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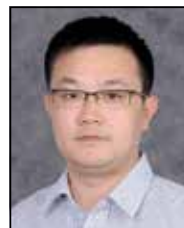
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Mark & Lottie Salton and Their Collection

Foreword by Harvey G. Stack

Over the years I have shared many stories of my family and their decades as leaders in the rare coin business. In 1933, Joseph and Morton opened a shop on 6th Avenue and 23rd Street, creating what became one of the most successful and influential numismatic firms of all time. Prior to World War II, catalogs and price lists were studied by the two brothers and this, along with interacting with some of the most famous numismatists of the time, provided them a perfect numismatic education.

Just five years earlier, in 1928, Felix Schlessinger started his own numismatic and banking business in Berlin, Germany, a thriving enterprise that was joined by Felix's son Max. Looking to escape anti-Jewish sentiment in the 1930s, Felix moved his family and business to Amsterdam. There he continued this popular business until 1943 when the Germans invaded the Netherlands, attacked the residents, and began confiscating their belongings. Max went underground, resisting the occupiers, and relocated to Portugal where he worked with the Free Dutch Forces. After the war, he moved to the United States where he took the name Mark Salton. He earned a master's degree in international banking at New York University, attained an executive post at Manufacturers Hanover Trust and established himself as a part-time coin dealer under the name of Mark M. Salton-Schlessinger.

The Stack family continued their legacy of numismatic expertise in New York City when I joined the firm in 1947. After the war, Stack's became a haven for many of the numismatic dealers and collectors who came to New York and other eastern cities. Among these was Mark Salton, and we began a friendship that would last into the 21st century.

In 1948, Mark met and married Lottie Aronstein, who had also fled the Nazis as a teenager. They shared the excitement of building significant, historical collections for decades. They also shared a mission to educate museums, libraries, and collectors about numismatics. Mark remained a full time banker, but he was passionate about building his collection, which included great studies of the ancient Greek and Roman series and classic European coins. He traveled with Lottie worldwide to collect and learn about the series he wanted to own, and Lottie became a superb numismatist in her own right. When they were in New York, they were frequent visitors at Stack's Rare Coins, and the friendship between the Saltons and the Stack family continued to grow.


My son, Larry, joined the firm in 1973 adding another generation to manage the Stack's family business. As the years went by, Larry and I often met with the Saltons at

special lectures at the American Numismatic Society annual meetings and dinners, as well as at conventions and shows we attended. It truly felt like a “family get together” and every gathering was enjoyed by all. Larry was very fortunate to have many numismatic “fathers and grandfathers” in the business/hobby with Mark being one of the most prominent. Larry modeled his fabulous Renaissance Collection after studying the exhibit the Saltons had on loan to Bowdoin College in Maine. Mark provided Larry with personal guidance and expertise until Mark passed away. We often shared our enthusiasm for the ANS and its efforts. Mark and Lottie always wanted to help institutions to catalog and display their collections so that viewers would have a better understanding of the coins and their history.

Almost every year, Mark and Lottie would make a charitable donation to some museum or institution to further educate those interested in medieval and ancient coins. Stack’s was pleased to provide the documentation and valuations for these incredible donations with our compliments. To show their gratitude, Lottie would stop by with rare bottles of wine for each of us. Over the years we

remained close friends and I will always cherish the time we spent together as warm family friends and numismatic colleagues.

It is with great pleasure and respect to our dear friends the Saltons that we showcase their collections in a series of catalogs in conjunction with our European partners Künker. These presentations will be a lasting tribute to Mark and Lottie Salton, their incredible lives, and their unwavering dedication to the numismatic hobby.

**This foreword was written by Harvey for the January 2022 auction catalog of Part I of the Salton Collection. He passed away on January 3, 2022, never having gotten the chance to see the auction results of his friends' Mark and Lottie's coins.*

The Mark & Lottie Salton Collection

Mark and Lottie Salton have been well known in American numismatic circles since the 1950s—they were active collectors and dealers as well as benefactors of numismatic and other educational institutions. Though probably little known to current generations of collectors, their collections, built quietly in the post-war era when supply was flush and prices were a fraction of today's levels, are some of the finest to come to market in decades. This exquisite collection was put together through the knowledge and connections Mark built in his family's pre-war coin business in Germany, as well Lottie's determined study of numismatics after meeting Mark in the late 1940s. As numismatic bookseller David Fanning wrote in the introduction to Kolbe & Fanning's auction of the Saltons' numismatic library, "Mark and Lottie Salton represented a transitional period in the numismatic trade, being direct links between the European dealers of the era before the Second World War and the modern American coin trade of the post-war years."

