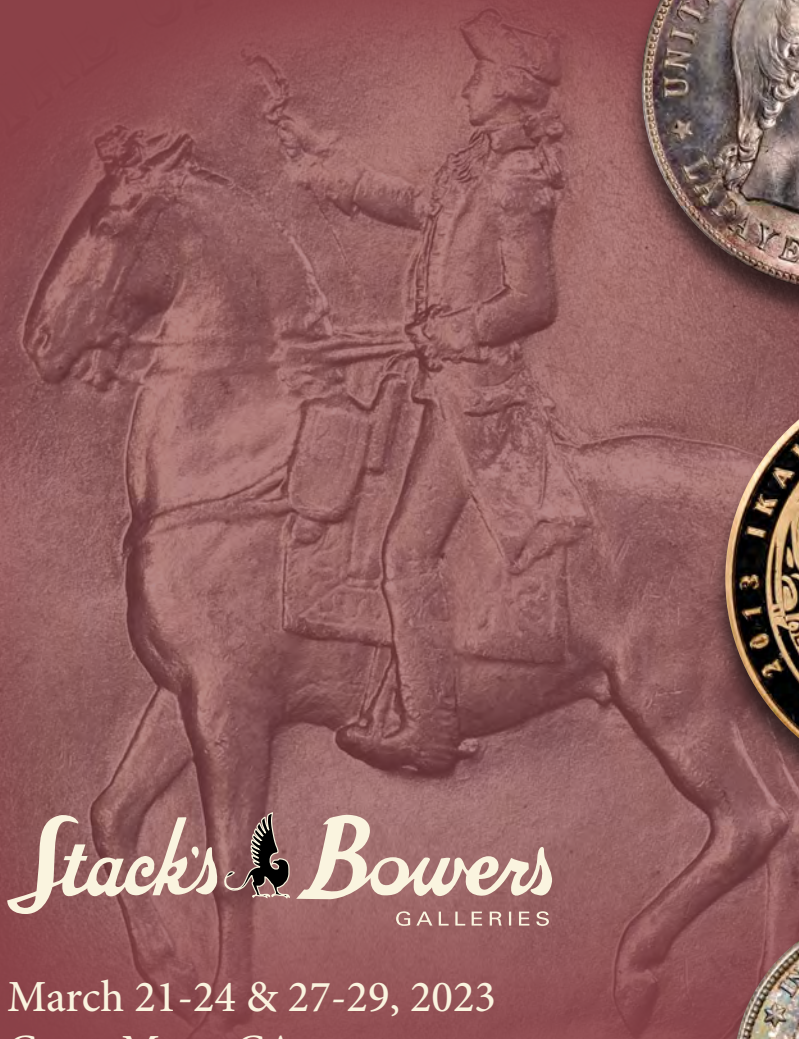

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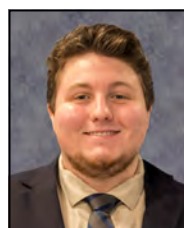
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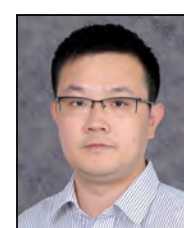
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Welcome to Our Spring 2023 U.S. Coins Showcase Auction

I am very proud to present our Spring 2023 Showcase Auction, the Official Auction of the Whitman Coin & Collectibles Spring Expo. Included in the following pages is an astounding selection of Numismatic Americana, U.S. Colonial and Federal coinage, and Physical Bitcoins and Cryptocurrency.

The Numismatic Americana is anchored by the Martin Logies Collection, which features a selection of rare tokens and medals with a focus on the Libertas Americana theme. Highlights include a 1783 Peace of Versailles “Libertas “ Silver Medal, Betts-608, MS-63 (PCGS), a 1783 Treaty of Paris Silver Medal, Betts-612, MS-64 (PCGS), and an 1867 Libertas / Bolen silver store card, JAB-30, MS-64 (PCGS).

Another important offering from the Americana category is a selection of medals being sold by the Yale University Art Gallery for the benefit of acquisition funds of the Numismatic Collection. Highlights include a (ca. 1762) Benjamin Franklin, L.L.D. Medal, Betts-545, Bronze, MS-63 BN (NGC), a (post-1807) Franklin American Beaver Medal, Betts-546, Bronzed Copper, MS-67 BN (NGC), and an 1857 James Buchanan Inaugural Medal, Silvered White Metal, MS-61 (NGC).

The Crooked River Collection is an impressive cabinet of Washington pieces with a focus on coppers from the 1780s and 1790s struck during Washington's lifetime. Superior eye appeal and surface quality are unifying characteristics for this group. Highlights from the Crooked River Collection include a 1791 Washington Liverpool halfpenny, GW-19, EF-45 (PCGS), and a 1795 Washington Liberty and Security halfpenny, GW-48, AU-55 (PCGS) CAC. Of course, additional Colonial coinage is offered from the Sydney F. Martin Collection, Part III in a separate standalone catalog.

Federal U.S. coins comprise a number of impressive named cabinets as well as numerous individual rarities. This session is anchored by the Cabinet of James Allaire Millholland (1842-1911), gathered well over a century ago and off the market since the coins were acquired by the collector himself. The offering comprises approximately 550 coins, many of which are beautifully toned from more than 100 years in a custom-built wooden cabinet. It begins with the circulation strike issues of the

1790s, with Proofs coming to the fore starting with coins of the 1860s. Highlights from the Millholland Collection presented in this catalog include an 1837 Liberty Seated dime, No Stars, MS-65 (PCGS), an 1890 dime Proof-67 (PCGS) CAC, an 1838 half dollar MS-64 (PCGS), and an 1890 half dollar Proof-67 (PCGS) CAC. The balance of the collection is presented in a separate section in our Rarities Night catalog along with a group of pieces featured in our Internet Only Session 11.

The Abigail Collection, Part III is a nearly complete set of half dollars from the Barber, Walking Liberty, Franklin, and Classic Commemorative series. It comprises over 340 coins including an exciting mix of Condition Census and Everyman quality coins that will appeal to all levels of collectors. The Abigail Collection was assembled throughout the mid-20th century and has been off the market for many decades. We are thrilled to present Part III from the collection, following other offerings that we first auctioned in 2020. Half dollar highlights from the Abigail Collection, Part III include a 1907-S MS-64 (PCGS), a 1908-O MS-67 (PCGS) CAC, a 1916-S MS-65 (PCGS), and 1927-S MS-65 (PCGS).

The Roberta and William C. Willner Collection is a cabinet of exceptional silver, copper, and nickel type coins with a focus on Morgan silver dollars. Included are many of the rarest key-dates from each series and most coins showcase Choice Mint State and Gem Mint State quality. Highlights from the Wilner Collection include a 1919-D Standing Liberty quarter MS-65 (NGC), a 1795 Flowing Hair half dollar, O-130, VF-25 (PCGS) CAC OGH, an 1879-CC Morgan silver dollar MS-63 (PCGS) CAC OGH, and an 1895-O Morgan silver dollar AU-58 (PCGS) CAC OGH.

The BASH Collection showcases a nearly complete date set of half dollars from the Draped Bust, Capped Bust, and Liberty Seated series, as well as a comprehensive run of Barber quarters. The selection of Barber quarters and Liberty Seated half dollars are also marked by exceptional Proof examples. Highlights from the BASH Collection include an 1800 Draped Bust half dime, LM-1, EF-45 (PCGS) CAC, an 1899 Barber quarter Proof-67 Cameo (NGC), 1901 Barber quarter Proof-65 Deep Cameo (PCGS), and an 1857 Liberty Seated half dollar Proof-64 Cameo (NGC).

The RK Long Beach Collection ranks as the Fourth Current and All-Time Finest 50-Piece CAC Set of United States Classic Silver Commemoratives on the PCGS Set Registry. This set has been assembled with a focus on originality and eye appeal, which is confirmed by full approval by CAC. Highlights include an 1893 Isabella quarter MS-66+ (PCGS) CAC, a 1915-S Panama-Pacific Exposition MS-66 (PCGS) CAC, a 1922 Grant Memorial, Star, MS-65 (PCGS) CAC OGH, a 1928 Hawaiian Sesquicentennial MS-65 (PCGS) CAC, a 1935 Old Spanish Trail MS-67 (PCGS) CAC, a 1936 Norfolk Bicentennial MS-68 (PCGS) CAC OGH, and a 1900 Lafayette silver dollar MS-65 (PCGS) CAC.

The Ward Collection is a curated type set of U.S. gold coinage with a focus on gold dollars and Saint-Gaudens double eagles. Most of these coins exhibit incredible Gem, Superb Gem, and Ultra Gem quality and the majority feature approval by CAC. Highlights include an 1880 gold dollar MS-67 (PCGS) CAC, an 1885 gold dollar MS-67 (PCGS) CAC, a 1923-D Saint-Gaudens double eagle MS-66 (PCGS) CAC, and a 1926 Saint-Gaudens double eagle MS-66 (PCGS).

The Joyce Collection is a fresh grouping of Classic Commemorative half dollars and Proof coinage from the 1930s and 1940s. The collection was assembled during the first half of the 20th century and is being brought to market for the first time in this sale. Highlights from the Joyce Collection include a 1938 Walking Liberty half dollar Proof-67 (PCGS) CAC, a 1936 Texas Independence Centennial MS-67+ (PCGS), a 1937 Antietam Anniversary MS-67+ (PCGS) CAC, and a 1938 New Rochelle Anniversary MS-67+ (PCGS).

We are also excited to present our Spring 2023 Cryptocurrency Session which marks our largest such offering yet, with 303 lots including 168 Loaded with cryptocurrency and 135 Non-Loaded coins. A noteworthy highlight of this offering is a pair of special Pattern sets from the Lealana Archives showcasing a variety of experimental finishes and features that did not appear on official production coinage until recent years. Additional offerings from the Lealana series include several very rare varieties of the silver 0.1 BTC, 0.25 BTC, and 0.5 BTC denominations as well as a selection of the 2021

and 2022 “Bitcoin Cent” 0.01 BTC coins that have never before been offered in a Live auction. Presented from the Casascius series are several of the historic 2011 “CASACIUS ERROR” 1 BTC in Brass alongside several Brass 0.5 BTC as well as an exceptional 0.1 BTC in silver graded MS-68 PL (ICG). We are also proud to present an exciting assortment of BTCC coins including a Proof-66 Deep Cameo (PCGS) 1 BTC in silver that marks the first of its type to appear at public auction.

In addition to these curated selections, we are proud to offer many individual highlights including a (1652) NE shilling, Noe 1-A, AU-50 (PCGS), a 1652 Oak Tree shilling, Noe-5, EF-45 (PCGS) CAC, a (ca. 1792) Washington Born Virginia copper, Legend Reverse, GW-33, MS-64 BN (PCGS), a 1798 Draped Bust cent, S-170, AU-58 (PCGS), a 1925-D Buffalo nickel MS-66 (NGC), an 1879-CC Morgan silver dollar, Clear CC, MS-63 (PCGS) CAC OGH, an 1884-S Morgan silver dollar MS-60 (ANACS) OH, a 1921 Peace silver dollar MS-66 (PCGS), an 1856 three-dollar gold piece MS-64 (PCGS), and an 1876-S Liberty Head double eagle MS-63 (PCGS).

Accompanying this primary catalog are several collections presented in separate catalogs including U.S. Colonial coinage from the Sydney F. Martin Collection, Part III, U.S. Liberty Head gold coins from Fairmont Collection—CAG Set, and a special selection of world-class U.S. coins in our Rarities Night Session with additional selections from the Cabinet of James Allaire Millholland (1842-1911).

MASSACHUSETTS SILVER COINAGE

Magnificent 1652 NE Shilling Noe 1-A, Salmon 1-B Among the Finest Known Ex Donald Partrick

Undated (1652) NE Shilling. Noe 1-A, Salmon 1-B, W-40. Rarity-6+. AU-50 (PCGS). 70.2 grains. A truly impressive example of this coveted issue. The surfaces show a mottled patina of grey and light peach tones beneath a faint golden iridescence. Glints of olive and navy texture show within the punches and suggest original luster. The planchet is imperfect but largely round, drawn to a soft point at the lower obverse. The punch on that side shows the typical softness at the very upper border, though is otherwise sharp and within a strongly defined cartouche. Each of the characters feature a negligible distortion from repeated impressions of the punch, and die breaks are well developed at the middle arm of the E and in the field to the right. An old mark just below center is matched by a similarly ancient blemish at center on the reverse, though neither of these distract from the overall aesthetic. The reverse punch is exceptionally bold, with the numerals uniformly pronounced and clear striations visible off the top of the first I. An exceptionally defined and impeccably preserved specimen.

This piece is a well documented and storied example, having served as the host coin to a number of highly deceptive forgeries discovered in the 1970s. One of these counterfeits had been consigned to our (Bowers and Ruddy Galleries') August 1978 ANA Auction in a group of seven other colonial coins, six of which were also forgeries. Another one of these counterfeit shillings was owned by specialist Bill Anton and had been designated a forgery in June 1977 by ANACS. In describing this

saga in his article "Superb Numismatic Forgeries Are Upon Us" in the April 1979 edition of *The Numismatist*, Eric Newman provides a thorough analysis of the present piece, providing a weight identical to the present assessment (70.2 grains) and a specific gravity (10.36). He notes the "dark & natural" toning in addition the "s shaped bend" of the planchet that distinguishes this genuine example from the two forgeries.

Modern Colonial researchers have been gifted an indispensable tool concerning these coveted NE shilling in the form of Jack Howes' lengthy survey of New England coinage published in the August 2010 *Colonial Newsletter*. This was an extraordinary feat of census work and redefining provenance chains that had often become confused in recent decades. In the Howes article, he identified a surprising 14 specimens from the Noe 1-A dies, a far cry from the five pieces that had been seen by the Ford cataloger in 2005. Of those 14 coins, fully half are impounded, with seven coins in the collections of the ANS, British Museum (three pieces), the Lasser Collection at Colonial Williamsburg, the National Numismatic Collection at the Smithsonian Institution (the gift of Mrs. Norweb), and the Hunterian Museum in Glasgow. The appearance of the EF-45 (PCGS) example in our March 2015 sale of the Kendall Collection, known to the Ford cataloger (the "New England Collection" coin) but not listed by Howes, makes for a total of 15 survivors, of which eight are in private hands.

The Howes 1 coin, the Ford piece, was acquired from the Ford XII sale by John Kraljevich on behalf of David Sundman, who later consigned it to our sale of November 2013. Graded AU-55 by PCGS in 2013, it brought \$440,625, up from the \$253,000 it sold for in 2005. Newman's superb Noe 1-A, the high grade Mills (1904) coin, brought \$352,500 in the May 2014 Newman sale, now graded PCGS AU-55. Howes places the Newman example at number 13.

Partrick had two Noe 1-As, the present example, Howes 4, being the finest of the pair. His other example, certified EF-40 (NGC), is listed as number 6 in the Howes census and previously sold in our (Stack's) 1988 Oechsner Estate; its more complete punches outweighing its lower surface quality. The other four privately owned Noe 1-As are Howes 3, the very well struck Judd-Stack coin, Howes 5, the AU-50 (PCGS) example offered in our October 2018 auction as part of the Archangel Collection (where it realized \$204,000), and Howes 7, the Zabriskie-Groves coin that Breen confused for the Ford coin.

It is difficult to grade, or even rank, NE shillings. Different collectors will differently assess the importance of good original surfaces, complete stamps, or a lack of marks. We would not presume to tell bidders one aspect is more valuable than another. However, when all factors are considered and opinions are taken, it is irrefutable that the present example is among the most desirable of the extant population. It is an important relic of American history and numismatics and will surely be a crowning achievement of the next cabinet it graces.

A lovely example of this classic Oak Tree variety, showing a good complete tree on lovely deep gray surfaces. Some earthen encrustation is noted in the recessed areas of both sides. Choice for the grade, with no major marks, just some trivial light circulation scratches on the reverse. The obverse shows its usual alignment towards 6 o'clock, with about half of the N of IN off the planchet, while the reverse is

well centered. Crisp early die state of Noe-5, showing a very strong and unclashed tree and apparently no large break at the bases of the letters AN in AND, though the section of the reverse periphery at 3 o'clock that is most useful for die state study is softly struck. A handsome piece in all regards, and a superb example of the type.

The patina of this pleasing example is mostly rich charcoal-gray, with hints of olive and steel-blue evident as the surfaces dip into a light. Nicely centered on an irregular, somewhat ovoid planchet, trimming just the tops of

the legends at the left obverse and lower reverse. Close inspection with a loupe reveals some ancient circulation marks, but these have long worn into the overall complexion. Softness at the upper border is typical of these dies and the balance of the devices are well pronounced.

peripheral letters in those areas. Close inspection with a loupe reveals fine surface scale, as well as some ancient circulation marks, but the most significant blemish is a dent at the upper right obverse border that explains the PCGS qualifier. Not a bad-looking piece, however, and at this price point a desirable coin for type purposes.

There is an exceptional amount of vivid color here for an early American colonial coin - enough, even, for the eye appeal alone to suggest a higher Mint State grade. The viewer is treated to a base of soft medium rose color overall with an intermingling of pale gold, champagne-apricot and light gray shades. The strike is ideally centered with crisp border denticulation framing razor sharp

to full design elements. Smooth in hand with no troublesome marks or other post-production blemishes, accuracy alone compels us to mention a few shallow planchet striations (as made) on the reverse. These are faint and well concealed within the border denticulation and the rose above and below the digits 22 in the date. This is a single die marriage *Guide Book* variety of the issue, and this superior piece is in the same grade as the Sydney F. Martin specimen that realized \$4,080 as lot 1156 in our Winter 2022 Auction.

(1694) Hodder 2-B, W-12040. Rarity-2. GOD PRESERVE LONDON. Thick Planchet. MS-64 BN (PCGS). 232.2 grains. A splendid example of this perennially popular colonial era type. Satiny surfaces are fully lustrous with an even endowment of original golden-copper patina. This coin is sharply struck for the type, the impression ideally centered on the reverse and only marginally less so on the obverse. The former side is fully Gem in quality, while the obverse reveals only a few trivial carbon flecks and flan flaws over and above the elephant that uphold the validity of the Choice Mint State grade assigned by PCGS.

While this is a plentiful variety in an absolute sense, and our multiple offerings of high grade examples throughout the years notwithstanding, the thick planchet London Elephant token is rare in the finest Mint State grades. A highlight of the present sale, and eagerly awaiting inclusion in another high quality cabinet of U.S. colonial and related coinage.

