

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

I am proud to welcome you to the Stack's Bowers Galleries Summer 2022 Global Showcase Auction, presented as an Official Auctioneer Partner of the ANA World's Fair of Money. Offered in the following pages is an incredible selection of U.S. Colonial rarities, exceptional Federal coinage, and some of the most desirable tokens and medals from the Numismatic Americana category. The sale is marked by several significant collections which span a variety of numismatic categories and offer fresh, high-quality selections.

Passionate collectors of Numismatic Americana will delight in an historic offering from the Collection of Paul A. Volcker, Jr., who served as the 12th Chairman of the Federal Reserve from 1979 to 1987. In a career spanning nearly six decades including public service under five U.S. presidents, Volcker worked for private and public firms as an esteemed economist and helped shape the nation's economic policies. In these roles he received numerous awards, medals, and commendations from entities both domestic and foreign, which Stack's Bowers Galleries is proud to offer at auction to private collectors and museums. In addition to the awards, Volcker collected a small group of numismatic coins. This selection from the Volker Collection is highlighted by an impressive 96 mm Benjamin F. Fairless Memorial medal in Gold and a historic Nelson A. Rockefeller Public Service Award Gold medal.

A truly astounding selection is offered from the legendary Cardinal Collection Educational Foundation. Famous for its focus on top-quality Early American coins and medals, the selection in this catalog is anchored by an incredible "1781" General Daniel Morgan, Battle of the Cowpens Bronze medal graded Specimen-66 BN (PCGS) and an important Specimen-62 (PCGS) 1826 Erie Canal Completion medal in silver, HK-1000 variety.

The Augustana Collection contains thousands of coins from around the world accumulated over the course of nearly five decades. The goal of the collection was to portray human progress over the last few centuries. Offered in this catalog are the United States coins that span from the extinct Charlotte and Dahlonega mints to the work of Augustus Saint-Gaudens, reflecting America's emergence on the world stage. Highlights include an elusive MS-61 (NGC) example of the 1860-C Liberty Head half eagle and the 1925-S Saint-Gaudens double eagle.

The Mocatta Collection was formed in the early 1970s and has been held privately since. With a focus on high-end gold coins, this catalog features numerous premium quality Saint-Gaudens double eagles in grades of MS-64 (PCGS) and MS-65 (PCGS). Offered in our Rarities Night catalog are additional rarities from the collection, including the finest known Proof 1825/4/1 \$5 and numerous other world-class treasures.

The Avrabanel Collection is an exceptional cabinet boasting some of the scarcest issues from the 19th and 20th centuries. Spanning nearly every series released by the U.S. Mint, it is highlighted by such rarities as an elusive EF-40 (PCGS) 1860-S Liberty Seated quarter, a bold EF-40 (PCGS) 1795 Draped Bust, Centered Bust silver dollar, a Proof-64 (PCGS) CAC 1905 Liberty Head quarter eagle, and a near-Gem MS-64 (PCGS) 1901-S Liberty Head double eagle.

The Pacific Rim Collection offers an impressive selection of silver dollars including such rarities as an 1873 Liberty Seated silver dollar graded Proof-64+ Cameo (PCGS), a Proof-66 (NGC) 1874 trade dollar, and a MS-66 (PCGS) 1921 High Relief Peace dollar.

The Jones Collection is a wide-ranging cabinet of rarities spanning from the very earliest issues to the renaissance of U.S. coinage in the early 20th century. The selection in these pages is highlighted by a key-date 1886-O Morgan silver dollar graded MS-64 (PCGS) and an 1892-CC Liberty Head double eagle graded AU-58 (PCGS).

An impressive variety of top-quality coins are also presented from the Huber Collection, featuring such outstanding items as a MS-64 (NGC) 1818 Capped Bust quarter, a MS-64 (PCGS) 1875 trade dollar, a Gem MS-65 (PCGS) 1888 three-Dollar gold piece, and a Gem MS-65 (PCGS) 1900 Lafayette dollar.

Beyond these named collections, we are pleased to offer numerous individual rarities including a historic AU-58 BN (NGC) "1781" Libertas Americana medal in bronze, a ca. 1790s signed sketch by Augustin Dupre (designer of the Libertas Americana medal), a 1825 John Quincy Adams Indian Peace medal in silver, a MS-64 RB (NGC) 1787 Fugio cent, a stunning MS-65+ RB (PCGS) CAC 1914-D Lincoln cent, a desirable MS-64 (PCGS) CAC 1842-O Liberty Seated half dollar with the Reverse of 1842, an exceptional 1814/3 Capped Head Left half eagle graded EF-45 (PCGS) CAC, and a Gem MS-66 (PCGS) 1899 Liberty Head eagle

This catalog is accompanied by several single-owner collections offered in dedicated catalogs. These separate catalogs include U.S. Colonial rarities presented from the Sydney F. Martin Collection, Liberty Head gold in our presentation of the JBR Set from the Fairmont Collection, Dahlonega gold treasures from the Georgia Gold Rush Collection, and a comprehensive set of Classic Head gold from the Virginian Collection.

We are also honored to present an exclusive selection of 35th Anniversary American Eagle coins on behalf of the United States Mint as part of our Summer 2022 Auction. These coins, deemed the American Eagle at Dawn and at Dusk Coins, will be presented in a dedicated catalog to recognize the importance of this unprecedented offering.

Of course, a remarkable array of world-class U.S. coin and cryptocurrency treasures are also presented in our stand-alone Rarities Night catalog.

Paul A. Volcker Biography



Born September 5, 1927 in Cape May, New Jersey to Paul Adolph and Alma Louise Klippel, Paul grew up in Teaneck New Jersey. He was active in student groups in high school, and developed a keen understanding of economics and politics.

After graduating with honors from Princeton's School of Public and Int-

ernational Affairs in 1949, he went on to Harvard University where he earned an M.A. in political economy from the Graduate School of Public Administration. During the summers, he served as research assistant for the Federal Reserve Bank of New York. After attending Harvard, Volcker went on to study at the London School of Economics under the Rotary Foundation's Ambassadorial Scholarships program.

Upon his return to the United States in 1952, Volcker joined the staff of the Federal Reserve Bank of New York as a fulltime economist. After five years there, he moved on to Chase Manhattan Bank where he served as a financial economist. In 1962 Volcker joined the U.S. Treasury Department as director of financial analysis and a year later, was appointed Deputy Undersecretary for monetary affairs. He returned to Chase Manhattan Bank as vice president and director of planning in 1965.

President Nixon appointed Volcker as Undersecretary of the Treasury for international monetary affairs, a position he held for five years. During that tenure, he was instrumental in eliminating the convertibility of gold to the dollar, ending the Bretton Woods system which had been in place for just over a quarter century. Following his work at the Treasury Department, Volcker became President of the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, a position he held from 1975 to 1979.

In July 1979, President Jimmy Carter nominated Paul Volcker to server as chairman of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System; he was confirmed by the Senate the following

month and was re-nominated four years later by President Reagan. Under Volcker's leadership, the Federal Reserve helped curb inflation, which had risen to nearly 15% in March 1980 – three years later it had fallen below 3%. The Fed under Volcker was also responsible for raising the federal funds rate, which resulted in extremely high interest rates during the early 1980s.

Paul Volcker left the Federal Reserve in 1987 and became Chairman of Wolfensohn & Co., a prominent New York investment banking firm. Throughout the 1990s he remained active, serving as the Chairman of various committees and task forces, among them the Independent Committee of Eminent Persons (Volcker Commission), the IFRS Foundation, the Group of Thirty. He received numerous awards from a variety of organizations.

Under Barack Obama, Volcker was selected to head the President's Economic Recovery Advisory Board. He was reported to be Obama's choice for Secretary of the Treasury, but as he was over 80 by then, he was considered too old. In 2013, Volcker founded the Volcker Alliance, a nonprofit organization to address the challenge of effective execution of public policies and to rebuild public trust in government.

In 1954, Volcker married Barbara Bahnson, and they had two children. After Barbara's death in 1998, he married Anke Dening in February 2010. Volcker died in New York City on December 8, 2019, at age 92. To say he had a most distinguished career and a life well-lived, would be an understatement.

The Andrew M. Hain Collection



We are pleased to present further coins from the Andrew M. Hain Collection in our Summer 2022 Global Showcase Auction. This is a provenance that requires no introduction among seasoned numismatists, one that is most famously associated with important Massachusetts silver coins and other early American rarities that

we offered in our January 2002 auction. Two decades later, we are again offering items from the Hain Collection. We featured a magnificent selection from this cabinet in our Spring 2022 auction and we are delighted to bring additional items to auction in the current catalog. Andrew Hain began working as a contractual coin appraiser for Carmel Stamp & Coin Company in 1989, after moving to Carmel from Pennsylvania. He was an avid movie viewer and financial analyst who enjoyed sharing his knowledge and appreciation of the cinema and wise investing with his friends and family. Andrew Hain died suddenly and peacefully at home on December 30, 2021, at the age of 74.

He is remembered for his kind and considerate nature and his willingness to serve others. In the words of Megan Terry of Carmel Stamp and Coin:

"Andy was an extraordinary person. He shared his insights, whether it was coins (he began collecting as a child with his Dad's encouragement), the stock market, movies he'd seen and enjoyed. He was modest, kind, and humorous. There are few people like him, at least in my experience, and I am blessed to have known him!"



David Lorenzo (Numismatist)



David A. Lorenzo, banker and coin collector, passed away in October 2020 at age 61. David was predeceased by his father Emil Lorenzo and his mother Carmen Pampin. He was born and raised in Massapequa Park, Long Island and was an expert historian of his current hometown Massapequa.

David graduated from Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Virginia with a Bachelor of Science in Business and went on to be a banker. He was a driven professional with an unmatched work ethic. His career as a Sr. Vice President of Middle Market Banking at JP Morgan Chase was a rewarding experience. He gained a great deal of respect from his clients and colleagues, and along the way, maintained his many friendships throughout his 27 years with the company.

David married Rita Leto in September 1998. They both graduated Massapequa High School in 1977 and fell in love at their 20-year high school reunion. They were married a year later and moved to Massapequa where they raised their daughter Jessica.

David was an avid coin collector and specialist of Standing Liberty Quarters. Although he never published in the numismatic field, he spent much time communicating with the late long-time collector and Standing Liberty Quarter specialist J.H. Cline. They corresponded regularly. David readily shared any new information with Mr. Cline that he would come across in his research. His older brother tried several times to broaden his numismatic reach as into U.S. Colonials, Tokens & Medals, and the like, but he continued with his "one" sole passion - Standing Liberty Quarters. His current Standing Liberty Quarter collection is an excellent display of his commitment to this numismatic series. David enjoyed perfection in his work and in his hobbies. He appreciated the complex motif style of these quarters where each date and mintmark set their own individual standards to what pieces were easily found well struck, with Full Heads and in many cases requiring a long pursuit for a singular high-quality item.

1670 British Colonization Medal. By Roettier. Betts-44, MI.203, Eimer-245, Rulau-E50A. Silver. AU-55 (NGC). 42 mm. A lovely example with vivid, mottled toning in rose-gray, antique gold, steelblue and orange-russet. Boldly stuck with just a touch of softness to the central obverse high point. The obverse of this type features conjoined busts of King Charles II and Catharine of Braganza. The English king's marriage to the daughter of King Joao IV of Portugal in 1622 gave his kingdom a foothold in South America (Brazil) and the East Indies.

1782 Frisian Recognition of American Independence Medal. By B.C.V. Calker. Betts-602. Silver. MS-62 (NGC). 44 mm. Prooflike fields support frosty, smartly impressed design elements on both sides of this pretty piece. Brilliant apart from blushes of light iridescent toning that appear to drift toward the borders. Frisia was the first of the Dutch states to recognize American independence from Britain. Quite symbolic, this medal illustrates a Frisian in ancient armor holding the hand of a young Indian Maiden representing America while holding back Britain who, while holding out an olive branch, stands with her lion at her side and a snake in the grass at her feet.

FRANCO-AMERICAN JETONS





1752 Franco-American Jeton. Compagnie des Indes Occidentales. Lecompte-112b, Betts-387 var. Silver. Reeded Edge. MS-63 (PCGS). 28.8 mm. 7.24 grams. Coin alignment. A popular addition to the Betts series, muling the reverse of Betts-384 with the obverse of Betts-387, a combination seen often enough to wonder how Betts missed it. With handsome pewter-gray patina to lustrous satin surfaces. Boldly struck. Survivors from these dies usually appear with significant handling and this one is nicer than most.

1754 Franco-American Jeton. Beavers Building a Dam. Lecompte-129, Betts-389, Breton-514, Frossard-33. Silver. Reeded Edge. AU Details—Cleaned (PCGS). 28.8 mm. Coin alignment. Untoned apart from wisps of iridescent color here and there around the peripheries, this piece retains appreciable semi-prooflike luster in the fields on both sides.





1755 Franco-American Jeton. The Argonauts and the Golden Fleece. Lecompte-150, Betts-390, Breton-515, Frossard-36. Copper. Plain Edge. AU-55 (PCGS). 29 mm. Coin alignment. A handsome, fully original example with blushes of steel-olive to dominant autumnbrown patina. Traces of ancient surface build up are associated with some of the deeper color, although these features do not detract from the medal's appearance in hand. The reverse legend and imagery takes its inspiration from the classics, depicting the vessel of Jason and his Argonauts but with a beaver pelt in place of the Golden Fleece. The legend, translated as "not less valuable than the golden one" drives home the point that riches were to be had in Canada's fur trade.

Comitia Americana & Revolutionary Era

Important 1777 Gates at Saratoga Obverse Splasher Only the Fifth Specimen Confirmed A Newcomer to the Census

Undated (1777) Horatio Gates at Saratoga Obverse Cliche. Original Striking. Workshop of Nicolas-Marie Gatteaux. Adams-Bentley 4, Betts-557, Julian MI-2. Tin. MS-63 (PCGS). 55 mm. Plain edge. Paper backed, although little fiber remains, many areas showing bare metal. Produced before the delivery of the gold medal in May 1787, this is among the earliest surviving impressions of Gatteaux's Gates obverse. This is an exceptionally well made and preserved specimen, the impression sharply executed with all design features fully rendered and crisp. Even pewter-gray color to the obverse, the surface is satiny in texture and generally smooth. Minor marks at the left and right borders are easily overlooked, more noticeable are shallow marks at the back of Gates' cheek and in the upper field between the top of his head and the letter D in DUCI. This die had not yet been polished enough to create the separation of Gates' external (our left, his right) lapel, indicating the early origin of this impression.

This is only the fifth Gates obverse splasher of which we are aware, only three of which are in private hands, as follows:

1 - **PCGS MS-63**. **The present example**. Prior provenance unknown, but perhaps offered in Godefroy Mayer's fixed price list of 1913, lot 355.

2 - **PCGS MS-62**. Ex Harry Forman to John J. Ford, Jr., November 4, 1967; our (Stack's) sale of the John J. Ford, Jr. Collection, Part XIV, May 2006, lot 196; our sale of the Dorchester Heights Collection, August 2012 Philadelphia ANA Auction, lot 4075; our sale of the John W. Adams Collection, November 2009 Baltimore Auction, lot 2009.

3 - **Extremely Fine**. Ex Richard Margolis, privately to the following, January 2010; our sale of the John W. Adams Collection, November 2009 Baltimore Auction, lot 2010.

The other two specimens are impounded in French museum collections, one at the Musée Carnavalet and the other at the museum of Montauban (which also has a reverse cliche).

While we know of no provenance prior to the present piece's consignment to this sale, it is suggestive that the sole historic appearance of a lone obverse cliche of the Gates medal we've recorded comes from the too-little-known fixed price list issued in 1913 by Godefroy Mayer of Paris. Entitled "Old Paintings, Drawings, Miniatures, Statuettes, Busts, Snuff Boxes, Bonbonnieres, Medallions, Medals, and Other Objects of Art Related to America," Mayer's offering was extraordinary: silver original strikes of Howard and William Washington, splashers of Gates and Morgan, a uniface Dupre Franklin medal in bronze, along with five (!) cliches of the Libertas Americana medal and a set of large plasters representing the central device of each side. We tentatively assigned the Mayer provenance to the secondary Adams Collection specimen (lot 2010) in our November 2019 cataloging, although given the European source of this PCGS MS-63 specimen, a stronger argument can be made for it being the piece offered by Mayer in 1913 as lot 355. It is, in any event, a newcomer to the census of Gates obverse splashers that is making its first auction appearance in the modern U.S. market.

Our November 2019 cataloging of the John W. Adams Collection included this extensive "Note On Trials: Clichés, Épreuves, and Splashers," which we reproduce here, with slight modifications, for the benefit of current bidders:

The Adams Collection of Comitia Americana and related medals was uniquely enriched by several specimens of a unique form of medallic production that is known by several different names. Typically struck from a die in its earliest state, usually before hardening, these trials were called épreuves — proofs — in the original French correspondence between Dupre and Duvivier and the Founding Fathers charged with the acquisition of the medals the Continental Congress authorized. In more modern numismatic literature, they are more often called clichés or splashers, the latter term being a fair description of just how these trials were made.

Unhardened dies are incredibly susceptible to damage, as 18th century die steel (and modern steel today) is brittle before it is hardened by quenching. Once a die is hardened, modification becomes very difficult, so if changes need to be made, they need to be done in that fragile, unhardened state. Engravers in major mints — Paris especially — were accustomed to making soft metal impressions as something of a proofreading copy, enabling the negative die to be viewed in the positive in rough draft form. Wax impressions were liable to leave bits of wax in the interstices of design elements, thus engravers settled upon tin (usually called "white metal" in modern numismatic circles) as the best medium.

Tin melts at 450 degrees Fahrenheit, a low enough melting point to be accomplished in any small workshop. A ladle full of molten tin poured onto a surface will cool and harden fairly quickly, but remain soft long enough that a die can be easily pushed into it by hand, leaving a relatively durable impression in medal. Most often, medalists would find a piece of scrap paper — a note, a newspaper, a book page — to pour the tin atop, thus preventing their workspace from getting scorched and making the tin sheet somewhat easier to lift and trim.

These splashers were not intended to be medals, or even permanent, but simply a temporary way to display the state of the die in the positive before its devices were rendered immovable. Each was personally crafted by the engraver in his shop. In the case of the Comitia Americana medals, the épreuves made by Duvivier, Dupre, and Gatteaux were ultimately intended to be viewed and handled by themselves and those close to the process. Benjamin Franklin reviewed the épreuves of the De Fleury medal between April 20 and May 4, 1780, then made recommendations regarding the lettering in the obverse exergue that were adopted by Duvivier. He later did the same with his Libertas Americana medal, correcting a spelling error on the reverse. Engraver Augustin Dupre retained many of his splashers in his personal collection, some of which found their way into institutions in France and the United States.

Thomas Jefferson used clichés as a spendthrift (and lightweight) way to collect all the medals of the Comitia Americana series, assembling a set for himself and another for his Virginia countryman James Madison. As he was preparing to depart Paris in September 1789, he wrote to Madison to let him know of the boxes he was shipping, including a box of books and several crates full of Houdon's John Paul Jones busts that the sitter wanted to have distributed in America.

"I have put a collection of the proofs in tin of the medals voted by the U. S. (except two, of which the dies are in America) the medals themselves not being allowed to be taken, I desired the workmen to let me have two sets of their last proofs; for their manner is, as their work proceeds, to make impressions of it in pure tin, in order to correct &c. These proofs are in fact more delicate than the medals themselves, and the last of them shew the impressions complete. I have had them arranged in a frame, under glass &c. & beg your acceptance of them."

By "delicate," Jefferson did not mean fragile, but well-detailed. The modern whereabouts of these sets are unknown.

Today, clichés of each of the Comitia Americana medals are extremely rare, with populations in the low single digits. There is not a single issue in this format that is known to the extent of eight or 10 pieces. Matched sets of obverse and reverse are the exception rather than the rule. Each of the survivors is an accident, a piece that was made to serve a purpose at a moment in time, not produced for long-term preservation in a cabinet. Their historicity is exceptional, as each survivor was not only in the hands of the medal's engraver, but likely in the hands of Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, David Humphreys, or a small number of others. Their rarity surpasses that of their normally struck cognates in nearly every circumstance.

Stunning Superb Gem Daniel Morgan at Cowpens Medal

A little planchet fissure crosses the rim below the right end of the reverse exergual line, but this



piece is both well made and well preserved. The tiniest bruise is seen in the high wire rim above the space between DANIELI and MORGAN on the obverse. This specimen was coined from exactingly produced copy dies made at the Paris Mint in 1839. The dies were shipped to Philadelphia and put into use there, but some examples may have been struck at the Paris Mint before shipment. This is a choice example of this famous Comitia Americana issue, one whose originals are extraordinarily rare and almost never encountered.

Both sides retain nearly full, razor sharp striking detail with only a trace of high point rub and a few wispy handling marks explaining the NGC grade. The die state is advanced here with the obverse break beneath the digit 4 in the date reaching its fullest extent. While the spalling pit beneath the second letter A in AMERICANA is a bit larger here than on earlier strikes, the spalling trail in the lower right obverse remains fairly stable over the course of the die state continuum. There is almost nothing we can say about the Libertas Americana medal that has not been said before. It is the most recognizable early American medal, the unanimous choice as #1 in the *100 Greatest Medals and Tokens* book, and the inspiration for many of the United States coinage designs of the 18th century. It is legendary beyond its rarity, historic beyond its celebrated creation narrative, and important far beyond the world of numismatics.