I knew the Saltons only vicariously through my mentors Harvey and Larry Stack, who were long-time friends of the Saltons and spoke warmly of their many encounters over the decades. And I knew them through the stories of Ira Rezak, who was their close friend, and whose published obituaries of both Mark and Lottie have informed much of what is generally known of the Saltons in public numismatic circles.

My entrée to the numismatic genius of the Saltons is from first-hand knowledge of and exposure to their immense

and immensely significant collections. The 345 lots in this sale catalog are but a small fraction of the many thousands of coins—ancient and modern—that will be put back into the hands of collectors and museums over the course of a series of auction sales held by Stack's Bowers Galleries in the United States and by Künker in Germany, a powerful auction duo chosen by Mark and Lottie themselves.

Mark passed away in 2005, and Lottie in April 2020, and their intention was that their coins were to be sold after they had both parted this life. As with just about everything in the world these days, the coronavirus pandemic delayed the reintroduction of the Salton Collection into the marketplace, so it was with much anticipation and excitement that Stack's Bowers Galleries received the collection in the summer of 2021. Though Harvey and Larry had seen snippets of the collection over the years, as had others, even the Saltons' closest numismatic friends didn't know the true extent of Mark and Lottie's numismatic holdings. Boy, were we all in for a surprise! With over 8,000 pieces ranging from the sublime to the obscure to the common, the collections were awe-inspiring to say the least.

As we studied the collections in greater depth in preparation for their sale at auction, the Saltons' eye for quality, rarity and pedigree stood out. Much of the collection was built with the goal of gathering together many numismatic masterpieces—both modern European and their ancient progenitors—in one place, while some of the collections are more academic gatherings of ancient or modern types. Other sections are more commercial—for example modern, common gold coins of the world and other pieces which are undoubtedly items retained from Mark's days as a home-based part-time dealer of coins in the 1950s and 1960s.

Stack's Bowers Galleries will be selling the entirety of the Saltons' ancient Greek holdings, of which the first part was offered in our record-setting January 2022 New York International Numismatic Convention Auction, to numismatists' delight and amazement. The Saltons collected not only ancient Greek coins (their Roman collections will be sold by Künker), but they also collected coins of the world, with a concentration on medieval and modern European coins in gold and silver. As with the ancient Greek, the coins of the world will delight due to their superb quality and rarity. Stack's Bowers Galleries sold the Saltons' small but incredibly powerful array of Polish and Russian coinage in January 2022, while Künker picked up the gauntlet in March 2022 with a glittering offering of European gold rarities in Part II of the Salton Collection.





A small number of East Asian and United States coins were offered through Stack's Bowers Galleries' May 2022 Hong Kong and Spring 2022 U.S. Coin Auctions.

In your hands is Part III of the Salton Collection, featuring coins from Portugal, Spain, Latin America, Great Britain, Scotland and the Commonwealth. Masterpieces abound in this offering, beginning with an extremely rare 10 Cruzados of Joao III, an impressively large denomination for the 16th century created at the beginning of the Portuguese Empire and meant to celebrate the growth of her overseas possessions. If the 10 Cruzados celebrates the beginning of a European empire, a 1825 Simon Bolivar gold medal of 8 Escudos weight struck by the city of Potosi in gratitude to the great liberator is symbolically celebratory of the end of Spain's empire in South America. Extremely rare in gold and hailing from the Waldo Newcomer Collection, this medal is yet more fascinating as a flipover double strike error.

British issues commence with a fine offering of Anglo-Saxon pennies followed by a dazzling array of silver and gold issues from the reign of Edward III on through the 20th century. A gold Sovereign of Elizabeth I graded PCGS AU-55 caught my eye the moment it poured forth from the Saltons' original paper envelope, an always impressive issue for its wide diameter and as the progenitor of the more numerous and wildly popular gold Sovereigns of the 19th and later centuries. Britain's first attempt at a Trade Dollar to compete with the Spanish-American 8 Reales is represented by a gorgeous example of the silver 8 Testerns of the then newly formed British East India Company under Elizabeth I.