RHODE ISLAND SHIP MEDALS

“1778-1779” (ca. 1780) Rhode Island Ship Medal. Betts-563, W-1740. Wreath Below Ship. Brass or Pinchbeck. AU-58 (PCGS). 205.0 grains. Rich dark chocolate-brown with some golden-tan undertones and a good deal of frost remaining around devices. Well struck, corrosion free, and free of flaws, this is about as nice a Rhode Island ship medal as anyone could hope for. One little natural planchet bubble is noted near the front mast, harming nothing. The popular Rhode Island Ship medals continue to fascinate and baffle numismatists. They are believed to have been struck around 1780, though by whom and for what reason remains unclear. The reverse of the medal depicts the Continental Army’s withdrawal from Aquidneck Island in August 1778 surrounded by the British fleet commanded by Admiral Lord Richard Howe. The Americans’ retreat was necessitated by the withdrawal of a covering French fleet under the Comte D’Estaing to Newport after receiving considerable damage in a storm. The obverse has been the subject of debate as to what it portrays. For generations, it has been assumed that it is a satirical representation of Lord Howe’s flagship fleeing Narragansett Bay in 1779, an interpretation in part based on the earliest versions of this medal bearing the word VLUGTENDE (“fleeing”) underneath Howe’s ship. The most recent scholarship asserts that instead of a pro-American medal, it is actually a British medal intended for the Dutch market, or even an entirely Dutch product created to help garner support to the British cause in the global war for empire that raged throughout the 1770s and 1780s and of which the American Revolution was only a small part. With this current interpretation of the medal, it would appear that if it was intended to influence Dutch feelings towards a more pro-British position, it failed in its purpose. Often at loggerheads with each other, British and Dutch relations were very tense, culminating in December 1780 when the Dutch joined other European nations in the League of Armed Neutrality. The League was established as a counter to the British Royal Navy’s policy of intercepting neutral shipping in search of French supplies.

Rhode Island Ship medals with VLUGTENDE are of the highest rarity, often with decades between auction appearances. The transitional type with VLUGTENDE removed, and the later modified die with the wreath, offered here, are of roughly similar rarity with most examples in the VF to low end AU grade range. Specimens at and near the Mint State threshold are notable rarities, which fact confirms the significance of this offering for the advanced collector.

Really a lovely piece, both sides exhibit even pewter-gray patina to surfaces that are free of troublesome marks. A bit of ancient surface encrustation within the ship’s rigging is easily overlooked, and just as easily forgiven. More significant, perhaps, is some surface scale on the reverse at the letters EYL in the legend, although being minor and out of the way near the border, even this is easily forgiven. Boldly defined overall with minimal rub, an impressive numismatic provenance further enhances the desirability of this significant Rhode Island Ship medal.

MASSACHUSETTS COPPERS

1787 Massachusetts Half Cent. Ryder 1-D, W-5900. Rarity-4-. AU-58 (PCGS). A satiny and smooth-looking piece with some good gloss to the surfaces. There is a touch of softness in the centers, typical of the variety, although the detail is sharp to full elsewhere. Struck trivially off center, the obverse devoid of denticulation from 1 to 7 o’clock, the upper reverse border flush with the lettering. A minor rim nick at 7 o’clock on the obverse is the only mentionable blemish, and it is easily overlooked. Ryder 1-D represents the sole use of this obverse while the reverse is also found in combination with 1787 obverses 4 and 6. The execution of both dies is distinctive, making this a readily identifiable variety. Most notable is the reverse with its thin, hand-engraved date digits and the rounded, high relief to the shield. Moderately scarce as an overall variety but scarce to rare in AU and Mint State grades, the typical survivor grading just VF or EF.

Border denticulation is present in all areas save for at the upper left obverse, upper reverse. Ryder 2-A is one of the less frequently seen varieties of 1787 Massachusetts half cents. While there are a decent number of Mint State coins known, nonetheless, the die pairing can be challenging to locate above EF.

This Choice EF will represent the 1787 Ryder 6-A nicely in any but the most advanced Massachusetts copper cabinet.

CONNECTICUT COPPER

Exciting 1787 Miller 49.2-Z.27 Connecticut Rarity Third Known – Discovered in 2021 Tied for CC#1

1787 Connecticut Copper. Miller 49.2-Z.27, W-4325. Rarity-8-. Draped Bust Left. VF-20 (ANACS). Stack's Bowers Galleries is pleased to present the third and most recently discovered example of one of the rarest die pairings in the entire Connecticut copper series. An attractive coin, both sides exhibit warm, even autumn-brown color to generally smooth-looking surfaces. Original planchet texture is seen in the area of shallow roughness through the center of the reverse that extends to the border at ET. Die swell that bisects the obverse from the letter T in AUCTORI to the colon after the word CONNEC interrupted metal flow for the reverse and explains why the original texture did not strike out on that side. Not surprisingly, the design elements in these areas are soft to indistinct, especially those on the reverse. Otherwise, however, we note bold striking detail that still presents quite well despite overall moderate wear. Surface preservation is quite pleasing, and there are no marks of note except for a couple of short, thin scrapes on the reverse at the letters E and L in ET LIB. Accuracy does compel us to mention a touch of glossiness to the texture and some curious underlying pinkish-orange color that points to an old, light cleaning.

Obverse 49.2 and Reverse Z.27 are two of the most challenging dies to collect in the entire Connecticut series. All of the individual pairings in which these dies are known (49.2-Z.1, 49.2-Z.26, 49.2-Z.27, 33.13-Z.27) are formidable rarities with only a handful of specimens known in total. Miller 49.2-Z.27, offered here, is readily attributable by the combination of two cinquefoils above the bust on the obverse with a Z-type reverse on which a prominent crack meanders down from the upper border to the seated figure's shoulder. These features are clearly seen on the present example, as is the aforementioned obverse die bulge and the lowest extension of the reverse crack as it passes along the right side of the digit 8 in the date. (This is actually a bisecting vertical crack, although the softness of strike in the center obscures the crack as it passes through the seated figure.) One final diagnostic of this reverse die is also readily evident here: double punching to the fifth cinquefoil.

Reverse Z.27 was discovered in April 2005 in its current pairing with Obverse 49.2, although the variety was not published until the Fall 2007 edition of *The C4 Newsletter*. By the time Randall P. Clark published his *Identification and Classification of Connecticut Coppers (1785-1788)* in 2021, a second example of Miller 49.2-Z.27 had been discovered. The obverse of the second specimen and the reverse of both examples are plated in Clark. The offered coin came to light just before Clark's was published in the summer of 2021, but too late to be included therein. Its discovery was published in an article titled "Third known example of 1787 Connecticut copper die variety found" penned for *Coin World* by Paul Gilkes and published at coinworld.com on May 28, 2021. Prior to its attribution by ANACS this coin was in the holdings of a Philadelphia area collector for years, where its attribution and rarity were unknown. As written by Gilkes:

"Early copper specialist Bob Grellman examined images of the coin and was able to quickly identify the coin. 'My impression of the coin: a choice Connecticut copper, regardless of the variety. Lightly worn with smooth surfaces and free of any notable defects,' according to Grellman. 'All the die features and cracks are clear. Far superior to the discovery coin.'"

Inasmuch as the discovery coin is holed, as pictured in Clark, this piece is certainly "far superior." It compares favorably to the second specimen discovered, which has a similar quality of strike, comparable wear, and is identifiable by a lengthy obverse flan flaw at and behind the nose. We rank the second and third specimens confirmed as tied for CC#1, with the holed discovery coin as CC#2.

Given the popularity of collecting Connecticut coppers by die variety, this Miller 49.2-Z.27 rarity is sure to attract strong bidder competition. Our only other offering for this obverse die, in its 49.2-Z.26 pairing, resulted in an impressive realized price of \$63,250 in our January 2012 Americana Sale of Collection SLT. The Tanenbaum specimen of that variety was unique at the time, although two specimens of 49.2-Z.26 are now known.

NEW JERSEY COPPERS

1787 New Jersey Copper. Maris 27-j, W-5060. Rarity-6+. Small Planchet, Plain Shield. VG Details—Cleaned (PCGS). This combination of well known dies was unknown at the time of the 1881 publication of Dr. Maris' *Coins of New Jersey*, and it has become well known since then as the most "common" of the not-in-Maris varieties with somewhere over a dozen specimens known. Lost in this bit of trivia is the knowledge that many of the known specimens are astoundingly ugly. The best of the known examples is the Spiro-Oechsner-O'Donnell coin now in the Ish collection. The Siboni coin that the late Tom Madigan cherrypicked in Florida is good-looking, and the ANS coin is a choice mid-range VF, but most of the other survivors are somewhat challenging on the eye appeal scale. This one, candidly, fits right in. The surfaces are rough golden-olive and steel-brown, lightly granular overall, with a few shallow planchet flaws slanting up to the left from the lower obverse border. Close

inspection with a loupe reveals numerous fine scratches, especially on the obverse. Judged against most standards, this isn't a terribly pretty coin, but it does retain bold outline detail to virtually all major design elements. The obverse is aligned such that CAESAREA is right against the edge of the planchet, typical for the variety. The date is clear.

The opportunity to add a not-in-Maris variety always dangles like catnip on a string before New Jersey copper enthusiasts, but the foulness of adding a coin that looks like a cat already ate it often limits the joy of such an acquisition. This example offers a happy medium: a rarity unlikely to require a new mortgage that still looks attractive enough that you won't be embarrassed to show it at the next colonial-coin barbecue.

Always a popular Maris number, and represented here by an impressively smooth, well struck example. The planchet is nicely made with only a single notable flaw in the date area on the obverse, although this just misses involving the first 7 and affects no other digits. Marbled deep autumn and

gray-brown patina to both sides with all major design elements bold. There are no detracting marks, and a trace of microscopic surface scale associated with the latter color is mentioned solely for accuracy. All in all, a pleasing mid grade example of this eagerly sought New Jersey copper *Guide Book* variety.

VERMONT COPPER

Famous 1785 Vermont/Immune Columbia Rarity

1785 Vermont Copper. RR-1, Bressett 26-Z, W-2250. Rarity-5+. IMMUNE COLUMBIA. VG-10 (PCGS). 123.8 grains. A pleasing, fairly high grade example of one of the most desirable and enigmatic Vermont varieties. Features the unusual combination of a crudely executed Bust Right Vermont obverse with a late die state Immune Columbia reverse, a die previously used on various Nova Constellatio patterns and later muled with a George III obverse. This variety is associated with RR-30 (the "Backward C" variety) and the aforementioned George III/Immune Columbia (Vlack 15-85NY) as all three feature extraordinarily poor letter placement in the legends, suggesting they were made by the same inexperienced die sinker at Machin's Mills and combined with whatever miscellaneous reverse dies happened to be lying around. What was likely a whimsical project on a slow day toward the end of the Machin's Mills operation made for some legendary rarities for numismatists today, challenging in terms of both condition and absolute scarcity.

There are perhaps 35-40 examples known of the present variety, an amount far lower than the number of collectors who desire to own one. This specimen is almost certainly among the best 10 or so, although ranking these in terms of grade is far from an exact science. While there is some of the typically seen planchet roughness and flaws, the surfaces are glossy and free from even the most minor post-strike problems. Predominantly light brown in color, with some areas of darker olive and deep maroon depending on the surface texture. Well centered detail on a slightly broader than average planchet, which allows for the vast majority of the legends to be visible and most importantly, a full, bold date - a notably rare feature for these and seen on only a handful of survivors. Overall, an excellent representative that would be right at home in a high quality set of Vermont coppers.

Pretty rose-apricot and iridescent gray-brown colors blend over surfaces that are fully defined with an overall smooth appearance to the eye. There are no handling marks of note, just a few widely scattered spots precluding an even higher numeric grade. A highly appealing specimen striking of the type, and rare, as such.

The partnership of Talbot, Allum & Lee, formed in 1794 and operated only until 1796, was composed of William Talbot, William Allum, and James Lee, who engaged in the India trade in lower Manhattan at 241 Pearl Street. Tokens dated 1794 and 1795, bearing the standing figure of Commerce on the obverse and a fully rigged sailing ship on the reverse, were struck in Birmingham and imported into America. On this side of the Atlantic they were sufficiently plentiful at one time that the Philadelphia Mint gathered examples and cut planchets for half cents from them, such half cent emissions being dated 1795 and 1797. The piece offered herewith is Choice prooflike Uncirculated and is probably the finest known example. It is sharply struck, well centered, and absolutely superb in every respect. In this condition it is one of the most outstanding pieces in the Garrett Collection of Washington items. A breathtaking piece worthy of any superlative adjective you wish to apply to it.

The enigmatic Washington President and Washington Born Virginia coppers are closely related in obverse portrait style to the Large and Small Eagle cents of 1791. As such, and for many years, numismatists believed that these coppers were struck

by Obediah Westwood of Birmingham, England. Modern scholarship, however, has confirmed the maker as Jacob Perkins of Massachusetts. Although seemingly produced in limited numbers, these pieces are not a pattern for a coinage contract. Yet even so, most show evidence of (considerable) use and it does seem likely they were placed into circulation. Were this primarily intended as a commemorative medalet, more of the known pieces would be Mint State or very high grade, but only a handful can be considered as fine as the Garrett-Partrick specimen offered here.

Glossy surfaces are primarily light milk chocolate-brown, though enough faded original red remains to have earned this piece the Red Brown descriptor from PCGS. The red remains close to the rims and in some other recesses and is vivid in these areas, but it fades rapidly into the brown fields. Very few handling marks of any kind are noted, but there is a large arcing planchet cutter mark passing just right of Washington's nose that terminates at the rim to the left and right of GEORGE. This is a mint error and speaks to the conditions under which these pieces were struck and distributed.

It has been estimated that just eight to 10 examples exist with this distinctive rim treatment, but the number might be just a hair

higher. We have four distinct specimens in our online archives going back to 2007, and it seems that as many as eight others can be fairly quickly found. It would appear that the number of corded rim specimens produced might be similar to the number struck with fire gilt surfaces, but the corded rim examples tend to survive in higher grades for some reason. It might point to a different distribution that resulted in them being more protected, but this is not likely to be sorted with certainty.

Even with the planchet cutter imperfection, this is one of the nicest examples we have seen, and it is the only one graded by PCGS with the Red Brown designation. As expected, it is their *CoinFacts* plate coin for the issue in RB.

Lustrous Mint State Funeral Urn Medal

Lovely light pewter-gray with rich luster around the devices and legends and the faintest patination in the fields. Superb eye appeal, with only the most trivial pesting on the reverse and a few scattered hairlines and marks consistent with the grade. The dies for these medals were cut by Jacob Perkins of Newburyport, Massachusetts, and the pieces were struck in early 1800 in preparation for the February 22nd civic funeral procession in Boston. There are at least six die combinations known, suggestive

of a large production and they seem to have been distributed widely. However, in all metals but gold they are often seen in hard worn to Very Fine condition, or so. White metal pieces are often pested and deep gray, with other impairments in the soft metal. All are highly desired and pieces as nicely preserved as this one are very much prized.

Apparently silvered on the satiny obverse, which has taken on a rose and blue-green patina. The reverse exhibits only a faint trace of similar toning. A bit handled with some scattered fine marks on the obverse and a couple of more pronounced reverse digs that were heavy enough to slightly bend the flan. These are seen in the legend at 8 o'clock and at the left base of the urn. To accentuate the positive is easy, as most obviously worn white metal pieces did not survive in nearly as nice condition as this one, the metal being

just too soft for prolonged use. Additionally, the softer composition struck up better and on this piece the details in the upper urn, while not complete, are certainly better executed than on the reverses of some silver examples we have offered in the past. With the demand for these medals on the rise in recent years, any Washington funeral medal is a good one for a collector to capture. The Baker number on the edge in red.

STRUCK COPIES OF COLONIAL COINS AND RELATED

Undated (1850s) Good Samaritan / Oak Tree Shilling Muling. Dies by Thomas Wyatt. Noe-GO, W-14092. Silver. MS-62 (PCGS).

This exceptional Mint State Wyatt muling looks as fine as it must have appeared on the day it was created. The sandy-gray surfaces are alive with softly glowing luster and whispers of pale gold and apricot iridescence. The obverse features a near-perfect rendition of an Oak Tree shilling, the reverse with the Good Samaritan of Biblical times aiding the beggar by the wayside, the Samaritan standing near his horse, the beggar seated with tree behind, all within a circle, IN MASATHVSETS around. Reverse die break from 6 o'clock on the rim upward across the seated beggar then out to the rim through the second A, scribe line for legend plainly seen. No marks of any measure can be found on either side no matter how diligent the search. Obverse border tight to the tops of IN MASATHVSETS, intruding on a few letters at the 5 to 7 o'clock position. Reverse evenly centered and boldly struck. We have difficulty imagining a finer example of this famous Wyatt concoction, and once the present specimen sells, it may be a long time before we see another in any grade.

Thomas Wyatt was a denizen of New York City at the time these copies were made, living then on Mercer Street circa 1840-1860. Mention of his "coins" first surfaced in 1856 in the June 16 edition of the *Boston Journal*. It was there reported that numerous NE shillings and sixpence were found in a bottle in Chelsea, Massachusetts, nearby to Boston, along with a 1652 Oak Tree twopence and a Pine Tree penny, both fantasies with no like pieces in the regular Massachusetts Bay coinage pantheon. A letter to the editor of the *Journal* a few weeks later from one "Nummus" - thought to be Jeremiah Colburn, a leading numismatic scholar from the Boston area - disparaged the coins as fakes. Wyatt either made or had made a dozen "sets" of his stylistic fantasies, including the NE shilling, NE sixpence, Oak Tree shilling and twopence, Pine Tree sixpence and pence, and Good Samaritan shilling. He had only seen illustrations of Massachusetts Bay Colony coins, and those had lines in the fields to show shading; Wyatt's copies included the shading lines feature in his finished product which easily distinguishes them today. The Wyatt dies were later acquired by Edwin Bishop of 9 Dutch Street in New York City who struck a few more "sets" including pieces in copper and a unique shilling with the Good Samaritan obverse and a shilling reverse overstruck on an English gold guinea.

Cast Copy 1670-A French Colonies Double de l'Amerique. As Martin Chapter 5, Lecompte-185, Breen-257, W-11600. Copper-Plated. Very Fine. 100 grains. An exciting piece, made even more so by the recent sale of the unique 1670-A double de l'Amerique in our Winter 2022 sale of the Sydney F. Martin Collection (see below). This cast copy is well produced, the molds/shells made from the original coin, but with the central detail subsequently strengthened. Both sides exhibit dominant rose-brown color that yields to deeper gray-brown in the protected areas around many of the design elements. Traces of the underlying metal (lead?) are evident at the lower reverse border; there are also traces of what appears to be old solder in two areas on the edge. Most features are boldly rendered, and all are readily discernible. A bit rough overall, as made, yet free of sizeable marks.