Cognizant of the historic moment they occupied, and appreciative of Franklin's largesse, it seems that most recipients of a Libertas Americana medal cherished it. The bulk of the mintage seems to have survived. Of course, to an 18th century non-numismatist, cherishing something meant handling it, displaying it, perhaps cleaning it now and again, thus few survive in Gem condition. The total population — perhaps 200 or so — is heavily weighted toward those with some handling, as here.

An Extraordinary Original Sketch by Augustin Dupre Signed "Dupre"

A superb original piece of art by one of France's greatest medalists, best known in America for his execution of the Libertas Americana medal on behalf of Benjamin Franklin, and signed by the artist in the same distinctive signature seen on his majestic medal for Daniel Morgan at Cowpens. The portrait is executed entirely in pencil, shaded with great expertise, depicting his infant son Narcisse huddled against a simple tall chair. A tiny defect is seen in the left field, not affecting the portrait, and a trivial stain is seen at the right margin. The condition and presentation is excellent. This portrait was passed down with many of Dupre's drawings through his son, the sitter, to a business partner and his descendants, before being sold as an archive in a New York Bonham's auction in 2014 for \$351,000.

While most of the Dupre sketches in the archive were somewhat numismatic, only two appear to have depicted Narcisse. This is the finer and more attractive of the two.

We have previously offered a Dupre sketch for the lion depicted on the Libertas Americana medal (October 2015, lot 2, \$18,212) and the 1790 Diplomatic medal (October 2015, lot 4, \$70,500). This is only the third piece of Dupre's art we've been fortunate to offer at public auction.

The dies, accomplished by Anthony C. Paquet at the Philadelphia Mint, were personally commissioned and paid for by General Benjamin Butler. Many sources attribute these medals to Tiffany & Co., but Mint records show 197 silver and 11 bronze examples being struck in Philadelphia. Further, a letter from Reuben D. Mussey, private secretary to President Andrew Johnson, dated July 1, 1865 noted:

"I saw at the Mint the other day some medals ordered by you for colored troops. I wish very much to procure one of them. I am not a 'colored soldier' nor have I 'ever shown conspicuous bravery,' but directly and indirectly with putting arms into the hands of ten thousand colored soldiers. The Director of the Mint informed me that it was necessary to have your permission to purchase one."

This letter appears in private and official correspondence of Gen. Benjamin F. Butler: during the period of the Civil War, Volume 5. Butler conceived of the medal as an American answer to the medals issued to veterans of the Crimean War, but to recognize in particular the bravery of the African-American troops who served under his command during the Richmond-Petersburg campaign. He wrote in his autobiography *Butler's Book* in 1892:

"...I had done for the negro soldiers, by my own order, what the government has never done for its white soldiers - I had a medal struck of like size, weight, quality, fabrication and intrinsic value with those which Queen Victoria gave with her own hand to her distinguished private soldiers of the Crimea."

The legend on the scroll at the top of the medal's obverse can be translated to "Freedom will be theirs by the sword," an appropriate epitaph for those brave African-Americans who so served. The Federal government waited some 50 years before decorating Union veterans.

Today, this exceptionally important and historic medal is avidly sought by both collectors of Civil War memorabilia as well as collectors of black history, and it holds the distinction of being the first and only medal ever struck to honor black troops. Its historical and sociological value would be difficult to overstate.

Exceedingly Rare Copper Julian MI-30 U.S. Colored Troops Medal Only 11 Struck

The 5th Light Battery of Massachusetts Volunteer Militia was organized in May 1869 at and around Boston. In 1875, the Massachusetts Militias were reorganized and the 5th Light Battery, probably armed with at least six brass 12-pounders and perhaps a Gatling gun or two, was relocated to Worcester. Perhaps 130 or so officers and enlisted men made up the artillery battery and support groups.

Lovely Choice Mint State Julian NA-24 in Silver

"1846" The Mexican War / Loss of the Somers Medal. By Charles Cushing Wright. Julian NA-24. Silver. MS-63 (NGC). 58 mm. Edge inscribed to the recipient JOHN COCKRELL, GUNNER's MATE. Exceptional quality for this classic Naval medal. Both sides exhibit a base of pearl-gray patina with iridescent reddish-gold and steel-olive overtones that are most pronounced at the peripheries. Modestly semi-reflective in the fields, the design elements are frosty and sharply rendered. A few wispy handling marks explain the Choice Mint State grade from NGC, the only one of note well concealed within the clouds on the obverse.

Authorized by Congress on March 3, 1847, production of the Loss of the Somers medal did not commence until the fall of 1850. The original reverse die prepared by Wright contained an engraving error in the legend: PRO VITA AMERICANA PRESERVANDA (For Having Saved An American Life) instead of PRO VITIS AMERICANORUM CONSERVATIS (For Having Saved American Lives). (A rare surviving example struck from the original reverse is offered below, in the following lot.) When the error was discovered at the Navy Department, Wright was forced to prepare a completely new reverse die, which promptly cracked when being hardened at the Mint. Wright presumably prepared yet a third reverse die, from which the ordered 10 gold and 100 silver impressions were finally struck. These pieces were first offered for sale in 1861. This silver piece, from the properly prepared reverse die, is exceptionally well preserved and would fit nicely into a specialized cabinet.

Exceedingly Rare Julian NA-25 Loss of the Somers Medal with Error Reverse

"1846" The Mexican War / Loss of the Somers Medal. By Charles Cushing Wright. Julian NA-25. Bronze. Error Reverse. Mint State, PVC Residue. 58 mm. A handsome piece despite our stated qualifier, the surfaces present as generally autumn-brown in color. They are attractively and originally preserved, and also nicely so with no blemishes of note apart from a small obverse carbon spot above the letter R in CRUZ. Our qualifier concerns a light film of PVC residue that is most pronounced on the edge.

As noted above in our description for the silver Julian NA-24, the original reverse die that Wright prepared for this medal contained an engraving error in the legend: PRO VITA AMERICANA PRESERVANDA (For Having Saved An American Life) instead of PRO VITIS AMERICANORUM CONSERVATIS (For Having Saved American Lives). The ordered 10 gold and 100 silver impressions were initially struck from this reverse die, but when the error was discovered all were melted and the bullion re-used for the final examples produced from the corrected, successfully hardened (i.e., Wright's third) die. However, a small number of bronze examples struck from the error reverse escaped destruction. These are rare today, this being the first one that we can recall offering, at least in recent decades. It would make a significant addition to an advanced cabinet, either on its own or alongside the silver NA-24 in the preceding lot.

BRITISH INDIAN PEACE MEDALS

Choice Small-Size 1814 George III Medal Ex Lucien LaRiviere

1814 George III Indian Peace Medal. Silver. Small Size. Adams-14.2. Specimen-61 (PCGS). 553.2 grains. Original suspension hanger. Handsome light silver-gray surfaces with soft overtones of pale blue and gold at a certain angle to the light. Slightly deeper toning close to the rims, but the overall appearance is uniform light gray, accented by soft original luster. Beautifully struck, with sharp expression of all details including the bold signature of Wyon at George's truncation. At least one seen appears to be missing this detail, but whether it was struck before the signature was added or if it was carefully tooled away is unknown. That medal appeared in our (Stack's) October 2006 Ford XVI Sale, at lot 77. This is the rarest size of the 1814-dated medals, and one of just nine medals listed in John Adams' census. It is certified by PCGS as the Lucien LaRiviere specimen, which seems to correspond to Adams' example number 6, "Private Collection, Rhode Island. Near Mint, possibly with a new reverse," further noted as "Not seen." The reverse is the same as that on others we have handled, however. A perfectly lovely medal, as one would expect from this particular provenance, as Mr. LaRiviere was known and is remembered foremost for his excellent taste in every series he collected.

Very Choice 1825 John Quincy Adams Medal The First Size in Silver

1825 John Quincy Adams Indian Peace Medal. Silver. First Size. Julian IP-11, Prucha-42. Extremely Fine. 75.6 mm. 2508.8 grains. Pierced for suspension at 12 o'clock, as issued. A particularly choice example with lovely gray surfaces accented by faint gold and pale blue toning in the fields. Though this is clearly an issued and worn medal, evidence of same is limited to many tiny marks over both sides, a few microscopic thin scratches and a couple of tiny rim marks. There are no marks serious enough to warrant specific mention, which is a bit unusual for these large medals. As a result, this is unusually nice looking, and it retains superb sharpness through the finer details. It was struck at least three times, and faint outlines from these multiple impressions are visible around some of the

letters on both sides. A single distinct collar mark is noted on the edge at 6 o'clock. It would appeal both to purist Peace medal collectors who seek medals that were used by Native Americans, but also to collectors more concerned with U.S. Mint medals or early American medallic art in general, who might be more sensitive to state of preservation and aesthetic concerns.

One of 22 such medals known to the present writer, though nine of these are held in institutional collections. This is the finest one we have handled since our October 2006 Ford XVI sale.

Rare Second Size John Quincy Adams in Silver Nine Known in Private Hands

1825 John Quincy Adams Indian Peace Medal. Silver. Second Size. Julian IP-12, Prucha-42. Extremely Fine. 62.4 mm. 1565.0 grains. Pierced for suspension at 12 o'clock, as issued. Another pleasantly sharp medal from the John Quincy Adams administration, this being the second of three issued sizes and the second scarcest of the three. Deep steel patina throughout, but with a somewhat flashy appearances due in part to some lingering prooflike character in the fields, but also to some polishing by well-meaning non-numismatic owners long ago — a detail not unusual among these medals that were objects deeply esteemed by their Native American recipients. This one

was clearly issued and used for its intended purpose, with the usual minor scattered handling marks over both sides. A small series of scratches is noted at the upper reverse, while a couple of small rim nicks help to identify this one as from the William Guthman Collection, sold by Sotheby's in 2005.

As noted, this is the second scarcest of the three sizes issued by Adams and one of 15 known to the writer. Just nine of these are believed to be in private collections, and among them this is probably the second-finest example.

Second Size Andrew Jackson Peace Medal A Silver Original

1829 Andrew Jackson Indian Peace Medal. Silver. Second Size. Julian IP-15, Prucha-43. Fine. 62 mm. 1403.6 grains. Holed for suspension at 12 o'clock, with an old silver loop still present. A well-worn awarded medal depicting the American president with perhaps the most infamous record relating to Native Americans. Attractive deep gray over surfaces pebbled with contact marks from extensive use, more deeply toned at the rims. The central reverse, below AND, retains some of the original surface texture, but nearly all other areas show light contact marks. A few minor rim marks are noted, most serious over PE of PEACE. The central devices still show good overall detail, and the visual impact is very appealing. This is a rare issue, and the rarest of the three sizes issued. John J. Ford owned just one Jackson of this size (a high-grade piece that sold for \$28,750), and Michael Hodder noted records on just three

others, one of which was in the ANS. The present writer has accounted for 13 distinct specimens, but at least five of these are in institutional collections.

Jackson medals are from a pivotal time in Native American history. The Jackson administration passed the 1830 Indian Removal Act which effectively accelerated the movement of Native people from their eastern homelands to reserved territories west of the Mississippi. This is the Act that paved the way for the infamous, Trail of Tears, the forced removal of thousands of Cherokee in 1838 and 1839.

Original Andrew Jackson Peace Medal in Silver Third Size

1829 Andrew Jackson Indian Peace Medal. Silver. Third Size. Julian IP-16, Prucha-43. Fine Details—Tooled (NGC). 50.9 mm. 767.3 grains. Neatly pierced at 12 o'clock, as issued. Medium gray-silver with more deeply toned outlines around the devices and close to the rims. The initial eye appeal is satisfying. Closer study reveals many fine scratches, tiny nicks and other impairments that are often seen on Peace medals that were used as intended. Notwithstanding the noted handling, the medal retains fairly good detail for the condition, with all major elements clear. A fairly even appearance and clearly an original

medal, which must be mentioned specifically for small-size issues as there are a number of later U.S. Mint restrikes that have passed as genuine in the marketplace for years. A single small die chip is noted inside the reverse rim at 3 o'clock on this piece. Later impressions, struck in 1850 or later, bear two small chips in this area. As such, the purist collector who desires the real thing — a medal awarded to and worn by a ranking member of some Native American group — is getting it in this example. The writer is aware of 17 original Jackson medals in this size, three of which are in institutional collections.

Impressive 1837 Van Buren Peace Medal The First Size in Silver Ex Garrett Collection

1837 Martin Van Buren Indian Peace Medal. Silver. First Size. Julian IP-17, Prucha-44. Extremely Fine. 75.4 mm. 2284.5 grains. Pierced for suspension at 12 o'clock, as issued. A lovely medal with medium to light silver-gray dominating both sides. Generous accents of soft gold and blue-green are noted on the obverse, particularly in the protected recesses. The reverse is more uniform gray, but nuances of toning can be detected in places. Another clearly issued and worn medal, but like others offered here, this medal has seen only gentle use and exhibits almost no noteworthy marks. Only a short scratch by the pipe bowl deserves mention. Otherwise, the standard myriad tiny surface nicks and a couple of rim marks are the only imperfections. Beautifully detailed, quite handsome and carrying one of the most legendary American provenances, that of the Garrett family. One of 17 specimens known to the writer, five of which are in institutional collections.

Rare Third Size Van Buren Medal in Silver

1837 Martin Van Buren Indian Peace Medal. Silver. Third Size. Julian IP-19. Prucha-44. Very Fine. 50.9 mm. 772.9 grains. Pierced for suspension as usual, with the hole fairly well worn and the rim above starting to thin somewhat. Soft blue and champagne toning over deep steel gray surfaces that are just a bit lighter on the high points. Scattered nicks and marks as expected for an awarded and worn Peace medal. A couple of heavier digs are noted left of the portrait and at the right wrist on the reverse. These marks seem to correspond to a very gentle bend in the flan. Small rim nicks are also noted. Though this has certainly seen some use and there is some resulting softness on the details in the highest areas of relief, traces of reflectivity remain in the fields and the eye appeal is quite satisfying.

Struck from the early state of the reverse die with a small die chip outside of the inner rim border just below the 3 o'clock position. This die was used to strike all of the medals of this size bearing dates 1809 through 1845 and would eventually develop a secondary break beneath the one just described. Carl Carlson recorded only five auction records for this size, the smallest number of appearances for the three sizes in silver. John Ford owned three small size Van Burens in silver, compared to two of the medium size and four of the largest size. The Ford appearances correspond to the relative rarities of the sizes that the writer has found in his survey of surviving specimens. Thirteen specimens have been accounted for, one of which is suspected but not confirmed by an image. Four of these are in institutional collections at the ANS, Colonial Williamsburg, the Jefferson National Expansion Memorial in St. Louis and Massachusetts Historical Society. This medal has a nice provenance back to the David Dreyfuss Collection sold in 1986, the first major offering of Indian Peace medals since the 1981 Garrett sale seemingly invigorated interest in this series.

Franklin Pierce Peace Medal in Silver The First Size

1853 Franklin Pierce Indian Peace medal. Silver. First Size. Julian IP-32, Prucha-49. EF Details—Tooled (NGC). 76 mm. Neatly pierced at 12 o'clock, as issued. Fairly light silver-gray with gentle darkening close to the rims, through the letters of the legends and around the design features. The surfaces feature many tiny marks, some long ago smoothed over from continued wear as typical of an awarded and worn Peace medal. There are many fine scratches, a bit of tooling, and many hairlines, again, all as typical. One small obverse rim bump is probably the only mark that stands out quickly as most of the handling is minor and well scattered about the large surface area. The even wear is not by any means severe, as superb detail remains on both sides and the eye appeal is really quite nice for one of these medals.

Intriguing remnants of initials can be found on both sides of this piece. In most numismatic cases, engraved initials are negative, but on Indian Peace medals, such evidence is tantalizing as a potential starting point for identifying a Native American recipient or owner. In this case, it seems that the fine engravings are simply G.S.M., in cursive, in the left field of both sides. The obverse might have an additional letter. Though an attempt to efface this from the reverse was clearly undertaken, the initials are clear under close examination.

This is one of just 15 large size Franklin Pierce medals confirmed by the present writer. Curiously, only one of these 15 seems to be in an institutional collection. Two others have been reported in museums but have not been confirmed. The fact that so few are in museum holdings, leaving nearly all to circulate amongst collectors, has given the impression that this is a more common issue than it really is.

1862 Abraham Lincoln Indian Peace Medal. Copper, Bronzed. First Size. Julian IP-38, Prucha-51, Cunningham 22-020Bz, King-520. Second Reverse. MS-65 BN (NGC). 76 mm. A lovely medal and easily the nicest bronze impression we have handled in years. Rich mahogany surfaces are lightly mottled from what was probably an imperfection in the bronzing process that often results in such a patina. Still, the colors are very pleasing. Virtually mark free as one should expect for the grade, with just a few tiny dark flecks noted under magnification. The exceptional Larry Ness Collection of Peace Medals, one of the most complete ever formed, included an NGCgraded MS-62, which realized \$2,160 in our March 2020 sale. This one is considerably nicer and more attractive in every respect and would be ideal for any collector of Peace medals, U.S. Mint medals or medallic portraits of Lincoln.

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1871 Ulysses S. Grant Indian Peace Medal. Silver. Julian IP-42, Prucha-53. Choice Extremely Fine. 63.2 mm. 1734.2 grains. Pierced for suspension at 12 o'clock, as usual, with the original loop. Deep steel-gray patina over most of the surface, with some lighter areas on the high points and in the right obverse field. Traces of soft blue and gold are noted in the recesses. Though clearly an awarded and worn medal, this remains sharply detailed and shows only the usual scattered tiny contact marks. A couple of rim nicks seem virtually unavoidable on these medals, but the busy design of the rim on this issue helps to mask those.

There are 57 examples in the present writer's census of specimens, 14 of which are in institutional collections. This is the most available of all the American Peace medal issues, but in

recent times it has grown in both popularity and price. It is the ideal entry into the series for a new collector of Peace medals, but it also holds appeal for those collecting the Civil War or American medals in general. This design type is very interesting in that, though it was struck as an "Indian Peace medal," references to Native Americans are virtually nonexistent, aside from the single small pipe motif below the presidential portrait on the obverse. The design here is more reflective of a general sentiment of world peace, illustrated plainly by the reverse, which is an understandable sentiment for the administration of Ulysses S. Grant, in the years just after the close of the War. In some ways, this medal has much more to do with the Civil War than it does Native Americans, though the latter might have been the official intended audience.

Undated (ca. 1777) Voltaire Medal. Musante GW-1, Baker-78B. Bronze. MS-64 BN (NGC). 40.5 mm. An immensely handsome specimen of this classic issue. Glossy deep mahogany-brown surfaces with considerable intermingling of olive patina. Roughness along the rims from 8 to 12 o'clock on the obverse, 12 to 4 o'clock on the reverse is as made, as is some light pitting in the center of the reverse and a tiny pit in the upper left obverse field. There are no marks or other blemishes of note, and the strike is sharply executed with crisp detail throughout the design. Evidence of double striking is present at the peripheral legends on both sides for those who care to search for it. Struck from a later die state with gentle buckling in the obverse, a small rim cud near 7 o'clock and the frequently seen spalling at the central reverse, although the cud is partially obscured by the aforementioned roughness to the obverse rim.

Long considered the first Washington portrait medal, though the portrait is representative only and clearly not an attempt at Washington's true visage, this medal is of prime importance for inclusion in any collection of Washingtoniana. This example is a pleasure to study and would be suitable for the finest of collections.

"1732" (1959) Washington Born Virginia Copper. Albert Collis Restrike. Musante GW-37, Baker-22C. Silver. MS-64 (NGC). Flashy silver-white surfaces with just a trace of light golden iridescence evident at direct viewing angles. A rare version of this modern restrike from the original obverse die, Musante (2016) reports a mintage of just 22 in silver.

The Norweb Hero of Freedom Overstruck on a 1797 Penny

1800 Hero of Freedom Medal. Musante GW-81, Baker-79BA. Copper. MS-62 BN (NGC). 38.3 mm. 424.0 grains. Uniformly dark chocolate-brown surfaces on both sides. The reverse is smooth and prooflike, with what appears to be considerable reflectivity beneath a layer of natural oil. The obverse exhibits shallow granularity in places, giving it a somewhat more matte appearance. Struck over a 1797 British penny, with evidence of the undertype visible in several places, most notably the D of D:G and the E of REX are seen on the right obverse, near the D of DEC and AE, respectively. When we sold this as part of the Norweb Collection in November 2006, it was still believed that such overstrikes were very rare variants. More recent observations have led the writer to believe that most if not all of these were on such hosts. Most with obvious undertypes visible are boldly struck, as here, with excellent definition through Washington's hair strands, an area sometimes quite weak. A scarce and popular memorial medal struck very shortly after Washington's death in December, 1799. Though we have had an unusually flurry of appearances in recent sales from a collection that included several, these are quite scarce and the provenance of this one to one of the great American collections sets it a bit apart from many.