The issues of Charles I and the Commonwealth from the Salton Collection can only be deemed fantastic. An academic and high quality collection of the Crowns and Pounds through the Civil War are dotted with coins pedigreed to significant collections stretching back a century or more in some cases. An Oxford Mint Pound of 1642 is arresting not only for the sheer weight (nearly 4 troy ounces) of the silver Pound denomination, but also for its quality and the fine rendering of King Charles on horseback; starting in 1919, this piece bounced from the George Hamilton-Smith to the E.H. Wheeler to the V.J.E. Ryan Collection before ending up with the Saltons in the 1950s. This coin is joined by one of the finest known examples of the famed "Cartouche Pound"

of 1644, pedigreed to the Henry Platt Hall Collection sold by Glendining's in 1950. I would be remiss not to cite a gorgeously toned and brilliant, nearly Uncirculated 1650 Commonwealth Unite that is one of the prettiest I have seen.

If you're interested in 5 Guineas, there are examples from nearly every reign from Charles II through George II, including a PCGS MS-61 example of a 1701 "Fine Work" issue of William III, notable not only for its quality but also for its cracked planchet error. An Indian Proof 1841 Mohur restrrike graded PCGS Proof-64+ shows the amazing lion design at its finest and is representative of the handful of issues in this auction from the British Commonwealth. Though we have highlighted just a few of the eye-catching rarities from the Salton Collection, we must admit that there are plenty more fascinating and worthwhile coins at more modest price points, with many carrying estimates well under \$1,000.

If you have even a passing interest in the numismatics of the Iberian peninsula, Latin America, or Great Britain and its empire, I encourage you to visit us during our lot exhibitions in our California headquarters, in our flagship New York City Gallery, or in Rosemont during the 2002 ANA World's Fair of Money to see these miniature works of art in person. Many of the treasures in the pages to follow have not been in the marketplace for half a century or more, and they might not again see the light of day for decades once they enter their next caretakers' hands.

I must impress upon all our clients that the Salton Collection represents an ultimate learning and buying opportunity. It is the culmination of the fruits of decades of efforts and multiple generations' accumulated knowledge and relationships, things that money can't buy. But you can take advantage of the Saltons' efforts at curating one of the most incredible cabinets of ancient and world coins built in the 20th century. If you take home even one of these coins on auction day, it will be impossible to be disappointed!

Certain to be much demand on account of its beauty and connection with the age of exploration.

Magnificently impressive and **EXTREMELY RARE**, this enticing example of early Portuguese gold was the largest denomination produced at the beginning of the Portuguese Empire and meant to celebrate the growth of the her overseas possessions. Portugal's early forays into India and Africa in the 15th and 16th centuries had made the country phenomenally wealthy and the 10 Cruzados was the most opulent way to demonstrate this new wealth.

The artful dies were produced by Alvarez and there is a careful precision about the workmanship with fine detail engraved into the devices and legends. The obverse legend variety appears to be highly unusual, if such a thing can be said to exist on this always uncommon denomination, with this cataloger being

unable to find a parallel example in Gomes or the Numismatic Museum of Portugal Collection. Salton's notes suggest another example may exist in the Portuguese collection, but this is unconfirmed. Nevertheless, the example stands as one of the preeminent European **RARITIES** and an example that is certain to drive much interest. This example displays some soft circulation and hints of strike weakness, most evident on the reverse. A few instances of scratching and scuffing are noted, but nothing too effacing of detail. Though PCGS does not note it on the holder, there is some evidence that this piece might have been used in jewelry in the past. When considering these drawbacks, one must note the general impossibility to acquire this type. This example has been off the market since 1910, and it is unlikely to resurface again for years. Given this state of affairs, we expect this example to perform quite well and for this piece to end up in the cabinet of an advanced European gold collector.

Providing a soft and attractive luster, this example has increased character added by the double struck flipover error. Some traces of the opposing side's design can be discerned when inspected closely, and a large bit of irregular metal flow is also seen near 9 o'clock on the reverse of the medal. The error has not left