This type is the most significant French colonial coin in existence. Struck as part of the first coinage intended for the French New World, it is both the first and the rarest. The reverse design reads DOUBLE / DE LA / MERIQUE / FRANCOISE or "double of French America." The engraving error, which substituted an incorrect De La Merique instead of the correct De l'Amerique, should not overshadow what this coin states: the type was produced for French America and is the first coin ever struck to name this landmass as part of its designs. There is only one genuine specimen extant, the Norweb-Martin specimen that realized an impressive \$504,000 in our Winter 2022 Auction sale of the Sydney F. Martin Collection. With that coin likely off the market again for many more decades, and also undoubtedly beyond the reach of most collectors, this appealing copy is a desirable alternative.

Cast Copy 1670-A French Colonies 15 Sols. As Martin 1.2-B.1, Hodder-4, Breen-255, W-11610. Extremely Fine. 118.21 grains. Deep steel-gray overall with a touch of glossiness to the texture, yet no troublesome marks. This piece is well made with sharp design elements and only trivial roughness to the texture. Only 10 coins from this die pairing are accounted for, just five of which are in private hands, which facts underscore the desirability of this cast copy for collectors of French colonial coinage seeking an example of this rare Gloriam Regni issue.

Cast Copy 1717-Q French Colonies Demi-Sol, or 6 Deniers. As Martin 1-A, Hodder-7, Breen-259, W-11800. Extremely Fine. 149.69 grains. This type is pictured on page 123 of Sydney F. Martin's outstanding reference *French Coinage Specifically for Colonial America* (2015), in which the author states:

"These coins [cast copy 12 and 6 deniers] are clearly made by the same hand, and seem to be relatively modern. They are not deceptive. In addition to being cast, they exhibit hollowness of the letters, and an odd outline appearance to the busts. Reverse difference are omitted

in both denominations. Supporting the theory that these coins were made for collectors, they do not appear to have circulated; rather, legend weakness seems to be from shallowly cut molds made to mimic circulation. In both cases, these copies are considerably lighter in weight than their genuine counterparts."

This piece exhibits dominant medium brown patina, the obverse border with enhancing steel-olive color. Swaths of steel-gray on the reverse are associated with pronounced roughness, as made. A few speckles of ancient verdigris on the latter side are noted.

Electrotype Copy 1785 Immune Columbia / Nova Constellatio Copper. Extra Star in Legend. As W-1960. Silvered Copper. 120.84 grains. Dominant silver-gray with streaks of olive, underlying copper is evident here and there on both sides, as well as throughout the edge. Detail is bold to sharp and allows full appreciation of this enigmatic, yet eagerly sought early Federal era design. Originals of this type are linked to the Nova Constellatio series by die marriage and are thus likely products of the same entrepreneurial partnership composed of

Robert Morris, Gouverneur Morris, and William Constable. These Founding Fathers were intimately connected to the creation of our monetary system. While their vision was not followed to completion, the Nova Constellatio coppers, the extremely rare Nova Constellatio patterns of 1783, and the rare Immune Columbia issues are what remain of it. Given the elusiveness and consequent cost of originals, well made copies of the Immune Columbia pieces such as this have long enjoyed a place in numismatics.

is printed 125TH ANNIVERSARY / 1833-1958 / GREENWICH SAVINGS BANK. On the bottom of the lucite is also printed THE BANK OF NEW YORK, which hoard reportedly contained 726 Newman 13-Xs out of a total of 1,641 Fugio cents.

The Fascinating Numismatic Cabinet of James Allaire Millholland, 1842-1911

Over 170 years of active trading in the numismatic hobby has dispersed most all collections built in the early days of American numismatics. But last summer, a once in a lifetime opportunity presented itself: an amazing collection of U.S. coins

built wholly in the 19th century and unseen by numismatists until last year. To use the term “fresh to the market” would be a gross understatement.

As numismatists, we at Stack’s Bowers Galleries are often interested in the history of a collection, especially how it evolved into the finished product that graces the pages of our auction catalogs. Sometimes that history is rich, such as

with the famed Garrett and Eliasberg collections, carrying so much associated information behind them that entire books have been written about these American cabinets.

The cabinet of James Allaire Millholland (JAM), who lived from 1842 to 1911, on the other hand, is today witnessed only by the coins themselves and a small handwritten ledger he kept as an inventory of the collection. The story we can weave is based solely on the evidence of the coins and the man, and how they intersect is unknown, as no records exist of his individual acquisitions or how he embarked on his numismatic journey. His numismatic path seemingly has left no wake, and he does not appear to have been a member of major numismatic organizations of the day, such as the American Numismatic Association and the American Numismatic Society. We do know that the coins descended in the family of Millholland’s 16th and final child, James Millholland (JM), and were kept reverentially within the family—they were regarded more emotionally than monetarily, a most tangible link to a father (JAM) who passed away before he (JM) was even seven years old.

The quality of the coins is a testament to the care with which the coins were held within the family for well over a century past James Allaire Millholland’s passing in 1911.

According to his grandchildren, the coins were for a long time kept out of sight by their father in their custom cabinet in an alcove behind the furnace in the family home and were later moved to the far back of their father’s closet, before finally being moved to a safe deposit box under their care. As you peruse the listings of the collection, you will immediately notice the fine cabinet toning, sometimes quite vivid and electric, that enhances so many of the coins. We would like to think that the heat thrown off by

the nearby furnace sparked and accelerated these wonderful tones on the coins sitting on paper inserts in neat little rows on trays in the wooden cabinet built by the crafty JAM himself. And being tucked away rather than constantly handled preserved the uniformly high quality of the collection, especially among the Proof coins which are prevalent starting with the issues of the 1860s and are almost exclusively graded in the Proof-64 to Proof-67 range. There are also many very original and beautiful circulated and Mint State coins in the earlier issues. As a further testament to its originality and high quality, the collection as a whole received a greater than 40% CAC acceptance rate among CAC-eligible items, and taken alone, the Proofs received CAC approval at a rate of more than 55%!

The road taken by the collection to these pages has been a long one. We know from the evidence of the coins themselves that the collection was built in the 19th century, as the last coins in the cabinet and recorded by JAM were in 1894. Though there is no evidence or family lore as to why he stopped collecting 17 years before his death in 1911, his grandchildren surmise that the extended illness which led to his first wife's death in 1896 might have been an influence.

His grandchildren, caring for the coins for many decades, tracked the trajectory of Stack's and then Stack's Bowers Galleries as the firm made numismatic headlines. But it wasn't until the summer of 2022—fully 111 years after their grandfather's passing—that they brought the coins to us. Working with Andrew Bowers, the family made an appointment for an evaluation. Blurry yet tantalizing photos of the trays were sent in advance. Hard to interpret, the photos showed trays full of coins that easily could have represented two extremes—they were either trays of well circulated coins or Gems, we couldn't be sure. So, the excitement of discovery was left to the day when the coins crossed the threshold of our New York City flagship gallery at 470 Park Avenue.

When the cabinet was first opened in our conference room, everyone's jaws dropped. The coins were neither uniformly circulated nor uniformly Gems but were a wonderful mixture of the two. Though the "key" issues—delicacies like a 1793 Chain cent, 1794 dollar, or 1851 dollar—were not present, Mint State and Gem Proof coins were abundant, and the century's worth of toning across so many of the coins was absolutely mesmerizing. With the assis-



tance of Avi Zalkin and Cecilia Coughlin, our two summer interns, the coins were inventoried and left with us in the amazing wooden cabinet. After some deliberation within the family, they decided it was time to part with the coins and allow current generations of collectors to enjoy their grandfather's numismatic legacy, retaining JAM's cabinet and ledger as mementoes.

Andrew and I delved into the collection. In the absence of acquisition records, our forensic thinking caps were on as we tried to figure out the collection's methodology. Consisting of half cents through silver dollars and covering the first century of the U.S. Mint's output, the collection usually includes just one coin per date and as such is clearly an effort of the 19th century before Augustus Heaton's 1893 monograph *Treatise on Coinage of the United States Branch Mints* (often referred to colloquially as "Mintmarks") opened the door wide to collecting coins by date and mintmark rather than just by date. Though at times the collection contains more than one example of a date, these usually represent the multiple date/type variants that can occur within a given year, like with the 1834 half dollars. As such, the issues of the Philadelphia Mint are dominant, with the New Orleans or San Francisco mints seldom represented, and the Carson City Mint represented by a solitary coin, a superb Gem 1878-CC dime. Did he get this remarkable Carson City coin from a dealer or from a friend who may have traveled out west and brought this coin back as a souvenir?

We imagine that the collection was built by two methods: from circulation and by purchases from coin dealers. Though not presented in this catalog, there were about 100 pieces in the cabinet that are of modest value, chiefly well used copper half cents and large cents and silver Liberty Seated issues that could have been plucked from loose change or an old family accumulation. More poignantly, JAM's ledger inventorying his coin collection lists a number of dealers from whom he must have purchased many of the most significant coins: familiar 19th century names like Scott and Co. of New York and Philadelphia dealers J.W. Haseltine, A.M. Smith, Mason & Co., and S.H. & H. Chapman. Less familiar or perhaps unheralded dealers include R.W. Mercer of Cincinnati, M.F. Blacy(?) of New York City, and F.R. Bavis(?) of Philadelphia, the latter two names difficult to decipher in Millholland's handwritten ledger.

Fully one-third (180 of about 540) of the coins in this auction are 19th century Proofs, with some years represented by complete Proof "sets." Did JAM purchase complete Proof sets from these dealers, or just happen to buy Proof singles that were of high quality in an era where the condition of a coin would have been secondary to filling the hole for that date? And though not listed among the dealers in his ledger, was the U.S. Mint in Philadelphia perhaps a direct source for some of the Proofs in his collection?

Following this introduction is a brief but pithy biography of James Allaire Millholland provided by his grandchildren, which will give you a better feel for the man responsible for the collection that is presented here. Unable to attend in person a meeting at Stack's Bowers Galleries in New York to discuss the auction, one of his octogenarian grandchildren wrote "I so much wish I had been at [my sister's] side to hear you all talk of the coins and open our eyes for a tiny peek into the vast and fascinating world of numismatics. This whole adventure has brought up – again! – the wonderful explosion of questions a little knowledge ignites.



This undertaking feels a bit as if we are getting to honor a grandfather we never had the chance to know.” Though we are not family, Andrew and I and all of us at Stack’s Bowers Galleries feel like honorary members of the Millholland clan, as we too have been enthralled by this adventure and are excited to present this fascinating cabinet to collectors in the 21st century.

I could blather on for many more pages talking about individual coins, but I will instead allow my colleague Jeff Ambio’s masterful cataloging and the images do the talking for each piece. I encourage you to peruse the listings of the collection presented in three places in this Official Auction of the Whitman Baltimore Spring Expo: our Rarities Night

(lots 3001-3056), Live (lots 4001-4229) and Internet (lots 9329-9581) sessions. There are truly coins for collectors of all stripes, whether you are looking for an inexpensive souvenir of a not-yet-famous collection or for a five-figure condition rarity destined for a top registry set. Once dispersed, we imagine these 540 or so coins will not often reappear in the numismatic market, cherished by their new owners as a connection to an unheralded 19th century collector and as remarkably high-quality survivors of their respective issues

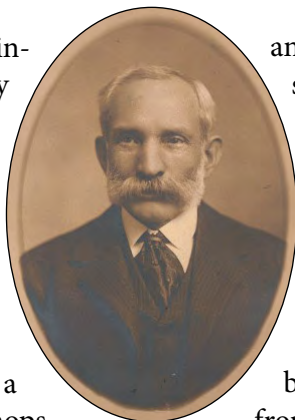
JAMES ALLAIRE MILLHOLLAND

1842 - 1911

Born to a heritage of railroad and marine innovation, James Allaire Millholland actively participated in the industrial explosion of the nineteenth century in western Maryland. His career flourished in railroads, first in building ever more efficient locomotives and then as a railroad executive.

His father, James Millholland (1812-1875), was one of the foremost railway master mechanics in the country. In 1829, as an apprentice to a prominent machinist in the B & O Railroad's shops in Reading, Pennsylvania, he helped build (supposedly of spare parts) the first light steam locomotive, the Tom Thumb, to a design of Peter Cooper's. (In the competition between this little engine and a horse pulled car, a belt slipping from a pulley resulted in victory for the horse-powered car.) Millholland, Sr. went on to design innovative locomotives, reconfigure designs, and experiment with ways to improve their propulsion.

James Allaire Millholland (JAM) continued in his father's footsteps. Born in Reading in 1842, he received his early education in local schools. At 17 he was apprenticed in the shops of the Pennsylvania and Reading Railroad where he did experimental work and gained practical experience, including running freight and passenger engines. When he was 24, his father relocated the family to the hills of western Maryland. Mount Savage was uniquely located among the ore-bearing strata of the Appalachians, as well as serving as a gateway to the West. It teemed with industrial activity - coal, iron ore, and clay mining; foundries; brick refractories; and machine shops constructing locomotives. Fresh from traveling to the Paris International Exposition in 1867 where he studied the vast number of displays of European technological developments, JAM set out to improve the machinery department of the Cumberland and Pennsylvania Railroad. Within a month he became a master mechanic of that railroad



and then an officer of the Cumberland and Pennsylvania Railroad, the Union Mining Company, and the Consolidated Coal Company. After ten years, he out-manuevered hot competition with other young railroad lines and acquired the "upstart" George's Creek and Cumberland Railroad, born of two mining companies. Becoming director and president of GC&C RR, he expanded it to extend through the Cumberland Narrows; it ran a variety of rolling stock, from coal hoppers to passenger cars, including an open-sided observation car. As interconnecting routes made it easy to connect from Cumberland to Philadelphia and New York, JAM traveled regularly to both cities where he maintained offices.

JAM and his first wife, Virginia Randolph Keim Millholland (1846-1896), a descendant of the Randolphs of Virginia, had 12 children, several of whom became mechanical and civil engineers. Their substantial house on Washington Street in Cumberland is still standing. His first wife died at 49, and two years later in New York, he married Harriett Woodward Blunt, known as "Woodie" to family and friends, a woman 24 years his junior from an old Montgomery County (Maryland) family. Together they had four children. The social columns of area newspapers tell of the family's parties and open houses, excursions, and visits to relatives, as well as their travels to a large rambling summer house, Glenora, on 120 acres of rolling fields, orchards, barns and stables on Valley Road two miles outside Cum-

berland. The dinner table there had 12 leaves and accommodated well over a dozen people. Guest book entries of extended stays from relatives and friends suggest a welcoming household of warmth and conviviality.

JAM wrote letters to Woodie when he was on his frequent business trips. Entertainingly worded and affectionately thoughtful, they describe city events, his experiences, even purchases — "a vase for the

yellow guest room.” Well-made, often beautiful, objects fascinated him - good machine tools (for which his shops were noted), the mechanism of a shotgun newly delivered from England, cameras, automobiles, and numerous gadgets. He admired the craftsmanship and beauty of Asian artifacts, intricately carved ivory figures, balls one inside another, and Chinese porcelains. Intriguing and unusual objects were kept in a heavy, carved black four-sided, glass-doored cabinet of curiosities. As a woodworker, he made the coin cabinet with 20 trays divided into compartments for each coin, a drop leaf corner table, and a large, heavy tool chest elaborately fitted with a series of sliding shelves. His library reflects his inquiring mind, innate curiosity, and wide enthusiasms - natural history, agriculture, gardening, animal husbandry. In it could be found Shakespeare, The Decameron, Pepys’ Diary, Emerson essays, humor, contemporary fiction, and history plus a collection of Lincolniana. The book plate in each volume records the exact date of its acquisition and often on the last page the date he completed reading it. Meticulous notebooks and numerous lists show the organization and the specificity of his thinking.

When James Allaire Millholland died, though retired for four years, he was still an active director of the First

National Bank of Cumberland which honored his more than 25 years of service, a vice president and treasurer of Accurate Machinery Company of Cumberland, president of the Chinese Trading Company of Philadelphia, and trustee of a hospital and a school. These associations speak to “his energetic capacities and mental resources.” His obituary praises his “innate refinement...[and] highly cultured and polished mind.” His associates remembered his lively and well-informed conversation, his “indefatigable energy,” wise judgment in business, and “his genial vivacity in speech and manner.”

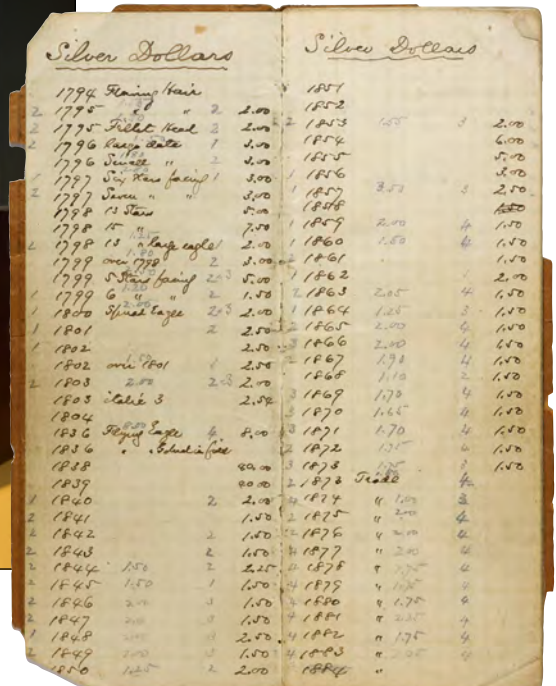
Coda: Four years before JAM died he sold his railroad to the Western Maryland Railway Company which was soon purchased by a son of Jay Gould, known as one of the robber barons. The lives of these two Millhollands, father and son, roughly bracket the nineteenth century and trace an important era in American railroad history and its role in the industrial revolution: from an early locomotive on eight miles of track to eventual absorption of smaller local lines into larger and larger systems; regional amalgamated into nationwide; independently owned and operated burgeoning —sometimes by hook and by crook — into large complex corporately-managed entities.

A bit of deeper olive-russet over the upper right obverse is associated with ancient surface build up, insignificant for the assigned grade, especially since both sides are otherwise smooth with no marks of consequence. With all major design elements readily evident, and mostly quite bold, this is a desirable circulated early half cent for type, date or variety purposes. Manley Die State 2.0, described as "Rare" by the author.

This handsome piece sports gentle marbling of olive-gray and golden-brown patina, the obverse a tad lighter than the reverse. Both sides are microporous, although not unusually so for the assigned grade. There are no sizeable marks, and a few faint pin scratches in the center of the obverse are also not out of context for a heavily circulated early date large cent. A fairly sizeable, yet shallow planchet flaw on the reverse is centered on the letter D in UNITED, which is visible, nonetheless. With all major design elements appreciable, even if some are faint, this is a respectable circulated example of an iconic one-year design type from the first year of large cent coinage.