"1819" Series Numismatica Medal. First Issue. By Vivier. Musante GW-98, Baker-132. Bronze. MS-66 BN (NGC). 41 mm. The edge is not visible through the NGC holder, and its style is not noted on the insert. We have identified several die combinations of this attribution in recent years, although the present example matches the dies pictured in the Musante reference. This is a richly original, evenly toned example with a smooth, frosty texture that includes modest hints of semi-reflectivity in the fields. A lovely Gem specimen of this early entry into the expansive *Series Numismatica*, medals that celebrated over 150 famous persons. As a group, they are generally considered common, but this attractive Washington portrait piece is among the most desired in the entire series.





"1819" (ca. 1845-1860) Series Numismatica Medal. By John R. Bacon. Musante GW-101, Baker-130. Bronze. MS-67 BN (NGC). 41 mm. Pointing hand privy mark and CUIVRE on the edge indicates the given date range, a variant not listed in the Rulau-Fuld revision of *Medallic Portraits*. This virtually pristine beauty reveals semi-reflective tendencies in the fields and delicate powder blue and champagne-pink undertones as the surfaces dip into a light. Otherwise richly toned in copper-brown with a full strike, frosty texture and silky smooth appearance. Per Musante's research, John Bacon was commissioned to cut this new obverse die after production of the *Series Numismatica* medals was returned to France. (From 1826 to 1844, Durand had the medals in this series struck in Munich.) As he noted that production of Bacon's dies concluded in 1846, it would seem that the Paris Mint privy mark seen on this piece dates it to the later part of the run.



Choice Heroes of Liberty Medal

(ca. 1841-1845) Cercle Britannique or Heroes of Liberty Medal. Musante GW-149, Baker-196R. Copper. Edge: CUIVRE and prow. MS-63 (PCGS). 50 mm. A beautiful example of this seemingly under appreciated medal. Glossy mahogany-brown surfaces are uniform except for a couple of small areas of deeper patina against Washington's head. Very attractive, with just a few minor scattered marks to account for the grade. A finely rendered and large medal from a period that produced relatively little in honor of Washington, a bit of a middle ground between the immediate aftermath of his loss and the strong resurgence of a market for his portraits in the 1850s. This is believed to have been conceived by the Cercle Britannique upon the death of Lafayette in 1834. While the Rulau-Fuld reference makes a distinction between originals and "restrikes," we suspect that these were simply made to order by the Paris Mint over a small number of years, and if a particular vintage dictated a Paris Mint privy mark, it was so applied. All seen seem to have a similar appearance, so it is unlike other issues struck in one era and then produced in a second era, a couple of decades later. No meaningful indicator of different die states has been noticed. They are likely all "originals," to be proper. According to Musante, this medal did not appear in the Paris Mint catalogue until 1838, so this one was struck between three and eight years after the first known offering.

Superb Silver Tyrant Alcohol

Undated (ca. 1841) Washington Temperance Benevolent Society or Tyrant Alcohol Medalet. Second Dies. Musante GW-163, Baker-332. Silver. Reeded Edge. MS-65 (PCGS). 20.8 mm. 48.7 grains. Unpierced and without question among the nicest examples we have seen. Virtually brilliant silver surfaces exhibit only a trace of soft gray and olive toning at the upper obverse. Spalling through the reverse field as usually seen on unpierced examples, but otherwise the fields are virtually prooflike and the piece has a lively appearance



as a result. Sharply struck with crisp definition of the rims and reeded edges. Most of these tokens were produced in the 1840s for those who had sworn off alcohol as part of the sweeping temperance movement of the day. As such, most were pierced for suspension. These unpierced pieces, with their later die states, are probably slightly later collector strikes, but they are rare and quite desirable. Even the esteemed William Spohn Baker collection included one just like this, though the present one is struck much better.

1889 Inaugural Centennial Thirteen Links Medal. Musante GW-187, Douglas-52. Bronze. MS-66 BN (PCGS). 54 mm. A virtually pristine example with semi-reflective fields supporting frosty, fully struck motifs. Original autumn-brown patina throughout, a tiny

Intensely reflective and brilliant fields contrast beautifully with the sharply frosted motifs. There are a few light hairlines, but this example is far superior to the usual one seen; the eye appeal is

rather stunning. The Chapman brothers published these medals in 1889, in celebration of the centennial anniversary of Washington's inauguration. The obverse bust was famously from an engraved punch accomplished by Charles Cushing Wright, in 1853.

1853 New York Crystal Palace Medal. By Alexander C. Morin and Anthony Paquet. Musante GW-191, Baker-361A. Bronze. MS-63 BN (NGC). 52 mm. Reflective fields and frosty motifs are awash in richly original chocolate-brown patina. The strike is sharp, and both sides exhibit plenty of good gloss. Faint hairlines are noted for accuracy, but there are no significant signs of handling. This medal is truly rare in all compositions, although silver examples are very rare and considered the most prized. Our electronic archives include only four examples in bronze over the past 15 years (and a lone example in white metal). The last bronze example brought just over \$2,600 in November 2019 sale of the William Spohn Baker Collection. Reported in 1864 to be one of 35 struck, but we suspect that this number likely included examples of all three compositions, as the rarity today does not support the original distribution of more than 100 Crystal Palace medals.

With a single tiny piecing on edge at 2 o'clock for mounting. The details of the seal are crisp and fully executed with virtually no signs of obvious handling. Handsome brassy-olive color overall with some deeper bronze tinting outlining the peripheral design elements. Examples of this type were often mounted for display, although this piece was not and retains a rough, irregular edge, as made. The original seal design was finalized on April 30, 1863, and features an equestrian Washington portrait at center, with the inscription, THE CONFEDERATE STATES OF AMERICA : 22 FEBRUARY 1862 \star DEO VINDICE \star around. Readers of this sale will likely know that February 22nd was Washington's birthday, but it was also the day selected for CSA President Jefferson Davis' inauguration. The original embossing dies were produced by Joseph S. Wyon in England, and shipped to the Confederate States. Electrotype copies such as this are said to have been made in the 1870s and sold in limited numbers to raise funds for the benefit of Confederate widows and orphans, according to research by Musante.



Undated (ca. 1864) Washington's Letter to Hamilton Medal. By John Adams Bolen. Musante GW-675, Baker-257B, Musante JAB-11. White Metal. MS-62 (PCGS). 58.5 mm. 71.5 grams. Some traces of reflectivity in the fields, but hairlined and somewhat handled. A few tiny nicks noted on the portrait, as well as around the obverse rim. Nicely struck, as typical of this medal, and quite pleasing overall. There is considerable lack of clarity as to the numbers of Letter to Hamilton medals struck. It was published in the 1868 *American Journal of Numismatics* that the number struck was unknown. Bolen's own annotated notebook also had no mention of mintage, while it has data commonly recorded for other issues. When Edwin Johnson published his list of Bolen's works in 1882, he gave the mintage as five in silver, 10 in copper, and 14 in white metal, adding that these were all by Dr. Edwards, to whom the dies were sold in 1865. We are aware of six distinct specimens in silver and 12 in copper, so we know that the reported figures of five and 10 are not correct for the issue overall, and we can assume the same is true for 14 in white metal. Among the six in silver, we have weight and die state data for five of them, which illustrates two distinct states and two weight standards that correspond to them. This suggests two distinct striking operations, so we assume that Bolen was responsible for a few and that Edwards struck a few more. Data suggests that the same is true of the copper pieces, and it is less conclusive for white metal. However, all silver examples are in Die States 1 and 3 (of four observed). Copper impressions are in states 3 and 4, and white metal ones seem to be in states 1 and 2, with a couple perhaps intermediate between 2 and 3. We are aware of just 11 in this composition.

Although plans for a medal for the Centennial of Evacuation Day were set into motion well before the event, the backdated medals were not produced until late the following year and into the next. In all, 332 bronze specimens were produced. They feature an unusual concave obverse depicting the

George Washington statue on the steps of the Sub-Treasury Building on Wall Street. The reverse with a more traditional rendering of the seals of the City of New York, the New York City Chamber of Commerce, and the American Numismatic Society. A medal very popular with competing groups of Washington collectors and A.N.S. Medal collectors.

The Truman Medal for Economic Policy was created in 2005 to recognize extraordinary achievement in the formation and conduct of economic policy. The medal is given biennially at an awards ceremony in Kansas City, Missouri. The Truman Medal for Economic Policy reflects on the creation of the Council of Economic Advisers (CA) under President Harry S. Truman. The CEA was established by the Employment Act of 1946, which President Truman signed on February 20, 1946. The act committed the government, as Truman described it, "to take any and all measures necessary for a healthy economy."

Paul Volcker was the third recipient of this prestigious award, following such luminaries as Alan Greenspan (2005) and George P. Shultz (2007). It was presented to Mr. Volker on October 23, 2009 at a ceremony in Kansas City, Missouri. (Total: 1 medal; 1 case)



The Harry S. Truman Foundation was founded in 1972 to "cultivate, promote, foster, sponsor, develop and preserve among persons of the United States and throughout the world an understanding and devotion to the principles espoused by Harry S. Truman." Truman's memory is celebrated at an annual birthday luncheon held in Kansas City in early May. At that luncheon, The Truman Good Neighbor Award is presented to honor a person in public life who has exemplified the principles of Harry S. Colombia. Order of Boyacá, Awarded to Paul A. Volcker by the President of Colombia. Mint State. In two parts, consisting of a circular badge that measures approximately 77 mm across and weighs 102.5 grams, with a golden colored bust of Simon Bolivar surrounded by the words ORDERN DE BOYACA at center inside a blue-enameled Maltese cross. The cross is set atop a jeweled eightpointed star with rays between.

The Grand Cross Star, 57 mm across, is similar to the center of the badge, with the bust of Bolivar inside a blue-enameled Maltese cross with gold borders and is suspended from a dark blue sash with gold, turquoise and red striping at the edges. The back of the Star reads REPUBLICA DE COLUMBIA in the center of the cross.

The Order of Boyacá (Spanish: Orden de Boyacá) is the highest peacetime decoration of Colombia. The order is awarded for exceptional service to distinguished Colombian military officers and civilians as well as foreign citizens of friendly nations.

The Order of Boyacá traces its origin to a Cruz de Boyacá that was awarded to the generals who led their forces to victory in the Battle of Boyacá in 1819. Reestablished in 1919 as an award for military personnel the order has undergone revisions and expansions into its current form, with the biggest change occurring in 1922 when civilians became eligible for the award.



Federal Republic of Germany. Order of Merit. Awarded to Paul A. Volcker on March 17, 1988, in Bonn, West Germany. Mint State. In three parts - the Grand Cross Star, 82.5 mm across with black Federal German eagle at center atop a red enameled cross on fourpointed golden star with rays; a red enameled cross, 60.3 mm across backed by a red, black and gold sash; and a small 10 mm insignia pin. Created in September 1951, by Theodor Heuss, the first president of the Federal Republic of Germany, the Order of Merit is the only federal decoration of Germany. It is awarded for special achievements in political, economic, cultural, intellectual or honorary fields. It is awarded to both Germans and foreigners, and over the past 70 years or so, has been awarded to between 2,000 and 4,000 individuals annually.

Designed by Arnaldo Pomodoro, the obverse is an allegorical representation of the history and values of the Bank of Italy. The three triangles represent the three original institutions that merged to create the bank of Italy. Also shown are the main functions of the Bank: banknote issue and payment systems, monetary policy and supervision of the credit and financial systems. The center of the medal portrays the moral and civic values expressed by the Bank over the past century. The reverse contains simply the bank's monogram and name, along with the dates 1893-1993. A larger (60 mm) version in silver was also made. Housed in the original case with Certificate of Guarantee.

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Japan. The Order of the Sacred Treasure. The Grand Cordon (First Class) Awarded to Paul A. Volcker by the Emperor of Japan. Mint State. In the original presentation box, consisting of two parts. The first is the circular insignia of the order (76 mm across, 103.7 grams) incorporating symbols for the three imperial treasures: the Yata Mirror (so sacred that not even the Emperor is allowed to look at it) the Yasakani Jewel (made of the finest jade) and the Emperor's personal sword.

The second is the badge (63.5 mm across, 70.7 grams) in the form of a Maltese cross, in gilt with white enameled rays (representing the sword). The central disc is blue, bearing an eight-pointed silver star (representing the mirror), surrounded by a wreath with redenameled dots (representing the jewel). The badge is suspended on a ribbon, worn as a sash on the right shoulder by the Grand Cordon. The orange and white sash and a small pin is included in the lower portion of the box.

Established in January 1888 by the Emperor Meiji, the Order of the Sacred Treasure was originally awarded in eight classes, but was pared down to six in 2003; the lowest two medals being abolished that year. It is the most widely conferred Japanese order and is awarded to those who have made distinguished achievements in research fields, business industries, healthcare, social work, state/local government fields or the improvement of life for handicapped/impaired persons.

This is the highest class of the Order of the Sacred Treasure, and appears to be complete, original and in superb condition. Instructions for wearing the award are also included.



Mexico. The Mexican Order of the Aztec Eagle. Sterling Silver. Awarded to Paul A. Volcker. Mint State. 57 mm. 61.4 grams, .925 finer. Circular badge backed by heavy pin, the badge with an eagle holding a rattlesnake in its beak on a ceramic turquoise base at center, surrounded by a ten-pointed star on an Aztec style background. Accompanied by a small golden ribbon indicating rank and a card which reads CON LOS ATENTOS SALUDOS DE LA DIRECCION GENERAL DEL PROTOCOLO DE LA SECRETARIA DE RELACIONES EXTERIORES (With the compliments of the General Directorate of Protocol of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs). In the original box of issue.

Created by decree in December 1933, the Mexican Order of the Aztec Eagle is the highest Mexican order awarded to foreigners in

the country. It was established as a reward for services provided to Mexico by foreigners and is given by the office of the foreign minister on the instructions of a council established for this purpose headed by the president.

Over the past 90 years, the Order of the Aztec Eagle has been awarded to numerous heads of state, dignitaries, ministers, military figures, business people and others. Some of the more notable recipients include Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip, Emperor Hirohito, Dwight Eisenhower, Chiang Kai-shek, Charles de Gaulle, Walt Disney, Cesar Chavez and most recently, Jared Kushner. A most attractive and prestigious award.



The Netherlands. Order of Orange-Nassau, Grand Officer Class, Awarded to Paul A. Volcker by the Kingdom of the Netherlands. Mint State. A two-piece set. The main badge is a blue-enameled, white enamel-bordered Maltese Cross, in gilt measuring 54 mm across. The obverse central disc displays the King's coat of arms in gold and blue enamel, surrounded by a white enamel ring bearing the national motto JE MAINTIENDRAI (I shall maintain). The reverse central disc has the crowned monogram "W" (for Queen Wilhelmina) surrounded by the motto GOD ZIJ MET ONS (God be with us). The badge hangs from a royal crown. A wreath of laurel is seen between the arms of the cross. The badge is attached to an orange ribbon with white and blue border stripes.

The second piece of the Order is a four-point silver star with straight rays, 82.5 mm across, the central disc has the King's arms in gold and

blue enamel, surrounded by a white enamel ring bearing the Dutch national motto JE MAINTIENDRAI. Both are housed together in the original box of issue.

Established in April, 1892, the Order of Orange-Nassau is a Chivalric order, bestowed upon "those who have earned special merits for society." The Order is awarded to people for outstanding achievements in their work, surpassing those of others in their field and exceeding what would normally be expected of someone in their particular job. The order recognizes six classes, this particular award (Grand Officer of the Order of Orange-Nassau) ranking the second from the top. Approximately 4,000 individuals are recognized by this award annually.

Undated (ca. 1861) Pioneer Baseball Club Medal. By John Adams Bolen. Musante JAB-1. Silvered Tin. AU Details—Environmental Damage (PCGS). 32 mm. Iridescent multicolored undertones of rich steel-gray patina provide superior eye appeal for the assigned grade. Areas of roughness explain the PCGS qualifier, although direct lighting calls forth considerable flashiness to original mint luster from the fields. Well struck with all features sharp. The edge marks on Bolen's personal specimen in our November 2021 sale of the E Pluribus Unum Collection indicate that 25 of these were struck, but the number is reported as 125 in his own notebook and in the 1882 Edwin Johnson listing. Considering the frequency of appearances of both compositions, it is fairly clear that the white metal (i.e., tin) examples were made in a larger number than the copper ones. There were some 40 club members in the Pioneer Club, so it is unlikely that either composition would have an original issue number smaller than that. As such, 75 is probably reliable for the copper ones and 125 is likely accurate for this, though this more fragile composition undoubtedly contributed to a greater degree of loss over the years.

Obv: Bust of Sharpe left with peripheral inscription OF MOUNTAINS AND DESERTS AND FAR FLUNG SEAS, "signed" H ALVIN SHARPE along lower right border, artist's initials S.J.W. below bust, hallmarks at upper left. Rev: Blank apart from hand-inscribed FOR PHIL / FROM H. ALVIN SHARPE, 10/8/82. This intriguing piece is actually a uniface striking on an irregular gold planchet using the die for the medallion that Sharpe created for the cover of his 1979 book of poetry, *Collective Meditations*. The struck portion is lustrous with a satin to semi-reflective finish, pretty reddish-rose outlines to the design elements. Otherwise warm medium gold overall, the unstruck potions with a satin to matte-like texture. The first example of this type that we can ever recall handling, and undoubtedly of the highest rarity.

Immense George Washington Wall Plaque

(ca. 1858) George Washington Wall Plaque. By Anthony W. Jones, New York. Cast Iron. Extremely Fine. Approximately 38 inches x 29 inches. An immense piece in incredible relief, the portrait of Washington, after the Houdon Bust, standing approximately three inches in relief from the somewhat concave ground. The ornate frame is supported by sprays of oak and laurel at the base, while the top is ornamented by a ribbon motive. The central medallion was cast separately from the frame and is bolted into place on the back. The signature of the sculptor is on Washington's truncation, "A.W. Jones Sculpt. N.Y." In the lower curve of the convex ground is found "Patented 1858," though the final digit is very difficult to ascertain with certainty and it looks more like a 5. A small, thin rectangular copper plate has been added to the base, reading "PRESENTED IN MEMORY OF / MARIA MESEROLE KNAPP / BY HER SISTER / EVELINA KNAPP HOLLINS / 1935." The entire piece has a uniform black applied patina, but there are a few minor breaks in it at some of the finer recesses. The additional plate presentation plate is somewhat bent and has also lost the black patina in places.

According to a website maintained by descendants of Jones, he was a born in 1792 and served in the War of 1812. More than one copy of this exceptional relief is known, including one referenced as having been gifted to the New York Historical Society by the artist in 1858, and another still in the possession of his descendants. In fact, the New York Historical Society seems to have two examples, one gifted in 1925 in addition to that that from the artist. The patina on the two NYHS pieces is similar to that seen on the present one. As noted above, the final digit in the patent date is difficult to discern, but both the family-maintained website and the NYHS site give the completion date of this piece as 1858. Jones also completed a relief of famous numismatist, Charles Ira Bushnell, sometime between 1855 and 1860, among other works. Jones' descendants point to this work as his "finest portraiture." Cut into white marble that has taken on a pleasant creamy tone, without visible chips or problems of any kind. A substantial piece both in size and significance to Fraser, as this early work has been identified as that which focused attention on the sculptor's exceptional talent, earning him further commissions that delivered him his eventual great

fame. This is clearly a private commission that would not have had widespread commercial appeal. As such, we have no other examples in any form in our archives, though our consignor reported smaller versions in bronze. This is represented in the Smithsonian, but only as a photograph of a slightly different version, perhaps a trial in plaster. Impressive and extremely rare in this form, if not unique. 

Mounted to a custom contemporary wood frame with plate-rail style presentation. Total dimensions as framed are 24.75 inches x 26.75 inches. The frame exhibits slight roughness including drill holes are the four corners from a past mounting. Likely a one-off personal commission. Fraser's name was stamped into the bronze, at the lower left, curiously as J EARL FRASER Sc., leaving off the final E from his middle name.

Dr. William Nye Swift was a Harvard College graduate of the class of 1877, who continued on to earn his M.D. in 1881 from the same school. His father owned whaling ships and as of 1877, he planned to join his father's business, so it is clear that the sea was dear to him, explaining the theme. Instead, he entered medical school and charted a different course. At Harvard, he was involved in many clubs, including the Hasty Pudding Club, of which he served as both vice president and president. He was also treasurer of the Weld Boat Club.

His family was related to the Hathaways, among other New England families, which is notable as a family name connected to James Earle Fraser's 1903 bas relief of Horatio Hathaway Brewster, also included in this sale. It might be that the recognition Earle received from the Brewster portrait directly tied to this commission. Swift died at New Bedford, Massachusetts, where he was a prominent citizen, in 1911. 

A large and incredibly impressive piece. Soft mahogany and tan patina with but a trace of light oxidation in one recessed area. Boldly signed by Fraser in at the top border, THE PLAINS VIRGINIA LAURA GARDIN FRASER SCULPTOR, and inscribed in the field above the horse IRISH DALE MCMXXX / HOME IS THE SAILOR HOME FROM THE SEA / HOME IS THE HUNTER FROM THE HILL. At the lower left is the insignia of the Orange County Hunt Club.

