonomous.

Since the Hapsburgs and the Holy Roman Empire refused to sign the Treaty of Utrecht, 11 April 1713, the War of Spanish Succession continued. Suffering yet again another siege, four in ten years, the Holy Roman Empire was barely able to raise a fraction of the necessary forces to defend Landau. While the advancing French, under the command of Claude Louise Hector de Villars, were able to raise an adequate army to assault the city. The Habsburg occupation forces were under the command of Prince Karl Alexander of Wurttemberg who melted his own tableware to produce gold and silver coinage.

When the Holy Roman Emperor Charles VI died the legitimacy of the line of succession to the throne was called into question and turmoil ensued. Severely weakened from years of war with large expenditures and an underprepared heiress, Maria Theresa, the War of the Austrian Succession began 16 December 1740. Numerous battles and skirmishes occurred between the Allied forces, primarily consisting of France, Spain, Prussia, Bavaria and Saxony and the Pragmatic Allies consisting of the Hapsburg Monarchy supported by Great Britain, Hanover, the Dutch Republic and Russia, the region of Braunau am inn was no exception. Located near the Austrian and Bavarian border, the decisive of Battle of Simbach 9 May 1743 drove the Allied forces across the river to Braunau where the Pragmatic forces besieged the city. Under constant bombardment and heavy losses, Duke Ludwig Friedrich of Saxony-Hildburghausen who was charged with defending the city attempted to hold off the advancing forces. Ultimately sensing defeat, he left the city 27 June to meet with Charles of Lorraine and negotiate the terms of surrender. Austrian troops continued the attack until word finally arrived three days later on 30 June.

By the time Austria declared war on France, the British Navy had gained control of the Adriatic Sea and moved to expel the French occupants of Cattaro. Instead of sailing straight to Cattaro harbor, the British setup a blockade, captured several nearby smaller islands and setup and installed battlements. After weeks of preparation, on Christmas day bombardment of the city commenced. Realizing that reinforcements weren't coming, the French commander Gauthier surrendered.

The arm of Zeeland stamp is bold and well-defined with attractive patina in the recesses. The central stamp is strongly applied, though slightly doubled and rotated somewhat obscuring the design features on the left side, on a nicely prepared flan. This **SCARCE** and charming obsidional issue offers a pleasing appearance with much originality and eye appeal.

The long and arduous siege of Middleburg saw many ups and downs that ultimately resulted in the surrender of the city to the besieging Dutch and English forces. Early in the siege the Spanish supply lines were cut-off causing food, water and specie shortages. In a dire situation, the magistrate confiscated silver from churches and other inhabitants to strike coins to pay soldiers and raise morale. In a failed attempt to lure the rebel forces away from Middleburg, the Spanish laid waste to Haarlem killing everyone within the city. On several occasions the Spanish sent a fleet with relief supplies and forces, but the Dutch Sea Beggars had taken control of the area capturing numerous ships and eventually blocking any relief efforts. Finally, the Spanish realized that relief was not coming and that defeat was only a matter of time, Governor Mondragon surrendered the city to the Dutch.

Amsterdam being a Catholic city was loyal to Spain and were hesitant to join the revolt. On 8 February 1578, the city reluctantly and only after being blockaded did they join against Spain. The cities council was replaced with Protestants who were loyal to William of Orange. During the blockade there was a shortage of specie in commerce and the city was given authority to strike the necessary coins, though they needed to procure superfluous silver. As it turns out that silver that was gathered was the statue of the city's patron saint, St. Nicholas.

When the invading Bishop of Munster, Christopher Bernhard von Galen, arrived in Groningen the city was well prepared to protect and defend. Prior to their arrival, the inhabitants of the city set the stage for their unwanted visitors, outside the city structures were torn down and fields were flooded. On 27 August, after a number of failed attempts, and even a couple of raids by the besieged, the city awoke to discover that the Bishops forces had withdrawn. To commemorate this victory coins and medals were struck shortly thereafter.

As provisions started to dwindle, Maurice of Nassau became ill and sought medical attention in Haag. While there he was able to muster some support and secure funds for 5,000 additional troops. However, by the time he returned to Breda, the Spanish had received reinforcements more than doubling in size. Ultimately, it was decided to surrender to the superior force with the remaining 3,000 soldiers being able to exit safe and honorably.

The onset of the Thirty Years' War (1618-48) was caused by Ferdinand of Styria being elected as king of Bohemia, later in 1619 becoming Ferdinand II Holy Roman Emperor, who was a staunch supporter of Catholicism. This alarmed Bohemian Protestants who eventually rejected Ferdinand's election declaring the Protestant Frederick V of the Rhine Palatinate as king instead. Frederick V was advised by his allies that by accepting the Bohemian throne it would be considered an inflammatory act, but he accepted anyways and was crowned 4 November 1619. Supported by the duchy of Bavaria, Ferdinand was able to amass a large military force and marched on Prague. After the decisive battle of the White Mountain, lasting only one hour, on 8 November 1620 Frederick along with his family fled Prague to the Silesian capital of Breslau earning him the nickname "The Winter King". On 21 January 1621 Ferdinand issued a decree accusing Frederick of breach of peace, supporting rebels and treason.

After the seemingly decisive battle of Arroyo Grande it was believed that the capital Montevideo would be next. This was a huge miscalculation on the advancing forces of former President Manuel Oribe and Buenos Aires governor Juan Manuel de Rosas. The city was under siege for a grueling nine years and was defended by a force of over 5,000 newly freed slaves and the foreign exiles. Fortunately relief for the city came in waves from the British, French, Spanish and Italians in the form of supplies and reinforcements. In 1850, after the French and British withdrew, de Rosas and Oribe appeared to have the upper hand. However, an uprising led by the governor of Entre Rios province, Justo Jose de Urquiza, changed the outcome ultimately leading to Oribe's defeat in 1851.

This frank morbidity is expressed by Eberbach himself in a letter to Julius Menadier, in which he writes "...I want whoever holds the pieces in their hands years later to be overcome by the shudder grimness." It's safe to say that, in this desire, Eberbach was astoundingly successful.

After initially joining World War I on the side of the Triple Alliance/Central Powers, Italy, under her foreign minister, Sidney Sonnino, signed the Treaty of London in secret, which saw her switch sides and join the allied powers. Additionally, should the allies be successful, the treaty included plans to dismantle the Austro-Hungarian Empire, at least in part to Italy's benefit. The suggestion of this medal is that Italy (represented by the Lupa Romana-the fabled she-wolf that suckled the twins, Romulus and Remus) was receiving her payback for signing such a treaty, namely in the battering which she suffered at the hands of Austria-Hungary in the Trentino Offensive/Battle of Asiago in May-June 1916.

Tarentum was a fierce rival of the Roman Republic, famously requesting the aid of Pyrrhus of Epirus in 280 B.C., thereby initiating the Pyrrhic War. After Pyrrhus was defeated and forced to flee, the Tarantines had no choice but to surrender and become a nominal ally of Rome. Their loyalty proved fickle, however, as when Rome suffered a series of reversals at the hands of the Punic general Hannibal, the Tarantines quickly surrendered their city to the Carthaginian forces in 212 B.C. During the subsequent years of occupation, Tarentum struck coinage to the Punic weight standard in order to pay the foreign garrison. Interestingly, this issue retained Tarentum's iconic horseman and dolphin rider types instead of adopting Punic imagery as many other occupied cities had done. Rome regained the upper hand and took back the city in 209 B.C., and this fascinating short series would be Tarentum's final silver coinage.