There is plenty of bold detail remaining on both sides to tempt the budget minded collector seeking an example of this challenging one-year design type from the beginning of large cent coinage. The reverse is quite smooth in hand, as well, although the obverse is extensively pitted with associated verdigris to explain the PCGS qualifier. Mostly medium olive-brown in color, and sure to find many eager buyers in today's highly competitive numismatic market.

1820 N-13. Rarity-1. Large Date. MS-65 BN (PCGS). CAC. Lovely satin to softly frosted surfaces are smooth, lustrous and exceptionally well preserved. Pleasingly toned in steely lilac-brown, direct lighting reveals plenty of pale rose from faded mint color. The borders are fully denticulated, and the central design elements are crisp. The 1820 Newcomb-13 is one of the most available varieties of large cent from the famous Randall Hoard. This hoard, which contained thousands of large copper cents mostly dated from 1817 through 1820, was rumored to have been found beneath a railroad platform in Georgia some time after the Civil War, but before 1869. Supposedly hidden in a small keg (or multiple kegs), the hoard was named for John Swan Randall of Norwich, New York, who purchased the coins after they had changed hands several times since their discovery. After Randall's death in 1878, the coins that remained were offered at auction by Edward D. Cogan. The most readily obtainable variety from the Randall Hoard is the 1818 N-10, followed by the 1820 N-13 (offered here). Over the years, even as late as the 1970s, it was not unheard of to find groups of Randall Hoard cents offered by coin dealers. However, as the 20th century came to a close, examples were usually found as individual pieces.

1842 N-3. Rarity-2. Large Date. MS-65 BN (PCGS). CAC. This lovely Gem retains plenty of faded orange mint color to place it among the finer Gems for the date certified in the BN category. Glossy medium brown patina is dominant, nonetheless, and it mingles nicely with soft, satin to frosty luster. Sharply struck with all major design elements crisp. Indeed, this is an early impression from the 1842 Newcomb-3 dies, Grellman State a, as further evidenced by the faint reverse die lines at the letters UN in UNITED. Bob Grellman (2021) describes this die state as "Very Rare." Be they an advanced type collector or late date large cent specialist, the discerning numismatic would do well to add this coin to their collection.

Late die state, Grellman b, with flowlined fields and fading peripheral definition; this is the typically encountered state of the 1850 N-7 dies. An ideal offering for the high grade type collector, this PCGS/CAC Gem would do equally well in a late date large cent variety set.

With razor sharp striking detail, as well, this coin should have little difficulty finding its way into a high grade type set.

1858 Large Letters, High Leaves (Style of 1857), Type I. MS-66 (PCGS). Glorious light tan surfaces exhibit a smooth satin texture that would accept nothing less than a full Gem Mint State rating. The second year 1858 Flying Eagle cent was produced in even greater numbers than the 1857, 24,600,000 vs. 17,450,000 circulation strikes. Both issues are of similar availability in numismatic circles, worn survivors plentiful and even Mint State coins readily obtainable in grades through MS-64. However, the type as a whole is scarce in MS-65 and rare any finer, making this beautiful PCGS MS-66 example an important offering for advanced specialists.

1859 Proof-64+ Cameo (PCGS). This luxurious specimen exhibits bright tan-wheat color on the obverse, warmer, yet equally desirable tan-apricot iridescence on the reverse. The design elements are fully struck with a soft satin texture that contrasts nicely with semi-reflective fields. James Barton Longacre's widely collected Indian cent made its debut in 1859 with a mintage of 36,400,000 circulation strikes and approximately 800 Proofs. The obverse portrait, in fact, is not that of a Native American but rather a representation of Liberty wearing a feathered headdress. The artist's original concept for this design made its debut in 1849 on the gold dollar, and subsequently went through various refinements (including on the three-dollar gold piece first issued in 1854) before appearing on the Indian cent. The reverse of the 1859 cent exhibits a simple olive wreath without a shield at its top, a design that was abandoned in 1860 in favor of the Oak Wreath with Shield design. (The olive wreath has gone down in numismatic literature as a laurel wreath due to Mint Director James Ross Snowden's designation from 1860.) The 1859 Indian cent, therefore, is a one year design type that is eagerly sought by today's collectors.

The debut of the Indian cent in 1859 came at a time when the United States was experiencing its first boom in coin collecting. In 1858, the Mint under Director Colonel James Ross Snowden began to produce Proof coins in greater numbers than in previous years and to advertise such pieces for sale. This practice continued through 1859, in which year the Mint recorded the number of Proof gold and silver struck for the first time in its history. (Proof minor coin mintages, however, were not recorded until 1878.) Despite the increased interest in these coins among contemporary Americans, the Mint's production of Proofs in both 1858 and 1859 proved overly optimistic. In fact, Rick Snow (2014) opines that less than half the estimated mintage of 800 Proofs for the 1859 Indian cent was actually distributed to collectors, the remaining pieces probably released into circulation in later years. With an uncommon degree of cameo contrast for the issue, this is a highly significant survivor that is sure to command a strong premium from the winning bidder.

There are no marks or other blemishes of note, both sides are satiny and smooth, and the striking detail is razor sharp from the rims to the centers. With only 10,100,000 circulation strikes produced, the 1861 boasts the lowest mintage among copper-nickel Indian cents. Perhaps understandably, this is the scarcest date of its type, the paucity of survivors also explained by the wholesale redemption and melting of examples during the 1870s. Even so, Mint State survivors are fairly plentiful in an absolute sense, due to hoarding of copper-nickel cents during the Civil War. Few such coins are as well preserved as this impressive upper end Gem, however, which fact is sure to result in spirited competition for this offering among discerning collectors.

Ideal color blending for the RB designation combines with a full strike and expertly preserved surfaces to establish this as one of the finest Proof 1871 two-cent pieces obtainable. Circulation strike two-cent production fell off markedly in 1866, and yearly mintages continued to fall through 1872, when the final coins of this type were delivered for circulation. Interestingly, yearly Proof mintages climbed somewhat through 1872, indicating more of an increase in demand for silver and minor coin Proof sets than a specific interest in Proof two-cent pieces. Most numismatic sources estimate the mintage of the Proof 1871 at 960+ pieces, the exact mintage unknown as the Mint did not begin recording the number of Proof minor coins struck until the late 1870s. The 1871 is conditionally challenging and can be difficult to obtain any finer than Proof-64 RB. Indeed, the typical example that passes through our hands is a moderately to extensively toned Red and Brown with at least a few distracting carbon flecks or other blemishes. The present example is a premium upper end Gem with abundant eye appeal. Sure to sell for a strong premium.

Die cracks below the star and clash marks in the adjacent field areas on the obverse are as made and provide interest.

Authorized by the Act of March 3, 1851, the silver three-cent piece entered its third year of production in 1853 with a delivery of 11,400,000 pieces from the Philadelphia Mint. The success of this denomination in circulation was at its peak during the early 1850s, where the Type I examples of reduced silver composition (75% silver, 25% copper, as opposed to standard silver alloy of 90% silver, 10% copper) were eagerly sought as replacements for old tenor half dimes, dimes, quarters and half dollars withdrawn from circulation due to rising silver prices. After the 1853 delivery, however, the usefulness of the silver three-cent piece began to wane, and yearly mintages for circulation fell off accordingly. The Act of February 21, 1853 reduced the weight of most other silver denominations, thereby allowing them to circulate freely once again. This development, by extension, sharply reduced contemporary demand for the three-cent silver. The denomination would soldier on through 1873, nonetheless, the post-1853 examples changed to the standard alloy of 90% silver, 10% copper and featuring either the Type II or Type III design. For collectors seeking just one piece to represent this denomination in a type set, however, the Type I issues of 1851 to 1853 hold the most appeal. Produced during the heyday of this denomination, and accounting for the majority of three-cent silvers extant, these early issues are understandably popular among collectors of both circulated and Mint State coins. For those in the latter category, and especially those demanding the utmost in technical quality and eye appeal, we can think of no finer representative of the denomination than this beautiful upper end Gem 1853 from the Millholland cabinet.

There is a shallow depression running around much of the coin's edge and, although boldly struck elsewhere, the lower and right obverse borders are a bit soft with metal flow toward the edge. Although this is only conjecture since the coin has not been weighed or otherwise evaluated along these lines, the planchet might have been slightly underweight or too small in diameter. Satiny surfaces are fully lustrous with pretty champagne-pink and powder blue iridescence. Offered strictly as certified by PCGS, as above, yet perhaps worthy of additional consideration by Mint error specialists.

Yearly Proof production for the Type III silver three-cent design was generous beginning in 1859 as the Mint anticipated strong demand from contemporary collectors in response to its early efforts at marketing these specially produced coins. After 1861, however, yearly mintages for the type fell off significantly and fluctuated from a low of 460 coins in 1863 to a high of 1,000 pieces in 1870. The 1867 was produced to the extent of 625 Proofs, all of which were distributed as part of the year's silver Proof sets. Survivors enjoy heightened demand in today's market due to the low mintage, key date status of the year's circulation strike (just 4,000 coins produced). In Cameo Gem Proof, as here, the 1867 is rare from strike and condition standpoints. Indeed, this beautiful specimen ranks among the finest known to PCGS, and it is worthy of the strongest bid.

1869/8' Breen-2960. Proof-65 (PCGS). CAC. Featuring incredible quality and eye appeal for the issue, this intriguing coin is from a die pairing that was formerly considered an overdate. Both sides are richly original in preservation with bold, mottled toning to a base of soft pewter-gray. A fully struck, appreciably reflective specimen that will please even the most discerning bidder. Six hundred Proofs of this denomination were struck in 1869 and were sold exclusively in sets. The majority of certified survivors are at the Proof-64 level, confirming the conditionally rare status of this CAC-approved Gem.

Walter Breen called this particular variety an overdate in his 1988 *Encyclopedia*, where he credited its discovery to Don Taxay ca. 1962. More recent research by Kevin Flynn, however, suggests that the final digit in the date is repunched, hence the 1869/8' designation on the PCGS holder. The reason for this is that in 1876, vast quantities of silver coins that had been hoarded by the public since the spring of 1862 suddenly became available in commerce in quantity. With large numbers of half dimes, dimes, quarters and the like flooding banks and merchants, demand for nickel five-cent pieces plummeted. In 1877, in fact, the Mint limited coinage of Shield nickels to Proofs struck solely for distribution to contemporary collectors; none were issued for circulation. The 1877 nickel three-cent piece is also Proof-only, and the 1877 Indian cent saw a circulation strike mintage of just 852,500 pieces - the lowest yearly production for the cent denomination recorded since 1823.

The obverse, however, has a curious chrome-like texture beneath antique silver-olive tinting that explains the PCGS qualifier. Remarkably attractive overall, nonetheless, with no significant marks. Logan-McCloskey 3 is one of two die marriages for the popular LIBEKTY *Guide Book* variety, which takes its name from the broken device punch used for the letter R in LIBERTY. The 1853 No Arrows half dime is a scarce key date issue with a mere 135,000 pieces produced. The mintage was achieved in two batches: 50,000 coins on February 19 and 85,000 pieces on February 22. As the latter delivery came one day after the Act of February 21, 1853 reduced the weight of the half dime from 1.34 grams to 1.24 grams, it is likely that the 85,000 pieces struck on February 22 were destroyed through melting. Many of the 50,000 coins from the initial delivery probably met the same fate, and those that did not were quickly snatched up by bullion dealers and speculators since their precious metal value exceeded their face value. Even so, a number of Mint State coins managed to survive, perhaps as part of a small hoard that Walter Breen asserts was found by Harold P. Newlin during the 19th century. Supremely attractive at the Gem Mint State grade level, the present example would serve as a highlight in any collection of Liberty Seated coinage.

The Millholland Collection 1837 No Stars dime offers outstanding quality and eye appeal for this brief design type from the early Liberty Seated dime series. Smooth and lustrous surfaces exhibit splashes of reddish-russet iridescence on a softly frosted finish. The strike is razor sharp over even the most intricate design elements, and the eye appeal is strong. The Fortin-101b attribution represents the middle die state of the circulation strike 1837 Large Date dime, the base of the digit 7 in the date repunched and the lower obverse shattered by one (here) or two (later) die cracks.

One of the classic U.S. Mint designs of the 19th century, the Liberty Seated motif would eventually be used at one point or another on all silver denominations from the half dime through the silver dollar. It made its debut on the dime in 1837 with a mintage of 682,500 circulation strikes from the Philadelphia Mint, as well as a small number of Proofs. A refreshingly uncluttered design that allows the eye to focus on the most significant device (Liberty's portrait), the No Stars type remained in production for just two years, only at the Philadelphia Mint in 1837, and the New Orleans Mint likewise alone in 1838. With the 1838-O much scarcer in all grades and elusive in Mint State, virtually all pressure from type collectors for this brief design is focused on the 1837. Buyers seeking a circulated example will usually have an easy go at it, as this issue is plentiful in those grades. Mint State pieces are another matter, however. In premium Gem Uncirculated this issue is rare, and our offering of the Millholland specimen is a special occasion that deserves the undivided attention of astute bidders.

1839 No Drapery. MS-66+ (PCGS). CAC. A premium Gem that really needs to be seen to be fully appreciated. Both sides are richly and originally toned, the obverse with iridescent steel-blue on a base of pearl-gray. For the reverse cobalt blue and reddish-gold iridescence surrounds a brilliant center. Intensely lustrous and virtually pristine, a razor sharp strike adds to the incredible eye appeal.

The 1839 dime was struck in depths of the Hard Times era, a major financial depression that affected the nation throughout much of the 1830s and the early years of the 1840s. This issue has a mintage of 1,053,115 pieces, achieved through the pairing of at least three obverse dies and eight reverse dies. 1839 also proved to be the last year of the original Gobrecht/Peale/Sully Liberty Seated design, which featured a more delicate composition than the modified hub that was used beginning in 1840. On these early dimes, the rock upon which Liberty is seated has a more naturalistic look and the shield rests at an angle, but the most obvious difference between the two hubs is the absence of drapery on Liberty's arm.

The issue is generally well struck, though quite a few are known with weak or uneven strikes most evident on the high points of the shield. The dies saw hard use, with many showing extensive die breaks that created varieties that are popular with specialists. Even if they were not cracked, some dies show heavy wear especially along the denticles. Found in a wide range of grades, an estimated one-fifth of the 1,000 or so extant specimens may be found Mint State, primarily in the Choice levels of preservation. Gems, while available, are quite rare, and only very few survive above the MS-65 level.

Bathed in intense, billowy, satin-textured luster, both sides exhibit a few speckles of olive-russet iridescence to otherwise "old silver" surfaces. The appearance is charmingly original and accents a strike that is remarkably full for the issue (at least two other high grade survivors that we are familiar with are softly defined in isolated areas and cannot compete with this piece as far as striking quality is concerned). Expertly preserved to the point of being virtually pristine, it is little wonder that this Condition Census beauty is among the finest seen by both PCGS and CAC.

The 1852 dime is surprisingly available in an absolute sense for an early 1850s Philadelphia Mint silver issue, most examples of which were hoarded, exported and eventually melted during the early California Gold Rush era. The typical survivor is circulated to one degree or another, however, with Mint State coins scarce in an absolute sense and rare above the MS-64 level. We have yet to meet a coin that surpasses the present Superb Gem in either technical quality or eye appeal, and doubt that such a piece exists. A close match, however, is the PCGS MS-67 coin that realized \$9,400 in our July 2015 sale of the Douglas C. Kaselitz Collection. With CAC approval in a more competitive numismatic market, the Millholland specimen is likely to command an even stronger premium from the winning bidder.

The reverse exhibits more evenly blended pewter-gray, olive, powder-blue and champagne-gold shades. Sharply struck overall with a full endowment of smooth, billowy mint luster. As a date the Philadelphia Mint's circulation strike dime of 1856 is one of the more easily obtained in the Stars Obverse portion of the Liberty Seated series. This makes it a popular choice for type collectors in both circulated and Mint State grades. While most survivors were struck from dies prepared with the Small Date logotype, as here, the variety is scarce in Gem MS-65 and rare any finer. A truly exceptional piece, the Millholland Collection specimen is worthy of the strongest bids.

Liberty Seated dime specialist Gerry Fortin has identified 23 marriages the 1856 Small Date. Fortin-110, represented here, is most readily attributable by obverse doubling to the top of the shield and on the ribbon on which LIBERTY is inscribed. Closer inspection with a loupe also reveals more modest doubling to the letters UNITE on the reverse.

Why the L counterstamp was applied to a modest number of 1815 and 1825 quarters has always been a mystery. In addition these two dates are also found with E counterstamps, always placed above Liberty's head near the rim. A few of these counterstamped coins display minor bending opposite the letter, others do not, as here. Hence, many of these counterstamps must have been applied while the coins were in the press. All sorts of theories have been published, but so far no definitive contemporary evidence has surfaced to explain the significance of these counterstamps. As such, the mystery remains unsolved until someone digs in a new direction and finds out the truth behind these enigmatic and popular pieces. This is one of the finest examples known to exhibit this feature, and it is a coin that will always be in strong demand.

Even so, in the finer grades, as here, this issue is scarce. Given the rarity of high grade Mint State 1883 quarters, the Millholland specimen will be eagerly sought by date collectors as well as those assembling Proof type sets.

While a concentration of adjustment marks in the center of the obverse is as made, faint initials in the field areas around the portrait account for the PCGS qualifier. There is also a faint graze arcing through the center of the portrait that we mention for accuracy. Tompkins Die Stage 1/5.

While 23,464 1794 half dollars were struck, perhaps just 600 or so examples remain of the nation's premier half dollar issue, a figure that encompasses all known Overton varieties and grades. There is a lot about the offered coin that will please a budget minded collector, and we anticipate that it will see spirited bidding at auction.

Though Walter Breen divined a mintage figure of 1,200 circulation strikes for the 1836 Reeded Edge half dollar decades ago, the true figure is undoubtedly several thousand coins higher. Given the population of surviving 1836 Reeded Edge half dollars today, Robert W. Julian has estimated that the mintage was actually closer to 5,000 pieces. Between the legendarily elusive Small Eagle half dollars of 1796 and 1797 and the scarce Philadelphia Mint dates between 1879 and 1890, no other half dollar issue approaches the low mintage of the 1836 Reeded Edge. Beyond its evident historical importance, the 1836 Reeded Edge has always been admired as a rarity. For most of the 19th century, this issue was deemed a pattern, too rare to have been issued for circulation. While listed in J. Hewitt Judd's *United States Pattern, Trial, and Experimental Pieces* as Judd-57, a listing that remains in modern editions out of a sense of tradition, the 1836 Reeded Edge half dollar is now acknowledged as a regular issue coin. The vast majority of survivors show significant wear, AU survivors such as this are scarce and always in demand.