This piece was acquired by our consignor from the estate of Nancy Penn Smith Hannum, the granddaughter of railroad magnate E.H. Harriman and his wife, Mary Williamson Averell Harriman. E.H. Harriman, along with a number of other wealthy New Yorkers which included August Belmont (namesake of the Belmont Stakes race), were members of the Orange County Hunt Club of Goshen, New York. It was a small, but exclusive group with an initiation fee of \$10,000 and yearly dues of \$2,000 — substantial sums in the 1930s.

The following is in the words of our consignor, who directly researched this important work:

"The inhospitable New York weather prevented the members from participating in their favored sport during much of the winter months. Around the turn of the century, they purchased enough acreage near The Plains, Virginia, a tiny town in Fauquier County, not too far from Washington, D.C, that would permit them to extend their hunting season from November through March. "In an effort to discover the story surrounding this plaque, I researched the relationship between the Harriman family and the Frasers, James Earle and Laura. Through various resources I found enough information to make some plausible assumptions and "possible" conclusions. My research shows that James Earle Fraser had no less than four commissions from Mary Harriman. (1) The Harriman Fountain which was installed in 1909 at the family residence. Arden House, Harriman, New York; (2) The Harriman Memorial Medal awarded by the American Museum of Safety; (3) The Edward H. Harriman memorial bronze plaque executed in 1916 which initially was displayed at the Union Pacific Headquarters at Omaha, Nebraska; (4) A bronze relief of E. H. Harriman ca. 1945, also installed at Alden House.

"Laura Gardin Fraser was said to be a "dear personal friend" of Mary Harriman and she did a number of pieces at the instance of the Harriman's. She was first commissioned by the son, Averell Harriman, in 1923 to do a polo pony award medal for the Horse Association of America. Subsequently, she did a sculpture of Miss Buck, a polo pony owned by Averell Harriman. Finally, in 1931 she did a bas relief of Mary Harriman, shortly before her death in 1932.

"Considering all of the above, I am fairly confident that the commission for the Irish Dale plaque came from either Marry Harriman or her son, Averell. My best guess is that it came from Averell and Irish Dale was his hunter. How it came into the possession of his niece, Nancy Hannum, is open to conjecture.

As far as I am aware, this is the only example of this plaque known."

1836 First Steam Coinage Medal. By Christian Gobrecht. Julian MT-20. Original Feb. 22 Date. Bronze—Double Struck—About Uncirculated. 27 mm. A particularly intriguing example of this elusive U.S. Mint medal. Both sides are dramatically double struck, a feature best seen when the design elements are scrutinized with the aid of a loupe. There is counterclockwise rotation between the first and second impressions, a feature that is clearest around the reverse periphery, where appreciable spread is discernible to the doubling. The second strike is well executed with all features bold in the absence of all but a trace of light rub. Frosty with nice gloss, the in hand appearance is smooth apart from a tiny dig in the center of the reverse and an equally trivial rim disturbance at 7 o'clock on that side

that we mention solely for accuracy. Sure to sell for a strong premium to an advanced collector.

This U.S. Mint rarity was struck as a sample from the original Feb. 22 die before mechanical problems with the new press forced the postponement of its inauguration ceremony to March 23. The die was recut to read March 23 to adjust for the change, with all later pieces bearing the new date. The few known pieces with the original date are typically worn and/or impaired, perhaps because with the date change they had no real purpose, and since they were struck on large cent planchets were tempting to spend, fitting in among the Hard Times tokens in everyday circulation at the time.

"1871" (1873) George F. Robinson Medal. By Anthony C. Paquet. Julian PE-27. Bronze. MS-62 (NGC). 77 mm. Choice save for a bit of muting to the deep copper-brown finish, the surfaces also reveal faint pinkish-rose undertones as the medal dips into a light. This medal was struck to commemorate George F. Robinson, a soldier who was assigned to protect William H. Seward, the secretary of state under Abraham Lincoln. On the night of April 14, 1865, Lewis Powell, a co-conspirator to John Wilkes Booth, attempted to assassinate Seward in his Washington, D.C. home. That very night President Lincoln had gone to Ford's Theater and was assassinated by Booth. Although Seward was attacked by Powell and suffered considerable stab wounds, he survived. Several of his children were also wounded, along with Robinson. These medals were issued with the obverse showing Robinson's bust left, the reverse with a wild scene of Seward in bed (still recuperating from a recent carriage accident) and Robinson defending against the knife-wielding Powell. The base of the reverse is signed in tiny letters G.Y. COFFIN DES. and PAQUET F. for famed medal engraver Anthony C. Paquet. It is believed that fewer than 100 of these were struck in bronze.

1882 Great Seal Centennial Medal. By Charles E. Barber. Julian CM-20. Bronze. Specimen-65 BN (PGCS). 62 mm. A richly original deep brown and olive-copper example with mildly granular surfaces, as made. The strike is fully executed and all features are sharp. Free of detracting blemishes, as the coveted Gem grade from PCGS would suggest. Medals of this type were struck in recognition of the centennial of the adoption of the Great Seal of the United States in 1782. Though the mint director at the time was against the idea of this piece being created, Superintendent Snowden obtained approval

from the secretary of the Treasury and the project moved forward rapidly. The dies were cut by Charles Barber in 1882, and the medals were available to the public by early September of the same year. One silver and 45 bronze were reported struck in 1882, with additional pieces to fill orders in later years. The earliest pieces have smooth prooflike fields; it is unclear when examples with the granular finish seen here were actually made, although striking periods in the late 19th and/or early 20th century are likely. All are rare.

Outstanding 1826 Erie Canal Completion Medal in Silver

1826 Erie Canal Completion Medal. HK-1000. Rarity-6. Silver. Specimen-62 (PCGS). 45 mm. A truly exceptional silver impression of this perennially popular type. Both sides are richly toned in deep silver-olive and charcoal-gray with iridescent overtones to the obverse. The fields are satiny smooth and brightly reflective in the protected areas. A few wispy handling marks are scattered about, none of which are worthy of undue concern. Visually appealing, and sure to attract spirited bidding from advanced specialists.

When completed on October 26, 1825, the Erie Canal was an engineering marvel nearly four decades in the making, having first been proposed in the 1780s. The canal connected Buffalo and the Great Lakes in the west to Albany and the Hudson River in the east, and by extension to New York City and the Atlantic Ocean via the Hudson River. Its completion ushered in an era of economic, cultural and political prosperity in New York and specifically New York City, whose increasing importance as a port city outpaced competing ports along the eastern seaboard. The Canal brought the agricultural products of the western interior to markets in the East, and transported finished goods from the port of New York City to the interior, all the while slashing the cost of transportation by 95% from overland routes.

Governor DeWitt Clinton led a nine-day procession from Buffalo to New York City on board the *Seneca Chief* to celebrate the opening of the Canal. The trip commenced in Buffalo on October 26, 1825, and ended in New York Harbor on November 4, at which time Governor Clinton poured water from Lake Erie into the harbor in a ceremony dubbed the "Wedding of the Waters."

To commemorate the Canal's completion, which was the largest and most advanced construction project of its era anywhere in the world, the Common Council of New York City authorized a medal and put its execution in the able hands of Archibald Robertson, a contemporary American artist. Detailed information about the medals is found in Robertson's report in the 1826 publication of *An Account of the Grand Canal Celebration at New York November the Fourth 1825*, which itself is an appendix to Cadwallader Colden's 1825 *Memoir* detailing the evolution of the Erie Canal. We learn that Robertson himself designed the medal, that iron and steel worker William Williams made the dies upon which famed medalist Charles Cushing Wright engraved the designs and Richard Trested punched the legends. The medals were struck by Maltby Pelletreau of Pelletreau, Bennett and Cooke, Pelletreau being from a family of New York silversmiths dating back to colonial times.

Robertson writes that "The first of my operations was to make an appropriate Device, intended for a Medal, to be worn by the guests of the Corporation [of the City of New York] on the joyful day; but time not permitting the execution of such a work as would be worthy of the occasion, it was resolved to have the Device engraved by a first-rate artist, and postpone the Medal to be executed at leisure..." A satin badge was created in lieu of the medals, using Robertson's design for the "device," a version of which appears on the medals that were eventually struck. Robertson does not elucidate when the medals were actually made, which had to be sometime between the grand November 4, 1825, New York City celebration at the end of Governor Clinton's procession (Robertson's "joyful day") and the eyewitness account of a medal published in the April 25, 1826 edition of the American Traveller newspaper, which was referenced in the August 10, 2003 issue of the E-Sylum:

"Canal Medals.—We have seen one of the Medals struck in honor of the Canal celebration by order of the Corporation of New-York. On one side is Pan's visit to Neptune-with cornucopia, distant view of the ocean, light house, &c. with the inscription—"Union of Erie with the Atlantic." On the reverse, are the arms of the state; on the right the representation of the canal, with its locks, and on the left the city of New York. The medal was designed by Archibald Robertson, engraved by C.C. Wright, and struck by Pelletreu. The whole is neat and appropriate. The medals struck

on composition [white metal] will be presented to all the invited guests of the corporation; silver ones will be transmitted to the President, Heads of Departments, Foreign ministers, Governors of States, &c. It is with great pleasure we learn that three gold medals will be transmitted to the surviving signers of the Declaration of Independence."

The white metal impressions have been assigned the attribution HK-1 in the standard reference *So-Called Dollars* by Harold E. Hibler and Charles V. Kappen, the low attribution number signifying that the Erie Canal Completion medal is the oldest

in the so-called dollar series, which includes more than 1,000 types. The silver and gold impressions, however, are cataloged as HK-1000 and HK-1001, respectively, the higher numbers assigned by the Hibler-Kappen reference indicating that these pieces are considered uncollectible. Indeed, most example of this type encountered in today's market are white metal impressions, HK-1, offered below. The HK-1000 silver example in this lot is scarce in an absolute sense, rare from a condition standpoint, and worthy of the strongest bids.

The white metal counterpart to the silver example offered above, and an outstanding representative of the HK-1 attribution. Bright silver-gray surfaces are remarkably smooth and near-fully Choice. Ample reflectivity in the fields is evident as the medal dips into a light, especially in the protected areas around the design elements. Sharply struck and crisp, we note only faint hairlines from old collector handling that preclude a higher Mint State grade. This medal was struck to mark the completion of the Erie Canal, an enormous project with ground broken on July 4, 1817, and completed on October 26, 1825. Issued by the Common Council of the City of New York, with dies engraved by Charles Cushing Wright after designs by Archibald Robertson. Survivors in this composition are rarely as choice as the specimen offered here. Also included in this lot is the original wooden case that housed this medal which in better condition than typically seen with the paper inserts inside quite fresh. A small crack along the edge of the top half of the case is apparent, though the item remains fully functional. Additionally, a framed note is included that describes this medal passing down from a John Elliot, president of a bank in Erie to his friend Mr. Baldwin and then eventually to Mr. Baldwin's great grandson Johnny. The medal is described as a valuable historical relic. Finally, a framed Erie Canal toll receipt dated November 1, 1831, for cargo shipped from Rochester to Buffalo, New York is included. AU-50 (NGC) A richly original steel-gray example with intermingled deep olive and lighter silver-mauve. Well defined overall with plenty of sharpness remaining. The individual number 585 neatly impressed at the base of the obverse. The following is from the December 1900 issue of monthly bankers periodical "Dicker man's United States Treasury Counterfeit Detector 'REFERENDUM' Dollars." — A Victor, Col., dispatch to the *Denver Evening Post* says:

"A unique enterprise has been established in Victor by Joseph Lesher, a Colorado pioneer and silver mine owner. He has procured a die, laid in a supply of silver bullion, and manufactured several silver coins, each containing one ounce of pure silver. He calls his coins 'referendum' dollars, because they are to be referred to the people for acceptance or rejection. Mr. Lesher proposes to demonstrate that the 'intrinsic value' theory is a delusion and a snare. His silver at the present quotation costs him 65 cents per ounce, the expense of coining is 15 cents — 80 cents in all, but he values his dollars at \$1.25, and intends to keep them above par. Although he is confident that the silver alone is really worth \$1.29 an ounce, he admits that other people may be prejudiced: therefore he promises to pay \$1.25 in United States money on demand for each 'referendum dollar."

The exact number of Lesher dollars issued is unknown, and Lesher's own estimate of 3,500 pieces given to Farran Zerbe in a 1913 interview has been called into question in more recent years. Specifically, Adna G. Wilde, Jr.'s exhaustive study of this series led to the conclusion that only 1,869 Lesher dollars of all types were produced. Wilde's estimate on the number of Bumstead pieces distributed is 710, comprised of 210 examples of the First Reverse with scrolls, HK-788, represented here, and 500 of the Second Reverse without scrolls, HK-789. Regarding the survivors, the outstanding reference *Forgotten Colorado Silver: Joseph Lesher's Defiant Coins* by Robert D. Leonard, Jr., Kenneth L. Hallenbeck and Adna G., Wilde, Jr. estimates that approximately 600 examples of all types are extant, or only about a third of the total number believed to have been issued. The present example is not included in the Adna Wilde Lesher Census published at the *lesherdollars.com* website.

Of the Imprint Type Lesher dollars distributed through merchants, the Slusher type is the most plentiful with a mintage of 260 pieces. This is a limited total in an absolute sense, of course, and the scarcity of this type is confirmed by the estimate of just 77 examples extant per the *lesherdollars. com* website. The offered example, however, is not included in the Adna Wilde Lesher Census, suggesting that it is a newcomer to the community of collectors who specialize in these intriguing pieces.

"Archibald H. Davis, Jr., 19, student, attempted to save R. Manly Hazzard, 16, student, from drowning, Tallulah Falls, Georgia, August 10, 1909. Davis swam upstream about 100 feet to Manly, who had become distressed in the Tallulah River in water six feet deep. Manly grabbed Davis, and they struggled desperately while the current carried them rapidly toward a large rock in the river. They went under the surface together several times, and at one time Manly had hold of Davis at the throat. When they reached the rock, Davis, who had broken Manly's grasp, stood up in shallow water and tried to lift Manly up, but the current swept them off the rock and they became separated. Manly was drowned. Davis was almost powerless from fatigue, but after swimming 20 feet, he managed to catch hold of some bushes and pull himself half out of the water. He then collapsed and was not revived for an hour."

CAVEY / FOR BRAVELY / RESCUING A MAN / FROM DROWNING / SEPTEMBER 16, 1928. Much of the original matte finish is discernible on both sides, the surfaces of which are enhanced by iridescent toning that outlines the still-bold design elements. With a few minor signs of handling around the rims, shallow scratch in the upper right obverse field. Specimens of this medal that remain intact, with their hanger, bar, and ribbon, are very rare. Most were well polished and abused over the years, and few retain all their parts. This example is very nicely preserved, and as such, is worthy of a premium bid.

This lot includes a copy of page 66 of a "Report of the Coast Guard" that details exactly how Private John J. Cavey, U.S. Army, won this medal:

"About 10:30 p.m. Sept. 16, 1928, Pvt. John J. Cavey, U.S. Army, was returning to the Ellis Island ferry slip from New York City to board for Governors Island when he heard a woman remark that a man was drowning. Looking into the water near the ferry ship, Covey saw a man just beneath the surface. Removing his belt and blouse, he jumped into the icy water, succeeded in raising the unconscious man to the surface, and swam with him to the sea wall, where he was assisted in removing the man from the water. It was later learned that the rescued man was Jerry Toomey, a civilian. The water was very deep where Toomey fell in, and undoubtedly he would have drowned but for the prompt assistance rendered by Cavey. Other persons witnessed the accident but none volunteered his services."

Badge Awarded to Chief Engineer Charles T. Lawson for Rescue of Passengers on the S.S. Olympia. Gold. Very Fine. 38 mm, medal only, approximately 69 mm in overall length. 28 grams, 14 karat. Badge suspended from pin-back hanger bearing Lawson's name with two short chains. The front of the medal pictures a lighthouse surrounded by choppy waves, and the reverse is engraved PRESENTED TO / CHIEF ENG. CHAS T. LAWSON / OF THE S.S. JUNO / IN RESCUING THE PASSENGERS / OF THE WRECKED / S.S. OLYMPIA. / DEC. 10TH 1910. Stamped A14K at bottom. A unique item awarded to a brave individual.

On 10 December, 1910, the *S.S. Olympia* ran aground on Bligh Reef off Alaska's Prince William Sound and sank without loss of life. Chief Engineer Charles T. Lawson, onboard the *S.S. Juno*, assisted in rescuing the passengers who were onboard the *Olympia* and was awarded this gold medal for his heroic efforts. Following the sinking, steamboat inspectors accused Captain Daniels, in command of *Olympia* when she ran aground, of "unskillful navigation."

Military Order of Foreign Wars Badge for the War with Spain. Gilt Silver. Awarded to John Jacob Astor, who was later lost on the Titanic. 38 mm, badge only, 90 mm overall. 22.8 grams. Oval wreath at top connecting to a hanger that reads WAR WITH SPAIN and backed by a tri-color silk ribbon in red, blue and gold. The back shows a blue and red enameled medallion with an anchor at center surrounded by the words DEUS ET LIBERTAS. A small suspension loop is stamped 153 and according to the Military Order of Foreign Wars registers (included with this lot), this particular medal was awarded to John Jacob Astor, IV in either 1899 or 1900.

Astor was an American business magnate, investor, writer, real estate developer and served as a lieutenant colonel in the Spanish-American War. The Astor family was one of the richest in the world, and when he perished onboard the *Titanic* in April 1912, John Jacob Astor, IV had an estimated net worth of \$87 million (which would equate to roughly \$2.5 billion today).

The Military Order of Foreign Wars was founded in December 1894, at the Tribune Building in New York City, and is one of the nation's oldest veterans' and hereditary associations. Membership is made up of veterans of the armed forces who served in wars with other nations, as well as their hereditary descendants.

Not only is this award quite beautiful in its own right, but when is provenance is traced to a person of such great stature, it becomes a most important and desirable item.

Exceedingly Rare Hunt & Nash HB-159 Thirty Cents Encasement Recently Confirmed Specimen

1862 Hunt & Nash (Irving House). Thirty Cents. HB-159, EP-180, S-112, Reed-IH30. Extremely Fine, Cleaned. Case: Minimally worn with all major features on the back sharp, although both sides exhibit light hairlines and a curiously bright brassy-gold color from a cleaning. There are, however, no sizeable marks or other blemishes. **Mica:** Fully intact and generally smooth with only a few subsurface laminations at the lower left. Minor scratches are evident upon close inspection with a loupe, but are hardly distracting in hand. **Stamp:** Faded salmon-pink color, yet quite smooth. It is centered high in the frame with the upper legend mostly lost to view.

During the severe shortage of small change in New York City during the Civil War, several hotels resorted to the expedient of having cardboard chits printed for the convenience of their customers. Typically, these chits were rectangular in shape and were denominated in one cent, five cents, ten cents and other low values. Among such issuers were the Washington House, Market House, and Putnam House establishments. Only one, however, Irving House, also commissioned encased postage stamps from John Gault.

The Irving House was located at the corner of Broadway and 12th Street, a fashionable address then as now. Broadway was New York City's main thoroughfare. Two blocks north lay the park that would later be named Union Square, while an equal distance south along Broadway was Grace Church and School, the first a perambulatory for New York's social elite, the other one of the more prestigious schools for their young. The hotel had been named for Washington Irving and earlier had been graced by the "Swedish Nightingale," Jenny Lind, who stayed there during her triumphant American tour under the auspices of P.T. Barnum in 1850.

The Irving House advertised on its own encasements that it offered the "European Plan" for its guests. Under this arrangement, the hotel charged its customers a flat rate for their rooms, and all other services were at an additional charge. This plan, first practiced in Boston's Tremont House, was advertised as being cheaper than the "American Plan," under which room, board, and services were all included in a single rate per day. In actuality, it was not cheaper, and its implementation at Boston's Tremont House and New York's Irving House hotels made them more profitable than their competitors.

George W. Hunt was the proprietor, and he oversaw the hotel's daily operations. Charles W. Nash was in charge of the food and catering services. This division of responsibility seems to have been typical of the better hotels of the day; it also characterized the arrangement that George Gage made with John Drake in Chicago's Tremont House. The Hunt & Nash partnership lasted until 1863, when Nash left to open a restaurant. Hunt stayed on until 1869, when he sold his interest to George Harlow. By that time, however, Irving House's glory days were over. The hub of New York's social scene had moved farther north along Broadway, leaving 12th Street and the Irving House behind.

The Irving House encasements are slightly different from others in the series. In the first place, Gault's patent notice is larger than on any other encasement, including Gault's own. Second, the border around the back was not beaded, while the borders of all other encasements (excepting Gault's own and Brown's) were beaded.

Encasements from this commissioner are known in the one cent through thirty cent denominations. The majority are extremely rare. All save the last are also known in either plain or ribbed frames and, surprisingly, the most available varieties are in ribbed frames: the five cent and ten cent pieces.

