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



Some notes are problem free while others display various impairments. Many notes are slash or cut out cancelled. A couple of notes are severed. Still a useful lot with plenty to offer. This broadly margined and boldly printed 10 Shillings note features beautifully original paper and perfect registration. An outstanding example of this early Delaware Colonial note.

Printed in black with red anti-counterfeiting inks. Blue seal at bottom right with hand and the motto ULTIMA RADIO (which should have been spelled RATIO) meaning "the last resort" as in a declaration of war. A bright note, boldly colored and displaying only moderate circulation. The restoration at left is quite minor but very well executed.



An interesting uncut strip of (3) 1778 dated Massachusetts Colonials all featuring the popular Codfish and Pine Tree motifs from plates engraved by patriot Paul Revere. Both the faces and backs of each note are sharply printed and seen in sharp detail. The designs are fairly well centered and the edges are well cut save for a tight spot near the left edge of the top note. Just a touch of light handling accounts for the PMG assigned grade.



The tape repairs mentioned by the grading service are relegated strictly to the back.

A lightly handled \$8 from this less often seen New Jersey issue. Only 12,000 of each denomination were issued. The paper is bright and well cut with bold red anticounterfeiting design elements seen on the back.

15020 SC-101. South Carolina. June 1, 1775. 50 Pounds. PMG Choice Fine 15 Net. Large Splits, Stains. No. 5516. Signed by Berwick, Waring, Moultrie, Neufville, Bacot and Gibbes. This is the highest denomination from the June 1, 1775 series and 6,000 pieces were issued. The 20 and 50 Pound denominations come with an engraved back design featuring the motto "FOR THE PUBLIC GOOD" by James Oliphant. The emblem on the face depicts a woman frightened by a storm under a tree with the motto "POST TENEBRAS LUX" which means "After the darkness light." A rare denomination and one often found terribly impaired. This example faces up quite nicely, and while splits are present, they do not detract greatly from the notes appearance. The stains mentioned by the grading service are quite minor considering the level of circulation and their mentioning is somewhat picky. A fine example of this rare type.

A nice mid grade example of this scarce denomination of which only 2,500 were issued. The \$10 was the highest denomination of the series which authorized total issue of \$80,000. This example is nicely printed on strong paper with few signs of circulation. The motto in the emblem at bottom right reads "TUTA PEDAMINE VIRTUS" and means "Honor safe in its support. Ex. Ford, Boyd Collection.

Boldly printed inks are noticed on this crisp February 17, 1776 dated \$3 Continental that features an emblem at right that features an eagle fighting a heron with the motto "EXITUS IN DUBIO EST" meaning "the outcome is in doubt." This very Choice note is fully framed on bright wholesome paper.

While already coming from the scarce Yorktown issue, this is simply a tough denomination to acquire in Extremely Fine or above, as PCGS Currency has graded a single note higher as of this writing. Dark and bold inks are seen on the front, with a Buttercup leaf depicted on back.

Nos. 40333. Each note signed by Cox and Donnell. An impressive full sheet of 16 Continental Currency notes from this January 14, 1779 issue. The notes are fully issued and display dark inks and bold color. Full selvage is seen on this sheet. Two examples of each denomination are present. Some splits are seen in the fold lines from years of storage. Minor residue from previous mounting is seen in the margins. Still a very impressive full size sheet.

15026 Continental Currency Counterfeit Detector Uncut Sheet of (8) Notes. May 9th. \$1-\$2-\$3-\$4-\$5-\$6-\$7-\$8. About Uncirculated. A really neat example of early counterfeit detecting examples. This sheet represents denominations from \$1-\$8. All the notes individually would grade About Uncirculated to Uncirculated if cut individually. There are couple of splits in the margins that do not effect the actual notes. A good strong example of a rare sheet.

(AR-10 G48 / Rothert 400-4) A scarce branch style Proof from this Arkansas bank that comes on India paper only. The margins are broad and the design elements are boldly inked on this note that was produced by Underwood, Bald, Spencer & Huffy of New York and Philadelphia.

15028 Monticello, Arkansas. Corporation of Monticello. June 2, 1862. \$3. PMG Fine 12. Stains. (Rothert-495 UNL) No printer's imprint. Crude typeset format scrip note similar to other Southern scrip notes from this era. Plate letter A at top left, serial number at top right. Denomination spelled out in bold letters at center. "In Sound Confederate Funds when the Sum of Ten Dollars is presented for Redemption" below. Signed by W.E. Owens as Treasurer and J. Ferguson as Mayor at right. The Rothert Arkansas reference lists denominations of 50 Cents, \$1 and \$2 but no \$3. Each listed note is given a R-7 rarity rating indicating 1 to 5 known. We have only seen a 50 Cent example offered prior to this note. Some stains are seen as mentioned by the grading service but they are of little consequence in light of the rarity of this note.