The 1839-O is the only realistically obtainable mintmarked half dollar of the Capped Bust design type as far as most collectors are concerned, although we stress that most survivors are heavily worn, impaired, or both. This is a scarce Choice AU example with subtle sandy-olive highlights to dominant pearl gray patina. Sure to see spirited bidding, especially since the 1839-O in certified grades of AU-55 and AU-58 is a mainstay on numismatic want lists.

With 2,456,000 pieces produced this is one of the most readily obtainable issues of the 1840 to 1850 era. Circulated survivors are plentiful in all grades up to and including AU, although premium examples in AU-55 and AU-58 are quite scarce. Given the absence of contemporary numismatic demand in the South, however, it is no surprise that this issue is very scarce in Mint State. The 1993 Wiley-Bugert rating at this level is Rarity-5-, and Q. David Bowers (2016) estimates that only 65 to 85 coins are extant, few of which are Choice.

Gobrecht's Liberty Seated design came last to half dollars, three years after its introduction to dollars, two years after it first appeared on dimes and half dimes, and a year after it was first seen on quarter dollars. Half dollars since 1836 had displayed a Gobrecht reworking of the old design by John Reich, with a capped bust of Liberty on the obverse and eagle on the reverse. The reverse design was retained with slight modifications; in 1842, the size of the legend on the reverse increased notably, 1853 saw the brief use of a glory of rays around the eagle, and in the 1866 the motto IN GOD WE TRUST was added. Of vital importance to type collectors, the No Drapery obverse design was used exclusively in 1839, and for only a portion of that year. With Breen having called any Mint State example "prohibitively rare," the significance of this offering of an attractive About Uncirculated example can hardly be overstated.

Minimally circulated, and gently so at that, although the otherwise smooth-looking surfaces do show mentionable nicks in the left obverse and upper right reverse fields. Striking detail remains sharp throughout, and there is ample luster. From a mintage of just 200,750 circulation strikes, reflecting the fact that by the early 1850s the bullion value of newly minted silver coins exceeded their face value. In 1851, for example, \$100 in face value of silver coins was worth on average \$103.40. Most 1851 half dollars were gathered up by speculators shortly after minting and were eventually melted for their precious metal content. The few survivors are generally lightly circulated, as here, or Mint State. Well worn examples are exceedingly rare and represent coins that were exported at the time of issue and repatriated after years of extensive commercial use in Canada or Latin America.

Minimally toned surfaces exhibit subtle gold and olive overtones to dominant antique silver. The texture is lustrous and frosty, the devices smartly impressed and crisp. The half dollar was the largest denomination affected by the wholesale weight reductions introduced to United States silver coinage through the Act of February 21, 1853. The new weight standard for the half dollar was 12.44 grams, as opposed to 13.36 grams for preceding issues produced beginning in the late 1830s. The weight reduction was introduced to return the half dollar to active circulation in the Eastern states, as they had disappeared through hoarding as the price of silver rose in response to the vast quantities of gold being mined in California during the Gold Rush. In essence, silver had become scarce relative to gold in the market of the early 1850s, and old tenor pieces were quickly removed from circulation as their bullion value exceeded their face value. As the 2022 edition of the standard reference *A Guide Book of United States Coins* explains:

On February 21, 1853, fractional silver coins were made subsidiary by reduction of their weights. As the coins' face value now exceeded their bullion value, free coinage of silver was prohibited except for dollars, and the Mint was authorized to purchase its silver requirements on its own account using the bullion fund of the Mint, and, according to law, 'the profit of said coinage shall be....transferred to the account of the treasury of the United States.'

As with the quarter, arrows were added to the obverse before and after the date and a glory of rays added to the reverse field around the eagle. The reverse design proved to be too highly detailed for efficient coinage operations, and the rays were dropped in 1854, creating a one year type in the 1853 Arrows and Rays design.

The Philadelphia Mint issue of the year is the preferred type candidate for the Arrows and Rays half dollar, being far more plentiful than the 1853-O in all grades. Uncirculated coins through MS-64 are scarce, yet obtainable with patience. Beginning at the MS-64+ level even the 1853 develops into a significant condition rarity. The Condition Census for this popular Philadelphia Mint issue comprises a handful of coins in MS-66, MS-66+ and MS-67, as certified by PCGS and NGC. The present example is a more realistic option for most collectors, and we anticipate a strong price from its auction appearance.

1873 No Arrows. WB-6. Rarity-5. Open 3. EF-40 (PCGS). Mottled russet highlights adorn otherwise pewter and steel-gray surfaces. A momentous year for half dollar production at the Philadelphia Mint, 1873 witnessed the production of three different varieties. The No Arrows, Close 3 pieces were struck first, to the extent of 587,000 circulation strikes and 600 Proofs. Sometime prior to April 1, but presumably also before February 12, the date logotype was changed to the Open 3 style in response to a complaint from Chief Coiner A. Loudon Snowden that the close-style 3 was easily mistaken for an 8. The Mint struck only 214,000 circulation strikes of the No Arrows, Open 3 variety before the Act of February 12, 1873 increased the weight of the half dollar from 12.44 grams to 12.50 grams. To denote this change, arrows were added to the obverse design, as had been done earlier in 1853, 1854 and 1855, when the weight was also changed. The Arrows coinage accounted for the majority of 1873 half dollars struck at the Philadelphia Mint: 1,815,200 circulation strikes and 500 Proofs.

Produced for only a limited time, it is likely that most 1873 Open 3 half dollars never even left the Mint, the coins instead being melted to provide bullion for the newly mandated Arrows coinage. (Walter Breen, 1988, states that these and presumably other half dollars struck to the outdated 12.44-gram standard were destroyed after July 10, 1873.) Indeed, the 1873 Open 3 is the rarest circulation strike half dollar of the year struck in the Philadelphia Mint, and it is also a prime rarity in the Liberty Seated series. Noted authorities on this series Randy Wiley and Bill Bugert (*The Complete Guide to Liberty Seated Half Dollars*, 1993) assign this issue an overall rating of Rarity-5+, with EF/AU coins rated even higher at an impressive Rarity-7+. Offered here is a pleasing Extremely Fine survivor that represents a significant find for the specialist.

Orange-copper, reddish-russet, salmon-pink and powder blue colors are all in evidence, their distribution more widespread on the obverse. Sharply struck. A sudden influx into commercial channels of earlier-dated half dollars that had been hoarded during the Civil War and Reconstruction eras, coupled with implementation of prodigious Morgan dollar production pursuant to the 1878 Bland-Allison Act, explains why circulation strike half dollar coinage fell off markedly in 1879. Always in demand with collectors, this issue inaugurates a run of low mintage half dollars that would continue through the end of the Liberty Seated series in 1891. The reason for the last is that after silver coins reached parity with Legal Tender notes on April 20, 1876, large quantities of hoarded pieces came on the market. There was such a glut of these that beginning in 1879 the Mint cut back production of new issues to very low levels, which continued for the remainder of the Liberty Seated series. An uncommonly attractive coin for the assigned grade that is sure to garner attention from budget minded type collectors. Both sides are nicely centered in strike, the denticulation complete despite a few areas where the definition comes up short. For the design elements we note bold to sharp detail by early dollar standards, although a few of the peripheral features are affected by the same minor softness observed for the denticles. This feature is the result of a couple of peripheral concentrations of adjustment marks (as made), although we stress these are lighter and far less numerous than often noted for this type. The obverse exhibits moderate hairlining beneath golden-gray retoning - the strongest evidence for the PCGS qualifier. The reverse, which was obviously face down in the Millholland coin cabinet, toned more extensively and shows attractive antique silver patina with olive-russet outlines to many of the devices. BB Die State III.

While first introduced in 1794, it was not until 1795 that the silver dollar was produced in numbers that would allow it to fulfill its intended role as the monetary unit of the fledgling nation. At least 10 obverse dies and 11 reverse dies were prepared for the 1795 Flowing Hair dollar, resulting in 19 known varieties. The BB-27 variety is the most available of these and may be distinguished by three leaves under each of the eagle's wings and a "bar" that extends from the topmost curl of Liberty's hair to star 5. Because Liberty's portrait was deeply impressed into the die, this variety was struck in high relief and many details wore down quickly. An estimated 2,500 and 3,500 pieces are believed to exist for the BB-27 die pair, but as with many early silver dollars, almost all are at the low to middle circulated grade levels, making the present EF specimen a noteworthy find for an advanced collector.

Otherwise sharply defined for the grade, softness to Liberty's bust and in the upper right star field are the result of obverse die swell (see below). BB-159 is a unique die marriage for the 1799 Draped Bust silver dollar in that the obverse stars are arranged eight left, five right. The reason for this configuration is unknown, although it was likely created in error when the engraver accidentally punched eight stars along the left border, realized his mistake, and then completed the die by adding only five stars on the right. Easily identifiable to the naked eye, this is one of the most popular varieties in the entire early dollar series of 1794 to 1803. As an appealing Choice EF, the present example will certainly see spirited bidding at auction. BB Die State III, late. This particular die state, with advanced obverse cracks including one that arcs across the top of Liberty's bust, is not specifically described in the 2013 Bowers early dollar reference. An example is plated on page 216 therein, however, with the same pattern of cracks and striking detail as the Millholland specimen. The break up of the obverse die explains the aforementioned swelling to Liberty's bust and the associated loss of detail in the star field on the reverse.

By modern Mint standards the mintage is extremely small, however, totaling just 61,005 pieces. Unlike many first year issues in U.S. numismatics, the 1840 silver dollar was not widely saved by the contemporary public, and most of the coins saw considerable domestic circulation. The few About Uncirculated, as here, and even fewer Mint State examples known survived almost entirely as a matter of chance.

1846 OC-2. Rarity-2. AU-58+ (PCGS). Really a pretty piece, and an exceptionally well preserved example of this otherwise readily obtainable 1840s silver dollar issue. Vivid, mottled toning in russet, olive and steel-blue enlivens a base of antique silver tinting. Sharply struck and intensely lustrous with modest semi-reflective tendencies in the fields. A shallow obverse scuff inside star 12 is noted for accuracy, although it is of no concern in any discussion regarding this coin's eye appeal. After delivering only 20,000 and 24,500 coins in 1844 and 1845, respectively, demand from bullion depositors rose in 1846, and the Philadelphia Mint struck 110,600 silver dollars for commercial use. While this issue is one of the most plentiful from its era in grades such as VF and EF, in Choice AU and Mint State the 1846 can be surprisingly difficult to locate.

The vast majority of survivors from the relatively generous mintage of 140,750 pieces are worn to one degree or another, indicative of extensive commercial use. Like all silver dollar issues from the 1840s, the 1847 is elusive even at the lowest reaches of Mint State. The present example represents an important bidding opportunity for type collectors as well as silver dollar enthusiasts.

Iridescent peripheral toning also comes readily to the fore, the colors with a handsome mottled distribution from decades of careful storage in the Millholland coin cabinet. Demand for bullion depositors resulted in a mintage of 62,600 circulation strike silver dollars in 1849. Most were exported, a familiar scenario, although enough returned from Europe in payment for goods that the 1849 is now regarded as one of the more readily obtainable issues of its type in circulated grades. Mint State coins are elusive and survived purely as a matter of chance, there being no contemporary numismatic interest in circulation strike silver dollars.

1850-O OC-1, the only known dies. Rarity-2. AU-53 (PCGS). A pretty piece with iridescent peripheral toning in mottled reddish-russet, steel-blue and sea-green. Similar colors outline the central design elements, which are boldly rendered in the absence of all but light high point wear. Only 40,000 examples were minted, the lowest production figure for any Liberty Seated dollar issue coined at the New Orleans Mint. While about 1,000 examples are thought to survive, the issue is scarce any finer than Very Fine. This vivid and lustrous About Uncirculated example is a seldom seen and irresistible opportunity for both type collectors and series specialists.

This piece is sharply struck with nearly full satin luster. Minimally toned, yet with pretty powder blue, pale lilac and champagne-apricot iridescence evident on the obverse upon closer inspection. From a mintage for the date of 46,110 pieces, most of which were exported for use in the China trade. Few escaped melting once in the Orient.

1857 OC-2. Rarity-3. Unc Details—Cleaned (PCGS). Strong mint luster and richly original toning provide superior eye appeal for the assigned grade. The obverse is splashed with swirls of olive-russet iridescence, while the reverse exhibits a peripheral halo of steel-blue with warm rose-gray toward the center. Faint hairlines in the right obverse field explain the PCGS qualifier, but they are easily overlooked at most viewing angles. The circulation strike 1857 is a notorious strike rarity in the Liberty Seated dollar series but, while the present example is typically soft on Liberty's head and around much of the obverse periphery, the reverse is sharper overall with uncommonly bold detail to the eagle's right leg and talon.

Survivors are rare and number no more than 400 or so coins in Mint State and circulated grades combined (per Osburn and Cushing, 2018), perhaps as few as 250 to 300 pieces (per Q. David Bowers, 2016). In either case worn coins constitute the majority of 1857 dollars in collectors' hands, and fewer than 100 coins are believed extant in Mint State. Perhaps not surprisingly, most of the Uncirculated survivors are tightly held, market appearances such as this few and far between in today's highly competitive numismatic market. We expect strong competition when this noteworthy condition rarity crosses our auctioneer's block.

1864 OC-1. Rarity-2. Repunched Date. AU Details—Altered Surfaces (PCGS). The circulation strike 1864 has a mintage of 30,700 pieces with survivors scarce to rare in all grades. The limited mintage can be explained by the fact that, although production at the Comstock was increasing (it amounted to nearly \$9 million in 1863), bullion dealers still had to rely on imports or foreign coins in domestic circulation (primarily Mexican dollars) to obtain most of their silver. Without an abundance of domestically mined silver, there was little need for bullion depositors to turn to the Mint to coin excess silver into dollars to use in the export trade. Of course, those dollars that were struck in 1864, as in other years in the Liberty Seated series, were exported and subsequently melted. Survivors are understandably scarce to rare at all levels of preservation, and in great demand.

1873 Liberty Seated. OC-2. Rarity-2. Unc Details—Cleaned (PCGS). The final circulation strike silver dollar of the Liberty Seated design type from the Philadelphia Mint, the 1873 is underrated compared to the 1871 and 1872. Standard silver dollar coinage was halted on March 29, 1873, pursuant to the terms of the Act of February 12, 1873, which abolished the standard silver dollar. By that time only 293,000 circulation strikes from 1873-dated dies had been produced, once again at the request of bullion depositors taking advantage of their last opportunities to exchange their silver for standard dollars. While many of these coins were likely used in the export trade, others were retained stateside. In both cases melting played the most significant role in reducing the extant population to only 350 to 500 coins. This estimate is per Q. David Bowers (2016), who observes, "These are much scarcer than the mintage might suggest." The present example is attractive for the grade with abundant luster and vivid, mottled toning that finds greater expression on the obverse.

1893 Isabella Quarter. MS-66 (PCGS). CAC. Richly and originally toned with full mint luster in a smooth, softly frosted texture. Sharply struck and supremely attractive. Designed by Charles E. Barber, the Isabella quarter was authorized March 3, 1893, and production began almost immediately afterward. Petitioned by the Board of Lady Managers of the Columbian Exposition, the issue features a stylized portrait of Queen Isabella as the central obverse device, with a kneeling woman with spindle in hand signifying the industrious nature of women as the reverse design. They were sold for \$1.00 each at the Exposition and a total of 24,214 were struck. They remain one of the key date issues in the classic commemorative series and this example is one of the finest obtainable at the assigned grade level.

Electrotype/Cast Copy 1792 Birch Cent. Type of Judd-3, Pollock-4. Copper-Plated Lead. Plain Edge. Extremely Fine. 280.87 grains. In 1792, many members of the House favored a representation of the President's head on the obverse of each coin, others considered the idea a monarchical practice. Washington is believed to have expressed disapproval of the use of his portrait on American coins. The majority considered a figure emblematic of Liberty more appropriate, and the Senate finally concurred in this opinion. Robert Birch was an engraver employed to design proposed devices for American coins. He, perhaps together with others, engraved the dies for the dime and half dime. He also cut the dies for the large copper patterns known today as "Birch cents." Many 1792 half dimes and dimes circulated, however, only about a dozen of the 1792 Birch cent patterns are now known.

This is NOT an original but a copy in copper-plated lead, type of Judd-3, Pollock-4 in the pattern references. Although displaying trivial rub from numismatic handling, good detailing remains throughout much of the design. Some of the underlying lead is visible, most notably at the central obverse high points and on the reverse above the letters ON in ONE and around the letter M in AMERICA. Otherwise we note warm autumn-brown color. Areas of roughness are as made, and they are more pronounced on the reverse. A rare, unusual opportunity to acquire an early copy of this exceedingly rare pattern. A personal examination is recommended.

HALF CENTS

Exciting 1793 Half Cent Discovered Near the Site of the First United States Mint

1793 Head Left. C-3. Rarity-3. AU Details—Corroded (NCS). An extremely sharp specimen of the first half cent issue, made all the more interesting by its unusual and historic provenance. This piece was found on the same site, at the same time, as a 1798 dollar die trial in copper that we (Stack's) also offered in our August 2007 sale. Both were located by metal detector in 2006 on a lot razed for modern construction abutting the former site of the First United States Mint in Philadelphia. The surfaces are granular, dark steel overall with some ruddy earthen encrustation still clinging to both sides. This piece has an "as found" look, and was never cleaned aside from brushing off whatever detritus adhered at the moment of discovery. The details on both sides are superb, well defined, and show little if any actual circulation wear. A little nick is noted off Liberty's chin, and some

raised scale is seen under the word UNITED on the reverse. Though this piece may not photograph well, it looks pleasing in hand, and its wealth of detail is easily studied and enjoyed. As a sharp example of this scarce one year type, this piece has a good deal of value and desirability. For its association with the aforementioned unique 1798 dollar trial and its fascinating story of discovery, it seems to us to be worth even more. The 1798 dollar die trial in copper realized \$29,900 as lot 3025 in our aforementioned August 2007 sale.

A bold and rather appealing example with considerable sharpness to the wreath on the reverse and throughout Liberty's hair. The surfaces present as more or less smooth, satiny in texture and generally tight. Closer inspection with a loupe, however, does reveal some roughness to the obverse, less on the reverse, that points to corrosion removal, as noted by PCGS. Pleasing in hand, nonetheless, and with handsome olive-brown patina, there is a lot of "coin" here to tempt the budget minded type collector. Manley Die State 2.0.

Manley Die State 1.0, with no trace of the obverse break that eventually develops at 9:30. Manley describes this die state as "Rare."

All major design elements are appreciable, however, and most are bold for the grade. Smooth in hand with no blemishes of note and a very pleasing appearance. Remnants of the undertype are faint, but discernible with patience at the lower, lower right and, especially, upper right obverse borders, as well as on the reverse at the letter E in STATES.