The present offering is for an exceedingly rare Hunt & Nash thirty cents encasement. This variety is listed, but not priced, in the1989 Hodder-Bowers reference on encased postage stamps. The newer reference *Civil War Encased Stamps* (1995) by Fred L. Reed assigns a rating of Rarity-10 with the comment "Unique." This is presumably a newcomer to the census, and its offering in this sale represents what could very well be a once in a lifetime bidding opportunity for the specialist.

Frank E. Needham of Bethel, Maine, was born to Captain John Needham and Almira Bryant Mills on April 15, 1844. He enlisted on October 15, 1862, as a private and was mustered into E Company of the Maine 27th Infantry Regiment. Needham served for the required nine months with the 27th Infantry, whose primary assignment was protecting Washington, D.C. The 27th did little to no fighting during its nine-month tenure, yet lost 22 men due to accidents and disease.

An interesting story surrounds the 27th Maine Infantry. Many of its members received the Medal of Honor for staying to defend Washington, D.C. On the request of President Abraham Lincoln, Secretary of War Edwin Stanton sent letters on June 28, 1863 to the commanding officers of the 25th and 27th Maine regiments, asking for them to remain beyond their contracted service due to the invasion of Pennsylvania by Robert E. Lee's Army of Northern Virginia. Declined first by the 25th Maine, the 27th was then asked, and over 300 men volunteered to remain beyond their service time in the defenses of Washington during what became the Gettysburg Campaign.

When Colonel Wentworth delivered the message to Secretary Stanton, he was informed that, "Medals of Honor would be given to that portion of the regiment that volunteered to remain." With the battle soon over, they left Washington for home on July 4, reuniting with the rest of the regiment in Portland for their mustering out on July 17, 1863. Following the end of the War, when the promise to award medals to the volunteers was fulfilled, there was a lack of an agreeable list of those who stayed behind in Washington. This resulted in some 864 medals being made, and it was left up to Wentworth to distribute them to those members he remembered staying behind with him. These medals were later purged by Congress in 1917, as the actions of the regiment did not meet the criteria for receiving such a medal.

After his discharge, Frank Needham returned to Bethel, Maine where he married Mary Abigail Stowell and worked in a variety of fields including railroad work and telegraphy. He died in Bethel at age 65 in late January 1910.

Pierced for suspension. The back is inscribed DANIEL LEWIS. / 75 WHYTE STREET / EAST BOSTON, MASS. Extremely rare.

Daniel Coffin Lewis was born in 1841, in Vassalboro, Maine to Prince Baxter Lewis and Harriet Gardner Coffin. He enlisted in Boston on June 13, 1861, as a private and was mustered into E Company of the Massachusetts 11th Infantry. Only a month later, on July 21, he was wounded at the First Battle of Bull Run, and taken prisoner. After six months imprisonment, he was released January 3, 1862, and discharged for disability in November 1862, at Falmouth, Virginia.

Daniel Lewis was later married to Bernice Burlingham, a native of California, where he later retired, and passed away at the age of 82 on March 17, 1924, in Fresno.

The 11th Massachusetts (known as the Boston Volunteers) saw heavy action throughout the War, being engaged at both the First and Second Battles of Bull Run, Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, Gettysburg, and the Wilderness. The regiment retuned to Massachusetts in July 1865, and was mustered out at Readville.

Born in August 1825, in Salisbury (or nearby Amebury), Massachusetts to James Lurvey and Susan Jewett, James Thomas Lurvey enlisted in Lowell, Massachusetts on August 22, 1862, as a captain. He was a practicing dentist at the time, and was commissioned into A Company of the Massachusetts 40th Infantry. He was honorably discharged on May 30, 1863, following a fall into a ditch at West Point, Virginia.

Lurvey was first married to Rossilla Judkins in January 1845, but remarried to Cynthia Jewett in 1878, five years after the death of his first wife. Lurvey died February 25, 1904, in Haverhill, Massachusetts at the age of 78.

Russell Moore of Alexandria, New Hampshire was born in Hebron to Nathan and Sarah Moore on September 22, 1827, and enlisted August 20, 1862, as a sergeant. He mustered into C Company of the New Hampshire 12th Infantry in early September of that year. He was wounded on May 3, 1863, at Chancellorsville, and discharged for disability on September 25, 1863, at Concord, New Hampshire after being reduced in rank to private.

Moore had married Abby Jenness in December 1852, and after the War settled in Newbury, Vermont, where he operated a grist mill and later sold ice. He died in Newbury on April 17, 1902, in his 74th year.

The 12th Regiment of the New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry had a most distinguished record, displaying valor and sacrifice almost unequalled by any other regiment in the Union Army. Serving in the Army of the Potomac during much of 1863, and in the Army of the James throughout 1864 and 1865, the 12th saw action at many of the War's most notable engagements, including Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, Gettysburg, Cold Harbor, the Siege of Petersburg, and the occupation of Richmond.

Lucian L. Buckland was born in Quebec, Canada to Walter and Jane Buckland in October 1841, and enlisted August 8, 1862, in Manchester, New Hampshire as a private. He was mustered into C Company of the 11th Infantry Regiment about two weeks later. The New Hampshire 11th saw a good deal of action in Virginia, Mississippi and Tennessee from late 1862, through the end of the war in April 1865, including engagements at Fredericksburg, Vicksburg, Knoxville, The Wilderness, Spotsylvania, Cold Harbor, and Petersburg. The regiment was mustered out in June 1865, at Alexandria, Virginia.

After the war, Lucian and his wife Elizabeth Shields Buckland settled in Vermont, and later Maryland, where he died in early 1887, at the age of 45.

Patrick Fitzgerald was likely born in Ireland in 1832, and immigrated to the United States in the 1850s. He enlisted as a private on November 9, 1863, in Syracuse, New York and 10 days later, he mustered into M Company of the New York 1st Veteran Cavalry. The 1st Veteran Cavalry saw extensive action throughout 1864, and engaged in over 20 battles mostly in Virginia and West Virginia. Fitzgerald was transferred to A Company in October 1864. He was mustered out on 20 July, 1865 at Camp Platt, West Virginia. Because Patrick Fitzgerald was a very common name in New York, tracing his activities following the War has proven to be nearly impossible. What appears certain though, is he must have worn or carried this identification tag with pride for a number of years.

Charles Lander was born to Charles and Genevieve Jane Gendreau Lander in Vermont in May 1841, and enlisted the last day of August 1861, in Burlington as a private. By the middle of September, he was mustered into B Company of the Vermont 5th Infantry, and he reenlisted in December 1863. He was wounded at Spotsylvania Court House in Virginia on May 12, 1864. Lander was promoted to corporal and later sergeant by 1865, and mustered out at the end of the War in June 1865, at Munson's Hill, Virginia. After the War, he married Addie St. George in 1876, and raised a very large family including six sons and four daughters. He resided in both Vermont and, later, Massachusetts, where he died in late December 1921.

According to the Heritage catalogers when they described this piece for auction in December 2009:

"The owner was Corporal Charles P. Jordan who enlisted in July, 1862 into Co. F, 33rd Mass. Vol. Inf. After the regiment's fight at Chancellorsville, Jordan suffered sunstroke and was transferred into the 21st Veteran Reserve Corps (originally known as the Invalid Corps) in December 1863 where he was promoted Corporal and remained until mustered out in June 1865."

This is a common design among Civil War identification tags, but in silver it is exceptionally rare.

Soldier identification disks were a Civil War invention sold by sutlers serving various military installations and units. Over half of the military casualties in the early stages of the Civil War were unable to be identified, so the sutlers sold these disks — only much later to be called "dog tags" — to the soldiers they served so that if they were to be killed in action, their next of kin could be notified, and their grave could be marked. Many were simple blank disks upon which the sutler stamped the soldier's identification, but others could be had that had portraits of political figures or generals on one side and a place for identification on the reverse.

Banks had been Governor of Massachusetts before the war, but he proved to be a more successful politician than a military tactician. After a few unsuccessful campaigns against the likes of Stonewall Jackson in the Shenandoah Valley, he was assigned mostly to Western positions, far from the major battlefields. In view of his record, the soldiers under his command probably did not have great confidence in him, and being far from the action, were not especially worried about being killed — both perhaps reasons for the extreme rarity of this type of tag.

Bradley was initially mustered into Union Army on April 24, 1861, with the 3rd Connecticut Volunteers, with which unit he saw action at the First Battle of Bull Run (First Manassas). He mustered out at Hartford on August 12, 1861, but re-entered the service on September 7 of the same year with the 6th Connecticut Volunteers, and re-enlisted with the same unit on December 24, 1863. He eventually reached the rank of first lieutenant, and was mortally wounded at Bermuda Hundred, Virginia when the 6th Connecticut was serving in the Army of the James under Benjamin Butler. Linked to an officer who made the supreme sacrifice in defense of the Union, this rare badge is sure to see spirited bidding.

Born in Portland Maine, on February 18, 1835, to John D. and Angela Cutter Kinsman, Oliver later moved to Clinton, Iowa where he enlisted in the Union Army in mid-September 1861 as a sergeant and was mustered into K Company of the Iowa 11th Infantry the following month. He rose rapidly through the ranks during the War, becoming a second lieutenant in January 1862, first lieutenant and adjutant in 1863, captain and assistant adjutant general in 1864, and a major by brevet in March 1865. He had achieved the rank of lieutenant colonel at the time of his discharge in October 1866.

After the War, he moved back East, marrying Emma Richardson in October 1871, in Washington, D.C. The couple had four daughters. It is believed he retired to a farm in Wheaton, Maryland sometime in the 1890s, where he lived until his death at age 92 on August 6, 1927. He is buried in Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia.

The 11th Iowa Infantry was active in several major battles in Southern Tennessee and Northern Mississippi in 1862, including Shiloh and Corinth. Later in the War, it took part in the Meridian Raid, finally joining Sherman's army in the march to Atlanta. It ended the War in the Carolinas and was mustered out in July 1865.

As cataloged by FJP Auctions in their March 2011 offering of this piece: "Captain John Mullen served in the 12th Connecticut Infantry, which was part of 2nd Division, 19th Corps. Nineteenth Army Corps was made up of Federal troops in the Department of the Gulf. In 1863, it was engaged in Louisiana and at Port Hudson. It had a role in the Red River Expedition where it fought at the Battles of Sabine Cross Roads and Pleasant Hill. In 1864, the 1st and 2nd Divisions transferred to Virginia and Maryland, and fought at Opequon, Fisher's Hill and Cedar Creek. The 12th Connecticut Infantry was mustered in 3 December 1861 and fought throughout the war, losing 273 men."

Henry Francis Felch, son of Isaac and Keziah Felch, was born March 18, 1839, in Natick, Massachusetts and enlisted August 1, 1862, as a sergeant. He was mustered into I Company of the Massachusetts 39th Infantry later that month. He led a successful military career, rising through the ranks to second lieutenant in October 1863, first lieutenant in September 1864, and captain at the end of his service in June 1865. The 39th Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry was quite active in the War following the battle at Gettysburg, when it joined the Army of the Potomac at Funkstown, Maryland. The engagements near Spotsylvania at Laurel Hill in May 1864, and the Weldon Railroad in August 1864, were particularly costly, with numerous casualties including Lt. Felch, who on August 19th, 1864, suffered a wound at the Weldon Railroad battle.

After the War Henry Felch married Martha Ann Clough in February 1866, and had two daughters. Throughout the late 19th and early 20th centuries he worked in a shoe factory, becoming the foreman by 1900. By 1910, he had retired to a farm in Natick where he lived until his death in 1924 at the age of 85.

Samuel Augustus Lawrence was born March 13, 1841, to John and Emily Gates Lawrence in Ashby, Massachusetts. As a 21 year-old carpenter, he enlisted on September 2, 1862, as a private and the following month, mustered into D Company of the Massachusetts 53rd Infantry as a sergeant. He was transferred to E Company of the Massachusetts 5th Infantry in July 1864, where he served until November 1864.

During the War, in July 1864, he married Susan M. Proctor and shortly after the War had a son and two daughters, one of whom died in infancy. Samuel and his family lived their entire lives in Stow, where he passed away on September 5, 1900.

Charles A. Hartel (b. ca. 1832-33 in Prussia) enlisted in Baltimore as a corporal on June 18, 1861, and was mustered into the field and staff of the Maryland 2nd Infantry serving as a hospital steward. He served for exactly three years, and was mustered out on June 18, 1864. Hartel was already married (to Emily) at the time of his enlistment, and the couple had at least five daughters and a son. Tragically, after arriving in Fort Wayne, Indiana from Washington, D.C. on business, Hartel

shot himself in the abdomen with a pistol and died on June 5, 1888, after leaving a bizarre and utterly incoherent message on a postcard. It was believed his rash action may have been temporary insanity following the death of his son Charles at the age of 22.

The 2nd Maryland Infantry saw extensive action throughout the war, including encounters at the Second Battle of Bull Run, Chantilly, Antietam, Fredericksburg, Blue Springs, the siege of Knoxville, Spotsylvania, Cold Harbor, Petersburg and was present at the surrender at Appomattox Court House. From 1861 to early 1863, the regiment was mostly a part of the Army of the Potomac. From mid-1863 through mid-1864, it was assigned to the Army and Department of Ohio, returning to the Army of the Potomac in April 1864, where it remained until the end of the war in the summer of 1865.

Francis Kimball Hobbs was born November 4, 1841, to Oliver and Deborah Hobbs of Tamworth, New Hampshire. Frank enlisted late in the War, on September 14, 1864, in Concord, New Hampshire. He enlisted as a private and was mustered into F Company of the 18th New Hampshire Infantry. Promoted to first lieutenant on May 1, 1865, Frank Hobbs mustered out six weeks later in mid-June 1865. Following the war, he married Sarah Atwood in late June 1868, and they raised a son Herbert and a daughter Alice. He lived his entire life in Ossipee, New Hampshire with a diversified career including merchant, lumberman, postmaster, state senator and farmer. He died at the age of 64 on January 4, 1906.

The New Hampshire 18th Regiment was assigned to the Engineering Brigade, Army of the Potomac, and saw relatively little fighting, losing only four men in battle.

The 51st Regiment Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry was assigned to Major General John G. Foster's Department of North Carolina, later designated as the XVIII Corps. While based in New Bern, North Carolina, the 51st Massachusetts took part in several expeditions in December 1862, including the Battle of Kinston, the Battle of White Hall and the Battle of Goldsboro Bridge.

Assigned to the 18th Corps from January to June, 1863, Company A was stationed in Morehead City on the east coast of North Carolina.

Stephen Merrill, born June 6, 1826, to Joseph and Catherine Merrill, enlisted in Natick, Massachusetts on July 30, 1862, as a private. At that time, he was married to Rebecca Blake and had two daughters and a son. Late the following month, he mustered into I Company of the Massachusetts 39th Infantry and served with that regiment for the next two and a half years. The 39th Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry was particularly active in the War following Gettysburg, when it joined the Army of the Potomac at Funkstown, Maryland. The engagements near Spotsylvania at Laurel Hill in May 1864, and the Weldon Railroad in August 1864, were particularly brutal, with many killed and wounded in the unit.

Tragically, near the end of the war on February 6, 1865, Merrill suffered a severe wound in his right leg at Hatcher's Run, resulting in the amputation of his leg. He died of his wounds about a month later on March 3, 1865, in Washington, D.C.

CLARK around the top rim of the bullet, with 1ST REGT. MASS VOLS on hanger backed by a long pin. The body of the bullet is engraved HOOKER'S DIVISION in gold, with a blue enamel center listing the numerous engagements of the division including Blackburn's Ford, Williamsburg, Glendale, Malvern Hill, Bull Run and Fredericksburg, among others. A rare and significant piece of Civil War memorabilia, particularly in gold. John S. Clark was born in 1832 in Roxbury, Massachusetts to Henry and Ann Clark, and worked as a coppersmith before enlisting in late May 1861, as a sergeant and joining C Company of the Massachusetts 1st Infantry. Wounded at the Second Battle of Bull Run in August 1862, and again at Gettysburg in early July 1863, Clark had a most distinguished career being promoted to second lieutenant in July 1862, first lieutenant in March 1863, and then to captain in September 1863. He was mustered out of the army after three years' service in May 1864, in Boston. Sadly, he would not survive long after the war, passing away at the age of 39 from smallpox on July 19, 1872, in Boston.

William Lovejoy was born February 1, 1833, in Hillsboro, New Hampshire and was called to duty in June 1863. He served as a musician with the 41st Ohio Infantry and bandmaster with the 3rd Brigade, 3rd Division of the XXIV Corps. In 1860 he was living in Cleveland, Ohio with his first wife Christina, but by 1863 was living in Suffolk County, Massachusetts.

After the war, he returned to Massachusetts, and after the death of his first wife, married Harriet Ranloff in early June 1887, in Boston. He died on August 13, 1896, from diabetes in Reading, Massachusetts. The *Boston Herald* noted his passing with this article:

"DEATH OF WILLIAM LOVEJOY

"Mr. William Lovejoy, age 64, a veteran of the late war, and formerly a well-known restaurant keeper in this city, died yesterday morning at 8:15 o'clock, at his home in Reading. He had been suffering from a combination of troubles for some time, and had been confined to his home by his illness.

"He served in the Hayes regiment, of which Maj. McKinley was a member, during the late war, and was bandmaster of the brigade to which the regiment was attached. He was a member of post 113 of this city.

"Just prior to his illness he was the night cashier and storekeeper at the Crawford House. He leaves a widow.

The drop is engraved ARKANSAS POST / JAN. 11TH / 1863 with filigree surround, and the back reads PRESENTED TO / M. RICE / CO. B 16TH IND V.I. BY / BRIG GEN'L S.G. BURBRIDGE / FOR GALLANT CONDUCT AT THE / BATTLE OF ARKANSAS POST / JAN. 11TH.. 1863. A unique and most fascinating award given to an extremely brave individual.

Born to John and Elizabeth Rice in 1846 or 1847 in Sharon, Ohio, 15-year old Michael Rice enlisted on August 18, 1862, as a private in Washington County, Indiana. He was mustered into B Company of the Indiana 16th Infantry, and served for the next three years with unusual valor and dedication. The records show that he was a prisoner of war, as well, on more than one occasion. After the war drew to a close, he was mustered out on June 30, 1865, in New Orleans, and returned to Elkhart, Indiana where he married Martha Mawhorter in late January 1873. The couple gave birth to a son Henry in July 1883. Michael and his wife Martha remained on their farm in Elkhart until his death in 1928 at the age of 82.

The lot is accompanied by a writeup that appeared in the *Indianapolis Journal* on July 7, 1863, detailing the actions of Rice. It reads in part:

"Young Rice is but fifteen years of age, but at the battle of Arkansas Post none fought braver than he did, and at one time during the most heated part of the fight, he ran back to the rear and filled all of his pockets with cartridges, and carried his hands full beside, and returned to the field and supplied his comrades with the ammunition thus obtained. At 'Vicksburg' he was equally brave."

Union. Massachusetts 6th Infantry and Massachusetts 2nd Light Artillery. Lot of (3) Items Pertaining to William Marland. The first item is a silver medal measuring about 32 mm in diameter, 16.5 grams, inscribed FIRST IN THE FIELD on the front and BALTIMORE 19TH OF APRIL 1861 around the rim on the back. In the center, it is engraved WM. MARLAND - CO. F: ANDOVER MASS. The silver medal is suspended from a pin-backed crossbar that reads OLD SIXTH and connected by a two-inch blue and gold ribbon that reads OLD 6 MASS. The entire piece measures approximately four inches long.

Next is a Massachusetts "Minute Men" medal in copper, 38 mm diameter with the standing Indian State Symbol on the front, and a tribute to the Massachusetts Volunteer Militia who were mustered into the army at Lincoln's first call on April 15, 1861. Suspended by a link from a pin-backed hanger that reads MASSACHUSETTS MINUTE MEN 1861. Engraved on the edge of the medal is WILLIAM MARLAND, SGT. F. 6TH. REG.

The final item is a sepia-tone wartime photograph encased in a black metal bezel measuring 57 mm in diameter.

William Marland, the son of William Sykes Marland and Sarah Northey was born March 11, 1839 in Andover, Massachusetts. He enlisted April 16, 1861, as a sergeant and was assigned to the Massachusetts 6th Infantry Regiment serving just under four months in that unit. The 6th Regiment was the first to arrive in Washington, D.C., completely uniformed and equipped for service and was first quartered in the Senate Chamber in the Capitol. It was later transferred to Baltimore before returning to Boston in early August.

Early the following year, he was commissioned into the Massachusetts 2nd Light Artillery as a second lieutenant. Promoted to first lieutenant in October 1862, and captain in January 1865, he achieved the rank of major by the time he was mustered out in August 1865.

During his service, he was awarded the Medal of Honor for his action on November 3, 1863, at Grand Coteau, Louisiana. After having been surrounded by the enemy's cavalry, he ordered a charge and saved his section of the battery.

In October 1870, Marland married Salome Jane Abbott who bore the couple three daughters and a son. He became postmaster of Andover, Massachusetts, where he lived until moving to Griffin, Georgia for health reasons a few years before his death on April 17, 1905, at the age of 66.