this medal unsightly, and it retains nearly all the beauty of the original intention. Very little evidence of handling is seen, with no obvious friction or marking that one might expect for the grade. The details are bold and resolute, despite the nature of error, and overall, the immense eye appeal is unquestionable. Having been off the market since 1935, it is impossible to gauge if this, or any other possibly unknown examples in gold, will ever come to market again in the lifetime of the potential bidder. Therefore, this medal provides a chance for the prodigious collector of Latin American medals to acquire a piece that is virtually uncollectible. 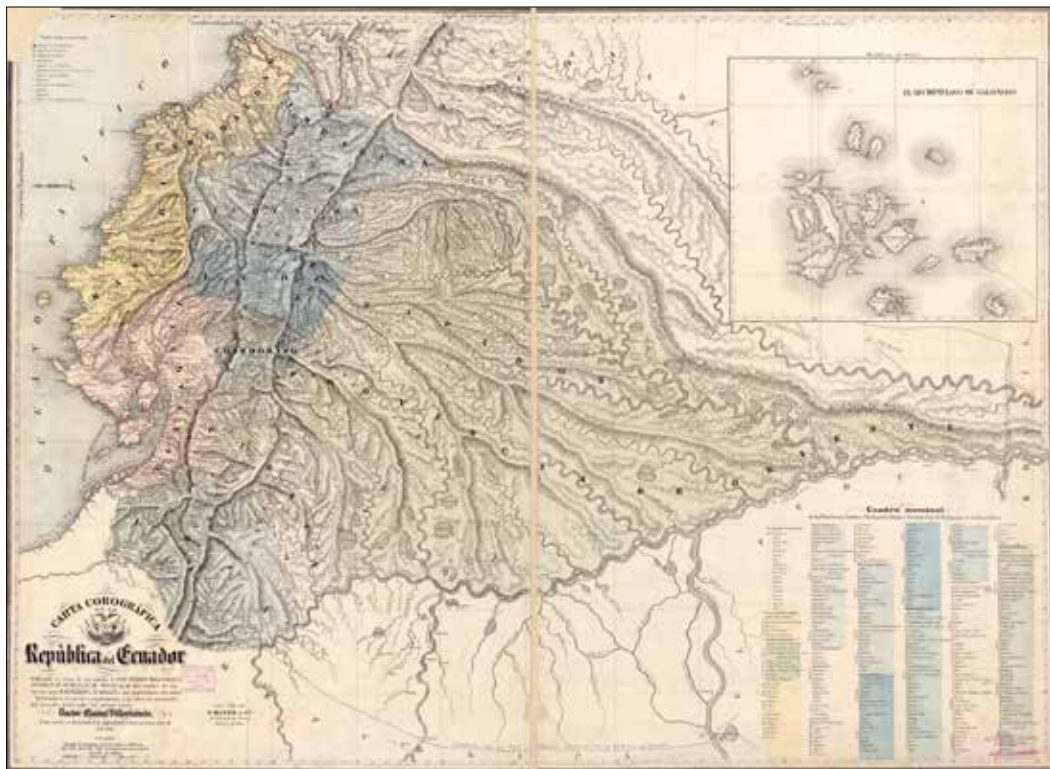

After gaining independence, the fledgling countries of Central America continued to struggle. This is most evident in the provisional as well as counterfeit coinage in circulation prior to proper mints being established. The problem was so dire that when the Provisional Government of Honduras issued the 8 November 1824 decree stating that all coins were to be brought to the government to be examined and if of proper or approximate weight and purity were to be countermarked. This included counterfeits in circulation as long as their weight and fineness were of good quality. Punches were ordered from Guatemala City, but were never received. It was later decided by the Honduran assembly to use an old colonial punch used for the King's Fifth or Quinto. The countermarking action effectively began about 6 months after the December deadline on 7 June 1825.

The first attempt at a British Trade Dollar, the Portcullis coinage was produced for the British East India Company, newly formed in 1600, to compete with Spanish Real pieces. To further this end, the weight of a Testern was standardized at 52.85 grains, equivalent to that of a single Spanish Real. The competition with the Spanish 8 Reales coinage never materialized, leaving the initial strikes of the 8 Testerns and the fractional types as the only examples produced for a brief one-year window. The idea of British Trade coinage would not be revisited until 1895, well after Britain had established herself as the preeminent global power in the age of Exploration.

Undoubtedly one of the finer examples known of this **INCREDIBLY RARE** type, the present specimen should generate tremendous appeal and be fiercely fought over. For comparison, just one other exceeds the current example in the PCGS a census—an EF-45 (the *Lingford/Brand/Montagu specimen*)—which realized a total of \$282,000 in January 2018. Given that the present example resides just back of that colossal piece, the heights to which the former could soar are dizzying to imagine.

The superlative “Cartouche Pound” of 1644, so-called on account of its reverse declaration appearing not merely within two parallel lines, but within a more decorative, shield-like cartouche, is undoubtedly one of the capstone coins of the early modern English series, and a crowning achievement for any advanced collection of world crowns and their multiples. Attributed to the hand of Thomas Rawlins, it represents a degree of artistry and minting mastery that was seemingly ahead of its time.