1852 Second Restrike. B-3. Rarity-7. Small Berries, Reverse of 1840. Proof-64+ BN (NGC). CAC. Iridescent golden-tan surfaces with a full strike and satin to semi-reflective finish. The United States Mint struck only Proof half cents in 1852. For years originals were unconfirmed, as various writers and researchers had speculated about the true nature of the 1852 Large Berries Proofs on the basis of precious little evidence. Neither Cohen nor Breen could get over the fact that the Large Berries reverse was used for all Proofs from 1840 to 1849, then shelved until the production of the 1852 Large Berries. We now know, thanks to the assembly of the Phil Kaufman Collection and follow-up research by John W. Dannreuther, that Proofs of each denomination used a single dedicated Proof reverse for all of the 1840s and, in some cases, as late as 1854, unless cracked or otherwise disabled. What Breen and others condemned as out of the order, under further examination, has turned out to have been standard operating procedure. In his *Encyclopedia of United States Half Cents* (1983), Walter Breen assigned the 1852 Large Berries the attribution B-4, but mistakenly classified it as a "Series VII" restrike. Now confirmed as an original striking of the year, the D. Brent Pogue specimen of the 1852 B-4 Large Berries realized \$493,500 in our April 2017 Pogue V Sale.

The elusiveness of the 1852 half cent was recognized early, certainly by the late 1850s when the production of the novel small size 1856 Flying Eagle cent and other factors combined to spark the first great surge in popularity for the numismatic hobby in the United States. The first restrikes of the Proof 1852 half cent hail from that era, and it is during the years immediately preceding the outbreak of the Civil War that examples of the B-2 variety were struck. That variety is now regarded as the only readily obtainable die marriage of the Proof 1852 half cent, identifiable by doubling to the letter T in CENT on the reverse. The present example is from the far rarer B-3 Second Restrike die pairing, with die file marks (as made) along the border outside the letters RICA in AMERICA.

The total extant population of Proof restrikes of this date is fewer than 75 coins, confirming the important bidding opportunity represented by this handsome Choice B-3 coin. It is the fourth example of six listed in the Breen-Hanson census published in 1983.

1793 Wreath Reverse. S-5. Rarity-4. Vine and Bars Edge. VG-8 (PCGS). Boldly toned surfaces in deep olive-copper. All major design elements are more or less fully outlined, although the obverse border is into the top of the word LIBERTY and the bottom of the date due to wear. The central design elements are quite bold for the grade. The reverse is smooth in hand with no marks or other blemishes of note. The obverse, however, is flawed with planchet laminations at the lower right border and, more significantly, through the center of Liberty's portrait. This very scarce S-5 vine and bars variety is identifiable by it being the only large LIBERTY among the Wreath cents; and also, as stated in Walter Breen's *Encyclopedia*, "The date wears down faster than other details." With a clear date, plenty of other definition and originally preserved surfaces, this is a relatively pleasing example that will win many adherents among early copper enthusiasts.

Both sides are frosty chocolate-brown with hints of lighter steel-brown in the protected areas. Ample luster remains, the coin Mint State in preservation apart from the barest trace of rub to the high points. Well centered in strike with bold to sharp detail throughout, a pleasingly smooth appearance in hand rounds out a truly impressive list of physical attributes. John Reich's Classic Head cent series passed into coinage history in 1814 with a reported mintage of 357,830 pieces for the year. The United States was in the throes of the War of 1812 at the time. Although the Treaty of Ghent signed on December 24, 1814, ended the conflict with Great Britain, future president Andrew Jackson would lead U.S. forces to victory in the Battle of New Orleans on January 8, 1815, unaware of the treaty's signing. The United States government did not officially ratify the treaty until February 18, 1815.

Among the many adverse effects of the war was the interruption of deliveries of copper planchets to the United States Mint. The Mint's principal supplier of this coinage metal at the time was Matthew Boulton, located in Birmingham, England. Indeed, his last shipment to the United States before the war (which officially commenced on June 18, 1812), was made in January 1811, the copper arriving sometime before May 9, 1812. No more shipments were made until after the cessation of hostilities, and the Mint's existing supply was exhausted by the end of 1814, explaining the lack of 1815 cents. When coinage of this denomination resumed in 1816, Reich's Classic Head motif had been replaced by the Matron Head design of Engraver Robert Scot.

This type has long been respected among advanced numismatists for its overall scarcity and rarity in the finest circulated and all Mint State grades. The two die pairings of the final year 1814 issue are among the most frequently encountered with superior quality and eye appeal, although we caution bidders that a coin such as offered here represents a fleeting bidding opportunity in today's highly competitive market.

1820 N-13. Rarity-1. Large Date. MS-66 BN (NGC). OH. Lovely satin to softly frosted surfaces are smooth, lustrous and exceptionally well preserved. Pleasingly toned in steely copper-brown, direct lighting reveals plenty of pale rose from faded mint color. The borders are fully denticulated, and the central design elements are crisp. The 1820 Newcomb-13 is one of the most available varieties of large cent from the famous Randall Hoard. This hoard, which contained thousands of large copper cents mostly dated from 1817 through 1820, was rumored to have been found beneath a railroad platform in Georgia some time after the Civil War, but before 1869. Supposedly hidden in a small keg (or multiple kegs), the hoard was named for John Swan Randall of Norwich, New York, who purchased the coins after they had changed hands several times since their discovery. After Randall's death in 1878, the coins that remained were offered at auction by Edward D. Cogan. The most readily obtainable variety from the Randall Hoard is the 1818 N-10, followed by the 1820 N-13 (offered here). Over the years, even as late as the 1970s, it was not unheard of to find groups of Randall Hoard cents offered by coin dealers. However, as the 20th century came to a close, examples were usually found as individual pieces.

We stress, however, that this is the typical pattern of strike for the die pairing, and all other features are sharply to fully rendered. Frosty medium olive-copper patina overall with traces of faded mint rose color persisting in the protected areas around some of the design elements. New digit punches were used for the date on the 1828 Newcomb-10 cent, the most obvious feature the stylized 8 with a smooth diagonal central stroke. 1859 Proof-65 (NGC). A well mirrored specimen with blushes of reddish-rose iridescence to a base of warm orange-apricot color. The debut of the Indian cent in 1859 came at a time when the United States was experiencing its first boom in coin collecting. In 1858, the Mint under Director Colonel James Ross Snowden began to produce Proof coins in greater numbers than in previous years and to advertise such pieces for sale. This practice continued through 1859, in which year the Mint recorded the number of Proof gold and silver struck for the first time in its history. (Proof minor coin mintages, however, were not recorded until 1878.) Despite the increased interest in these coins among contemporary Americans, the Mint's production of Proofs in both 1858 and 1859 proved overly optimistic. In fact, Rick Snow (2014) opines that less than half the estimated mintage of 800 Proofs for the 1859 Indian cent was actually distributed to collectors, the remaining pieces probably released into circulation in later years. As a solidly graded Gem, the offered coin represents a significant find in today's competitive numismatic market.

Many 1859 Indian cents have survived in Mint State, but most are poorly defined due to the Mint's widespread use of worn dies in production of this issue. In the North, the introduction of a three-cent fractional note in 1863 and the three-cent nickel coin in 1865 effectively made the silver three-cent coin superfluous. After 1862, production figures dropped precipitously and finally in 1873, the denomination was discontinued after a final issue of Proof specimens.

Unlike some of the earlier issues, the 1861 trime is generally well struck with overall excellent lustrous surfaces and lower end Gem examples may be secured with only a modicum of effort. The present specimen is a premium MS-66, conditionally scarce as such, and with such outstanding toning it ranks as one of the finest available at this impressive grade level. 1913 Type I. MS-67 (PCGS). With exceptionally vivid and varied iridescent toning on that reverse, it is little wonder that PCGS mounted this coin with that side up in the holder. The obverse is also toned, albeit in more reserved golden-apricot. Both sides feature full mint luster to silky smooth surfaces. An outstanding Superb Gem representative of this popular first-year Buffalo nickel type.

Unique 1800 LM-5 Half Dime Newly Discovered Die Variety First Ever Auction Appearance

1800 LM-5. Unique. LIBEKTY. AG Details—Holed (PCGS). Stack's Bowers Galleries is pleased to present the unique 1800 LM-5 half dime - the first new die pairing discovered in the Draped Bust, Heraldic Eagle half dime series in nearly three decades. This important discovery was the subject of an article entitled "PCGS Grades New 1800 Draped Bust Half Dime Variety" by Dylan Dominguez and Edward Van Orden, and published October 13, 2022, at coinweek.com. The authors describe the new die pairing and the significance:

A previously unknown die marriage of the 1800 Draped Bust, Heraldic Eagle Half Dime was recently submitted to PCGS for grading. Newly designated as Logan McCloskey-5 (LM-5) with 'Obverse 3' and 'Reverse C', it becomes the 12th-known die marriage in the series (1800-1803, 1805) and the first new die marriage discovered in almost 30 years. It also represents the only unique coin by die marriage within the entire Bust Half Dime series, surpassing in rarity the 1800 LM-4 (two to three known); the 1801 LM-1 (five known, most with problems); the 1833 LM-5 (seven known); and even the famous 1802 (35-40 known), which shares the same reverse!

Prior to this discovery, the workhorse Reverse C was known in the 1801 LM-1, LM-2, 1802 LM-1, 1803 LM-1 and LM-2 pairings, but not with an 1800-dated obverse. Given that the reverse is in its early state in this pairing, before formation of a border break above the letter E in UNITED, Dominguez and Van Orden conclude that "the 1800 LM-5 demonstrates...a natural progression wherein 'Reverse B' likely failed late in 1800 and was replaced with 'Reverse C' to strike additional 1800-dated coins before going on to strike the first 1801 Half Dimes." Since the variety eluded researchers for more than two centuries, it is likely that very few coins were struck from the 1800 LM-5 pairing.

Original warm, even steel-gray patina is pleasing. The coin is well worn with many design elements lost to circulation, but key features remain to confirm both Obverse 3 and Reverse C. On the obverse, all four digits in the date are discernible with patience, the final 0 clearest, and its wide spacing relative to the first 0 confirms Obverse 3. Approximately 50% of Liberty's portrait is outlined, and most of the stars along the right border are discernible. The reverse shows somewhat more detail overall, the positioning of the nearest leaves to the letters IC in AMERICA discernible to confirm the Reverse C attribution. The PCGS qualifier concerns an irregular, ragged hole through the obverse at the top of Liberty's head, reverse in the area of the lower right corner of the shield. Inspection with a loupe reveals myriad marks and faint pin scratches that are not out of place on an early U.S. Mint silver coin that saw this extensive circulation.

While far from a perfect coin, this fact should be of little concern to early half dime variety specialists. The collector seeking to complete a die variety set of half dimes, 1792 to 1837, simply must acquire this coin. Its unique status guarantees that only a single complete die variety set of this series can exist at a time. The strongest bids are urged, for once this piece sells, it could be decades before another collector has the opportunity to acquire the unique 1800 LM-5 half dime.

Produced during an era in which silver coinage was not seen in commerce in the East or Midwest, it is little wonder that the circulation strike 1867 half dime has a paltry mintage of just 8,000 coins. This is the lowest mintage issue in the entire circulation strike Liberty Seated half dime series of 1837 to 1873, which fact has long bestowed key date status on the 1867. The limited mintage caught the eye of 19th century numismatists, who set aside enough coins that this issue is actually a bit more obtainable in lower Mint State grades than one might suspect. Since this issue was not released into circulation at the time of striking, some Mint State coins may have been obtained from bullion brokers or banks during the early to mid-Reconstruction era by those willing to pay the required premium in Legal Tender notes. It is more likely, however, that most such coins were acquired after silver and paper currency reached parity on April 20, 1876. After that date large quantities of half dimes were deposited in banks, allowing sharp-eyed tellers and numismatists the opportunity to acquire key date examples before these coins were sent to the Treasury for melting.

Q. David Bowers (2016) estimates that only 40 or so coins are extant in grades of MS-65 or finer. With most such examples off the market in tightly held collections, the fleeting nature of this offering can hardly be overstated.

With a generous mintage of 1,492,000 pieces and a good rate of survival for Mint State coins, this is a popular type issue with quality-conscious collectors. Most will have to settle for an example in lower grades, however, for MS-68s such as this are rare in an absolute sense. Outstanding!

At least two sets of particularly bold clash marks are readily evident on both sides of this interesting coin when studied with the aid of a loupe. These are particularly pronounced on the obverse around Liberty's head and in the right field, and in the reverse around the letters ME in DIME.

On October 28, 1982, a few minutes past noon, excitement prevailed in the French Quarter in downtown New Orleans as earthmoving equipment brought to light a vast treasure of silver coins. The site, scheduled to be used for a new Meridien Hotel, may have secreted a long-forgotten bank reserve.

Passersby grabbed what they could in a frantic free-for-all. In the melee no accounting was ever made of what was found. However, it is estimated that over 1,000 silver pieces were found, including large numbers of Spanish-American silver coins. Apparently these had been buried in three cedar boxes. A report of the scramble by New Orleans dealer James H. Cohen noted:

"Visualize, if you will, businessmen in Brooks Brothers suits, women executives dressed in high heels and stockings, and laborers in their work clothes all on their hands and knees in mud at times up their waists, digging with their bare hands for buried treasure."

In the course of research, Bowers learned that among large denomination United States silver coins there were various half dollars from about 1811 to 1837, plus a single 1798 dollar. Most attention by numismatists was centered on a remarkable cache of Liberty Seated quarter dollars struck at the nearby New Orleans Mint in 1840 and 1841, many if not most of which were in Mint State! The exact quantity of 1840-O and 1841-O quarters has been a matter of conjecture ever since. In his 1988 *Encyclopedia* Walter Breen suggested about 40 of the most plentiful variety, the 1841-O, but Bowers thought the number might be larger than that. Further details are given in the Bowers book.

Given the population of surviving 1836 Reeded Edge half dollars today, Robert W. Julian has estimated that the mintage was actually closer to 5,000 pieces. Between the legendarily elusive Small Eagle half dollars of 1796 and 1797 and the scarce Philadelphia Mint dates between 1879 and 1890, no other half dollar issue approaches the low mintage of the 1836 Reeded Edge. Beyond its evident historical importance, the 1836 Reeded Edge has always been admired as a rarity. For most of the 19th century, this issue was deemed a pattern, too rare to have been issued for circulation. While listed in J. Hewitt Judd's *United States Pattern, Trial, and Experimental Pieces* as Judd-57, a listing that remains in modern editions out of a sense of tradition, the 1836 Reeded Edge half dollar is now acknowledged as a regular issue coin. The vast majority of survivors show significant wear, and even more affordable AU survivors such as this are scarce and always in demand.

Both sides are fully struck, as befits the method of manufacture, and the surfaces are fully Choice in preservation with only trivial signs of numismatic handling. Visually appealing, and rare from both absolute and condition standpoints.

Produced just prior to launching of the Mint's campaign to market Proof coins to a wider numismatic audience, the 1857 half dollar has an unknown mintage in this format that Q. David Bowers

(2016) estimates at just 30 to 50 pieces. Among the survivors, few are as technically superb as the offered coin, as confirmed by extremely limited population figures in the PCGS and NGC Cameo categories. Fit for inclusion in the finest cabinet.

The omnibus Act of February 12, 1873, among many other things, mandated a slight weight increase for the half dollar from 12.44 grams to 12.50 grams. As in 1853 to 1855, the Mint felt that an identifying feature was required to distinguish those pieces produced to the new weight standard from their predecessors. Arrows flanking the date were again used for this purpose, but only for two years - 1873 and 1874 - and no attempt was made to modify the reverse design as had been done in 1853. The Arrows, Motto half dollar type resulted in just two Proof issues and, with a slightly lower mintage of 500 coins as opposed to 700 pieces, the 1873 Arrows is scarcer in today's market than the 1874. The type as a whole enjoys strong collector demand in today's market, especially when accompanied by CAC approval, as here.

1892 MS-65 (PCGS). Handsome and undeniably original toning blankets both sides in a blend of antique copper-gold and warmer steel-blue. The underlying luster is full and, were it just a tad more intense, the smooth-looking surfaces would probably have secured an even higher Gem Mint State grade. Sharply to fully struck, this is an outstanding high grade type candidate for this first year of Barber silver coinage.

While typically the first year of issue of a denomination attracts attention by the public, this does not seem to have happened with the Barber dime, quarter, and half dollar. The main reason is probably that nationwide attention was focused on the forthcoming 1892 souvenir (as it was called) half dollar for the World's Columbian Exposition. These coins attracted a great deal of attention, with widespread newspaper accounts. In contrast, contemporary notices about the new Barber coins were occasional and contained some pointed remarks about the design, not intended to inspire people to save them. Because of this, Barber half dollars of this date survived as a matter of chance. We are not aware of any hoard or even a small group surviving from the year of issue. Barber coins remained in numismatic disfavor as well, with scarcely a word of favorable comment being given to them in pages of *The Numismatist*, auction catalogues, or elsewhere. During the ensuing years, to 1915, most circulation strikes slipped into the channels of commerce without fanfare. Incidentally, the same was true of Morgan silver dollars, although today Morgan dollars survive in quantities because of government hoards. There were no equivalent hoards of Barber coins.

Fast forward to the second half of the 20th century, when Barber coins became a specialty for quite a few collectors. It was soon found that the number of true Gems was few and far between. Today in 2022, it can be a real challenge to put together a set of MS-65 Barber half dollars that combines high grading numbers with sharpness of strike and good eye appeal. Indeed, we estimate that it would take several years and a well endowed pocketbook to accomplish this feat.

The San Francisco Mint produced 740,000 half dollars in 1893, the second year of the Barber series, representing a reduction of nearly 300,000 coins from the mintage for the 1892-S. Throughout the Barber series yearly half dollar production was a response to the needs of commerce, and examples were released into circulation on a routine basis in proportion to the call for them. The early San Francisco Mint issues in this series saw particularly heavy commercial use, which combined with the limited mintage explains why the 1893-S qualifies as a key date even in the lowest circulated grades. In Mint State this issue is one of the rarest of its type from the 1890s. Writing in the 2019 edition of his *Guide Book of Barber Silver Coins*, Q. David Bowers' comment about high grade half dollars from this era is brief and to the point: "With only a few exceptions, Barber half dollars of the 1890s are very difficult to find in gem preservation." The 1893-S is one of the leading rarities in this group at the certified MS-65 level, with superior Choice examples in MS-64+ similarly elusive and equally worthy of attention.

For reasons that have been lost to history, the New Orleans Mint produced a staggering (for the type) total of 5.3 million half dollars in 1908. This is the second highest mintage of any coin in the Barber series, trailing only the 1899, and the 1908-O is obviously a plentiful issue by the standards of the type. This is even true of Mint State survivors, although examples that grade MS-65 or finer are rare from a condition standpoint, especially with the superior striking quality and outstanding surface preservation offered here.