Adelbert Bailey was born January 24, 1843, to Samuel and Violet Snow Bailey in Granville, Massachusetts. By 1860, he was living in Conway, Massachusetts and the following year, enlisted on October 11 as a sergeant. In mid-November, he mustered into C Company of the Massachusetts 31st Infantry. He re-enlisted in February 1864, and mustered out on September 9, 1865, at Mobile, Alabama after being promoted to first sergeant. Following the war, Bailey married Juliette Metcalf and settled in Williamsburg, Massachusetts where they raised a daughter May Violet. He died at the age of 89 on May 3, 1932.

Commanded by Brigadier General Joseph Hooker, the 2nd Regiment, New Hampshire Volunteers saw extensive action throughout the War, with engagements ranging from the First Battle of Bull Run in July 1861, through the occupation of Richmond in April 1865, and including the battles at Malvern Hill, Second Bull Run, Fredericksburg, Gettysburg, Cold Harbor and the siege of Petersburg.

Thomas J. Harding was born in February 1838, in Sullivan, New York and enlisted on September 14, 1861, at Callicoon Depot, New York as a corporal. He was mustered into H Company of the New York 56th Infantry Regiment early the following month. He was promoted to sergeant, re-enlisted on February 20, 1864, and was promoted to first sergeant on May 24, 1864. He was mustered out on October 17, 1865, at Charleston, South Carolina.

It is believed that following the War Thomas Harding and his wife Mary Tucker settled on a farm in Bethany, New York where they raised two sons, Alfred and Edwin. Harding died in late December 1907, at the age of 69.

George Ware Gates, the son of Moses and Harriet Baltzell Gates was born in Gallipolis, Ohio on the border with Virginia (later West Virginia) in February 1838. He enlisted in early September, 1861 as a private and was mustered into H Company of the Ohio 15th Infantry. The 15th Infantry saw action at Shiloh, Corinth, Stone's River, Liberty Gap, Chickamauga, Missionary Ridge, and other locations throughout the Tennessee, Mississippi, Alabama and Georgia regions. Gates was discharged for disability on June 15, 1863.

After the war, Gates settled in Charleston, West Virginia where he later married Sarah Ferguson with whom he had two daughters. He operated a grocery for many years and died at the age of 75 on January 15, 1913, in Hamilton, Ohio.

He was killed on January 7, 1862, during the advance on Paintsville, Kentucky at Jennie's Creek. He was buried in Mound Cemetery, Marietta, Ohio. Private Albert W. Leonard was just 19 years old at the time of his death.

The back reads PRESENTED BY THE STATE OF WEST VIRGINIA inside a wreath. Around the rim is printed EDWARD B. ST. JOHN 1ST LIEUT. 13TH REG INF VOLS.

Edward Betts St. John was born October 7, 1843, to Moses Betts and Pamelia Wilson St. John in either Danville, New York or Pennsylvania (records conflict), but by the time the Civil War broke out, the family was living in Mason, Virginia (soon to be West Virginia) on the Ohio border. He entered into service in September 1862, as a sergeant and was mustered into D Company of the West Virginia 13th Infantry. He served through the end of the war, achieving the rank of first lieutenant at the time of his discharge in June 1865.

Shortly after the War, Edward married Annie L. Reynolds and worked as a cobbler, remaining in Mason, West Virginia for many years before moving to Jefferson, Missouri (probably sometime in the 1890s), where he died December 22, 1912, at the age of 69. He had a daughter and son, both of whom it is believed died in childhood.

Mustered into Union Army service on October 21, 1862, the 30th Wisconsin Infantry served in Wisconsin until March 1863. It them saw service in several Indian campaigns through 1864, followed by provost duties in Kentucky until mustered out of service on September 20, 1865. The regiment lost 69 men to combat and disease during its service.

Exceptional VMI Award of Valor for the 1864 Battle of New Market

Confederacy. Award Given to the Cadets of the Virginia Military Institute for Valor in the Battle of New Market, May 15, 1864. Bronze. The cross-shaped drop measures 38 mm x 38 mm, and with hanger and short chain the entire piece is approximately 60 mm in length. The front of the drop features the state symbol of Virginia in the center, with VMI CADET BATALLION surrounding. The back is engraved V.M.I. / ALUMNI / ASSN. / TO / P.W. WOODLIEF. The pin-backed hanger reads FOR VALOR. We note the sale of a similar medal, lacking the pin and showing evidence of cleaning, for \$10,625 in June 2017. This example, complete and in outstanding condition, should easily fetch more.

Approximately 250 cadets from the Virginia Military Institute helped to defend the town of New Market, Virginia on May 15, 1864, resulting in the death of 10 and the wounding on 45. The cadets were held in reserve until ordered by General Breckinridge to come to the aid of the Colonel George S. Patton, Sr.'s Echol's Brigade. This medal was awarded in 1904 to the surviving participants of the battle, as well as the family members of those who had died in the battle or had passed away in the ensuing 40 years.

This particular medal was awarded posthumously to the family of Pierre W. Woodlief, Jr. Pierre was born in 1846 and was a member of the class of 1867. He was a private in Company B, and was wounded in the Battle of New Market. He later became a merchant and was involved in the insurance business in Texas during the 1880s. He volunteered for federal service for the Spanish-American War in 1898 and served as a lieutenant in Cuba, and later as captain and adjutant of the Port of Gibara. He was mustered out at Camp Meade in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania in mid-1899, but died of illness at Camp Caffery in Covington, Louisiana later that year.

Charles A. Burt was born on October 8, 1823, in Hornell, New York and enlisted as a captain on January 1, 1863, at the age of 39 while living in Ischua, New York. He was commissioned into the field and staff of the New York 159th Infantry. He was promoted to major upon his first commission and to lieutenant colonel only three months later in April 1863. He also had prior service with the New York 83rd and 91st Infantry. He had been married to Sarah McGee since about 1846, and at the time of his enlistment the couple had four children.

The Battle of Irish Bend was fought on April 13 and 14, 1863, near Franklin, Louisiana and just west of Grand Lake. It was the first serious engagement for the 159th New York, and they sustained losses of 117 killed, wounded and missing, including five high ranking officers. The regiment was also engaged at the siege of Port Hudson the following month, taking 73 casualties.

Charles Burt was discharged after one year of service on January 7, 1864 and returned to Ischua, where he continued farming until his death at age 58 on January 1, 1882.



Original hardbound in white half cloth and white boards, with 20 original fine photographic plates and the original prices realized list bound in. Partially hand-priced in blue, almost completely through about lot 1500, and then sporadically thereafter. A fairly sound copy. There are loose internal areas between some signatures, but it is intact. Rubbed and somewhat chipped on the edges, with some handling patina on the cloth spine and covers — the marks of an often consulted volume.

Matthew A. Stickney, born in 1805, formed his magnificent collection somewhat quietly, it would appear. According to Henry Chapman, writing in the preface to the sale, "this celebrated collection has for many years been a mystery, as hardly any one of the present generation had seen anything of it." However, Stickney is also credited therein for generously allowing Sylvester S. Crosby access to study his holdings as he prepared his landmark work, *Early Coins of America*, published in 1875. The sale realized \$37,859.21, the largest amount ever for a numismatic collection sold in America. This was in no small part due to a new record price for a single coin, \$6,200 for lot 236, a Brasher doubloon.

Just three of Henry Chapman's 51 sales were ranked as "A+" for content by John Adams, including this one. The Pogue library copy realized \$2,640 in our August 2020 sale.






purposes. It was the second largest and one of the most important sales Henry Chapman conducted, securing him a new record for the most valuable American collection sold with prices realized totaling \$55,821.63, considerably more than what was achieved by his Stickney sale just five years before. This was in no small part due to the extensive holdings of outstanding quality. The Earle sale included four 1794 silver dollars, 17 examples of 1795, and so on through the American series. The extensively plated large cents, gold and other series were all of superior quality, and the sale included outstanding ancient and world coins as well. With the large number of nice quality plates, many fine properties can be easily provenanced to this landmark sale. One of three sales by Henry Chapman ranked "A+" by John Adams.

A superb thin planchet Elephant, far finer than typical and better than the frontline piece in most advanced cabinets. Smooth, glossy surfaces exhibit choice light brown color on both sides. The obverse is ideally centered, the reverse is aligned slightly to the left. The aesthetic appeal is excellent, with no notable post-striking flaws. Though the undertype retains little detail, this piece is



overstruck, probably on a Charles II halfpenny. Some relics of design are visible on the elephant's hindquarters. The edge shows some short splits created at the moment of striking, and a trivial pit is seen in the upper right obverse field. A very nice example of this challenging variety.

Undated (ca. 1694) London Elephant Token. Hodder 2-B, W-12040. Rarity-2. GOD PRESERVE LONDON. Thick Planchet. AU Details—Environmental Damage (PCGS). There is plenty of sharp to full detail remaining on both sides of this piece to tempt the budget minded type collector of colonial and related coinage. The obverse is toned in a blend of autumn-brown and medium brown colors, while the reverse is medium brown overall. Both sides are equally original in preservation, although unfortunately both show areas of pitting to explain the PCGS qualifier, the most significant of which are on the obverse around the elephant's shoulder. Marks are mostly minor and well scattered, however, so in general this is a pleasing, if more affordable AU example of this enigmatic type. PCGSP 55.

"1778-1779" (ca. 1780) Rhode Island Ship Medal. Betts-562, W-1730. Without Wreath Below Ship. Brass. EF-40 (PCGS). This visually appealing piece exhibits blushes of copper-rose patina to dominant bright brassy-gold color. Light carbon and a bit of surface scaling in isolated peripheral areas is noted for accuracy, but in the absence of significant marks the in hand appearance is quite smooth. Well defined for the grade, we note only light wear that is largely confined to the high points. The overall detail is bold and allows full appreciation of this fascinating, if somewhat enigmatic design.

The Rhode Island Ship medals are believed to have been struck around 1780, though by whom and for what reason remains unclear. For generations, it has been assumed that the obverse is a satirical representation of Lord Howe's flagship fleeing Narragansett Bay in 1779, an interpretation in part based on the earliest versions bearing the word VLUGTENDE ("fleeing") underneath Howe's

"1778-1779" (ca. 1780) Rhode Island Ship Medal. Betts-563, W-1745. Wreath Below Ship. Pewter. EF Details—Scratch (PCGS). Handsome, fully original color in deep pewter-gray greets the viewer from both sides. Tinpest has invaded the planchet in several areas around both the obverse and reverse, where the surfaces are rough and devoid of detail due to metal loss. On the positive side, the centers are not only generally smooth, but they retain plenty of sharp detail to allow full appreciation of the overall design. The PCGS qualifier concerns a pair of bisecting scratches in the upper ship. The most recent scholarship asserts that it is actually a British medal intended for the Dutch market, or a Dutch product created to garner support to the British cause in the global war for empire that raged throughout the 1770s and 1780s. It would appear that if it was intended to influence Dutch feelings towards a more pro-British position, it failed. Often at loggerheads with each other, British and Dutch relations were very tense, culminating in December 1780 when the Dutch joined other European nations in the League of Armed Neutrality.

Rhode Island Ship medals with VLUGTENDE are of the highest rarity. The transitional type with VLUGTENDE removed, offered here, and the later modified die with the wreath, are of roughly similar rarity with most examples in the VF to AU grade range. Mint State specimens are notable rarities.

Though not rare, there is a degree of collecting pressure on stylistically distinctive varieties that other die pairings generally do not attract. Laughing Heads can come nice, but they are not often as nice as this choice piece. Beautiful satin surfaces are hard, tight, and free of troublesome blemishes. Rich autumn-brown patina throughout, both sides also with intermingled steelolive. The strike is ever so slightly off center, though dentils of varying depth are visible in some areas around both sides. It would be difficult to improve upon this specimen, especially without venturing into Mint State territory, where prices climb significantly. A coin that offers exceptional value as well as genuinely premium quality surfaces for the type. PCGS# 358. NGC ID: 2B2W.

Extremely Rare Machin's Mills / Connecticut Muling Vlack 13-87CT Just Six Known

1787 Machin's Mills (Atlee) Counterfeit Halfpenny / Connecticut Copper Muling. Vlack 13-87CT, Miller 101-G.2, W-7890. Rarity-7+. Fine Details—Scratch (PCGS). 134.0 grains. Dark brown fields surround design motifs and legends that are worn to a pleasing olive-brown hue. Surfaces are lightly granular but not disturbingly so. The planchet itself is a study in the colonial era minting process, with two small curved planchet clips most easily seen at the 2 o'clock and 6 o'clock on the reverse; there is also a pronounced planchet cutter lip between the 3 o'clock and 6 o'clock positions of the reverse.

The dies are oriented at about 85 degrees, well beyond the usual 'coin turn orientation. A trio of deep marks across King George's head are most probably contemporary with this coin's circulation, as they have blended quite well with the overall patina of the surfaces; these hits gently bowed the planchet, creating a convex surface at the central reverse that accelerated wear to that area. Despite this impairment, the evenness of the surfaces and pleasing tone give this coin a decent overall appearance.

We are delighted to be able to once again present this rarity for sale, one of just six specimens reported for the variety. The finest thought to exist is in an eastern collection, unseen by your cataloger and most students of the series. The second best was offered in our (Stack's) Ford IX sale of 2005 as lot 506, bringing \$40,250. That piece was fairly smooth and pleasing despite some inherent planchet texture at central reverse; it was graded therein as 'About Very Fine' but would likely be accorded full VF status by most observers. The Ted Craige specimen, offered here again, is perhaps a bit less sharp than the Twin Leaf Collection specimen that realized \$10,200 in our Spring 2019 Baltimore Auction; the latter was certified Fine Details-Environmental Damage by PCGS at the time of sale. Another piece is impounded among the Colonial Newsletter Foundation / Ned Barnsley coins at the ANS, but it grades just poor, while the sixth appeared in 2016. Depending upon how one views the damage on the present coin relative to the impairment of the Twin Leaf piece, the former ranks as either third or fourth finest known

1786 Vermont Copper. Landscape. RR-8, Breen 6-E, W-2030. Rarity-3. VERMONTENSIUM. EF-45 BN (NGC). Arguably the scarcest of the three VERMONTENSIUM varieties and almost certainly the most challenging to find in choice better grades. The present example offers a great deal of bold to sharp detail from a generally well executed strike. The impression is only trivially off center on both sides, affecting only the denticulation along the lower obverse and upper reverse borders. There are no singularly distracting marks, and the planchet is free of flaws apart from a single notable fissure at the upper reverse. We do, however, note a trace of glossiness and curious iridescent champagne-pink highlights that point to a light cleaning. Otherwise medium brown in color, with much to attract type collectors of colonial and early Federal era coinage.

The obverse centering is strong with the rim just to the top of the letter V in VERMON, no marks of consequence present, tiny patch of planchet roughness below effigy. Faint die cracks are present on the obverse, one from the ribbon ends to E, another from the border to M, and another from R that curves upward across the M to the border above O. The reverse is equally well centered with only the denticulation from 7 to 1 o'clock off the flan. Die crack at the digits 178 of date, but evidently this is an early reverse state as none of the other usual cracks are seen. Tiny, natural fissures, as made, are seen just above the date and at the top left of the shield, best seen under low magnification. The most often seen weights for this variety are in the range of 115 to 125 grains - the present piece falls slightly below this range. As exemplified by the present example, RR-20 features some of the finest planchet stock in the Vermont copper series. Even so, this variety is rare in grades above Choice VF. The primary Partrick coin (Heritage, January 2015, lot 5793) is a strong contender for finest known. Choice for the grade, both physically and aesthetically, the coin offered here approaches the Carlotto plate coin for overall sharpness.

An uncommonly well preserved example of this intriguing early American token with glossy mahogany-brown surfaces that retain traces of mint frost. Late state of the dies with a large die break at the top left corner of the clock and spalling in the fields and peripheries of both sides. The exact origins of these tokens remain a mystery, but it is likely they were made at least a few decades after the 1789 date they bear and the die work appears to match that of some other tokens produced by Robert Lovett, Sr. in the 1830s. This is a choice and appealing example.

CASTORLAND MEDAL, OR JETON





1796 Castorland Medal, or Jeton. Original. Lecompte-195, W-9100. Silver. Reeded Edge. MS-62 (PCGS). 15.16 grams. Superior quality for the type, both sides reveal considerable semi-reflectivity in the fields as the medal dips into a light. Generally light silver-gray in appearance, yet with enhancing blushes of iridescent reddish-gold toning around the peripheries. Sharply defined overall with only wispy handling marks precluding a higher grade. The Castorland medals or jetons (or as Breen called them "demi ecu") are as enigmatic as they are rare. The original strikes in silver, as here, were probably struck to circulate among the denizens of the 630,000 acre parcel of upstate New York which French settlers founded in 1793. The settlers built a mill, a forge, and a canal and settled two villages, Castorville (now Castorland), and Carthage. The name itself, Castorland, is from the French "castor" or beaver, an example of which figures prominently in the medal's design. Nearly always seen in well-circulated condition, original Castorland pieces - they have been restruck many times over the past two centuries - have long been popular with collectors in America. We see these only occasionally, rarely in Mint State, and when offered the bidding is substantial.

1783 Washington Georgivs Triumpho Token. Musante GW-54, Baker-7, W-10100. AU-55 (PCGS). Lovely medium brown surfaces with a tinge of warm rose patina discernible as the token rotates under a light. Well struck for one of these, trivial signs of handling hardly interfere with the bold, overall smooth appearance to both sides. The design of this type remains somewhat enigmatic, though the fleur-delis decorated basket in which Britannia sits is now thought to be that of a hot air balloon — this theory suggested as the first hot air balloon made its ascent in September 1783, the same month in which the Treaty of Paris was signed, marking the official end of the Revolutionary War. "1783" (ca. 1820) Washington Military Bust Copper. Musante-109B, Baker-4, Vlack 2-B, W-10165. Large Military Bust. Proof-62 BN (NGC). An extremely rare and highly unusual specimen of Large Military Bust Washington token, the first we have encountered graded with a Proof designation. The strike and luster are indeed suggestive of a special production, the detail is extremely sharp, the borders high and show a partial wire rim, and the fields on both sides display reflective luster while the devices are lightly frosted. Advanced die state with die cracks on both sides, indicating this special striking likely came after the normal production run of the Vlack 2-B die pair. Mottled orange and brown with silvery-blue iridescence. Fingerprint stains are noted on both sides but there are no significant abrasions. NGC has labeled this coin a Restrike, but only the 1783 Draped Bust Washington pieces are known to have been restruck later than the 1820s, not the Military Bust type as here. A fascinating and distinctive piece.

Very Rare Liberty and Security Penny With Corded Rims

Undated (ca. 1795) Washington Liberty and Security Penny. Musante GW-45, Baker-30E, W-11055. Copper. ASYLUM Edge, Engine Turned or Corded Outer Rims. MS-64 BN (PCGS). Light mahogany surfaces with some pleasing reddish orange remaining, particularly in the reverse fields. Glossy on the sharply struck reliefs, while the fields are generously lustrous. The corded rim ornamentation that makes this a rare variant of an otherwise fairly available issue is quite sharp, though somewhat obscured by the grading holder in places. A few trivial hairlines are noted upon close inspection. Fairly close in condition to the lovely example we sold in our Spring sale, but that one had a large planchet-cutter mark that was a bit distracting. This one has no such features, and though it is graded Brown instead of Red Brown, many would find it the more desirable of the two.

It has been estimated that just eight to 10 examples exist with this distinctive rim treatment, but the number might be just a hair higher. We have five distinct specimens in our online archives going back to 2007, and it seems that as many as seven others can be fairly quickly found. Interestingly, these tend to be in nice condition, suggesting that their initial distribution might have been different than that of the usual uncorded pieces.

As is often the case with Newman 8-B, the definition on the sun face and sun dial is especially intricate and sharp, making this variety an excellent choice for type collectors.

A few flan flaws (as made) are noted, most significantly on the obverse to the left of the area of die swell and on the reverse at the upper border. Superior quality for one of the more popular die marriages of the Fugio cent for high quality type purposes, as 189 examples of Newman 8-X remained in the Bank of New York hoard in 1948.

In the modern market, they enjoy unflagging demand among both high grade type collectors and series specialists.

Quite attractive, though showing some of the usual central softness of strike associated with the issue. The NE is mostly bold and the XII is crisp. Exceptionally nice for one of these. Bowers (2020) reports a mintage of 12 as part of sets, plus additional singles by Wyatt, and yet others by Edwin Bishop of New York City. Examples are scarce in today's market, and with the quality offered here they are rare.

The historic first year 1793 half cent is also eagerly sought at all grades as the only Head Left issue in the Liberty Cap series. This more affordable EF offers universally bold to sharp detail that allows full appreciation of the design. Dark copper-brown surfaces are rough and granular overall to explain the NGC qualifier, but in the absence of sizeable marks they are actually quite smooth in hand.