During the reign of Charles I, a number of factors put strain upon the relationship between the King and Parliament. Aspects such as his marriage to a Roman Catholic (Henrietta Maria of France), failure in wars with Spain and France, the levying of taxes without the consent of Parliament, and the use of antiquated laws to fine individuals all contributed to revolts (from both the Scots and the Irish) and a further estrangement of Charles from main factions in Parliament. One of the final blows before the start of the war

was Charles’s attempted arrest of five members of the House of Commons, going so far as to enter the House chamber by force with an armed guard. After this failed arrest attempt, Parliament seized control of London and Charles marched north to raise an army against them, eventually controlling the west and north of England, having set up his court at Oxford.

While assembled in Wellington (before one of the first battles of the war), Charles made what became known as the “Wellington Declaration,” wherein he declared that he would uphold “the Protestant Religion, the Laws of England and the Liberty of Parliament.” This slogan was afterward given a Latin abbreviation, which was added to the design of several of his coins—including this Pound of 1644—which boldly displays it upon the reverse in a wide and ornate cartouche. On its obverse, we see Charles astride a majestic war horse trampling upon arms and armor below. This equestrian warrior image is prevalent in much of Charles’s coinage and was meant to inspire as many of his subjects as possible. However, his cause was all but lost by 1645 in the face of the Parliamentarians’ New Model Army under Sir Thomas Fairfax and Oliver Cromwell. While seeking assistance from a Scottish army in Nottinghamshire, he was handed over to Parliament only to broker a secret deal with the Scots, leading to the Second Civil War where he was once again defeated. This time, he was tried, convicted, and ultimately executed, leading to the brief Commonwealth period in England under the Cromwells. By 1660, Charles’s eponymous son would be crowned and the monarchy restored.

Though not of Royal Mint dies nor production, this proposed incuse Crown is among the most reflexively recognizable pieces that have become part of the British numismatic cannon. Conceived in the mind of the eclectic Joseph Bonomi the Younger, a man born into a family of architects, and adoptive of many further varied trades inclusive of Egyptologist and sculptor. The November 1837 minutes of the Numismatic Society of London include a description of Bonomi's highly original design for coinage, one where all the devices and legends were sunk under the surface into incuse relief. According to the record: "Mr. Bonomi's object is to suggest to the government a method of perpetuating the prolific likeness of her Majesty Victoria...". By sinking the devices, the portrait of the monarch could be spared wear; a highly novel concept, and one not implemented by any circulating coin until Bela Lyon Pratt's designs for the Quarter and Half Eagle were adopted by the United States.

The 1837 minutes also include an illustration of Bonomi's design, heavily inspired by his classical tendencies. Victoria is presented wearing a diadem and surrounded by stars, representative of the Egyptian conception of the heavens. The reverse presents Britannia standing right, not seated as is normally encountered, holding Victory, and flanked by

the legends "BRITT MINERVA" and "VICTRIX FID DEF". The reverse seeks to synthesize Greco-Roman elements into Victorian iconography; much as the obverse attempts the blend of British and Egyptian motifs. Despite Bonomi's inspiration, and the beautiful nature of the design, he never submitted it to the Crown for review, and the design remained an unexecuted drawing and a cast mold for many years.

It appears that, circa 1893, the Pinches Medallists Company executed this design in a variety of medals and offered them for the price of 21 Shillings. Issues in silver were produced in the number of 150, with this example being numbered 45. Bonomi's original design was slightly modified, with a trident being added to Britannia's left hand, and the stars on the periphery being evened out. The resulting product is an incredibly beautifully piece that is nothing short of breathtaking. The antiquarian design is fully represented on the present specimen, offering impressive details and a splendidly soft and artful luster. Free of any distracting marking, this example stands out with a state of preservation to honor the design. Specimens of the type are quite elusive, making this Crown a must have for any premium collection of British numismatics. A near certainty to inspire much bidding and spirited competition.