Some 423,515 coins were struck, although not all of those were from 1799-dated dies. The estimated mintage for this particular issue is 395,000 pieces, achieved from 22 die pairs, three of which bear the 1799/8 overdate. The most fascinating and popular of these overdate varieties is the BB-141 combination, which has quite a tale to tell. The obverse die bearing the 1798 date was prepared but was not used, so the date was recut to 1799, though remnants of the 8 remain visible. In addition, the reverse die of BB-141 die is a study in diecutter improvisation and adaptation. When the engraver was entering the stars, he elected to put one arc of seven stars, then a second arc of six stars, then flanked the eagle with two more stars, rendering 15 stars all told on the reverse, two too many. Realizing this and because die steel was at a premium, the diecutter tried to correct the mistake by drastically enlarging the leftmost and rightmost clouds in an attempt to cover up the extraneous stars. This adaptation did not fully hide the two stars so that they remain partially visible. The die nonetheless entered service and a sizable quantity of silver dollars were made with this die pairing. Thanks in no small part to speculators buying up as many silver dollars and selling them overseas at a profit, perhaps between 700 and 1,200 pieces survive, mostly in the middle to higher circulated grade levels. This die pair becomes a notable condition rarity at the Choice AU level and above. The expert preservation and pleasing patina of the offered coin make this a desirable example for discriminating silver dollar connoisseurs. BB Die State IV.

Surface quality looks average, generally smooth in hand, but with a few scratches in the left reverse field that accuracy compels us to mention. Good detail remains for the assigned grade, however, and the eye appeal is quite strong. BB Die State II-III (intermediate die state).

This is the popular Apostrophe variety, so named because of the die break on the reverse after the final letter S in STATES seen on all but the earliest die state examples. BB-167 is only a median rarity among 1799 silver dollar die parings in an absolute sense, but at the assigned grade level the present example is rare and qualifies as Condition Census per the listing in the 2013 edition of the Bowers early dollar reference. BB Die State II.

BB-168 is among the scarcer die marriages for the 1799 issue, its elusiveness no doubt attributed to the ever-present bisecting reverse crack that must have resulted in the early withdrawal of that die from production. Moderately abraded surfaces are mentioned for accuracy. Scarce in an absolute sense, this die pairing has an estimated population of 250 to 400 survivors in all grades (per Q. David Bowers, *The Encyclopedia of United States Silver Dollars: 1794-1804*, 2013). With most examples confined to lower grades through VF, BB-184 is also a conditionally challenging variety that is rare in EF and AU. With only a single Mint State coin positively confirmed - the Cardinal Collection specimen that we (American Numismatic Rarities) brought to auction in 2005 - this Extremely Fine coin is a noteworthy find for the advanced early dollar variety enthusiast.

With most examples confined to lower grades through VF, BB-184 is also a conditionally challenging variety that is rare in EF and AU. 1836 Name on Base. Judd-60 Original, Pollock-65. Rarity-1. Silver. Plain Edge. Die Alignment II. Proof. EF Details—Graffiti, Repaired (NGC). While far from a perfect example, this is a bold EF example of a famous and rare early silver dollar issue whose status as a circulation strike has been gaining more widespread recognition in recent years. Otherwise brilliant, the peripheries exhibit vivid retoning in reddish-gold and cobalt blue. Bright and glossy overall with considerable evidence of smoothing, although traces of initials remain in the right obverse field. Scarce from a market availability standpoint and always in demand due to its historical significance and the beauty of its design, the 1836 Name on Base Gobrecht dollar is eagerly sought at all levels of preservation.

Recent authors have generally recognized four different die alignments for Gobrecht dollars, designated as I (coin turn, eagle flying upwards), II (medal turn, eagle flying upwards), III (coin turn, eagle flying level with respect to obverse), and IV (medal turn, eagle flying level with respect to obverse). When Walter Breen wrote his *Complete Encyclopedia* in 1988, he considered Die Alignment I examples of the Judd-60 Name on Base issue to be originals from 1836 and Die Alignment II pieces from a mintage of 600 pieces delivered in March of 1837. He regarded Die Alignment III and IV pieces as restrikes. This view had been challenged by the early 1990s, when it was found that many Die Alignment IV pieces evinced signs of circulation, suggesting that they had been made for that purpose rather than to accommodate coin collectors. Modern research by Craig Sholley, John Dannreuther, and Saul Teichman (based on an exhaustive examination of die state evidence), reported that the die alignment sequence of Judd-60 Gobrecht dollars is actually I-IV-II-IV-I-IV. All examples in these alignments are originals attributed to the December 1836 issue of 1,000 coins; the 600 pieces struck in March 1837 represent a test striking, and all were subsequently melted. Die alignment III pieces are still regarded as restrikes coined decades later than 1836. Pollock in his *United States Patterns and Related Issues* considered Die Alignment II and III pieces as the scarcest alignment varieties, followed by IV. He regarded Die Alignment I pieces to be the most readily available.

1842 OC-2. Rarity-1. MS-63 (PCGS). Warmly patinated in pewter-gray, this satiny example also reveals glints of antique gold, olive and powder blue as the surfaces dip into a light. Boldly defined in most areas, and exceptionally well preserved for an early Liberty Seated dollar issue that is typically offered in circulated grades. In response to uncommonly strong demand for this denomination from bullion depositors, the Philadelphia Mint produced 184,618 silver dollars in 1842. Many survivors in VF, EF and AU grades are coins that were exported to Europe and subsequently returned to the United States in payment for goods. Mint State examples, as here, are rare and seldom offered except at the largest numismatic gatherings.

Since it one of the more frequently encountered issues in the Liberty Seated series, the 1842 is popular with type collectors seeking a single coin to represent the No Motto design.

1845 OC-P1. Rarity-7-. Repunched Date. Proof-40 (PCGS). While perhaps not the flashiest, this coin is certainly among the most significant in this sale. As the OC-P1 attribution confirms, it is an undeniable Proof striking of the 1845 silver dollar, and a major numismatic rarity, as such. Plenty of sharp striking detail remains to surfaces that are warmly toned in blended mauve and pewter-gray. There are no marks or other blemishes of consequence.

As with all pre-1858 Proof silver dollars, the 1845 is a major rarity. Produced when the Mint did not keep records of the number of Proofs struck, the mintage is unknown. What we do know is that Proofs were struck in extremely small numbers for official purposes or distribution to a few numismatists with close ties to Mint personnel. Most were distributed as part of the year's Proof sets, with perhaps a few additional specimens for individual sale. Q. David Bowers provides an estimated mintage of just 15 to 25 coins in his 1993 silver and trade dollar encyclopedia. Only 15 or so specimens are believed extant, including the present coin, which was obviously released into circulation by an early owner. Offerings for Proof 1845 silver dollars at any level of preservation are few and far between, highlighting the important opportunity that this lot represents.

1845 OC-1. Rarity-2. MS-61 (PCGS). OGH. Brilliant and highly lustrous surfaces are semi-reflective in the fields, otherwise satiny in finish. Boldly to sharply struck with superior eye appeal at the assigned grade level. The 1845 is one of the lowest mintage silver dollars from the 1840s with just 24,500 circulation strikes produced, third only to the 1848 with 15,000 and 1844 with 20,000 coins struck. Most silver dollars of that decade circulated domestically, but were valued at a slight premium. Many were exported, especially to Europe and, increasingly after 1842, to China. After 1852, in fact, nearly all Liberty Seated dollars were exported to Asia, the quantity to Europe via England diminishing, yet still significant enough. Due to its earlier use in domestic commerce, the 1845 is more plentiful in circulated grades than issues such as the 1855 and 1856, which were produced solely for use in the export trade. In Mint State the 1845 is a landmark rarity, however, “the rarest of all Liberty Seated dollars of the 1840s and [maybe] the rarest Philadelphia Mint Liberty Seated dollar, period” (per Q. David Bowers, 1993). This importance of this Brilliant Uncirculated example for advanced Liberty Seated and/or silver dollar enthusiasts cannot be overstated.

1845 OC-1. Rarity-2. AU-58 (NGC). A sharply struck and essentially brilliant example with much of the flashy, modestly semi-prooflike luster remaining. The 1845 is one of the lowest mintage silver dollars from the 1840s with just 24,500 circulation strikes produced, second only to the 1844 with 20,000 coins struck. Most silver dollars of that decade circulated domestically, but were valued at a slight premium. Many were exported, especially to Europe. After 1852, nearly all Liberty Seated dollars were exported to Asia, plus a smaller quantity to Europe via England. As such, the 1845 is more plentiful in circulated grades than issues such as the 1855 and 1856, which were largely exported. It has long been popular with both type collectors and Liberty Seated dollar enthusiasts, especially in the finest circulated grades, as here.

1854 OC-1. Rarity-3+. Repunched Date. VF-30 (NGC). Lightly toned in silver and golden-gray, a touch of glossiness to the texture is noted for accuracy, but in hand this coin presents quite nicely for a Choice VF survivor of an extraordinarily challenging Liberty Seated dollar issue. The circulation strike 1854 is a low mintage affair with just 33,140 pieces produced. As was customary during the era, this mintage was achieved at the request of bullion depositors, who used the coins in export trade to Europe and China. Few examples of this issue returned to the United States in payment for goods, and it is likely that the Orient was the destination for most, where the coins were melted for their bullion content. This sharp AU is among the finer examples of the 300 or so pieces believed extant in all grades (per Osburn and Cushing, 2018).

From Q. David Bowers, 1993:

Just as the 1853 has an unexplained availability for a Liberty Seated dollar of the decade of the 1850s, the 1854 has kept the secret of its rarity well. Although 33,140 were struck, or a mintage just below that of 1850-O and double that of 1848, circulated 1854 dollars are few and far between today. This may be the rarest Philadelphia Mint Liberty Seated dollar after 1851-1852. In fact, dollars of this date were considered rare by Montroville W. Dickeson (in his American Numismatical Manual) in 1859, just five years after they were minted! Writing in 1880, Ebenezer Locke Mason considered the 1854 to be the rarest circulation strike silver dollar dated after 1852 (Mason did not consider mintmarks, as these were not collected at the time).

Why are they rare? As noted, the most logical explanation is that most were exported and melted. Possibly, many dollars of the 1850s were among the 40,000 melted at the Mint in 1861 to provide bullion for subsidiary silver.

Bowers estimated that only 130 to 200 exist in circulated grades.

1856 Proof. Unc Details—Altered Surfaces (PCGS). Dusky sandy-gold patina blankets both sides and helps to explain the PCGS qualifier. Virtually full in strike, as befits the method of manufacture, with no sizeable marks to distract the eye. The Proof 1856 dollar is among the scarcer issues of this type, with only 50 or so survivors remaining as per specialists Dick Osburn and Brian Cushing (2018). An estimated 80 Proof examples were struck from a single die pair employing a unique obverse die and a reverse that would go on to strike original Proofs in 1857 and 1858, as well as later Proof restrikes dated 1851 and 1852. The present example is a desirable, if more affordable survivor that will appeal to specialists in Liberty Seated dollars or early U.S. Mint Proof coinage.

1857 OC-P1. Rarity-5. Proof-53 (PCGS). Light handling that has imparted mostly light, wispy hairlines and marks has not effaced the Proof qualities of this predominantly brilliant silver dollar. Sharply to fully defined in most areas, including along the upper obverse border, which is almost always quite blunt on circulation strike Liberty Seated dollars of this date. Untoned apart from blushes of reddish-gold and steel-blue at the top of the obverse and through the central reverse. By 1857 the popularity of numismatics in the United States had grown to the point where the Mint was starting to increase its offerings of yearly Proof coinage to collectors, many of which at the time resided in the Northeastern states. The mintages for Proofs struck that year were still not officially recorded, but based on the number of coins estimated to have survived the Philadelphia Mint appears to have produced more than 100 examples of the Liberty Seated dollar in this format. Most of these were distributed as part of the year's silver Proof sets, but others were likely sold individually, such was the popularity of the large size silver dollar. The present offering is for one of the approximately 50 to 75 survivors accounted for in most numismatic references.

1858 OC-P1. Rarity-4-. Proof-53 (NGC). Deep, rich steely-mauve obverse toning gives way to somewhat lighter rose-gray patina on the reverse. Plenty of razor sharp striking detail remains to surfaces that are a but muted in appearance, yet free of sizeable marks. As the sole Proof-only date in the Liberty Seated silver dollar series, the 1858 is very popular with advanced collectors. These coins were struck during the first year that the Mint made a concerted effort to market Proof coins to collectors. As such, more specimens were produced in 1858 than in the preceding years of the Liberty Seated dollar series. Q. David Bowers (2016) writes that 210 examples were struck for distribution as part of the year's silver Proof sets. As in earlier years, the popularity of the silver dollar with collectors likely resulted in the production of additional Proofs for individual sale. The mintage was not recorded, but most numismatic scholars accept that 300 Proof 1858 silver dollars were made. Inasmuch as a small number of Proofs of this date were struck from the same reverse die that the Mint used to strike all known Proof 1859 dollars, it is possible that some Proof 1858 dollars are restrikes from that year. Those coins are attributed as OC-P2, Dick Osburn and Brian Cushing (2018) account for only five specimens in numismatic hands. OC-P1, offered here, has an extant population of approximately 175 pieces, and it was struck from the same reverse die that the Mint previously used to coin all known Proof 1856 and Proof 1857 dollars. Sure to have no difficulty finding its way into an advanced silver dollar date set.

1859 Proof-63+ Cameo (NGC). CAC. This delightful specimen exhibits powder blue and champagne-pink peripheral highlights around brilliant centers. Fully struck design elements are also softly frosted in finish to contrast nicely with reflective fields. Although readily obtainable by early Proof Liberty Seated dollar standards, the 1859 is much scarcer than a mintage of 800 pieces might imply. Numismatic scholars believe that only 450 or so examples were actually distributed to contemporary collectors, the remaining specimens eventually disposed of through melting or, more likely, release into commercial channels.

1859-O OC-1. Rarity-1. AU-58 (PCGS). Glints of reddish-gold peripheral iridescence on the obverse interrupt an otherwise brilliant-white appearance. Not likely a coin that saw actual commercial use, but rather a more heavily abraded example from the Treasury Department releases of the early to mid 1960s, which find has made the 1859-O one of the most popular type issues in the challenging Liberty Seated dollar series.

1859-S OC-1. Rarity-2. MS-61 (PCGS). Offered is a rare Uncirculated example of this historic key date Liberty Seated dollar issue. Sharply struck throughout, and uncommonly well produced for an 1859-S dollar, as such, since most examples are noticeably soft on the high points of the reverse. Both sides are minimally toned with delicate silver and gold tinting that yields to brilliance at direct viewing angles. Highly lustrous throughout with pronounced semi-prooflike tendencies to an otherwise satin texture. A highlight of the silver dollar offerings in this sale, and sure to see spirited bidding among advanced collectors.

Among San Francisco Mint Liberty Seated dollars of the No Motto type, the 1859-S is an isolated issue with most examples produced for a single purpose. Of the 20,000 pieces struck, the first 15,000 coins delivered were intended solely for export. Indeed, the San Francisco-based firm of Bolton, Barren & Co. acquired 8,985 of these coins for use in the China trade. Those examples that went overseas were invariably lost through melting. Fortunately for today's collectors, the additional 5,000 pieces were retained stateside and released into circulation on the West Coast. Worn survivors of that delivery are more plentiful than the mintage might suggest, but given the manner in which this issue was distributed, combined with a lack of contemporary numismatic demand, it should come as no surprise that the 1859-S is a formidable rarity in Mint State. Surviving almost certainly as a matter of chance, this Condition Census example is visually appealing, and would serve with distinction in an advanced collection of Liberty Seated coinage or silver dollars.

In its earliest die state, the OC-1 is a bold Repunched Date variety. The present example represents a later die state, however, after die polishing has removed all evidence of the repunching to the digits 18. There is also a faint die crack at the base of the date.

1860-O OC-4. Rarity-2. MS-62 (NGC). OH. Highly lustrous with minimal peripheral toning, reminiscent of the 1860-O silver dollars released by the Treasury Department in the early 1960s. An ideal coin to represent this challenging type in a Mint State set.

1861 OC-1. Rarity-5+. MS-61 (NGC). Offered is an uncommonly well preserved, rare Mint State example of a circulation strike silver dollar issue that can be highly elusive even in worn condition. Lustrous surfaces are splashed with iridescent reddish-apricot and powder blue toning. Fully struck, visually appealing, and sure to appeal to advanced collectors of Liberty Seated coinage or silver dollars.

Much of the silver deposited at the Philadelphia Mint for dollar coinage in 1861 came from Nevada's rich Comstock Lode. Beginning in 1859, much of this metal found its way to California, where it flooded the market before being shipped East. In 1859, 1860 and 1861 U.S. merchants exported 1,250,000 silver dollars to China, where the coins were received at bullion value - although they were less popular than the slightly heavier Spanish-American dollars. Most of the 77,500 circulation strike dollars coined in 1861 were lost to future generations of numismatists in this manner. Additionally, many examples are believed to have been destroyed through melting in the United States to provide bullion for the large mintages of subsidiary silver coinage at the Philadelphia Mint in 1861 and early 1862. As a Civil War date, as well, the 1861 is one of the most exciting, and also challenging issues in the entire Liberty Seated dollar series of 1840 to 1873.

1862 Proof-62 (NGC). Pretty iridescent gold highlights enhance both sides of this fully struck and highly reflective specimen. Similar in overall rarity to the 1859 and 1860, the 1862 is one of the more frequently encountered Proofs of this type. On the other hand, demand from type collectors seeking a high grade No Motto Liberty Seated dollar is strong. When combined with the additional demand from series specialists looking for an alternative to a Mint State 1862 silver dollar - which coins are rare - Proofs of this date are understandably scarce from a market availability standpoint.

1863 OC-1. Rarity-3-. EF Details—Cleaned (NGC). The Act of February 21, 1853, reduced the weight of the half dime, dime, quarter and half dollar. The weight of the silver dollar remained unchanged, however, as the denomination was essentially a storehouse for bullion whose most widespread use was in international commerce. Some of the coins shipped overseas found their way back to the United States, accounting for many circulated survivors of scarce Philadelphia Mint issues from the 1850s and 1860s. Demand from contemporary merchants and other bullion depositors resulted in a mintage of 27,200 circulation strike silver dollars in 1863. Survivors are elusive in all grades, both circulated and Mint State. Writing in the 2018 reference *Liberty Seated Dollars: A Register of Die Varieties*, Dick Osburn and Brian Cushing account for only 450 coins extant.