A popular variety of the first year 1809 Classic Head half cent that was long thought to be an overdate, Cohen-5 has since been reclassified as having the primary digit 9 in the date punched over an inverted 9. Remnants of the underdigit are clearly evident with the aid of a loupe. This variety barely edges our C-6 as the most readily obtainable of the issue with William R. Eckberg accounting for approximately 4,500 survivors in all grades in his 2019 reference The Half Cent, 1793-1857: The Story of America's Greatest Little Coin. The author further asserts, "UNCs are plentiful; probably at least 60 exist." Technically sound and visually appealing, the PCGS/CAC MS-64 BN example offered here will appeal to discerning numismatists, be they type collectors or early copper enthusiasts.

Medium golden-brown and antique copper patina blankets both sides, the reverse a bit more boldly toned than the obverse. The former side also exhibits a trace of microgranularity when observed with the aid of a loupe, although both sides are overall smooth in hand with few blemishes of note. In fact, the only mark worthy of individual attention is a small planchet void on Liberty's cheek. Well centered in strike with plenty of bold detail remaining, there is much to recommend this coin to advanced type collectors as well as early copper specialists.

Historically 1793 large cents have been one of the most coveted of collector coins. These impressive copper pieces were the first coins the new Philadelphia Mint issued in quantity as coinage first began in the United States. The first cents display the Flowing Hair, Chain Reverse motif launched on March 1, 1793 with 36,103 coins struck of that type before public outcry over the design forced a change in mid 1793 to an entirely new design. This is when the 1793 Wreath cents were launched, with the output reaching 63,353 pieces before the public cried out once again and a third revision to the large cent design was undertaken late that year. The resulting Liberty Cap design proved more agreeable to contemporary Americans than its Chain Reverse and Wreath Reverse predecessors with coinage of that design type lasting into 1796.

Supposedly hidden in a small keg (or multiple kegs), the hoard was named for John Swan Randall of Norwich, New York, who purchased the coins after they had changed hands several times since their discovery. After Randall's death in 1878, the coins that remained were offered at auction by Edward D. Cogan. The most readily obtainable variety from the Randall Hoard is the 1818 N-10, followed by the 1820 N-13 (offered here). Over the years, even as late as the 1970s, it was not unheard of to find groups of Randall Hoard cents offered by coin dealers. However, as the 20th century came to a close, examples were usually found as individual pieces.

James Barton Longacre's Indian cent made its debut in 1859 with a mintage of 36,400,000 circulation strikes and approximately 800 Proofs. The obverse portrait is not of a Native American but is a representation of Liberty wearing a feathered headdress. The artist's original concept for this design appeared in 1849 on the gold dollar, and subsequently went through various refinements before appearing on the one-cent piece. The reverse exhibits a simple olive wreath without a shield at its top, a design that was abandoned in 1860 in favor of the Oak Wreath with Shield design. (The olive wreath has gone down in numismatic literature as a laurel wreath due to Mint Director James Ross Snowden's designation from 1860.) The 1859 Indian cent, therefore, is a one year design type that is eagerly sought by collectors.

Many 1859 Indian cents have survived in Mint State, but most are poorly defined due to the Mint's widespread use of worn dies in production of this issue. Well produced and expertly preserved, the coin offered here will please even the most discerning numismatist.

1852 MS-66+ (PCGS). This virtually pristine premium Gem comes highly recommended for inclusion in the finest numismatic cabinet, be it a type set or a specialized collection of silver three-cent pieces. Bathed in full, vibrant, satin to softly frosted luster, both sides are as smooth and inviting as we have seen in a three-cent silver of any date in recent memory. The outward appearance is one of silver-white brilliance, although closer inspection does reveal subtle gold and apricot highlights that are highly attractive. Boldly struck, expertly preserved, and sure to sell for a very strong bid.

Authorized by the Act of March 3, 1851, the silver three-cent piece entered its second year of production in 1852 with a delivery of 18,663,500 pieces from the Philadelphia Mint — the highest yearly total achieved for the type. The success of this denomination in circulation was at its peak during the early 1850s, where the Type I examples of reduced silver composition (75% silver, 25% copper, as opposed to standard silver alloy of 90% silver, 10% copper) were eagerly sought as replacements for old tenor half dimes, dimes, quarters and half dollars withdrawn from circulation due to rising silver prices. After another substantial mintage in 1853 (11.4 million pieces), however, the usefulness of the silver three-cent piece began to wane, and yearly mintages for circulation fell off accordingly. The Act of February 21, 1853 reduced the weight of most other silver denominations, thereby allowing them to circulate freely once again. This development, by extension, sharply reduced contemporary demand for the three-cent silver. The denomination would solider on through 1873, nonetheless, the post-1853 examples changed to the standard alloy of 90% silver, 10% copper and featuring either the Type II or Three II design. For collectors seeking just one piece to represent this denomination in a type set, however, the Type I issues of 1851 to 1853 hold the most appeal. Produced during the heyday of this denomination, and accounting for the majority of three-cent silvers extant, these early issues are understandably popular among collectors of both circulated and Mint State coins. For those in the latter category, and especially those demanding the utmost in technical quality and eye appeal, we can think of no finer representative of the denomination than this beautiful premium Gem 1852.

The popular 1796 is the first of only two half dime years that feature the Draped Bust, Small Eagle design type. Two die marriages are known with Logan-McCloskey 1, represented here, corresponding to the LIKERTY Guide Book variety. This name is derived from the use of a broken B punch that gives that letter the appearance of a K. While not as rare as LM-2, LM-1 is scarce in its own right with most survivors well worn, if not also impaired. The handsome AU offered here would serve as a highlight in any cabinet.

The Draped Bust, Small Eagle type coin has always been one of the most difficult type issues to obtain wholesome. Most of those that do survive show evidence of a hard life, scratches, dents and even bends are common on these small silver coins, and few exist as pleasing as the present example.

Circulation strike half dime production remained strong at the Philadelphia Mint in 1862, despite the fact that by the early summer of that year silver had disappeared from circulation in the East and Midwest due to the uncertain situation created by the Civil War. With a generous mintage of 1,492,000 pieces and a good rate of survival for Mint State coins, this is a popular type issue with qualityconscious collectors. There was a curious monetary situation on the West Coast during the Civil War. Silver and gold coins circulated at par, and freely, while federal Legal Tender notes traded at a deep discount. In contrast, in the East, silver coins disappeared in the spring of 1862, due to hoarding, and issues produced after that time were retained by the Treasury or sold at a sharp premium in relation to Legal Tender notes. Although the mintage of the 1863-S was generous, at the time there was no known numismatic interest in collecting such pieces. Today, examples in the presently offered condition are seldom seen. Unfortunately, the JR book lists that coin as Lot 130 in the Miles sale (Lot 130 is an 1809 large cent) and the single 1827 dime in the April, 1969 Miles sale has neither a photograph nor a die variety description, which makes us question the veracity of the information presented in the book on this variety. 

1799 was a very busy year at the Philadelphia Mint for silver dollar production. Some 423,515 coins were struck from 22 die pairs that year, three of which bear the 1799/8 overdate. The most fascinating and popular of these overdate varieties is the BB-141 combination, which has guite a tale to tell. The obverse die bearing the 1798 date was prepared but was not used, so the date was recut to 1799, though remnants of the 8 remain visible. In addition, the reverse die of BB-141 die is a study in diecutter improvisation and adaptation. When the engraver was entering the stars, he elected to put one arc of seven stars, then a second arc of six stars, then flanked the eagle with two more stars, rendering 15 stars all told on the reverse, two too many. Realizing this and because die steel was at a premium, the diecutter tried to correct the mistake by drastically enlarging the leftmost and rightmost clouds in an attempt to cover up the extraneous stars. This adaptation did not fully hide the two stars so that they remain partially visible. The die nonetheless entered service and a sizable quantity of silver dollars were made with this die pairing. Thanks in no small part to speculators buying up as many silver dollars and selling them overseas at a profit, perhaps between 700 and 1,200 pieces survive, mostly in the middle to higher circulated grade levels. This die pair becomes a notable condition rarity at the AU level and above. The expert preservation and original patina of the offered coin make this a desirable example for discriminating silver dollar connoisseurs.

1863 OC-1. Rarity-3-. AU Details-Cleaned (PCGS). The story of the 1863 mirrors that of most other post-1853 circulation strike Liberty Seated dollars. In order to discourage hoarding and allow the coins to once again circulate freely, the Act of February 21, 1853, reduced the weight of the half dime, dime, quarter and half dollar. The weight of the silver dollar remained unchanged, however, as the denomination was essentially a storehouse for bullion whose most widespread use was in international commerce. Indeed, circulation strike Liberty Seated dollars of the 1854 to 1873 era can generally be regarded as predecessors to the trade dollar of 1873 to 1883. There are some exceptions, most notably the Carson City Mint issues of 1870 to 1873, which saw considerable use in local commerce. As a rule, however, circulation strike silver dollars of the late 1850s, 1860s and early 1870s were struck almost exclusively at the request of bullion depositors who used them in international transactions. The most popular destinations for these coins were Liverpool, England and China. Some of the coins shipped to England found their way back to the United States, such as in payment for bales of cotton, accounting for many circulated survivors of scarce Philadelphia Mint issues from the 1850s and 1860s. On the other hand, virtually all of the coins shipped to the Orient were eventually destroyed through melting.

Demand from contemporary merchants and other bullion depositors resulted in a mintage of 27,200 circulation strike silver dollars in 1863. Survivors are elusive in all grades, both circulated and Mint State. Writing in the 2018 reference *Liberty Seated Dollars: A Register of Die Varieties*, Dick Osburn and Brian Cushing account for only 450 coins extant. Near-Mint survivors such as offered here are in the distinct minority among survivors, and they probably represent coins that remained stateside as part of bullion reserves. The surfaces are a bit dull from the stated cleaning, and each side presents a deeply toned finish.

"Following the closing of the New Orleans Mint, quantities of 1885-O dollars were shipped to the Treasury Building in Washington, D.C. and the Philadelphia Mint for long-term storage. From the Washington vault, 1885-O dollars were paid out beginning by the early 1930s, and in multiple-bag quantities in 1938, 1953, 1954, and 1957. In October 1962, continuing into early 1963, vast quantities, probably amounting to millions of coins, were released from storage at the Philadelphia Mint. The 1883-O, 1884-O, and 1885-O constitute the bulk of approximately 10 million coins released from a long-sealed vault in the Philadelphia Mint, beginning in October 1962 and continuing through much of 1963. My estimate is that the breakdown of these three dates is about as follows: 1883-O: 1.5 to 2.5 million coins; 1884-O: 2.5 to four million coins; and 1885-O: two to 3.5 million coins. These are, of course, in addition to bags released before 1962."

Thanks to these releases, the 1885-O is one of the most available Morgan silver dollars. However, no issue in this perennially popular and widely collected series is plentiful in the finest Mint State grades, as here. An important opportunity for the discerning collector.

While some of these coins may have found their way into the stocks of contemporary dealers, many Proof 1874 trade dollars were lost. The same set of circumstances also affected the first year 1873 and, indeed, these two issues are the rarest and most underrated Proof trade dollars of the 1873 to 1883 era. The 1874 is particularly elusive in high grades, as related by Bruce Amspacher (quoted in Bowers, 1993): "The rarest of the non-clandestine [i.e., 1884 and 1885] issues in gem condition." Clearly this visually appealing Proof-66 represents an important find.



1878-S Trade. MS-64+ (NGC). CAC. This handsome piece is richly toned over smooth, satiny, sharply defined surfaces. Rose and lavender-gray toning is accented with olive color at certain border areas. Although the order from Secretary of the Treasury John Sherman halting circulation strike trade dollar production was issued on February 22, 1878, the San Francisco Mint continued striking coins until early April, by which time 4,162,000 pieces had been delivered. This is the fourth highest mintage in the trade dollar series and was achieved to make good on existing orders for these coins. One of the most frequently encountered trade dollars in numismatic circles, the 1878-S is a perennial favorite for type purposes in both circulated and Mint State grades.

However, not a lot of attention was paid to it at the time of production and few Gems are known. Several factors account for the lack of nice examples; they were carelessly made and had overall low relief making them more susceptible to early wear especially when jostled around in pockets or stored in sacks. In addition, once the novelty of the coin wore off, the only real customer for them was casinos where they spent time in dollar slot machines getting all sorts of mechanical damage. Assembling a top tier collection of Eisenhower dollars can be surprisingly formidable. Only a single MS-67 is recorded at PCGS, making this MS-66+ specimen a find.

Most features are fully rendered, in fact, and softness in the center of the reverse affecting the letters LA in DOLLAR is the result of a shallow, Mint-made depression in the planchet that is also present on the 2008 Winter plate coin. (This feature is likely the result of foreign matter adhering to the reverse die.) In the absence of significant marks, we leave it to a small post-striking scuff in the field above the denomination to serve as a pedigree marker.

From a mintage for the date of just 9,434 pieces, down more than 31,833 pieces from the Charlotte Mint gold dollar output of the preceding year. This elusive issue is found in VF or EF more often than not, and even pleasing Choice AU coins are definitely among the minority of the 250 to 350 examples thought to exist. Mint State survivors of all stripes are rare, while with the quality, originality and eye appeal offered here they are exceedingly so. This is the last Charlotte Mint gold dollar until the Type II 1855-C, and after that the Carolina Mint issued gold dollars in just two years, 1857 and 1859. A fantastic condition rarity that would do equal justice to a gold dollar collection or an advanced Southern gold cabinet.

Winter-2 is the more readily obtainable die pairing of the 1852-C gold dollar, and it is readily identifiable by repunching to the digits 18 in the date. The offered coin reveals faint clash marks in the fields when studied under magnification.

The second strike is positioned at 6:30 relative to the obverse, and it is also discernible in the opposing area on the reverse. Apart from the denticles, however, the second strike shows no definition, as made. For the primary strike we note plenty of bold definition for a lightly circulated Type II gold dollar, especially one from the New Orleans Mint. Light hairlines and a touch of glossiness are noted, and there appears to also be evidence of a bend when the coin is observed through the PCGS holder. With only 1,600 pieces produced, the 1880 has the lowest mintage among circulation strike gold dollars from the Philadelphia Mint excepting only the fabled 1875. However, the 1880 is obtainable today as many were sold to numismatists at the time of issue. Contemporary numismatic interest in low mintage circulation strike gold dollars began in earnest in 1879 and continued through the series' end in 1889, explaining the overall availability of issues such as the 1880 and the generally high quality of many of the survivors. The more common in numismatic circles, JD-1, was also used to coin the 7,500 circulation strikes of the date. The Low Date JD-2 die pairing, however, is far rarer with only 30 to 50 coins believed extant. This issue as a whole is scarce, of course, and the present offering represents a particularly important opportunity for the advanced numismatist, be their focus on quality or underrated varieties.

These were preserved by design to save money for that rainy day, some with care, others commonly by chance. These two pairings are readily identified by examining the reverse: BD-1, as here, has a very widely spaced 5 D, while BD-2 has the denomination compact. BD-1 forms the bulk of the production with maybe 45,000 to 60,000 pieces struck from this die par alone, with 10,000 to 15,000 examples coined for BD-2. Even with this fairly substantial mintage, because of mass speculation and melting during the 1820s, less than 1% survive to this day. John W. Dannreuther's (2006) estimate on the number of BD-1 survivors is in the range of 300 to 450 coins. The president originally demanded that the motto be left out of the Saint-Gaudens design because he felt that the use of a deity's name on money was blasphemy. The Philadelphia Mint's premier circulation strike of the Motto design, the 1908 was produced to the extent of 341,370 pieces. Mint State survivors are relatively obtainable by the standards of this conditionally challenging series, although most are in lower grades than that offered here. A premium near-Gem worthy of the strongest bids.

1854-S Unc Details—Cleaned (PCGS). From one of the most historic and eagerly sought issues in the Liberty Head double eagle series comes this smartly impressed, near-fully defined coin. The S mintmark is a bit weak. There is nothing to report in the way of actual wear, although surface dullness explains the PCGS qualifier. Pleasingly colored an even deep olive-golden.

After several years of political wrangling, the mint in San Francisco was finally opened for business in March 1854. It was first located in the offices of highly regarded private coiners Moffat & Company at 608-610 Commercial Street. In 1874 it was replaced by a larger facility better suited for mass production. The first coins struck in 1854 were the five main gold denominations: gold dollar, quarter eagle, half eagle, eagle, and double eagle. A total of 141,468 \$20 gold pieces were struck in that first year, all of which were promptly absorbed into the regional economy and would remain there for years. Because of the coins' heavy use in a cash-starved West, this is a comparatively scarce issue that is almost always found in low grades. The present example, retaining its full detail that the typical 1854-S double eagle does not. Being offered in today's market, this coin is sure to appeal to advanced gold enthusiasts.

1857 MS-61 (**PCGS**). A lovely example with subtle pale rose highlights to dominant honey-gold patina. Sharply, if not fully struck throughout with outstanding luster quality for the assigned grade. The Philadelphia Mint produced slightly more double eagles in 1857 than it did the previous year, although this issue's mintage of 439,375 circulation strikes is still modest for the era. Face value for the issue amounted to \$8,787,500. Perhaps 40 to 60 or so different Mint State examples are extant, with nearly all confined to the MS-60 to MS-62 grade range. Finer than the coin that sold as lot 12015 in our August 2014 sale of the Gilded Age Collection of Liberty Head Double Eagles, this richly original, softly frosted example would make an impressive addition to an advanced collection of this perennially popular series.

1857-O Winter-1, the only known dies. EF-40 (PCGS). A wholly original, aesthetically pleasing EF to represent this elusive New Orleans Mint issue. Warm honey-olive color throughout, both sides retain sufficiently bold detail for a lightly circulated survivor from this challenging Southern coinage facility. Traces of luster remain, as well, and the surfaces are uncommonly smooth for the assigned grade.

The 1857-O and 1858-O are anomalies among New Orleans Mint double eagles from the late 1850s, being the only two issues from that era with mintages in excess of 10,000 coins. For the 1857-O, records provide a figure of 30,000 pieces struck in New Orleans, despite the mint being closed in the early part of the year due to repair work to the building. Apparently more gold bullion reached New Orleans from California in 1857 than in the previous three years, and proportionally more coins were produced. However, a more generous mintage does not mean that the 1857-O is a readily obtainable double eagle. In fact, it is still an elusive key date, with perhaps as few as 200 pieces surviving in all grades.

After producing 19,250 double eagles in early 1861 using the Paquet Reverse, the San Francisco Mint went on to strike an additional 768,000 examples using the pre-existing reverse by James Barton Longacre. The "regular reverse" 1861-S twenty is available in lower circulated grades but is scarce in AU and above.

An exception to the general rule for double eagle issues from the Civil War and Reconstruction eras, many were sent to Europe, and of these at least a few hundred were not melted. Among lightly circulated survivors, few that we have seen over the years even approach, let alone match, the quality of this piece.

The mintage for the 1872-S amounted to 780,000 pieces, reduced by 148,000 coins from the previous year at the San Francisco Mint. As with many issues from the era, some portion found its way into overseas banking and bullion transactions. Perhaps 100 only or so Uncirculated coins are known today, with the preponderance of such pieces at MS-60 or just slightly finer. Many of the Uncirculated 1872-S double eagles in numismatic hands were returned to America from overseas banking sources beginning in the latter half of the 20th century. Given that the certified population of this issue dwindles rapidly above the present grade level, this lovely MS-61 represents the finest realistically obtainable in an 1872-S \$20 as far as most collectors are concerned.

1873-CC AU Details-Cleaned (NGC). Warm, even honey-rose color blankets both sides and, along with bold to sharp striking detail, enhances the appearance of this more affordable 1873-CC \$20. While there are few individually mentionable marks, heavy hairlining is noted and explains the NGC qualifier. Only 22,410 double eagles made their way off the coin press at the famed Western facility in 1873, all of which entering local commercial channels where they served as the workhorse large denomination coin. Unlike most of their contemporaries from the other mints, only a paltry quantity of 1873-CC double eagles went overseas, which ultimately limited the number of high grade survivors for later numismatists to enjoy. Just about a dozen Mint State examples are known (Rusty Goe, 2020, is slightly more liberal with an estimate of 15 to 20 pieces), making the 1873-CC \$20 a major condition rarity. Of the remaining estimated 250 to 375 circulated specimens thought extant, the vast majority are at the lower end of grade scale, clustering primarily at the VF and EF levels. Given the popularity of CC-Mint gold coinage today's market, this specimen represents an important find for the budget-conscious collector.

Portions of the mintage were used in international trade, repatriations in recent decades accounting for many of the 600 to 800 or more Mint State examples that we believe can be traced today. Most of these grade MS-60 to MS-62, yet even they represent a marked increase in quality over the VF and EF examples that were used to represent the 1878 in most "old time" collections. With superior technical quality and strong visual appeal, this condition rarity MS-63 is sure to catch the eye of advanced double eagle enthusiasts.

Most of these circulated extensively on the West Coast, although others were shipped overseas and found their way into European bank hoards. Q. David Bowers estimated a circulated population of 900 to 1,200 or more examples when he wrote his Guide Book of Double Eagles back in 2004. His estimate has stood the test of time. Far finer than the typically encountered AU survivor, this premium quality coin is worthy of the strongest bids.