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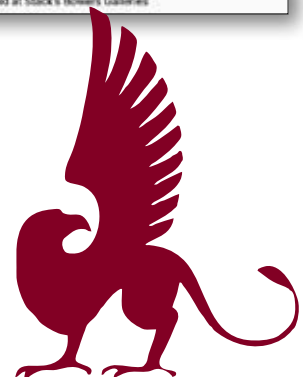
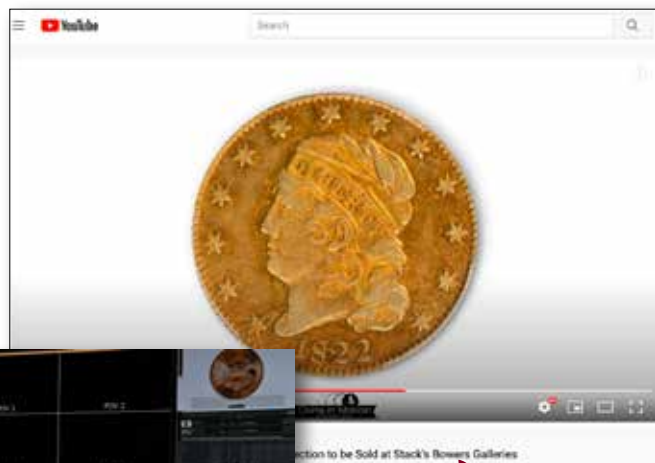

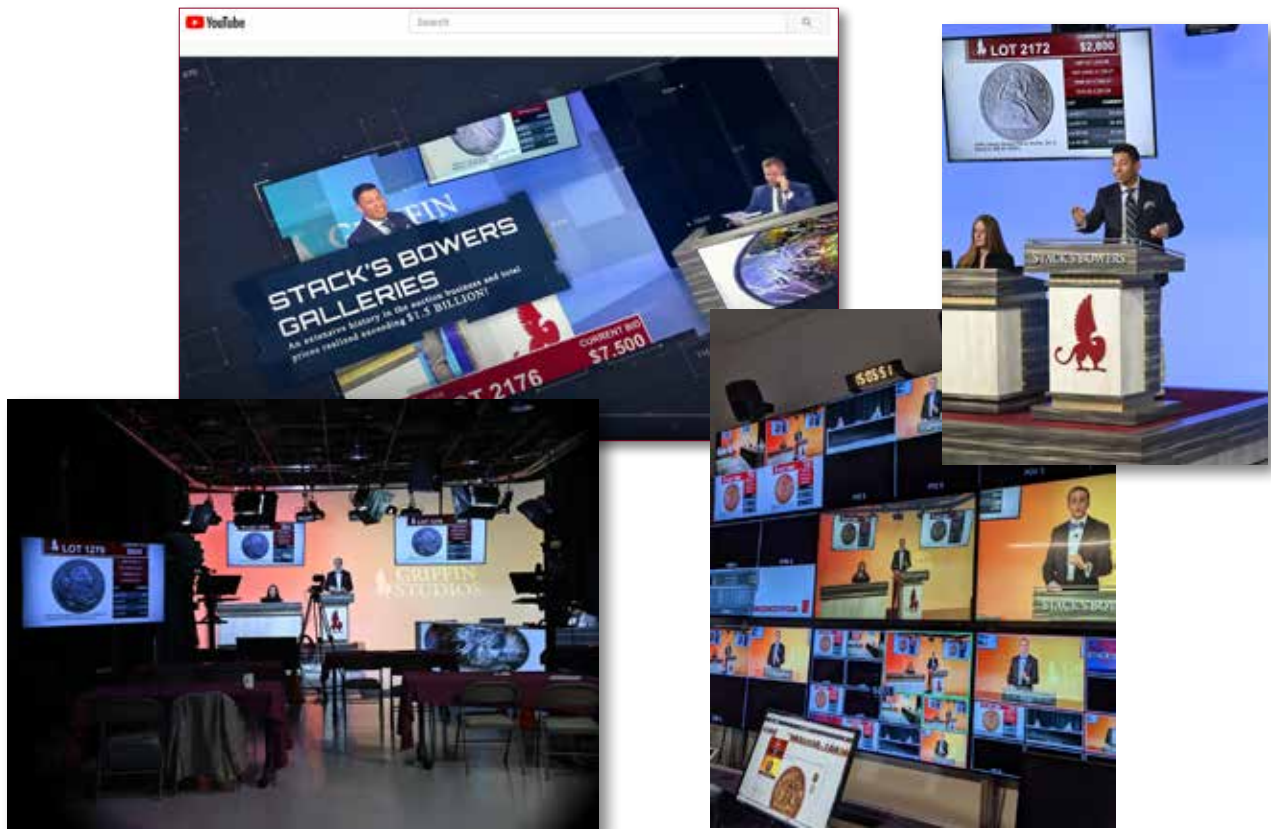