1868 OC-5. Rarity-3-. AU-55 (NGC). Plenty of luster persists to flash through an overlay of silver-rose iridescence as the surfaces dip into a light. Most were used in the export trade with the Orient, at which destination they were melted for their precious metal content.

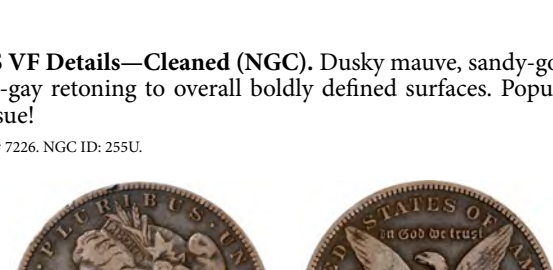

Perhaps just 225 examples are known today in all grades, and Mint State coins are very much in the minority. Even so, this MS-67 example is a distinct cut above the norm, and it numbers among the finer examples known to both PCGS and CAC. It will be equally well suited for high grade type or date purposes.

The United States Mint's circulating gold dollar series passed into history in 1889 with a mintage of 28,950 pieces. The denomination had long since fallen out of favor in commerce. Once gold coins disappeared from circulation in the Eastern and Midwestern states early in the Civil War, mintages at the Philadelphia Mint dropped off markedly beginning in 1863 and remained limited through the series' end, with the exception of isolated increases in 1873 and 1874. Only one mintmarked issue was produced after the 1861-D, the 1870-S. As with most of the low mintage issues of 1879 to 1889, 1889 gold dollars were saved in significant quantity by contemporary numismatists and other speculators. For those seeking a superior quality example of this historic issue for type or date purposes, the search could end here with a strong bid.

1836 HM-1. Rarity-3. Large Head, Block 8. MS-63 (NGC). Fully struck with a lustrous, satin texture to pinkish-honey surfaces. The Classic Head quarter eagle made its debut in the aftermath of a weight reduction for the denomination as mandated by the Act of June 28, 1834. Designed by William Kneass, this portrait of Liberty is radically different than any previously used on coins of this denomination. Gone is the soft cap, Liberty's head now displaying tight curls held in place with a headband inscribed LIBERTY. The entire portrait is smaller with sharper lines, while on the reverse the ribbon upon which E PLURIBUS UNUM had been inscribed is now absent to allow the eagle to stand alone as the central device. The Classic Head series would see the largest yearly mintages of quarter eagles since the denomination's debut in 1796, as well as the first mintmarked issues with deliveries from Charlotte, North Carolina, Dahlonega, Georgia, and New Orleans, Louisiana. With one of the highest mintages in the early quarter eagle series, the 1836 vies with the 1834 Classic Head as the most frequently encountered issue of this type. Choice Mint State survivors are scarce relative to combined demand from type collectors and advanced gold enthusiasts, however, and we anticipate this coin to be a strong performer in the present sale.

When production of quarter eagles began for 1873, the initial date logotype employed a 3 with the two loops terminated by large balls that closed in so close in the middle the digit could easily resemble an 8. The chief coiner raised concerns early in the production cycle and soon thereafter, William Barber furnished a new logotype with significantly smaller terminal balls. A total of 178,025 quarter eagles were struck in 1873, of which 122,800 or roughly two-thirds bear the Open 3 date logotype. While the more available of the two types, locating a true Gem Mint State example can be a challenge. For those seeking one of the very best examples, that search is over.

All of the three-dollar gold coins of this date were delivered in two batches in April of the year; perhaps they were from the two different reverses. Regardless, this is far scarcer issue in Mint State than the first year 1854, to say nothing of the 1874 and 1878.

1812 BD-1. Rarity-3. Wide 5 D. Unc Details—Scratch (PCGS). Popular in commerce, half eagles saw extensive use both domestically and abroad. Die life had improved by 1812, so that the entire reported mintage of 58,057 coins was accomplished from only two die pairings (and this is likely an underestimate of the true quantity struck). These two pairings are readily identified by examining the reverse: BD-1, as here, has a very widely spaced 5 D, while BD-2 has the denomination compact. BD-1 forms the bulk of the production with maybe 45,000 to 60,000 pieces struck from this die par alone, with 10,000 to 15,000 examples coined for BD-2. Even with this fairly substantial mintage, because of mass speculation and melting during the 1820s, less than 1% survive to this day. John W. Dannreuther's (2006) estimate on the number of BD-1 survivors is in the range of 300 to 450 coins. This example is a more affordable Mint State option for the advanced gold type collector or early half eagle enthusiast.

The Dahlonega Mint half eagle series was only in its second year when the facility struck 18,939 examples in 1839. This is the first D-Mint issue of Christian Gobrecht's Liberty Head design, the 1838-D displaying William Kneass' Classic Head motif. The 1839-D is an important one-year type in the Dahlonega Mint half eagle series. Liberty's portrait is different than that used on succeeding issues with deep curvature to the neck truncation. Additionally, the 1839-D is the only Dahlonega Mint Liberty Head half eagle that displays the mintmark on the obverse above the date. Beginning in 1840 the mintmark can be found on the reverse between the eagle and the denomination FIVE D.

A median rarity in this Southern gold series, the 1839-D has an extant population of just a few hundred coins. Not all that far removed from the Choice Uncirculated category, this offering from the phenomenal Fairmont Collection represents a significant bidding opportunity for the astute numismatist.

With Mint State survivors of the 1862-S highly elusive in today's market, this Choice About Uncirculated example is sure to see spirited bidding among advanced double eagle collectors.

Just 155,150 circulation strike double eagles of this date and mint were produced and many of these were sent overseas in later years, by which time they were worn. While EF and low end AU coins are readily obtainable in the context of the Type II Liberty Head series, Uncirculated examples are rare and seldom offered. Nearly as rare are premium Choice About Uncirculated examples, as here. An impressive piece worthy of a premium bid.

The expansion of the railroads was funded largely through copious loans that proved to be high risk as creditors realized that the new railroads did not produce immediate dividends and began to call in their chits. This caused a significant credit crunch that rippled through the financial system as railroads could not pay back their immediate creditors, who in turn had overextended themselves with larger banking houses. The resulting panic was felt nationwide as more than 15,000 businesses of various types including some 500 banks defaulted on their loans and shut down. Meanwhile, the long struggling Carson City Mint was facing its own troubles as the Comstock Lode had basically dried up by this time, essentially eliminating the Nevada facility's *raison d'être*. The 18,402 double eagles struck at Carson City in 1893 proved to be part of the mint's swan song when all coin production ceased by the end of the year and its doors finally shut. While the mintage figures are nowhere near the mint's high water mark in 1876 or even just three years earlier, the 1893-CC double eagle is exceptional in that unlike most previous issues which generally circulated locally, the majority were sent to overseas banks where they sat for decades. As coins were repatriated to an appreciative numismatic audience, many 1893-CC specimens were included and mostly in the higher circulated and lower Mint State grades. Because of this, this has proven to be an especially popular issue among collectors who wish just one double eagle from this historic mint, alongside Western gold specialists. This example will more than fit the bill and will find a position of honor in any cabinet.

Contemporary Counterfeit 1844 Liberty Head Half Eagle. Platinum. About Uncirculated. 8.24 grams. This is a particularly well executed, die struck piece with all design elements sharply to fully rendered. Apart from the metallic composition, in fact, the overall appearance is remarkably similar to that of the regular issue United States Mint product that this counterfeit imitates. The bright silver-gray surfaces are quite smooth overall in hand, although there are a few shallow scrapes over and before Liberty's portrait. These may be the result of someone's "testing" of this curious "half eagle." Closer inspection reveals wispy hairlines which, when taken in conjunction with a somewhat glossy texture, point to an old cleaning. While we have handled a number of platinum counterfeits of Spanish colonial gold coins in recent years (some gilt), this is only our second offering for a counterfeit of a United States gold coin in at least a decade. The first was a more crudely executed 1869-S "half eagle" that was marred by several prominent obverse scratches; it realized \$660 in our November 2020 Auction. This piece is far finer and should fetch a stronger price. It is an intriguing specimen produced at a time when platinum was less valuable than gold.

Barber, the Isabella quarter was authorized March 3, 1893, and production began almost immediately afterward. Petitioned by the Board of Lady Managers of the Columbian Exposition, the issue features a stylized portrait of Queen Isabella as the central obverse device, with a kneeling woman with spindle in hand signifying the industrious nature of women as the reverse design. They were sold for \$1.00 each at the Exposition and a total of 24,214 were struck. It remains one of the key date issues in the United States Mint's classic commemorative coin series, and this lovely example is among the higher graded to meet with strict CAC approval.

Gems are scarce and are eagerly sought and this upper end MS-66 is surely among the most desirable survivors in today's market.

Liberty is wearing a coronet inscribed LIBERTY. **Rev:** The inscription 895.8 S. / 4.2 - G. / 100 - C. / 25 GRAMS is centered within a beaded circle, outside of which is a wreath of corn and cotton. The Latin motto DEO EST GLORIA is inscribed within an ornamental cartouche at the top of the wreath. The legend UNITED STATES OF AMERICA is inscribed along the upper border and the denomination ONE DOLLAR is inscribed along the lower border. Boldly to sharply defined overall, this otherwise silver gray example exhibits blushes of light russet toning around some of the peripheral design elements. These were sold in sets along with J-1635/P-1833 and J-1626/P-1822 to congressman for \$6.10 and later to collectors for \$15.”

Obv: Bust of Abraham Lincoln right with the motto GOD AND OUR COUNTRY above, date 1866 below. **Rev:** The denomination as a Roman numeral III is centered within an oak and laurel wreath. The wreath has some scroll ornamentation at its apex and is surmounted by a six-pointed star. Lovely satin surfaces are smooth, lustrous and framed by halos of delicate champagne-apricot iridescence. This is private issue is attributed to famed medalist Joseph H. Merriam. The *uspatterns.com* website reports only two silver impressions with a reeded edge, the Smithsonian Institution specimen and a piece that sold in our (Bowers and Merena’s) September 1989 sale of the Byron White Collection, lot 2590. As the present example lacks the spot at Lincoln’s shoulder seen on the Byron White specimen, it appears to be a newcomer to the census for this rare Judd number. A pair of tiny carbon spots at the lower left obverse border should serve as useful provenance markers in future market appearances.

1956-D Lincoln Cent. Struck on a Dime Planchet. AU-58 (ANACS). OH. With light golden-gray tinting to satiny, appreciably lustrous surfaces. Both sides are sharply defined in most areas despite the size differential between the cent dies and dime blank, although the obverse border is into some of the peripheral lettering. Rare and desirable as a wrong planchet mint error.

1918-D Buffalo Nickel. Struck on a Cent Planchet. AU-58 (PCGS). A dramatic wrong planchet error, the obverse design of the nickel is fairly well centered on the cent planchet, while the reverse is more closely aligned with the lower border. The date is bold and nearly complete while the D mintmark is identifiable despite being a bit soft. Deep copper-rose patina overall with light cobalt blue providing further visual appeal.

Undated (1840-1935) Type I Silver Dollar Blank Planchet. MS-60 (PCGS). Although the weight is not given on the PCGS holder, the date range confirms that it conforms to the post-1836 standard for this denomination. Attractive golden-gray surfaces with only minor nicks and equally trivial marks that are commensurate with the type.

Undated (1840-1935) Type II Silver Dollar Blank Planchet. MS-60 (PCGS). Pearl-gray surfaces with an upset rim confirming the Type II attribution. A couple of minor edge disturbance are noted for accuracy, but otherwise we note only trivial marks that befit an unstruck planchet of this size.

1977 Eisenhower Dollar. Struck on a Half Dollar Planchet. AU-58+ (PCGS). The strike is flush with the lower right obverse and upper right reverse borders. While the smaller half dollar planchet had no chance of taking all of the design from the Ike dollar dies, those features that are present are generally sharp. The top of the 9 and at least half of both 7s are present, and with the mintmark area clear there is little doubt that this wrong planchet error is attributed to the Philadelphia Mint in 1977. Untoned satiny surfaces with just the lightest friction precluding a full Mint State rating. Rare and visually dramatic, Mint error enthusiasts are sure to compete vigorously for the honor of securing this Eisenhower dollar.

Although not as rare as once thought, these Clark, Gruber & Co. die trials are still scarce. The 1860 K-4a type offered here is particularly desirable given the legendary rarity of the firm's regular issue "Mountain Twenty" of the same date.

The Bob Leonard census published in 2003 includes 12 listings, with his familiar comment about duplication. Interestingly, Jay Roe owned three different examples of this issue, finally settling on the PCGS MS-61 coin featured as lot 40 in our (Bowers and Merena's) sale of that important collection. The coin offered here is graded higher and holds tremendous appeal for advanced specialists in this series.

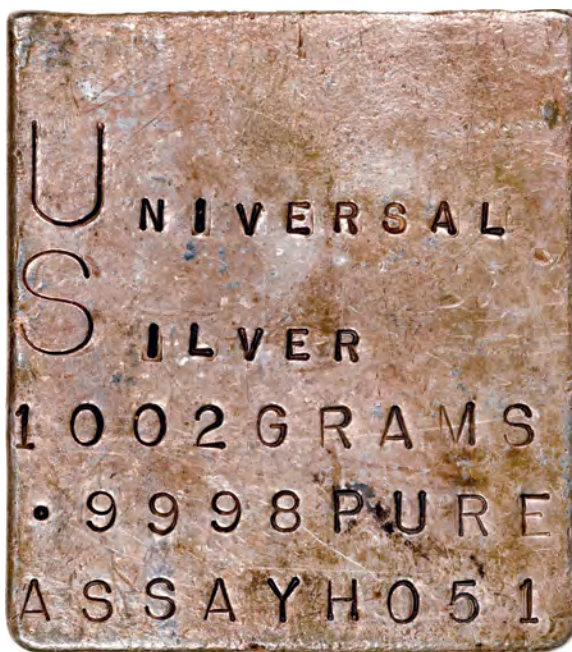

Although 25,000 sets were originally intended, production is estimated to be only about 5,000 sets, with many of those disappearing in the great silver melt of the 1980s. Originally offered at \$79.95 for a complete set, today these sets are rarely seen, and typically sell for well over \$1,000. The ingots remain essentially as issued, the case complete and intact, but showing some handling marks. The booklet with a single, minor crease at the upper right corner.

2013 Casascius 0.1 Bitcoin. Loaded. Firstbits 1AgyACis. Series 3. Silver. MS-68 PL (ICG). Loaded with 0.1 BTC. Intense reflectivity in the fields contrasts the rich and frosty luster across the devices. Just over 800 of this type were issued, though researcher Elias Ahonen points out that “these coins were sold in rolls of 20, meaning they ended up in relatively few hands.” They also share the same hologram style as the silver Series 3 0.5 BTC. It was funded on October 8, 2013, at which point Bitcoin

was valued at around \$125. This was an exponential increase from the same date the year prior, when it was valued at \$12.

The present example represents a scarce public offering of this 0.1 BTC rarity and we are confident that only very few survive in such exceptional condition. A similar MS-68 PL (ICG) example sold for \$9,600 in our November 2022 sale.

Loaded with 0.50 BTC. A true condition rarity from an already scarce issue, this Superb Gem will serve as a crowning jewel in an advanced collection. It sits among the very finest examples graded by PCGS, with only 3 others at the MS-67 level and none finer. An MS-64 (PCGS) example realized \$31,200 in our April 2022 sale.

According to researcher Elias Ahonen, the Series 2 0.5 BTC were released on February 17th 2013 in response to the significant increase in the price of bitcoin, from around US\$14

to around US\$30, in just a few weeks. Issued on a 25.4mm brass planchet, the obverse features the Bitcoin currency symbol at center surrounded by a legend listing the date, denomination, and the Latin phrase “VIRES IN NUMERIS” that translates as “Strength in Numbers.” The reverse features a tamper-resistant holographic sticker with the firstbits address printed at the center. Just four distinct varieties are reported for this issue in Elias Ahonen’s *Encyclopedia* including Non-Serialized Black Address, Serialized Black Address, Buyer Funded Black Address, and (Buyer Funded) Green Address. The present combination, however goes unlisted.

It’s pirate ship design is both fun and highly symbolic. The sail of the ship features a prominent Bitcoin symbol, while the symbols for other fiat currencies can be found in the waves below. This alludes to the “uncharted waters” that the Bitcoin movement represents, and also it’s triumph above fiat. Just 50 of this type were released, making it among the rarest issues from the modern era of physical crypto.

This piece is also accompanied by a special limited edition poster featuring a more detailed rendition of the Pirate ship motif seen on the coin. In this poster, the ship, waves, and currency symbols are vibrantly colored and positioned beneath a twilight sky. An image of the moon is featured in the upper corner which is not depicted on the coin, and this might allude to the popular battle cry of “To the Moon” heard among crypto enthusiasts. 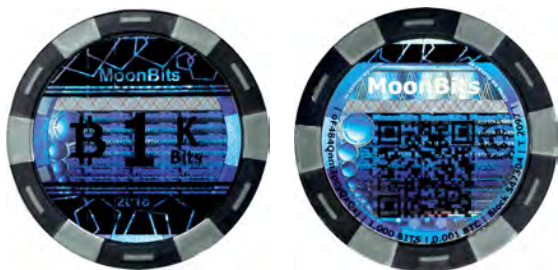

The game was sponsored by prominent cryptocurrency payment processor BitPay. Most significantly, an example of this very coin was used for the coin toss before the game’s kickoff.

This particular specimen is noteworthy for including the official jersey patch that replicates the one worn by players, as well as an impressive piece of related artwork by artist Josh Dykgraaf of Melbourne, Australia. This piece of art depicts a large robot standing on the beach clutching a football with the Bitcoin St. Petersburg Bowl logo on it, which is the same logo featured on this Casascius medal. This artwork was featured on the cover of the December 2014 issue of *yBitcoin Magazine*, which bills itself as “the world’s most widely distributed digital currency publication, reaching over 200,000 readers per quarter at over 2,000 unique locations and events”. The artwork is also accompanied by a certificate of authenticity signed by the artist. It is housed in a frame that measures approximately 18.5” x 14”. Ahonen further notes that Titan Mint is historically significant within the physical crypto category for introducing “a new and unique design aspect in their holograms. Today, Monero (XMR) has the third largest developer community among cryptocurrencies behind only Bitcoin and Ethereum.

These coins were announced on October 26, 2016 when Monero was valued at roughly \$6.50. At the \$452 height of the Monero currency in May 2021, this denomination represented over \$2,200 in value. Because of this massive growth, a large portion of the early 2016 Monero coins have been peeled and redeemed, with the high-denomination 5 XMR particularly impacted. Even so, they remain heavily prized by collectors aiming to complete a full range of denominations in this series.

It is currently the 11th largest cryptocurrency with a market capitalization of \$7.9 billion dollars.