Some small internal splits are seen which are consistent with the level of wear but do not significantly detract from the note's appearance. Idaho is one of the rarest states for scrip and this issuer was even unseen in the massive holdings of the John J. Ford Jr. Collection. Likely a note needed by many Mormon and Idaho specialists. Spectacular Fernandina, Florida \$5 Brown Back- Serial Number 1

Fernandina (now Fernandina Beach) is located on the Northern most section of Florida's Atlantic coast. And unlike a lot of Central and South Florida which was mostly just swamp land until the newly built railroads ushered in the real estate boom of the late 19th and early 20th century, Fernandina has been a fort/establishment/city since 1732. Fernandina is located on Amelia Island. Amelia Island is known as the Isle of 8 Flags. France, Spain, England, Mexico, The Confederacy, The United States, and two different rebel groups have all laid claim to the island at some point in history. Fernandina even had a state bank that issued obsolete currency dated as 1859 and 1860. Point being, that when The First National Bank of Fernandina received its initial shipment of national currency, it isn't a surprise that the bank president, knowing the history of Fernandina, decided to save this souvenir that is now up for auction today.

Charter 4558 nationalized in 1891 with RC Cooley as cashier and Fred W Hoyt as president. Cooley, a Massachusetts native, left the bank in 1894 to join The First National Bank of Jacksonville. He was with the bank in Jacksonville until it closed in 1903 and he then left the banking field. Fred W Hoyt was a teacher, newspaper editor, grocer, and ship chandler in the Fernandina and Jacksonville area before he opened The Bank of Fernandina in July of 1887. While it appears he left day to day bank operations in the early 1910s, he was still a fixture around Fernandina until his death in 1928. Today his home is a bed and breakfast in Fernandina. The bank itself survived past the national currency era and was bought in 1948 and its name was changed to The Florida First National Bank of Fernandina Beach. Today it is part of the Wells Fargo bank chain.

The visual appeal of this note is outstanding, as it is seen with excellent hand signed signatures, good centering and ink tones on both sides. There are a couple of small pinholes on the left portion of the note which PMG comments on the back of the holder. We suspect this note was pinned long ago and stored, perhaps on letter head of the bank. None the less, one of the greatest national bank notes from the Sunshine State to be discovered.




The rarity of the sheet alone is impressive. It is equally interesting that by name the town of West Minneapolis doesn't even exist any longer. In 1929 the town changed its name to Hopkins. In fact, there are just six large size notes known from this charter. Before this discovery the best note for the bank was probably a lower end VF blue seal.

The visual appeal of this sheet is also nothing short of impressing. Salvage remains on both the top and bottom, dark blue inks are seen in both the seal and serial numbers which are incredibly embossed into the frosty white paper. The signatures are very strong and PMG does comment "Minor Ink Burn, Signatures retouched" It appears that the cashier may have touched up his signature on the first and last note but is only visible under close scrutiny and does not affect the overall appeal of the sheet.

It is difficult to value such a unique and irreplaceable item. Private sales of similarly rare non-number one large size sheets from other states have been in the mid-five figure range. So it is very possible that our estimate could prove to be a bit conservative.



In the event any applicable conditions of these Terms of Sale herein are not complied with by a Buyer or if the Buyer fails to make payment in full by the Default Date, Stack's Bowers reserves the right, in its sole discretion, in addition to all other remedies which it may have at law or in equity to rescind the sale of that lot or any other lot or lots sold to the defaulting Buyer, retaining all payments made by Buyer as liquidated damages, it being recognized that actual damages may be speculative or difficult to compute, and resell a portion or all of the lots held by Stack's Bowers, in a commercially reasonable manner, which may include a public or private sale, in a quantity sufficient in the opinion of Stack's Bowers to satisfy the indebtedness, plus all accrued charges, and Stack's Bowers may charge a seller's commission that is commercially reasonable. - 12. Disputes. If a dispute arises concerning ownership of a lot or concerning proceeds of any sale, Stack's Bowers reserves the right to commence a statutory interpleader proceeding at the expense of the Consignor and Buyer and any other applicable party, and in such event shall be entitled to its reasonable attorneys' fees and costs. Bidder further agrees that venue of the arbitration proceeding shall be in Orange County, California; and any court proceeding shall be in the Orange County Superior Court, in the State of California, and in each case waive any claim of Forum Non Conveniens. 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
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