Just 283,000 double eagles were struck at the San Francisco Mint in 1887. Although this is not a particularly small mintage in an absolute sense, it marked the lowest production for double eagles coined at the San Francisco facility during the 1880s. As recently as 1982, David W. Akers considered the 1887-S to be scarce in Uncirculated condition, and Mint State examples appeared in fewer than 10% of the major auction sales that he surveyed in preparation of his landmark double eagle treatise. Later in 2004, when Q. David Bowers authored his Guide Book of Double Eagles, the situation was completely different, as thousands of Uncirculated examples from overseas bank reserves had come to light, and were repatriated in American collections. Today, the more generous estimates place the Uncirculated population above the 3,000-coin figure. On the other hand, the finest that most collections can muster for the 1887-S is an MS-62. In MS-63 this issue is scarce, and it remains exceedingly rare any finer. Indeed, this is a Condition Census offering that represents a significant find for the quality conscious gold collector.

Akers recorded that he had never found an auction record for a Mint State example of this issue prior to 1965.

1893-CC AU-53 (NGC). Lustrous yellow-gold surfaces are sharply to fully defined throughout the design. 1893 was a momentous year for the nation's economy. The expansion of the railroads was funded largely through copious loans that proved to be high risk as creditors realized that the new railroads did not produce immediate dividends and began to call in their chits. This caused a significant credit crunch that rippled through the financial system as railroads could not pay back their immediate creditors, who in turn had overextended themselves with larger banking houses. The resulting panic was felt nationwide as more than 15,000 businesses of various types including some 500 banks defaulted on their loans and shut down. Meanwhile, the long struggling Carson City Mint was facing its own troubles as the Comstock Lode had basically dried up by this time, essentially eliminating the Nevada facility's raison d'etre. The 18,402 double eagles struck at Carson City in 1893 proved to be part of the mint's swan song when all coin production ceased by the end of the year and its doors finally shut. While the mintage figures are nowhere near the mint's high water mark in 1876 or even just three years earlier, the 1893-CC double eagle is exceptional in that unlike most previous issues which generally circulated locally, the majority were sent to overseas banks where they sat for decades. As coins were repatriated to an appreciative numismatic audience, many 1893-CC specimens were included and mostly in the higher circulated and lower Mint State grades. Because of this, this has proven to be an especially popular issue among collectors who wish just one Mint State double eagle from this historic mint, alongside Western gold specialists. This example will more than fit the bill and will find a position of honor in any cabinet.

The Panic of 1893 caused problems nationwide. The migration of double eagles to foreign countries increased. Treasury reserves were very low and, while undoubtedly a problem for the nation at the time, mass exports laid the groundwork for later repatriations that have provided many of the Mint State Liberty Head double eagles in today's market.

1895 MS-64+ (**PCGS**). Gorgeous green-gold patina mingles with fulsome satin luster on both sides of this beautiful near-Gem. Fully struck and, in our opinion, smooth enough to secure an even higher grade. The mintage for this issue amounted to 1,114,605 circulation strikes, down nearly 255,000 pieces from the previous year's tally. Face value totaled \$22,292,100. Much of the mintage found its way overseas in banking and other business transactions. Some 17,500 to 30,000 or more Mint State examples are extant, mainly in MS-60 to MS-63 with occasional forays into higher grades. Most Uncirculated coins are from repatriations of quantities that fled the country in the mid-1890s.

The Treasury was required to keep at least \$100,000,000 in gold coins on hand, but in February 1895 just \$41,393,212 was in the coffers. Gold coins by the millions continued to be shipped overseas, however, as the value of silver was less than half that of gold and foreign traders insisted on payments in the yellow metal. President Grover Cleveland reached a deal with J.P. Morgan & Co. and August Belmont & Co. of New York, in cooperation with N.M. Rothschild & Sons of London, to offer a bond issue that yielded 4% interest over 30 years especially aimed at European gold dealers. The bond issue sold out in 22 minutes! By March 30, the Treasury reported \$90 million on hand, with much more gold yet to arrive. Seemingly, J.P. Morgan and friends had saved the country. The specter of the government running completely out of gold coins passed!

The typical owner of a Mint State 1895 double eagle today probably does not know of the near panic that occurred during its year of issue and the great clash between silver and gold interests that took place from the late 1870s through the mid-1890s. This was the great political question of the era, overwhelming everything else.

Despite all the problems experienced with the original Saint-Gaudens High Relief design, a circulating version was ready toward the end of 1907. To avoid the multiple strikes required to bring up the relief on the MCMVII double eagles, Chief Engraver Charles Barber reduced the relief so that only a single strike from a regular high speed coining press would be required. The use of Roman numerals for the date was also discontinued. The Philadelphia Mint was the only facility that was in a position to produce the new coins so late in the year, and coined 361,667 pieces. The new low relief coins were released into general circulation on December 13, 1907, and while not quite the original idea Roosevelt and Saint-Gaudens had in mind, the Liberty Head design that Roosevelt so detested became a thing of the past.

Once released, numismatic attention was given to the High Relief MCMVII double eagles, leaving the "ordinary" low relief coins to join their Liberty Head cousins primarily for use in overseas transactions. Few thought to save these coins in high grade so they were either destroyed in the later melts in the 1930s or spent large amounts of time shuffled about in bags. Today, while there are a considerable number of examples in the lower Mint State grades, the issue becomes steadily rarer the closer to Gem it reaches. A few MS-66 examples can be located with some effort but truly outstanding specimens with excellent eye appeal, as here, are few and far between.

The Grant Memorial half dollars and gold dollars of 1922 were issued to commemorate the centenary of the birth of the Civil War hero and former president, Ulysses S. Grant, who was born in Clermont County, Ohio. While the Ulysses S. Grant Centenary Memorial Association planned several community buildings and roads in Grant's honor, only the short-lived festivities and these commemorative coins came to fruition.

The basic designs of the two denominations are identical and attributed to Laura Gardin Fraser. Small quantities of both the half dollar and gold dollar incorporated a five-pointed star as part of the design in the right obverse field. This feature has no known significance, and may have been included on some of the coins to create a distinct type that would require contemporary collectors to purchase multiple examples. Whatever its original purpose, if any, the star today serves to denote the scarcer half dollar and gold dollar variants of the Grant Memorial commemorative coins. In the case of the half dollar, only 5,000 circulation strikes were produced of the star variant, 750 examples of which were melted as unsold for a net mintage of just 4,250 coins. (Six additional coins were produced for assay purposes, as well as perhaps four Proofs.) Scarce in MS-65 and rare any finer, this upper end Gem ranks among the finest obtainable in today's market.

In 1921, the Ulysses S. Grant Centenary Memorial Association was established to raise funds to coordinate a series of special events and observances in commemoration of the centennial of the famed Union general and United States president. The Association planned to fund the creation of monuments, civic buildings and roads to honor Grant as well as celebratory activities through the sales of commemorative silver half dollars and gold dollars. Approved by Congress in February 1922, Laura Gardin Fraser was tapped to design the coins. Wife of the designer of the Buffalo nickel, James Earle Fraser, she was no stranger to commemorative coins, having designed the 1921 Alabama half dollar. The Grant design, shared across both denominations, exhibits a bust of Grant on the obverse and a representation of his childhood home surrounded in trees in Ohio. The Association adopted an idea that was employed on the Alabama and Missouri commemorative half dollars, the placement of a special mark on a select number of the coins to help generate interest, and by extension increase sales.

Here, the mark was a small star placed above Grant's name on the obverse. Originally intended to be used only on the gold dollar, a small number of half dollars were also struck with the star. The gold dollar was a success and the total authorized mintage of 10,000 coins — 5,000 of each with and without the star — were all sold out at the retail price of \$3/coin. Despite the revenue generated, none of the planned monuments were built, though the festivities did go on as planned.

Thanks to their small size and careful preservation, most examples today are known at the Choice and Gem Mint State level. Superb Gem Mint State specimens are scarce, but well worth seeking out as near perfect demonstrations of the engraver's art in miniature.

A Special Consignment of Rare Experimental Cents From the Estate of a General Motors Technical Center Employee

Stack's Bowers Galleries is pleased to present a special consignment of six experimental cents that are rare survivors an intriguing, yet little recognized and even less well understood projects in which the United States Mint was ever involved. These coins have been the subject of several excellent articles in recent decades, yet even so their existence and the project through which they were produced are unknown to most numismatists. Through this unique consignment Stack's Bowers Galleries hopes to shine a light into one of the darker corners of the United States Mint's history during the mid-20th century.

The story of these General Motors experimental cents begins in late 1963 with, oddly enough, a special viewing of the famous James Bond movie "Goldfinger." Since the plot of this movie includes a break-in at the United States Mint's Fort Knox facility, the Treasury Department was able to arrange a private viewing before the film's commercial release. Among those invited to attend were some high-level GM executives. After the movie the conversation turned to the nation-wide coin shortage during the mid-1960s. Believing that his firm could help solve the problem, a GM executive remarked that they could build a machine capable of striking 10,000 coins per minute. This off-hand remark was so well received that it developed into a joint venture between GM and the Mint to produce the press. The machine was so eagerly anticipated, and its projected capabilities held in such high esteem, that then-Mint Director Eva Adams declared it "will be the greatest development in the art of minting that has been made in the last 2,000 years."

General Motors assigned the project to their Manufacturing Development Department (later Staff), one of the firm's four major technical divisions, which carried out the work at the General Motors Technical Facility in Warren, Michigan. The design of the machine was based on a "roll forming press" with planchet cutters and coin dies mounted on the faces of two sets of opposing metal cylinders. The intention was to punch out planchets and strike them into coins almost simultaneously from a continuous coil of sheet copper. The final version of the press would have numerous dies installed to allow for multiple coins to be struck at the same time.

General Motors began testing this concept in 1964, using first a hand-operated, rotary-type machine, but eventually progressing to motor-driven machines that were the first true prototypes for the finished product. The dies that GM used also evolved throughout the early testing process, progressing from a simple initials-based design to one modelled in part after the Mint's regular issue Lincoln cent. The results of the first tests were promising enough that on July 25, 1965, GM and the Mint signed a \$500,000 contract for one coin roller. A demonstration for the Mint was given at the GM facility on November 2, 1965, after which GM received final approval to build a production model of the roller press, which the firm proceeded with in 1966.

Testing continued using the production model, although the dies were now supplied by the Mint in place of the earlier ones developed by GM. There were two reasons for this significant change. The first was related by retired General Motors Senior Project Engineer Walter M. Gaudette in an article written by Ken Potter and published at uspatterns.com:

"[Gaudette] said when Mint officials came into the G.M. Tech center and saw Lincoln Head tokens being produced they said something like: 'What the hell do you think you're doing!' and they explained that the pieces were being produced contrary to public law. (They were obviously referring to the 1947 regulation issued by Mint Director Nellie Tayloe Ross that stated: 'no official coinage dies, domestic or foreign' were to be used for striking trial pieces except under rigid security, that 'no special coinage dies bearing the inscription, insignia or device, in whole or part, of the United States or foreign government, bearing a resemblance thereto, is to be used for striking experimental or trial pieces.') Production of the Lincoln Head pieces was halted, and shortly after, dies simulating the metal flow of a Lincoln cent were supplied by the Mint."

Chief Engraver Frank Gasparro created the design of the so-called "Lady Head" experimental cent. In simulating the metal flow of a Lincoln cent, these new dies were also meant to confirm the roller press' ability to strike the Mint's regular issue cents of the era.

Despite initial high hopes and the considerable resources invested in it, by the late 1960s the roller press project had ended in failure. GM employees encountered overheating problems with the production press, which meant that it could not operate at high speeds for sustained periods. Lubricating oil for the dies leaking onto the sheet copper, a high rate of die breakage, and a complicated unloading device for the struck coins also contributed to the press' failure. It was also simply unpleasant to use, as related by one GM Tech Center employee: "We had all kinds of overheating problems. The oil vaporized like a cloud around the machine from the heat when we ran it, and it sounded like a hail storm. It was a very noisy machine."

The limited number of specimens struck during testing that escaped destruction after termination of the project are the only known numismatic relics of the United States Mint's experimentation with the roller press concept in the 1960s. Most have come to light through former General Motors employees or their families, as here. None are listed in the reference United States Pattern Coins by Dr. J. Hewitt Judd, although the "Lady Head" and one variety of "Lincoln Head" designs are featured in Andrew W. Pollock's 1994 book United States Patterns and Related Issues. Several examples of the "Lady Head" type have been sold in recent decades, along with at least one specimen of the "Lincoln Head." The early GM/ MD design is unlisted and currently known only through the two examples in this catalog, representing the first time that the type is being offered for sale.

Beginning in the mid-1990s, several articles have been written about the U.S. Mint – General Motors roller press project and the experimental cents that it produced. The most significant of these are listed below as sources for our cataloging of the present consignment. They are highly recommended for readers wishing to obtain more detailed information on this project and/or the technical aspects of the roller press and its development and operation.

Obv: Letters GM, for General Motors, with thin raised rim. Rev: Letters MD, for Manufacturing Development Department, with thin raised rim. Warmly toned in golden-brown, both sides readily reveal considerable faded orange pink color as the surfaces dip into a light. The simple design motifs are sharply rendered, the surfaces satiny in texture with no significant signs of handling. Faint, scattered carbon spots account for the MS-63 numeric grade from PCGS, the most prominent of which is in the obverse field above the left side of the letter M, and serves as useful identifier. One of the earliest experimental cents produced by General Motors as part of the roller press project, these GM/MD pieces were struck on one of the first prototype presses using dies created by GM. PCGS has incorrectly mounted this coin with the reverse up in the holder. Original golden-brown surfaces retain outlines of faded, yet still vivid mint orange color to the letters. Scattered carbon spots, especially in the upper obverse field, account for the lower Mint State rating from PCGS. There are no significant marks, however, and the in hand appearance is pleasingly smooth.

Well detailed for the type, the surfaces are generally medium brown in color, yet with ample mint orange color that is more pronounced on the obverse. There are no marks of consequence, only light carbon in and around the centers to explain the MS-62 numeric grade from PCGS.

Although once thought to have been a product of the United States Mint, the dies from which this type was struck are attributed to General Motors. They were made without official U.S. government knowledge at the firm's Tech Center in Warren, Michigan on an electrical discharge machine (EDM). Actual Lincoln cents acted as models in the Elox EDM machine, which created the dies through the spark erosion process. A product of General Motors earlier testing as part of this project, these pieces were struck on one of the first prototype roller presses. Rare.

These are also rounded except at the lower obverse, where the rim is somewhat flattened due to slight misalignment of the dies in the press. Struck from dies designed by Chief Engraver Frank Gasparro and supplied to General Motors by the United States Mint, this the most frequently encountered of these experimental roller press cents. The Control Code 30-M identifies this obverse die as being installed in the 30th row, middle bank of the cylinder in the press. Decidedly scarce, and a fascinating relic of this ultimately failed experiment on the part of the Mint - GM collaboration.

MINT ERRORS

1999 Lincoln Cent—Triple Struck and Cupped—MS-64 RD (PCGS). Portions of two strikes are readily evident, although one is distended, and the other is partial and further obscured by underlying zinc. The third impression is far off center with just a trace evident at the upper left obverse border of the distended strike. In addition to spreading the copper plating thin, the multiple strikes have resulted in a pronounced indentation in the planchet, as made, and thereby explaining the "cupped" designation from PCGS. Only one date is discernible, and then again just the digits 199. This is a visually dramatic Mint error on a modern Lincoln cent, and also a rare one, so interested parties would be wise to prepare for stiff competition in bidding.





1962-D Franklin Half Dollar—Peeling Lamination Reverse—MS-63 (PCGS). This visually stunning Mint error was almost certainly caused by an imperfection in the alloy of the planchet. The pressure of striking was too much for the imperfection, which caused a nearly bisecting lamination through the center of the reverse. The lamination begins just before 9 o'clock on that side and extends nearly to the opposite border close to the 2:30 position. The obverse is unaffected by the error, and both sides exhibit mottled golden-russet overtones to a base of antique silver-gray patina. Boldly to sharply defined, and sure to see spirited bidding among specialists.

1977-D Kennedy Half Dollar—Struck on Scrap Planchet—MS-66 (**PCGS**). 7.96 grams. An unusual error offering. Apparently a piece of a clad planchet made its way into the coining dies and was struck as a 1977-D half dollar. Subsequently, it made its way out of the Mint in a bag and was later rescued by a collector. Most of these we have seen are either undated, or in relatively poor condition. A Newly Discovered BG-606 Long Thought Unique None Seen Since 1956

1854 Round "Dollar" Locket. BG-606. Rarity-8. Liberty Head. EF-45 (Uncertified). Pleasing warm yellow-gold with light, even wear, and traces of natural debris still clinging to the surfaces on both sides. Looped at 12 o'clock, as made, with the presumably original jump ring intact. Hinged in the edge at 3 o'clock relative to the obverse. This was carefully masked by the maker, with the rims of both sides making it invisible from obverse or reverse examination, suggesting a great degree of care and skill in its production. The interior of the locket is light satiny gold, with the primary designs incuse inside. There are no additional contents.

The story of this piece begins with a proverbial "close-call." It was discovered in a box of mixed damaged coins, broken jewelry and various gold scrap in a deceased collector's holdings. It was a box clearly assembled with the melting pot in mind. Upon studying the contents, the present writer thought it wise to segregate the fractional gold coins to be sure there was nothing rare. The effort yielded nothing, until this final piece in the box. While working to attribute this clearly unusual type late one evening, the efforts were rewarded upon the discovery of a match to BG-606. The first scan of the description of this variety noted a single thrilling word, "unique," which prompted a closer look at the details of the specimen in hand to be absolutely sure. It was on this closer examination that a tiny hinge neatly hidden in the edge was noted. While this was a bit of a disappointment at first, a complete reading of the Breen-Gillio reference entry revealed that the only example previously seen, the T. James Clarke specimen in New Netherlands' 47th Sale, in April 1956, was also described as a hinged locket, this from Walter Breen's personal notes.

Remarkably, it is clear that the presently offered specimen is not the T. James Clarke piece, and thus it stands as the second example ever seen and the only one known today. The significance to numismatics is twofold. First, the discovery of something seemingly long lost to history always carries with it degrees of relief and excitement. In this case, the discovery also sheds important light on the true nature of BG-606, an issue long published, long sought after by serious collectors of the series, but equally long misunderstood. Since just two examples have ever been reported, and both are lockets, it seems probable that this is the natural original form of what numismatists have catalogued as BG-606. Further and even more significant evidence may be found in thoughtful examination of this piece. Though the BG reference discusses that the Clarke piece, the "lone survivor" had been "made into a hinged locket," this was almost certainly in error. The present piece was, in fact, never a coin. Both the obverse and reverse, the "coin" design surfaces, were clearly produced as shells from the outset. These were never in solid coin form, as the interior surfaces of the thin sheets of gold exhibit, as noted above, a satiny lustrous texture and design features incuse and in mirror-image. It is highly probable that what we know as BG-606 was produced, in total, as a jewelry item and simply misunderstood decades ago. As such, for any collector seeking to complete the BG reference, or even the prized Period One series, this piece is a must-have. There is simply no other form for BG-606, and this is the only one to come to market in 66 years. With the Clarke piece missing since the 1956 sale, this one may now have taken its place as the sole survivor. It is not a stretch to imagine that misunderstood Clarke "coin" lost to a melt many years ago at the hands of someone who simply didn't know better.



1872 Octagonal 25 Cents. BG-722, Musante-GW 818, Baker-503. Rarity-4-. Washington Head. MS-67 (PCGS). Virtually pristine for this perennially popular variety, vivid golden-yellow surfaces reveal subtle semi-reflective qualities in the fields. Otherwise satiny in texture with sharp striking detail and abundant visual appeal. The Washington Head varieties by Frontier & Bellemere, circa 1871 to 1875, are easily among the most eagerly sought of all the California Small Denomination gold issues. Fortunately for today's collectors, BG-722 is a somewhat available variety that allows for specialists and type collectors alike to obtain a pleasing specimen with a modicum of patience. The currently offered Superb Gem is exceptional and will find itself at home in the finest cabinet of these interesting and diverse issues.

Included are: 1937 Mercury dime, missing grading label, Mint State; 1942-D Mercury dime, missing grading label, Mint State; 1956 Franklin half dollar, missing grading label, Mint State; 1963 Franklin half dollar, missing grading label, Proof; 1964 Kennedy half dollar, handwritten label, Mint State; (2) 1965 Kennedy half dollars, handwritten label, Mint State; and 1922 Peace silver dollar, missing grading label with handwritten sticker, Mint State. Also included in this lot is a standard NGC series 7 sample slab with an 1981-S Proof Roosevelt dime. (Total: 9 coins)

NGC confirms the experimental nature of the slabs and that the party who owned these was helping them in the development of new

holders. The three Kennedy half dollars with handwritten labels are notable for having variations in the coating and/or dipping of the plastic with some type of protective substance and close inspection under a bright light does reveal a unique look between them. All three are dated 10/4/96. The Peace dollar is simply labeled "75 psi July 29, 1998" and is clearly a test of the pressure being used to seal the slab.

As a group, these are a fascinating window into the inner workings at NGC and these are the only examples any of our numismatists have ever seen or heard of. With unusual holders and rare sample slabs experiencing strong collector interest in recent years we expect stiff competition when these cross the block.




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
